The Friona Chieftains dropped a pair of games during the week prior to the Christmas break.

The team fell to Lubbock Dunbar here on Tuesday, 63-47, and then lost to the Vega Longhorns, 66-51 on Friday night. The losses left Friona with a 4-7 record at the holiday break.

The game with Dunbar was close for most of the game. The teams traded baskets evenly during the first quarter, which ended tied, 14-14.

The Lubbock team picked up the scoring pace a little in the second quarter, and went to intermission with a seven-point lead at 32-25.

The third quarter, which has been disastrous for the Chiefs in most of their games this season, again proved costly, as the visiting Panthers

outscored the hosts, 18-9, to take a 48-34 lead into the final period.

Mark Tucker led Friona scoring with 14 points, while Roland Comacho had 17 for Dunbar.

Merry Blitzmas To All And To All A Safe Night

Mothers are resourceful souls, particularly at Christmas time. As my family hung up their stockings and receive far too many gifts, I think back forty years to a holocaust of a Christmas Eve when Santa and his reindeer jingled along a perilous path through Nazi bombs and anti-aircraft fire in order to make delivery at a small house in Manchester.

It was December, 1940. England stood alone against the Axis powers. The North Atlantic was a graveyard of merchant ships, sunk by U-boats as they ferried-in fuel and foodstuffs from the American continents. London had been bombed nightly since early September. Other large cities such as Birmingham, Bristol, Coventry and Liverpool were devastated and for the past few weeks Manchester had been receiving her share of destruction. Night after night the "howling Banshee", as Winston Churchill had named the air-raid siren, sent out its eerie message through the city.

The first waves of enemy planes always carried incendiary bombs to light the way for succeeding waves of bombers carrying high explosives.

Targets were supposedly the Manchester Docks and munition works. Most of the schools were no more. Our church was a burned-out shell. Several of the large hospitals had been hit and row upon row of homes and shops were now rubble. Food, clothing and everything else was in short supply and the outlook was for a very bleak Christmas.

Our family was doing very well. A package had arrived from a New York aunt so we had tea, sugar, Crisco, tuna and dried fruits. An unknown-to-us schoolteacher in Tacoma, Washington had received our name from a Manchester schoolteacher. Her class sent a

package which rivalled anything Santa might carry in his sleigh.

There was chewing gum, candy, perfumed soap, toothpaste, dehydrated soups, books and many other items as well as a gorgeous doll from the teacher herself. Mother had unearthed an ancient jar of mincemeat and made pies and had squandered our week's supply of meat coupons on a small roast.

School finished early on Christmas Eve for the holidays. As usual we filed into the assembly hall for evening prayers and our closing hymn was sung. The Headmaster read the prayer, the same one he had used over and over for the past several weeks: "Lighten our darkness we beseech Thee, Oh Lord. And by Thy great mercy, defend us from all perils and dangers of this night."

It always sent a shiver through my soul. As we marched through the door the Headmaster stood there shaking some hands, patting some heads and murmuring, "Good night!" "God bless!" "Take care!" There were many empty desks in his makeshift school and the number of students dwindled with each raid.

At home, Mum, Grandad and I began our nightly before-dark routine.

Everyone who was able went to bed early to snatch a few hours sleep before the blitz began. Dad was an air-raid warden in charge of a large shelter on the other side of the city, the size of Chicago. He always left by mid-afternoon and didn't return until morning. Mum busied herself feeding six-month old Sylvia, and Nora, going on six, plus filling her bag with supplies for the night. Grandad and I had our own checklist of chores. He was eighty years old and a stroke had left him partially paralyzed down one side, but he helped wherever he could.

The family cat was his special charge. In the coal cellar we had a large galvanized tub which lay on its side embedded in sandbags. Inside was a small litterbox, a dish of water and a rug. Puss was placed inside and the opening covered with another sandbag. If the house was bombed she stood a good chance of surviving until we could dig her out.

I filled several pails and pitchers with water and distributed them in the downstairs rooms before turning off the main supply of water and gas. The fires must be damped-down and screens placed in front of them. Grandad gathered up the tin box containing family papers and money. He allowed no one to take care of it save himself. The box was placed on the kitchen table along with gas masks, flashlights and heavy coats. We were yawning and ready for sleep but had to listen to howls of protest from Nora.

"I want to hang up my stocking."
"I'd forgotten all about it," said Mum.

We went through a ritual of hanging up knitted stockings, an old one for me, a slightly-used one for Nora and a spanking new one for the baby. Grandad and Mum said they were not hanging theirs this year as there was a shortage of presents. Grandad told Nora that Santa's elves had joined the army and he was short of workers.

Around 9 p.m. I awoke to the bawling of the siren. I loved the steady music of the "All-clear" but this stomach-twisting, rising-and-falling wail meant "Air-raid warning." I sprang out of bed to wake my mother. She is totally deaf so I shook her and described a circle in the air with one finger. She knew too well what it meant.

While she dressed, wrapped the baby in a blanket and put warm

clothes on a weeping Nora, I got into my siren suit, a sort of jump-suit made from heavy wool, and went to help Grandad down the stairs. They picked up belongings from the kitchen table and left for the shelter with Nora looking at the sky and saying, "I hope the "Nasties" (Nazis) don't shoot Santa Claus."

I closed the door and ran to my post at the street corner lamp. At twelve years old I was on the fire-watching team. Our street consisted of two long rows of houses facing each other. Mr. Lewis and Mr. Ashton each climbed onto a rooftop and stood facing the direction the bombers would come from. I stayed by the lamp post which was encircled by a wall of sandbags and Leslie, my counterpart, stood at the other end of the street.

There were two elderly couples who manned stirrup-pumps. One held the metal end in a pail of water while the other pumped a handle to syphon the water onto any flames. We were waiting for the first waves of planes which would deliver the fire-bombs. If an incendiary landed on a rooftop, Lewis or Ashton would rush to kick it into the street below where Leslie or I would smother it with a sandbag.

If the bomb fell through the roof and into a house, directions were called to the water crew who would enter the house and find some way to put out the flames. If a fire should get out of hand either Leslie or I would run the two blocks to the main road where members of the fire-fighters were cruising the area.

I stood looking at the huge bomber's moon. Fire bombs were really not needed tonight. Bet they came, all the same. I heard a distant thrumming which grew steadily louder until I saw the glinting wings of planes. My muscles tensed.

"Here come the B.....!" Called

reinforced basement of a soap factory. In retrospect, it was a crazy place to have a shelter, with tons of soap and fat stored overhead. I went down a flight of steps and into a huge room which held about three hundred people. There were benches set along the walls and two rows down the center.

The people along the walls had backrests, but those in the center used each other's backs to prop themselves awake through the long nights. Grandad sat with a bunch of his friends playing endless card games. Mother's spot was in the middle with several of our neighbors. They

The Farm contains 266-acres, where the children work to grow much of their own food. They tend a large dairy goat herd and have a thriving egg business, with more than 700 laying hens. They also raise cattle, ducks, geese, and a variety of other small animals. The Farm's program contains a strong vocational emphasis. The children are being taught woodworking and other industrial arts in an effort to prepare them to enter the job market upon graduation from the Farm's Academy. The Farm and the Academy are licensed and approved by the appropriate state agencies. Along with Bob Breunig, other Board members from throughout the business community, assist the

Executive Director, C. Edward Shipman, and his wife, Gloria, in operating the non-profit, charitable facility.

The Farm is multi-denominational. It does not receive Federal or state aid. Operating funds to sustain the program have come from hundreds of individuals throughout the state. Corporations and foundations in the area are assisting with capital funds for the Farm. Several new buildings have just been completed. Homes for seventy-six children are planned.

The Farm's Director, in assessing the success of last year's cookbook, said: "The 'Dallas Cowboys Wives' Cookbook' not only provided needed income to assist us in caring for the children, but it let Cowboy fans all over the country know about the Farm. Since then, many of them have become involved in helping to support our boys and girls. It is far enough away to provide a rural atmosphere, yet close enough to take advantage of all the recreational, educational, and cultural opportunities of the big city.

The Farm contains 266-acres, where the children work to grow much of their own food. They tend a large dairy goat herd and have a thriving egg business, with more than 700 laying hens. They also raise cattle, ducks, geese, and a variety of other small animals. The Farm's program contains a strong vocational emphasis. The children are being taught woodworking and other industrial arts in an effort to prepare them to enter the job market upon graduation from the Farm's Academy. The Farm and the Academy are licensed and approved by the appropriate state agencies. Along with Bob Breunig, other Board members from throughout the business community, assist the

Executive Director, C. Edward Shipman, and his wife, Gloria, in operating the non-profit, charitable facility.

The Farm is multi-denominational. It does not receive Federal or state aid. Operating funds to sustain the program have come from hundreds of individuals throughout the state. Corporations and foundations in the area are assisting with capital funds for the Farm. Several new buildings have just been completed. Homes for seventy-six children are planned.

The Farm's Director, in assessing the success of last year's cookbook, said: "The 'Dallas Cowboys Wives' Cookbook' not only provided needed income to assist us in caring for the children, but it let Cowboy fans all over the country know about the Farm. Since then, many of them have become involved in helping to support our boys and girls. OLD LAWS ARE GIVEN

Check The Lawbook--You May Be Guilty

The following are actual laws. Though most are ludicrous, all are currently on the books.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

A law enacted in Great Britain in 1865 limits the speed of self-propelled vehicles to four miles per hour and requires that each be preceded by a man on foot waving a red flag.

Twice a year in the Shawnee National Forest, the U.S. Forest Service closes a two mile stretch of highway so the local snake population can migrate between their winter and summer homes. Rattlesnakes, copperheads and water moccasins wriggle down from the hills to summer in the swamps, then charge uphill again for the winter.

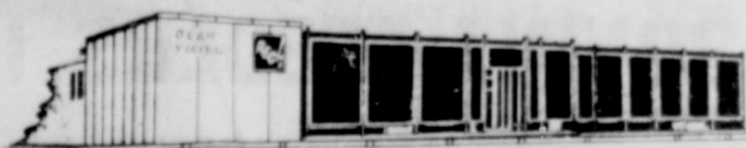

Major Bell concluded by saying, "It is the sincere wish of the Texas Department of Public Safety that all citizens enjoy a safe and happy holiday season."

Blue Shelled Eggs Are No Different

Despite some claims, "blue shelled" eggs are no more nutritious and are no lower in cholesterol than ordinary white or brown shelled eggs.

The myths originated mainly with the Araucana breed of chickens in Chile, says Dr. Dave Mellor, poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The Araucana chicken is the best known breed producing blue shelled eggs. Actually, the eggs vary in color from light green to dark olive, so some people have tabbed the Araucana the "Easter egg chicken."

In tests at Texas A&M University and other universities, blue shelled eggs have always had as much or more cholesterol than commercial table eggs or any other egg for that matter, points out Mellor. Actually, in one Texas A&M test, Araucana, quail, pheasant and White Leghorn eggs all had the same cholesterol content based on amount of cholesterol per unit weight of egg.

Blue shelled eggs are usually more expensive to produce than commercial table eggs, notes Mellor. People willing to pay a high price for these eggs should recognize that the Texas Egg Law requires that all eggs be graded, have a clean, sound shell and be maintained under 60 degrees F.

The Happy Homemaker

This week's column is going to be somewhat different than usual. There will be no recipes in it. Instead, we're going to have some real honest-to-goodness "receipts."

When plans for Ingram's Centennial-Plus-One Celebration, which was held in July of 1980, were being made, someone came up with the idea of publishing a "Receipt Book of Pioneer Days."

Ingram is a small town in West Kerr County, Texas, and the book was published by The Citizen's Chamber of West Kerr County.

Our down-the-street neighbors, Luther and Clessy Stroud, attended the celebration. There were several booths where hand made items could be purchased and Clessy came home with some of these.

She browsed through the cookbooks, but didn't buy one. Later, Luther told her he had bought one for her. In addition to the many receipts for all kinds of good things to eat, there are some for beauty aids, remedies for various illnesses, soap and other things.

The forward of the book contains some history of the town and the following explanation:

"It is important to remember that the majority of our Texas Pioneer women were raised on plantations throughout the South and were totally unprepared for the life that lay before them.

Their appetites had often been appeased in banquet sized dining rooms; the food having been prepared by cooks who knew how to cook "by ear."

Therefore, not only were they faced with the general hardships endured to make happy homes in the wilderness, but they had to learn to cook and to doctor their families.

The frontier did not have available the patent medicines and tonics which had been available to them before they journeyed to Texas.

Staples were brought to last a year

and usually included flour, sugar, salt, beans, sorghum and vinegar.

Vegetable, flower and herb gardens were an important part of each household, for they provided food, medicine and ornaments.

Storage cellars contained foods that were dried, cold packed and canned. To these our pioneer mothers added nature's yield, spiced everything with a handful of imagination, blended in an overflowing cup of love, and were homemakers for their families.

The following are "receipts," the antiquated word for recipes, and hints from the book.

For Good Spinach Do Not Overcook

Wash the leaves well. Shake slightly the last rinse and put in heavy skillet with a lid.

Add: 1 clove garlic, halved, 1 strip bacon, 1 tablespoon butter and salt to the skillet. Cover, cook until sizzling; toss to distribute butter and seasonings. Recover, and in 3 to 4 minutes, test for doneness. Remove from heat—toss with black pepper and 1 to 2 teaspoons vinegar and black pepper.

Serve immediately. Garnish with sliced hard boiled egg.

Hint: "There are only two lasting bequests we can leave our children—one is roots, the other, wings."

Depression Cookies

2 cups sugar
1 cup shortening
2 teaspoons baking powder
3 eggs
Pinch of salt
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Flour—3 or 4 cups

Mix sugar and shortening 'till well blended. Add remaining ingredients and flour 'till mixture is very stiff. Roll or drop onto greased cookie sheet. Bake in 350 degree oven about 12 minutes.

Tea Cakes

3 eggs
3 cups sugar
4 tablespoons shortening
2 teaspoons soda
4 tablespoons baking powder
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 tablespoon vanilla
Enough flour to make stiff dough (5 cups)

Cream sugar and shortnin'-add eggs and vanilla, mix well. Mix soda and baking powder with 2 cups flour. Add milk and flour alternately to creamed mixture. When dough is stiff enough, roll out small amounts at a time—1/4 inch thick on floured board.

Cut with cookie cutter. Bake in preheated oven (400 degrees) for 10 minutes—a fourth generation receipt!!

I especially like this little filler. "Oh, Weary Mothers, rolling dough, Don't you wish that food would grow?"

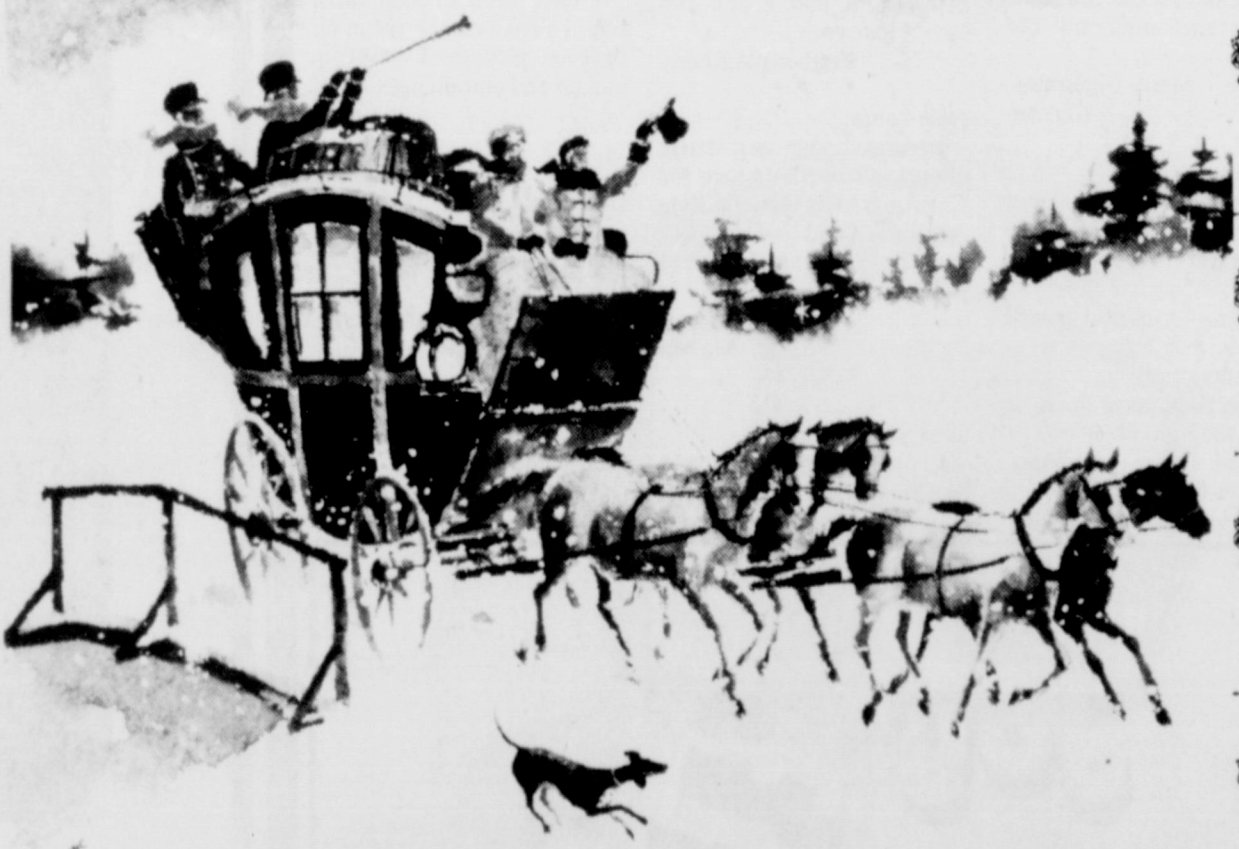

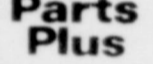

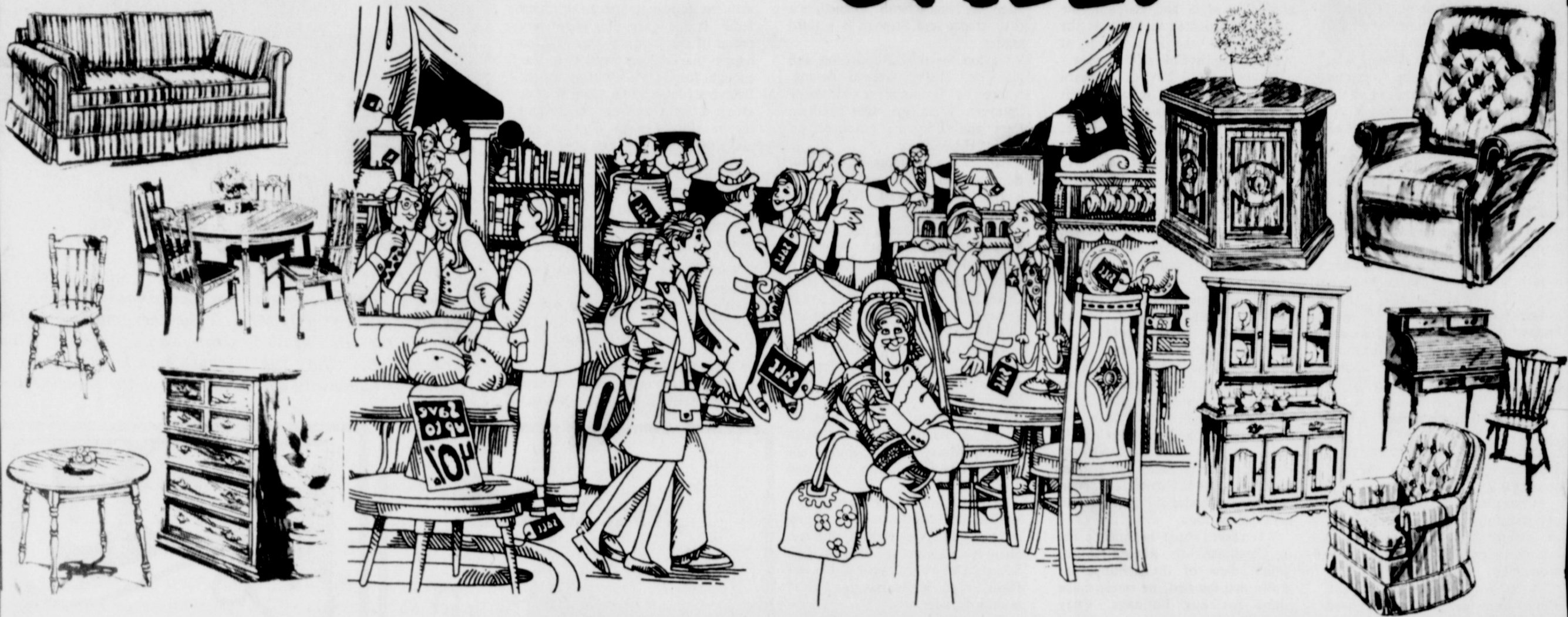
