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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I think it is a shame that the school has to employ coaches to teach vital subjects in high school. Especially coaches who have such poor qualifications for teaching. This can be a very bad educational experience for students hoping to learn all they can in a particular subject.

Such students are penalized when they enter college, and take advanced courses, with a skimpy background. It makes it hard for them to compete in college.

Did you know that one particular "teacher" required his students to read the newspapers for current events, then asked questions such as "Which team is leading the EASTERN division of the National League?" or "What player has the best batting average?" We doubt that even the athletes knew these "current events."

His command of English is so bad, that sometimes the wording on his test questions made it possible for the students to interpret the question several ways. But only HIS way is right—if you don't interpret it the way he meant it, you're out of luck.

It's also pretty sad when such a teacher doesn't always check the roll, because he can't pronounce the kids' names.

Also, I heard that in several instances, he gave "zero" grades to students for not turning in homework, when such work actually was turned in; and that some of the students, when they were given their grade averages, figured the averages

themselves, and came up ten points different from the teacher's grades.

I realize that in a school system the size of Friona's, we are faced with having coaches fill spots in the classroom. This is the way it has always been. And I also know that sometimes it's hard to judge a person's teaching ability until they have actually performed.

But I want to remind the school board of one old standard they might have forgotten: ask the applicants to walk and chew gum at the same time. If they can't do both, then send them on down the road.

It's too late to mend the wrongs done by this particular "instructor," but perhaps the school board and administration should use a little more care in the future.

Editor's Note: I think you have a very valid complaint. This isn't the first time we've heard that particular complaint this year.

Dear Bill,

This past Wednesday City Manager A.L. Outland informed the manager of the swimming pool that starting Tuesday, June 2, there would be one lifeguard and one manager on duty. And NO lifeguards and one manager at private parties.

When I heard this I thought it was a joke. Not only is this absurd, but it is impossible for one person to watch the pool.

One person cannot get to all places in the pool from the lifeguard stand

very quickly. Also, if there was one lifeguard, this person would have to sit, watching the pool for five hours. It is impossible to keep alert for over 30 minutes.

The reason for this is that the pool has not brought in enough money so far this year. The pool has only been open for 12 days when this letter was written. Two or three of these days were bad and cold because of rain. Mr. Outland said that there was too much money spent on salaries. The lifeguards have spent a few extra hours overtime to try and clean up the pool area these first few days. The salaries were lower these two weeks than they were all last year.

He (Mr. Outland) also said that there have never been four lifeguards on duty before. Last year there were four fulltime lifeguards on duty at all times. The lifeguards are the lowest paid babysitters in town. They are paid \$2.25 per hour to watch over 50 or 60 people. If Mr. Outland's "new idea" goes into effect, the city will surely be out a lot of money if someone drowns.

Not only does there need to be at least four fulltime lifeguards on duty, some improvements need to be made also. There is nothing out at the pool to help save people. In the lifesaving course, it is taught that going in after someone is to be the last resort. Going in is the ONLY way there is to help someone out there. Some throwable ring buoys were asked for. Mr. Outland went to a variety store and bought two rubber inflatable, 98 cent toys that have an 8 1/2 inch in diameter hole for someone to fit in.

The pool area has gone down hill for several years. The cement has holes in it and is chipping. The tile on the inside is chipped up and can cut someone's feet. The roof leaks when it rains, after it rains there is an inch of water standing inside. Almost all of the equipment to clean the pool is old and needs to be replaced.

As you can see this whole mess is unnecessary and can be cleaned up if some money was spent on the upkeep of the pool area. The pool is the only recreation Friona has for it's youth. It should not be neglected. I would like everyone to go and view the pool area for themselves. If you have children that swim you especially need to get involved, and make the pool a safe place with four lifeguards and some new equipment.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 6, 1941

Paul Spring, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.L. Spring of this city, has completed his degree requirements at Texas Tech College and will enter medical school at Baylor University this summer.

35 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1946

Brookfield, one of the stars of our 1941 team, may play for Borger's team in the West Texas-New Mexico professional league this year.

30 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1951

Friona students this week chalked up a final honor for the concluded term by winning the Quizdown contest in Amarillo. Local team members included Mary Tom Spring, Robbie Boggess, Jon Mack Roden, Judy Barnett, Jan Edelman, Darrell Buske, Phyllis Treider, Gerald Floyd

and Janice Miller. The program is sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and Station KGNC.

25 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1956

A new business for Friona, to be owned and operated by J.L. Marcum and J.C. Claborn, will soon open its doors on Main Street in the former location of the Corner Drug and Knox's Ready-to-Wear. It will handle furniture and home furnishings. Marcum, who is now managing Marcum-Claborn Funeral Home here, made the announcement this week.

20 YEARS AGO—JUNE 1, 1961

Parmer County voters saw eye-to-eye with the majority of the ballot-markers throughout the state in Saturday's special U.S. Senate election, giving Republican John Tower a slight edge over his democratic opponent, Bill Blakely. Lazbuddie was the only precinct to give Blakely an edge, and that was by a one-vote margin, 75-74.

15 YEARS AGO—JUNE 3, 1965

Dr. Robert Alexander, a former classmate of Friona's Dr. J.L. Humphrey, will move to Friona as the fifth medical doctor on the staff of Parmer County Community Hospital on July 1. The ceremonies will also commemorate the 64th anniversary of the organization of Parmer County, and will highlight the local observance of "County History Appreciation Week," which has been proclaimed for June 6-12 by

Governor Preston Smith.

5 YEARS AGO—MAY 30, 1976

Milton Evans of Friona was injured Wednesday following a freakish two-vehicle accident just east of Friona. A large truck driven by a Nebraska man jack-knifed across Highway 60, just after a cloudburst had dumped water onto the road and made it slick. Evans crashed into the truck. Evans sustained cuts and abrasions, plus a fractured ankle.

Industry Starts New Promotion

On July 1, 1981, the Texas cattle industry will implement a voluntary 25-cent-per-head beef promotion investment program.

Under the new system, 25 cents will be collected on cattle and calves sold through participating markets, packers, dealers and order buyers. The funds will be remitted entirely to the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board for use in national programs of research, education and promotion.

The organizations initiating the 25-cent investment are the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., Texas Cattle Feeders Assn., Texas Farm Bureau, the Independent Cattlemen's Assn. and the Livestock Marketing Assn. of Texas.

At a meeting May 6 in Irving, Texas, these groups agreed to put the investment program in motion and also to form a beef promotion coordinating committee which will oversee the implementation of the entire effort.
