Two Killed In Two-Car Crash

Two men died as the result of a head-on automobile crash at Black last Sunday morning, September 20. It was the county's second fatal highway accident within a week.

Killed outright was Arthur C. Bentley, 72, of Hereford, one of the drivers. Dying later of massive head injuries was Robert Amador, 27, of Bovina, driver of the other vehicle.

Officers said that Bentley was driving a 1977 Plymouth westbound, and that Amador was driving a 1978 Trans-Am eastbound. Amador's vehicle was on the wrong side of the roadway when the two cars hit, about 6.7 miles northeast of Friona.

Bentley was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler.

Also injured in the accident was Bentley's wife, Ellen, who was on the passenger side of the front seat, his daughter, Barbara, 26, of Amarillo,

and a grandson, Allen Sears, nine, of Hereford, who was found unconscious when rescue workers arrived.

Amador was pinned in the car he was driving for some 20 or 30 minutes. Members of the Friona Fire Department rescue squad used their Jaws of Life to extricate him from the wreckage.

The Bentley women, the Sears youth and Amador were all brought to Parmer County Community Hospital for treatment. Amador was later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he died of his injuries at 9:15 p.m. Monday, September 21.

On Monday, September 14, Pedro Guerrero, 19, of Bovina, was killed as he was working as a flagman on the U.S. Highway 60 construction project, about a mile west of Friona.

Church Loyalty Day Slated Here Sunday

Sunday, September 27, will be a special day for the churches in Friona.

The day has been designated as "Church Loyalty Sunday," with special emphasis on attendance at the morning worship services that day.

Attendance goals have been set by many Friona churches, and the promoters of the event are hoping for 2,500 people to be in church on Sunday.

"This will give people a chance to stand up and be counted for their faith, and also provide an opportunity for people to realize how much they are needed by their church," said Rev. Archie Echols, pastor of the Friona United Methodist Church.

Everyone who is a member of a Friona church is urged to make a special effort to be in church and Sunday School on Sunday. Those who are

not members are urged to attend the church of their choice.

It was pointed out that the goal of 2,500 people in church represents less than half of the population of Friona and its trade area.

"Church Loyalty Sunday" is being sponsored by the Friona Ministerial Alliance, but the group indicates that other churches which are not members of the alliance are expected to take part.

A tally will be made by the individual churches and the results of the special church attendance emphasis will be published next week.

As far as anyone knows, this is the first time for all of the churches in the community to band together in a church attendance program. Depending upon the success of this effort, the event may become an annual or a semi-annual affair.

Maize Days Fete Termed Successful

Friona's Diamond Jubilee Maize Days was a big success, as judged by the participation and attendance at the events last week.

A capacity crowd attended the Little Miss Friona pageant, first major event on the schedule, at which Poppy Grimsley was crowned Little Miss; Stephanie Wilcox was named first runnerup and Misty Renner, second runnerup.

Another full house was present Thursday afternoon and evening for the 25th annual Maize Queen pageant. Penni Weatherly, 17-year-

old Friona High School senior, was crowned queen at the close of the full day of activities.

Saturday's activities were blessed by good weather, as the day dawned clear. Only a slight breeze marred an otherwise perfect day.

A good crowd attended the Maize Days parade at 10 a.m. Saturday, which also drew a large number of parade entrants from across the Golden Spread. The parade lasted for almost an hour, and featured a number of floats, bands, riding clubs, antique cars, and other entries.

Serving as parade marshal and mistress were JeDon Gallman and Gaye Tannahill, Friona's Man and Woman of the Year.

A good crowd also attended the Maize Days barbecue, which was catered this year by Johnny's Barbecue of Midland, and good reports were heard concerning the barbecue meal.

Aero Space Shows of Dallas furnished the carnival for Maize Days, featuring a good selection of rides. The carnival business, which had been slowed somewhat earlier in the week by rain and cool weather, picked up considerably toward the last of the week, and apparently Saturday was a banner day.

The six-gun shootout, presented by the McKenzie Gunslingers of Lubbock, featuring several members from Friona, proved to be a popular attraction. The group presented their act every hour on the northwest corner of the park.

A good turnout was also noted at the pet show, and for the barrel racing and steer roping events Saturday evening.

Clubs and organizations also reported that their fund-raising efforts from booths and raffles held in conjunction with Maize Days, were highly successful. For most of these organizations, Maize Days provides the chief fund-raising event for the year.

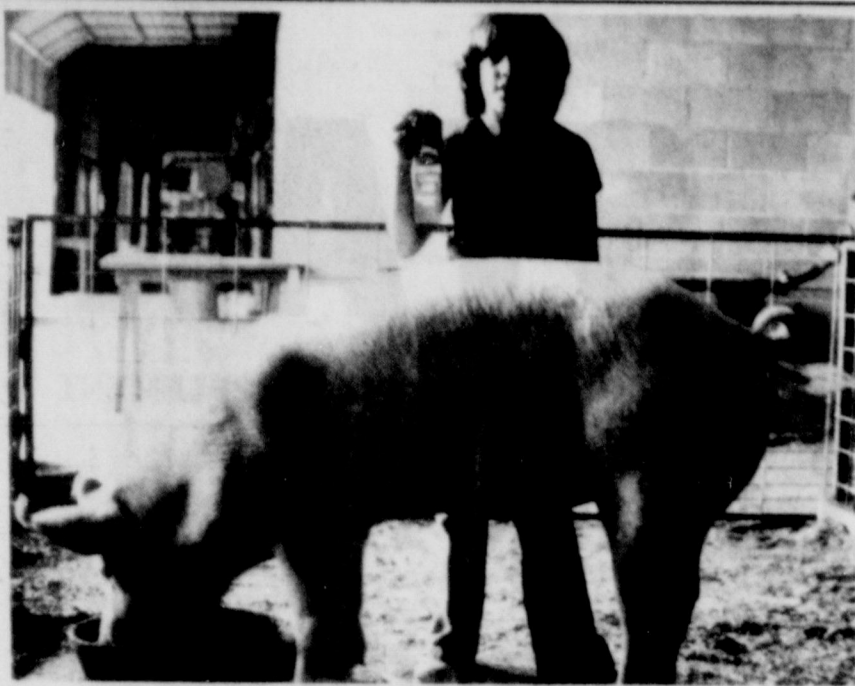

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 11, 1931

The 1931-32 term of school opened in Friona Monday morning, under the direction of a most competent corps of teachers, numbering 19 in all. Supt. George A. Heath reports an enrollment for the first day of 517.

O.E. Massie, one of Friona's progressive and thrifty farmers, living some eight miles southeast of town, had eight sows who during their last farrow brought forth 120 fine pigs, an average of 15 to the sow.

45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 11, 1936

Born to Mr. and Mrs. S. Abdullah, at their home in Friona Sunday morning, twin daughters, weighing five and one-half and six and one-half pounds. Twin daughters were also reported born to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Naples of the Lakeview Community on the same day. Word was also received at the Star office that twin daughters were born to Mr. and Mrs. Buck Chiles.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 12, 1941

The Friona Cardinals dived a double-header with the Amarillo Pinkney Packers, played on the local diamond Sunday, winning the first game by a score of 6-2, and losing the second, 1-0. Wright Williams pitched a two-hit game in the nightcap, only to lose, with the only run scoring on an error.

Miss Staley of Springfield, Mo., and a joint owner of what is known as the "Staley Sisters" farm, adjoining the city on the West, visited the city last week.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1946

The marble games that had been in progress among the smaller boys on the vacant lots south of Plains Hardware, have been forsaken by the boys on account of the opening of school. Whether this breaking up of the games was optional on the part of the boys, or rather obligatory on the part of the parents, is a question.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1951

School began in Friona this week. Some added confusion was evident, due to the lack of space brought about by the loss of the high school building last spring by fire. Classes

are meeting in makeshift locations, until such times as the annex is completed. The annex will house high school students this year, and in future years will be used as a cafeteria. A total of 525 students enrolled on the first day of school.

25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1956

Enrollment in Friona's bulging public school system crept close to the 900 mark Wednesday morning, as a total of 893 students filed into the buildings for the second day of classes.

The Baxter Addition was annexed to the city by the Friona city commissioners Tuesday night. Developed by Oscar Baxter, the addition includes a two-block area in the western part of town.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 7, 1961

Joe W. Jones, Parmer County Agricultural Agent for the past 11 1/2 years, last week submitted his resignation to the Parmer County Commissioners Court. Jones plans to join the Security State Bank in Farwell.

A sudden blaze raced across five alleys in the Friona Lanes Sunday morning at 3:05 a.m. causing an estimated \$8,500 in damage, most due to smoke.

15 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 8, 1966

Thirty contestants had been entered in the 1966 Friona Maize Queen Contest, just one short of the all-time record.

A talent contest sponsored by the Friona Junior Chamber of Commerce will kick off the 1966 Maize Days celebration--Friona's 60th Anniversary--next Tuesday at 8 p.m.

10 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 9, 1971

Frank A. Spring, longtime president of Friona State Bank, officially announced his retirement this week. At the same time, the bank's board of directors announced that Robert L. Neelley would become the bank's seventh president. Spring's retirement date, and Neelley's

appointment, will be effective October 1 of this year. Spring, 63, has been associated with Friona State Bank since 1931. He has served as president since 1959, but has been active in the bank's management since 1944.

SWCD Sets Election

An election for a director to serve in Zone 3 on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 6 at Hub Grain in the Hub community, according to M.C. Osborn, chairman of the board. The election will be held beginning at 10 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone three of the district includes an area from a line beginning at Parmerton going north to Frio Draw and taking in the following area: land south of Frio Draw below Hub to Castro County line.

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County SWCD are M.C. Osborn, chairman, of Friona; Leon Grissom, vice chairman, of Bovina; Phillip Johnson, secretary-treasurer, of Hub; R. Dan Smith, member, of Lazbuddie; and Raymond Schueler, member, of Rhea community.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

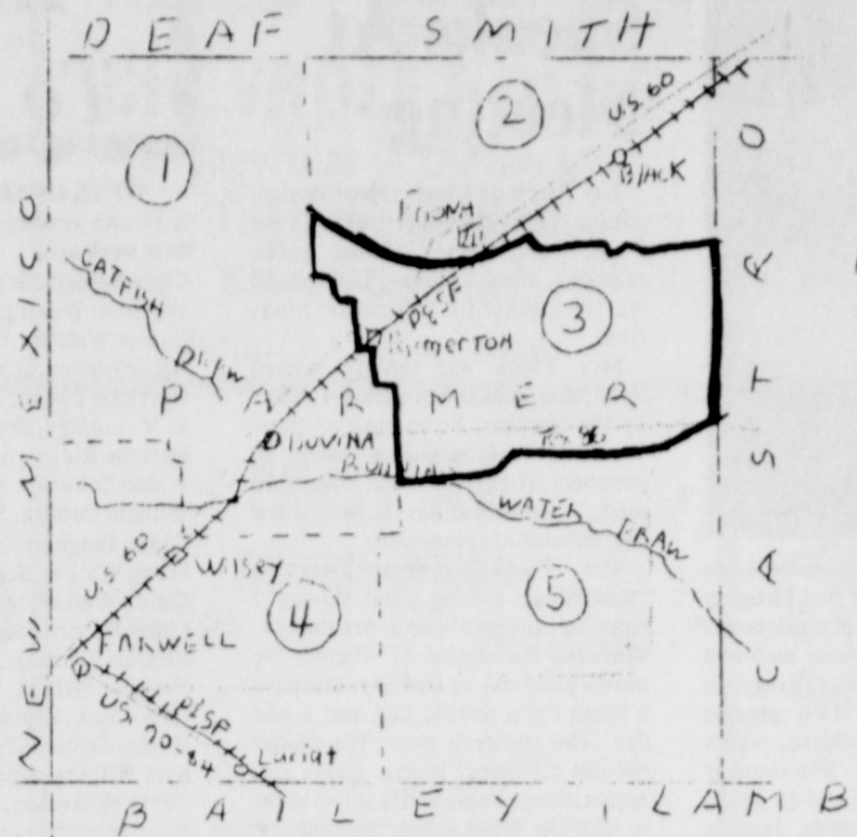

Medfly Problem For Consumers Major Concern For Producers

This summer's supplies of fresh produce are abundant, thanks to good growing conditions throughout most of the country, but a persistent little fly is causing a lot of concern. Although many growers are worried about the potential spread of the Mediterranean Fruit Fly, consumers have little to fear.

No significant reduction in supplies of quality fresh produce items is expected, according to United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association. However, the battle against the medfly—a very destructive pest—has raised some questions for consumers, especially with all the publicity about this prolific insect.

Will I find a medfly in my fruit (or vegetable)?
 No. Infested produce is not being shipped. All shipments must be certified free of infestation.

Will there be any shortages of fresh fruits and vegetables?

Not likely. The affected growing areas include far less than 1 per cent of the total for fresh and processed produce. This should have little effect on fresh supplies. While California's San Joaquin Valley is a major producer of fruits and vegetables, only a tiny amount of produce—much of it for processing—is involved at this time. In addition, supplies of fresh produce from other producing areas throughout the country are good or better than average.

Will prices go up?

Historically, prices remain reasonable when supplies are adequate. So far this season, and on the basis of all known projections, supplies will be at least adequate, probably abundant.

How should I handle fresh produce I buy in the supermarket?
 Just like you always handle it. Handle it as you would produce from your own fruit trees or garden.

Food items that contain harmful residues or substances cannot be shipped in interstate commerce. Malathion, the pesticide being used in the medfly eradication program, is considered to be one of the safest on the market and has been widely used for a number of years by consumers in the home and by public health officials.

What is the "bottom line"? Can I buy and eat fresh fruits and vegetables with confidence?

Of course! Supplies and quality are good. Believe your own experienced eye as you buy. If it looks and feels good, it ought to be good. Look for the freshest of the fresh. Select produce that is of characteristic color, shape and size for the commodity. These are good guides for choosing quality produce.

Then why is the medfly a problem?
 Once infested, fruits and vegetables spoil rapidly and become unmarketable.

Everybody is understandably concerned about controlling a potentially destructive pest. Fortunately, control measures, which are known and proven, are available and are being applied.

Sales Tax Checks Are Documented

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said 750 Texas cities received \$40.9 million in city sales tax rebates for September.

The September payments push the city's rebates for this year to \$480.3 million, up 14.7 per cent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

Most area cities received some type of rebate and the per cent of change from 1980 to 1981 showed an increase in the percentages of payments to the cities.

For example, in Friona, city sales taxes paid to date amounted to \$4,683.67, which was more than their comparable figure of \$1,590.96 for this period last year.

Friona's 1981 payments to date include \$67,558.87, and their comparable totals to this date in 1980 include the total of \$59,629.26, which is an increase of 13.30 per cent.

In the neighboring city of Bovina, their sales tax net payment this period amounted to \$654.01, which compared to \$1,175.99 for the same time last year. The amount of payments in 1981 amounted to \$18,347.73 to date and to this time last year, the amount was \$16,053.62, which denoted an increase in payments of 14.29 per cent.

In Farwell, net payment of sales

taxes for this period totaled \$1,327.65, which compared to a payment of \$1,319.78 one year ago, to date.

In payments made to date in 1981, the figure totaled \$15,810.93 which compared to a payment of \$19,347.35 to date last year, indicating a loss of 18.28 per cent.

In the Bailey County seat at Muleshoe, the payment to this period in 1981 amounted to \$10,656.60, which compared to a payment in 1980 for the same period of \$8,249.59. In payments to date for 1981, Muleshoe totaled \$144,565.28, which compared with \$128,207.30 for the same period last year, an increase of 12.76 per cent.

Forty-five teams entered the first roping. After four rounds, overall winners were:

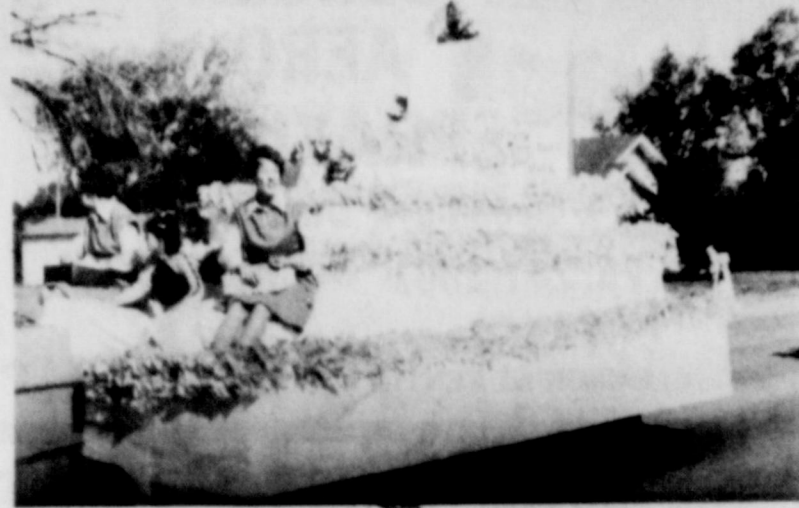
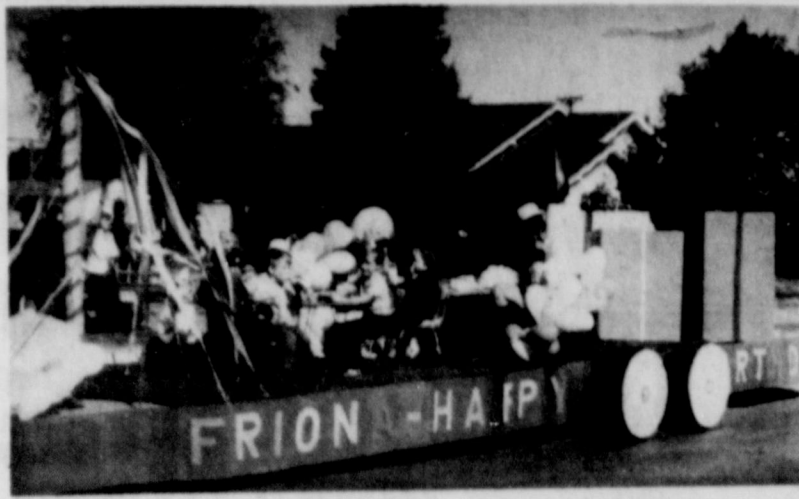

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Chiefs Threaten, But Eagles Take Victory

For a time there, it looked as though the Friona Chieftains were going to snap their 18-game losing streak, at the expense of the tough Seagraves Eagles.

Friona took advantage of a couple of second-quarter breaks to take a 12-6 lead, and definitely had the momentum and things going their way, when a fumble gave the ball to Seagraves, and they regained the lead—and the momentum.

Seagraves scored first, driving 75 yards in 12 plays, capped by a 25-yard pass for a touchdown. The PAT kick was low, for a 6-0 score, 32 seconds into the second quarter.

A few minutes later, the Chieftains used a Mark Montoya punt to back the Eagles into bad field position. Montoya got a good roll on a 54-yard boot that rolled dead at the Seagraves eight yard line.

The Friona fans had something to cheer about when the Eagle ball-carrier was shaken from the pigskin on first down, and Friona recovered.

The Chiefs capitalized on the break. Nelson Jackson gained five yards, and then on third down went across the goal-line for Friona's first touchdown for 1981. Montoya's kick went wide, and the team had to settle for a 6-6 tie, with 8:04 left in the half.

Montoya boomed the kickoff out of the end zone, and the fired-up Chieftains began hitting like gangbusters. Once again, they forced a fumble, and recovered the ball at the Eagle 35 yard-line.

Two plays lost yardage back to the

Seagraves 41, setting up the play of the game as far as Friona was concerned.

Jackson took the ball, and cocked his arm as if to pass, then tucked it away and ran. He went toward the left sidelines, then cut back against the grain, picking up a block or two, and turned it into a 41-yard scoring play. A number of would-be Seagraves tacklers were left on the turf, after the nifty run.

Once again the kick was wide, but Friona had a 12-6 lead with 6:15 on the clock. The Chieftains had the momentum, and Seagraves was visibly shaken.

Following the kickoff, Friona forced a punt, and then after a short kick, took over on the Eagles' 46 yard-line.

This would have been the chance to really gain control of the game, but instead, a turnover gave Seagraves the chance to get back in the driver's seat.

The Eagles pounced on a Friona fumble at their own 44. Two plays later, a reverse play worked for 53 yards and a touchdown. The kick gave Seagraves a 13-12 lead with 3:34 on the clock, and that turned out to be the halftime score.

Friona had yet one more scoring chance, after a Montoya punt backed the Eagles up to their two-yard line. The Chiefs forced Seagraves to punt, then partially blocked the kick and took over on the Seagraves 31. However, the team had failed to call an early time out, and just 29 seconds remained before halftime.

Three passes gained to the 24, and on fourth down, and 17 seconds showing on the clock, Montoya was called on to try a 41-yard field goal. The kick had enough distance, but was barely wide, and instead of having a 15-13 lead, the Chiefs trailed at halftime by one point.

The second half was dominated by Seagraves, which held Friona to only one first down and just 30 net yards, and in the meantime put a couple of insurance touchdowns on the scoreboard.

Friona had almost held the Eagles on a third-period drive, when they scored on a 26-yard pass play, in which the quarterback was forced to scramble. The pass was completed over the outstretched hands of Jackson, who was covering the receiver. This made the score 20-12.

Later in the quarter, Friona punted to the Seagraves 39, and Gilbert Espinoza fielded the ball on his 39 yard line. He pulled away from a would-be tackler, and raced 61 yards up the sideline for the clinching touchdown.

The Chiefs didn't have a serious threat in the second half.

"We made four bad mistakes, and got burned all four times. Those things will happen to you," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Moss said he expected that it would take a good performance for his team to beat Farwell this week. Both teams are winless to this point. Farwell

dropped a 72-0 decision to Morton last week.

"I'm sure they'll be after us. They will be wanting to win just as badly as we do," Moss said.

After Friday's game, the third road game out of four 1981 engagements, the team will return home to meet Vega October 2.

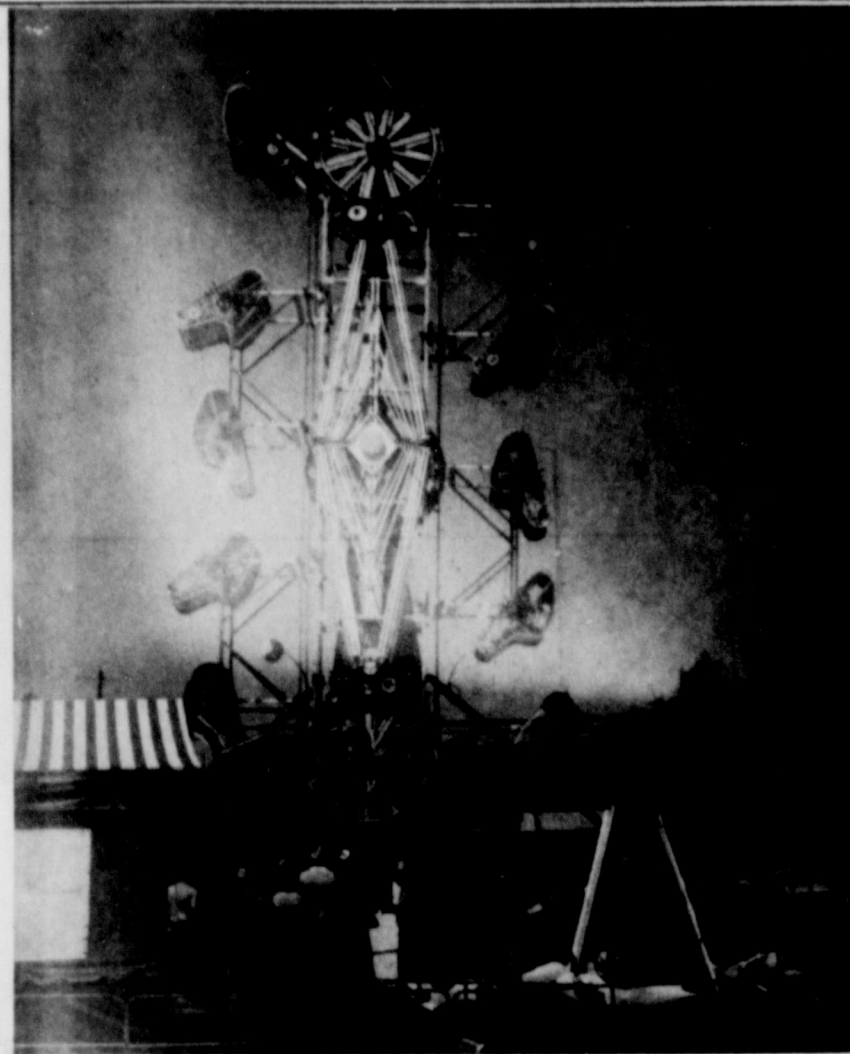

The Georgia-Clemson game was missed by approximately 95 per cent of the contestants, as top-rated Georgia felt the upset bug.

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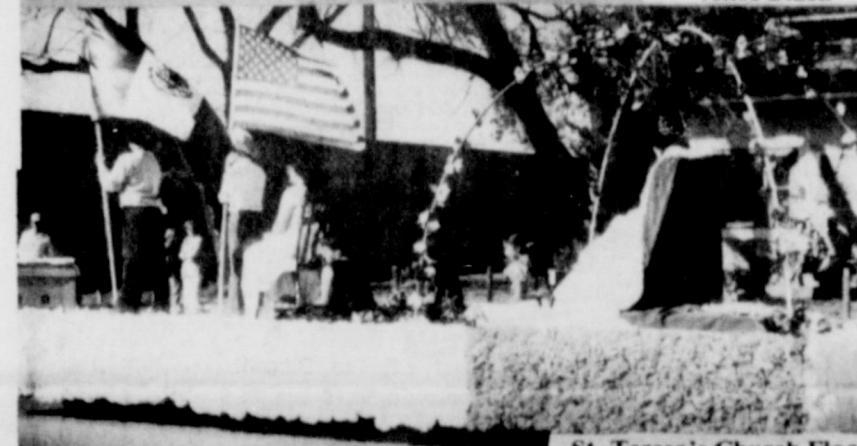

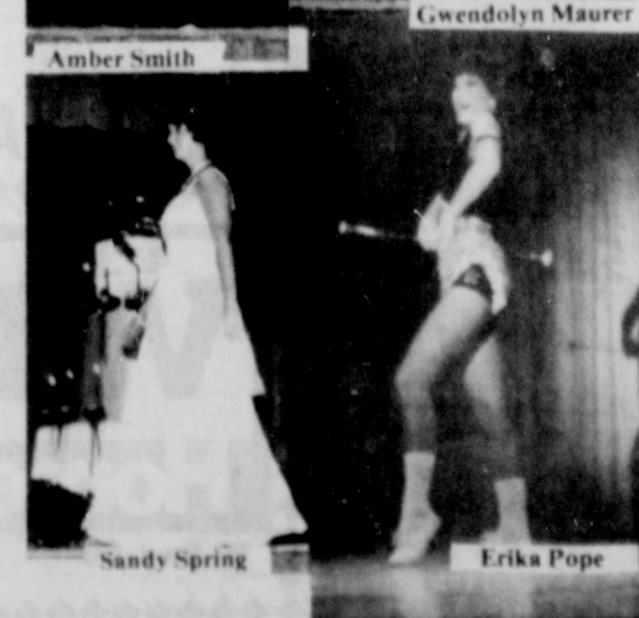

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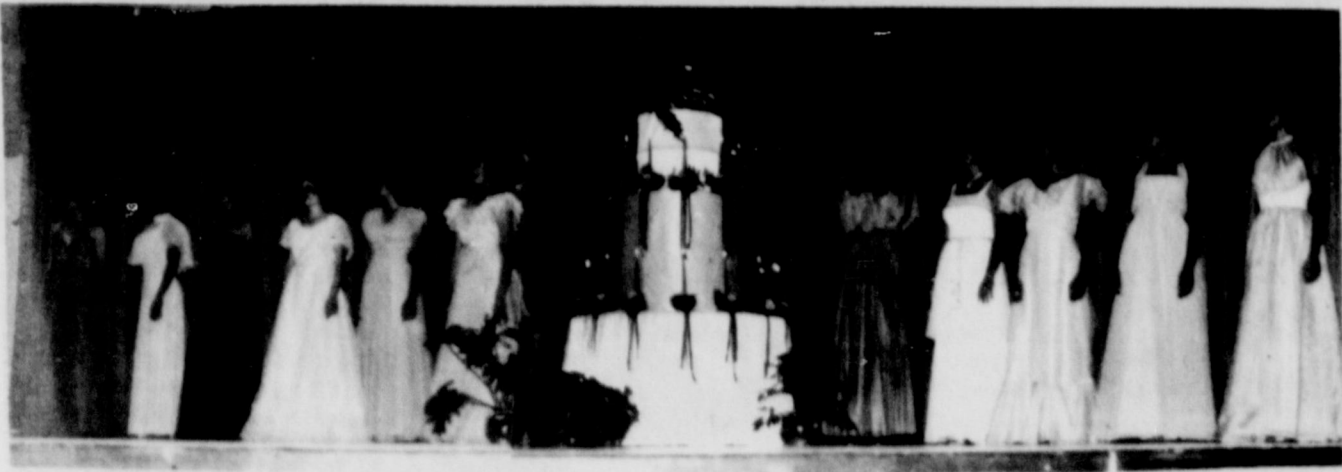

Ella May Wilkerson Observes Birthday

Wednesday, September 23 marks the ninety-seventh anniversary of the birth of one of Friona's most charming Senior Citizens. She is Mrs. W.C. (Ella May) Wilkerson, who lives at 112 East Twelfth Street.

She was born in 1884 and was a teenager at the time of the Spanish-American War. She also remembers two world wide conflicts, World War I and World War II, and a few lesser conflicts.

Ella May was the fourth of eight children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. James Hatcher, who lived near Grapevine in Denton County at the time of her birth.

Mrs. Wilkerson says, "I've outlived all of my brothers and sisters except one. My only living sister, Ida Adams is ninety-two and lives just around the corner over on Main Street."

The Hatcher family made a move

to the Indian Territory when Ella May was small. They lived near the town of Davis, Oklahoma, and the first school she attended was a one room school with one teacher and was at Iona, Oklahoma.

Ella May remembers many things about the school, teacher and pupils.

She says, "We walked one and one half miles to and from school each day. At school all the drinking water was hauled and was in a water bucket. All of us drank from the same dipper and the water wasn't real fresh. The big event of the day was drinking from a spring in Sandy Creek on our way home from school each afternoon. All of us enjoyed a good cold fresh drink very much."

After a few years in the Indian Territory the Hatcher family moved back to Denton County and stayed two years. Then, they moved to a farm east of Ardmore, Oklahoma

and on to Lawton before Oklahoma became a state.

Ella May was married to W.C. Wilkerson, who was a farmer at Walters, Oklahoma, in 1914. The couple moved to Parmer County in October of 1925. For the next five years they lived at the Syndicate Hotel.

She reports, "I was the chief cook and bottle washer and had a lot of other chores to do, too." Her husband farmed a nearby farm they had purchased.

Five years later they moved to the farm and stayed until 1935, when they moved to Weslaco, which is in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas.

When asked about the task of moving, Mrs. Wilkerson replied, "Surely I must like to move. I've done so much of it. Several times we moved in a covered wagon. I remember seeing our cows being moved across Red River on a boat. Later we moved in trucks.

She continued, "When we moved to Parmer County, we chartered a car and loaded all our possessions including household goods, farm equipment and farm animals on it."

When her husband died in 1958, they were living in Tipton, Oklahoma, where they owned and operated a motel. Soon after his death she moved to Frederic, Oklahoma and later to Temple, Texas.

"I like living in Friona," Mrs. Wilkerson said, "and don't have any plans to move away. I've lived here four years now and enjoy it more each year."

She has two sons. Clarence lives in Oklahoma City and Billy lives in Temple, Texas. She also has two grandchildren, four great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

She's a long time member of the United Pentecostal Church and participates in all its activities. She's planning to attend the International Conference of United Pentecostal Churches in Amarillo September 27.

Even though Mrs. Wilkerson's eyesight has dimmed and she has had eye surgery, she's still able to take care of herself and do some handwork.

Many of her home decorations are hand made. Some of them have been gifts and others are different things she has made. She still grows flowers, makes jelly, cans fruit and crochets small articles.

She has many friends and enjoys visiting with them. One, who is about twenty years her junior, commented, "She is more agile right now than I am."
