Wednesday Deadline For Chamber Tickets

The time is rapidly approaching for the annual banquet for the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

The banquet date is Saturday, January 17. Deadline for purchasing advance tickets will be 5 p.m. Wednesday, January 14.

Ticket prices are \$10 for tickets purchased in advance. Tickets at the door will cost \$12.50. Poor Boy's Steakhouse of Clovis will cater the banquet.

Speaker for the banquet will be Gil Stricklin, a humorist-motivational speaker and veteran of some 800 banquets and conventions.

Stricklin is a native Texan, born in Grayson County. He has served as Associate for Direct Evangelism and Chaplain Ministries for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, from 1970 to the present.

Stricklin has spoken on three continents in 37 countries since he began his public speaking ministry in 1953. He has been heard by more than 4,000 audiences.

He holds BA degrees from Baylor and Texas Christian University; as well as a BD from the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

An ordained minister, Stricklin has spoken in a number of prestigious pulpits, including the Melbourne Anglican Cathedral, Duke Street Church, London; Calvary Baptist Church, New York; and the First Baptist Church, Dallas.

Stricklin also has contributed scores of articles to various publications on a variety of subjects. He was named the outstanding journalism graduate from TCU in 1963.

A highlight of the annual banquet will be the naming of Friona's outstanding citizens for 1980.

City Feather Entry Cops County Title

Winner of the Friona area "Longest Tailfeather" contest during the pheasant season was Davis Bennett, whose winning entry measured 26-1/8 inch.

E.L. Fairchild and Lester Williams tied for second and third in the local contest, each with entries measuring 25 3/4 inches.

The Friona entry will apparently be the county champion for 1980, as Bovina's winner, by Dennis Willard, measured 24 3/4 inches, and Farwell's winner, Donald Lovelady, had a 25-3/8 inch feather.

The contest is sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Assn. Top three entries in each community receive prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5, and the county champion receives a plaque.

County Purchases CDs

Parmer County Commissioners voted to purchase certificate of deposits totalling \$216,000, using tax money which was collected as of December 22.

County treasurer Benna Felts suggested that the bulk of this money would not be needed for awhile, and since tax money is coming in, that a total of \$116,000 of Right of Way funds and \$100,000 in general funds be invested in three-month CDs, which will mature on March 31, 1981.

A bid was accepted from Deckard Equipment Company, Amarillo, on supplying a trailer which had been advertised for Precinct 1. Deckard's bid was \$4,799.

A change in the method of paying for meals for prisoners in the county jail was approved. For years, the sheriff has received an allowance for each jail meal served. Under the new setup, the county will buy the jail groceries on open account.

Judge Roberts read the court a letter telling of the clothing needs of two Parmer County foster children. A motion was passed to send \$100 for use to buy clothing for the children.

Judge Roberts had been contacted about the possibility of the county purchasing radio crystals for the game warden for car to car contact with the New Mexico warden. This item was tabled pending receipt of further information.

Approval was granted of boarding expenses in the amount of \$180 for one of the county foster children.

Susan Johnson appeared before the court expressing concern about the MX Missile system, and asking that a hearing be proposed for Parmer County, in order to clarify parts of the proposed system. The hearing is to be requested.

Soil Conservation expenditures were approved for Richard Engelking, \$37.50; Bobby Calloway, \$37.50; Harry Sheets, \$25; and Harold Jones, \$25.

Members of the court attended the open house at the County Extension office, where Christmas goodies were served to all attending.

Seth Ralston reported that the 4-H barrows are ready for the stock shows, which will begin soon. Ralston said that 30 barrows from Parmer County are entered in the Denver Stock Show January 15.

Area Gets Rain Shower

The first measurable moisture in several weeks was recorded in Friona on Thursday, although it fell considerably short of breaking the drought.

A total of .12 inch of rain fell, mostly during the morning hours, as a light shower.

Farmers with wheat crops are hoping that the shower may start a trend, as moisture is badly needed for the winter wheat.

50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1931

45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1936

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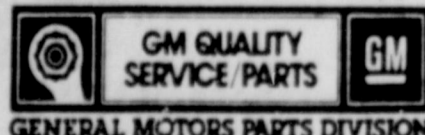

This UT clinic doesn't give shots

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) - A new Children's Rights Clinic in The University of Texas Law School will give the voices of children a chance to be heard in Texas courts through competent legal representation.

Through the clinic (in which advanced law students gain practical case experience), a member of the law faculty will be available for appointment by State district judges in Travis County to represent a child's interests in any case where the State intervenes to take custody of a child or to terminate parental rights.

Such a court-appointed attorney for children's rights was mandated when the Texas Family Code was amended in 1979.

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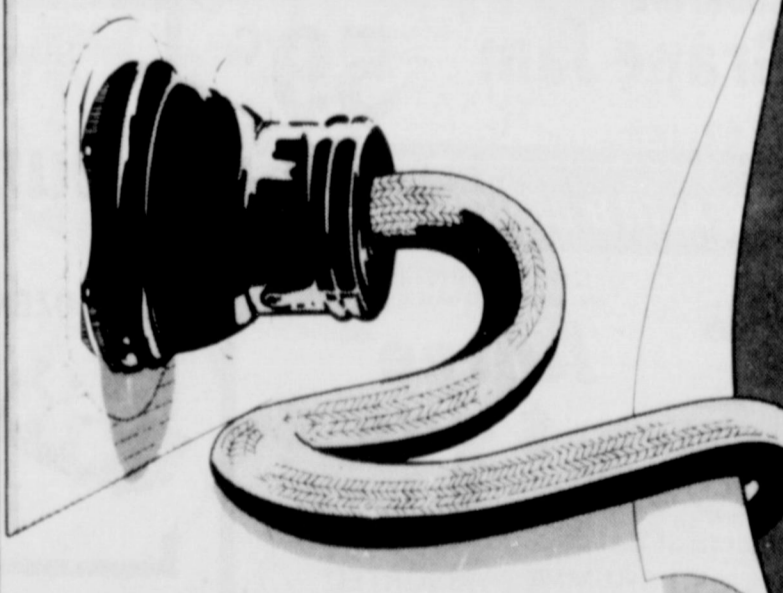
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ASCS Gives Tips To Protect Cotton Payments

Parmer County cotton farmers were given tips this week by Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director of the ASCS, concerning ways they can protect their payment yields.

"This message is for all cotton producers; and, especially the farm operators. The farm operator is the person who can do the most to maintain a farm's cotton program yield," Mills said.

As the yield for each farm is established on the basis of actual production of cotton from the farm,

it behooves the farm operator to make certain that the yield records for the farm are correct. As the operator of a cotton farm, there are two very important things for you to remember to do. These are:

(1) When you take your cotton to your gin, make certain that the ginner knows which farm it came from. Look at your account sheet and make certain that it shows your name (operator), the name of owner of the farm and be certain that the ASCS Farm Number is shown on the

ginner's account sheet for that farm.

DO NOT allow your ginner to list cotton for more than one farm on one account sheet. As soon as all the cotton from one of your farms has been ginned and marketed, bring your settlement sheets (or copies of them) to the ASCS office in order for us to record the necessary information. We will keep these documents in the farm file.

(2) If the cotton yield for your farm is below average due to adverse weather (wind, hail, rain, etc.) or other circumstances beyond your control, you (the farm operator) should report this to the ASCS office and also report to us just what you did in attempting to produce a normal crop of cotton on the farm.

"Your County Committee has the authority to adjust the cotton yield on your farm and they are eager to help you as much as they are permitted to by law; however, they cannot help you unless you furnish them with the information (facts) they need to work with," Mills says.

"One thing more--If the acreage of cotton you harvest from a farm is different from that you reported earlier, be sure and let us know about this. Any person having any question as to the procedure for protecting their cotton yield, should contact their local ASCS office," he concluded.

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

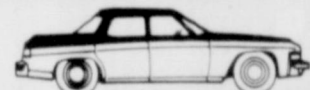

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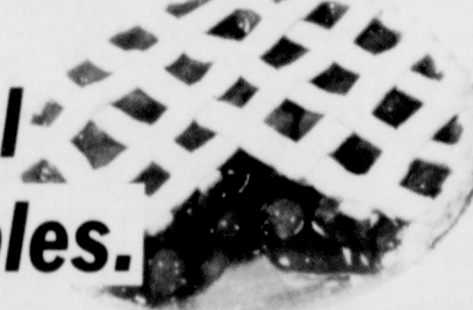
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Lou Whaley, John Sutton United In Church Ceremony

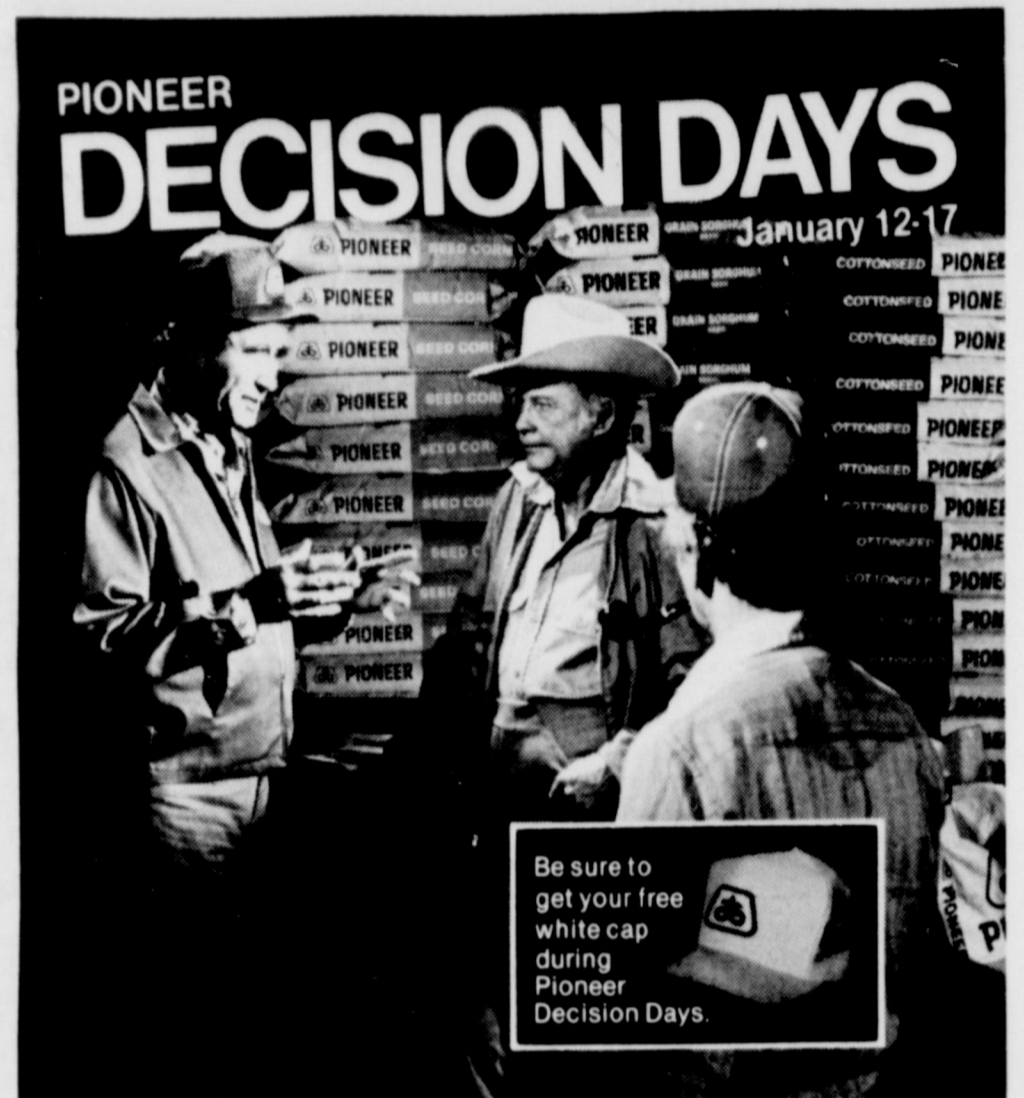

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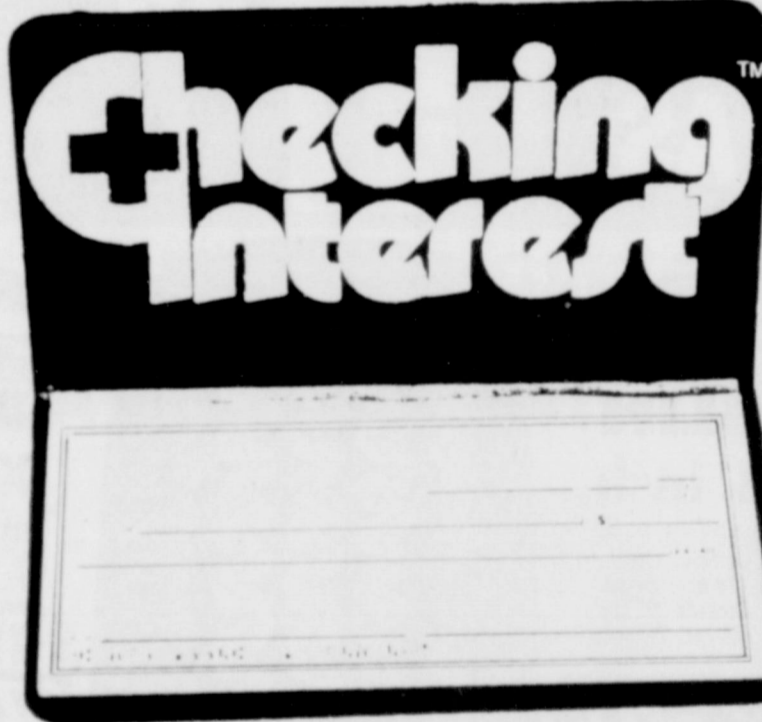
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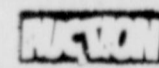
