Farmers Hear Pitch For Political Action Committee

FOOT-IN-MOUTH department:
Last week at the girls state basketball tournament at Austin, the head coach at Dime Box had some choice quotes before his team played Nazareth for the Class 1A state championship.

Dime Box was evidently no slouch, with a 31-1 record entering the title game. The team liked to run and gun, having averaged 73.5 points per game, scoring 100 points or more in five games enroute to the state tournament.

The Dime Box coach told the media he thought his team would score a lot of points against Nazareth, which had been limiting playoff teams to only 35 points per game.

"I noticed they (Nazareth) shoot the ball well when nobody is on them. I just wonder how they'll do when we apply pressure," stated the Dime Box coach, Ben Collins.

Nazareth, which lost five games this season, but four of them were to class 5A teams Lubbock Monterey and Amarillo High, quietly demolished Dime Box in the state finals on Saturday. The final score was 64-37. It was only the third time all season that Dime Box had been held to 50 points or less.

Oh, yes, prior to Saturday's game, Coach Collins also had said: "We play good defense, too." They had caused 15 turnovers in their state semi-final game.

You'd think that the outspoken coach would have been silent following the 27-point loss in the state finals, wouldn't you? Oh, no. He had one more gem: "To be honest, on a good night for us, we could have beaten them. I don't know, maybe we were a little tight..."

Actions, someone once said, speak louder than words. It was the sixth straight state title for the Nazareth girls, a new record.

The Little League and Babe Ruth board members and all interested adults are invited to attend a planning meeting Sunday, March 14, at 2 p.m. in the Friona High School Cafeteria for the 1982 season.

The baseball season will be starting soon and plans need to be made for the Little League and Babe Ruth teams.

A large group of farmers attended a meeting at Bovina Thursday evening, designed to acquaint them with the Political Action Committee, and what its backers feel it can do for agriculture.

Speaking to the crowd were Dick White of Washington, Marvin Meeks, Plainview, national chairman of the American Agriculture Movement, Ted Godfrey, Spearman, marketing specialist; State Representatives Bill Clayton of Springlake and Pete Laney of Hale Center.

"You have been talking about parity prices, but what you need is parity politics," White told the group. "The farmer has a right to make a profit in the marketplace. American Agriculture has the greatest opportunity to solve the problem, but the PAC (political action committee) is the key," White said.

White said he had had contacts with several lawmakers, including Representative Kent Hance, concerning the PAC, and the reaction has generally been "Why haven't you had this before?"

Clayton, who has served this area as state representative for the past 20 years, including a record-breaking four terms as Speaker of the House, said farmers are in one of the biggest binds they have been in.

"I have been farming 32 years, and there are more farmers going out of business this year than I have seen in that period of time.

Clayton pointed out that representatives from the rural areas, and their constituents will need to do a better job of educating the non-agricultural residents and representatives, due to the fact that West Texas will lose three representatives due to the every ten year re-districting process.

Clayton said that although he is retiring from politics, at least for the present, that he pledged his efforts in behalf of the farmer in any way he could

help. "I still have a lot of contacts in Austin," he said.

Laney, who will be the new state representative for Parmer County beginning next January, pointed out that he and Clayton were the only members of the 150-member House of Representatives who were full-time farmers.

"West Texas is losing three rural representatives, that's true, but I submit to you that if Bill Clayton had not been Speaker of the House during the re-districting effort, it would have been more like four or five representatives," Laney said.

"There are more representatives in Harris County (Houston) than there are from Fort Worth westward, but we can still win (the legislative battles)," the Hale County legislator said.

He explained this statement by saying that while Harris County has 26 residents, they are from diverse areas, and they never vote as a block—usually differing in their views.

Concerning the involvement of farmers and other residents of this area in politics, Laney said "You've got to get involved, and stay involved. You don't have the luxury of not being involved in politics."

Meeks, who has been active in the AAM movement ever since its inception four years ago, said that farmers are the most powerful and influential groups in the world, for two reasons. "Number one, everyone has to eat. Second, farmers are the largest consumers in the nation."

"The farmer's assets equal the assets of most of the manufacturers in the United States, and it is a crime to have the industry which supplies our foodstuff to have a negative tax base," Meeks added.

The Plainview farmer said there were 13 little words which will make the difference in whether the farmers make it: "If it is to be, it is up to us to do it."

Meeks pointed out that while the economical situation is bad in this area, there are still places in the country where they are worse.

He challenged those in the audience to join the "\$1 per acre club," by contributing \$1 per acre farmed to the political action committee.

Tax Office Is Closed

Poison Is Blamed In Dog Deaths In City

Friona residents were alerted to the fact that a dog poisoner is at work in the city. On Wednesday of this week, some eight instances of poisoned dogs had been reported in the city. A number of other non-reported cases may have occurred.

City Manager Jerry Lewis warned city residents who own dogs to keep their pets in the yard until the situation can be brought under control.

"If you see anything suspicious, or if you have a particular dog problem, please call the City Hall," Lewis asked.

"Poisoning dogs is not the way to handle the problem. It could turn into a tragedy if a young child were to pick up whatever has been killing the dogs," Lewis observed.

The city manager said he planned to confer with Chief of Police Bill Denney and have the surveillance increased. The city would take legal action against the person or persons discovered having a part in the dog poisoning.

There seemed to be no set pattern, and no set part of town for the current wave of mischief. Most of the pets involved have been those which have been allowed to run loose.

"We do not want to scare the residents, but we want them to be aware of what is going on," Lewis concluded.

To report a dog problem, residents may call the City Hall at 247-2761. To report an incidence of criminal mischief, they may call the Friona Police Department, 247-2711.

Perry Church Is New Red Raider

Perry Joe Church of Friona has been named the 1982-83 Red Raider for Texas Tech University. He succeeds Kurt Harris of Stratford whose year-long role as the masked rider of Texas Tech ended Wednesday, March 10.

Church is an agricultural economics-finance major with senior standing in the College of Agricultural Sciences.

Identity of the new masked rider was name at a Transfer of the Reins ceremony in Jones Stadium where the Red Raider, astride a black Quarter Horse, Happy VI-II, rides to cheering crowds at every football game.

Announcement of Church's selection as Red Raider was made by Tech's vice president for student affairs Robert H. Ewalt. Alyson Griffin, president of the Student Foundation, presented Church a \$1,000 scholarship. Mark Peachee of the Saddle Tramps presented Church the Joe Kirk Fulton Award. Athletic Director John Conley presented Harris a letter jacket in appreciation. Judith Henry, assistant to the dean of students, was master of ceremonies.

Church won the title of Red Raider

by competing in both horsemanship and interview sessions. He said he began riding when he was about three years old and later was involved with the Martin County Sheriff's Posse.

Church is a 1978 graduate of Friona High School, and was an all-district member of the Friona Chieftains' football team. "I appreciate the people of Friona for their support. I feel I owe a great deal to the people there," said the new Red Raider.

Those competing for the Red Raider must, among other things, maintain a 3.0 grade average. Following the horsemanship competition, there were 19 students who were still in the running for the honor. The interview is held in front of representatives of nine facets of the university.

He also has worked with Jack Kyle, in the training and showing of Quarter Horses. Kyle has been an American Quarter Horse Association judge.

Church will care for as well as ride Happy VI-II, the horse given the university by the late Anne Burnett


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On The Farm In Parmer County

 Farmers in Parmer County have been battling increasing numbers of soil insect pests in recent years due to the loss of some effective seed protectants and a general increase in pest populations. Soil insects generally attack plants at, or slightly below, the soil surface, points out Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. They feed on germinating seed, tender shoots and on roots of developing plants. Some tunnel into the crown of young plants. Heavy infestations can reduce stands and make replanting necessary.

Common soil insects include several species of cutworms, such as the variegated cutworm, black cutworm and climbing cutworms; wireworms and false wireworms; soil maggots; rootworms and white grubs.

Wireworms and false wireworms often cause severe problems for grain sorghum and corn producers, notes Ralston. Soil maggots, including the seedcorn maggot and onion maggot, often cause seedling losses, especially in cool, wet soils.

Corn rootworms are severe pests of corn and grain sorghum. They reduce stands on thousands of acres each year and are probably the most serious soil pests in Texas.

White grubs attack corn, sorghum, small grains, vegetables and other crops. One white grub per foot of row will cause a stand loss in grain sorghum.

If damaging soil pest populations are detected, apply an approved pesticide according to label directions.

Treated seed are effective against light infestations of wireworms and corn rootworms while broadcast

or row-band applications are required for heavy infestations. Broadcast applications are usually necessary to obtain effective control of white grubs.

Here are a list of approved insecticides to control soil insects in field crops:

Cotton-Cutworms, Carbaryl (Sevin R) (5 per cent bait), Toxaphene plus methyl parathion, Trichlorfon (Dylox R) (5 per cent bait).

Small grains-Cutworms, Methyl parathion, Toxaphene, Trichlorfon.

Corn-Rootworms, Amaze, Counter, Dyfonate, Furadan; Cutworms, Toxaphene, Toxaphene plus methyl parathion, Trichlorfon (Dylox R).

Grain sorghum-White Grubs, Dasanit, Diazinon; Cutworms, Toxaphene; Corn Rootworms, Heptachlor (seed treatment), Lindane (seed treatment).

IRA--The 'Little Guy's' Tax Shelter

Want to "make a million" in the next 30 years? You can invest your money in an individual retirement account (IRA).

An IRA is a personal tax-sheltered retirement savings plan for all workers--including those covered by a pension or a profit-sharing plan.

You can set aside up to \$2,000 per year and deduct the amount you invested from your gross income.

An IRA is fast becoming a "little guy's" tax shelter since it reduces tax obligations and income. It's an investment that can be deducted.

No taxes need be paid on the IRA until amounts are withdrawn beginning at age

59 1/2 or later.

How does it work? If you save the maximum amount--\$2,000 a year is the highest amount--you set aside about \$38 per week.

In 30 years, at a 12 per cent annual interest rate, your investment will have grown to about \$1 million.

Working spouses can double the maximum amount of savings. They can set aside up to \$4,000 a year.

In addition, couples with only one working spouse can have an IRA for a non-working spouse.

Such a couple can contribute up to \$2,250 a year and divide the amount as they desire.

And you aren't limited to only one IRA so long as the total annual contribution to all accounts doesn't exceed \$2,000.

Equal deposits to two or more accounts could enable you to compare performance so long as service charges don't eat the differences in earnings.

IRA options are offered in a variety of places, including banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions, mutual funds, insurance companies, stock brokers and the U.S. Treasury.

Some employers may offer their own type of IRA plans.

But, remember to study the terms and conditions of the IRA plan before investing--there is no ceiling on what rate of interest can be paid, so the amount of earnings can vary from place to place.

You should also know what charges, if any, will be made for opening or managing an account as well

as transferring funds from one account to another.

TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

Don't overpay your Property Taxes.

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

Redemption
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filling out a redemption statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

General Homestead Exemption
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

Exemptions for the Elderly
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

Disabled
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are

entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your home for school taxes. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

Farmers and Ranchers
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year before May 1 to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax offices to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.






