**THE WINTER OF 1981-82** isn't even a month old yet, as the calendar goes, and yet it has already made its mark as one of the worst in history, as far as the weather goes.

Last week's plane crash in the nation's capital, in which 65-70 people were killed just served to underscore the severity of the situation. In one week alone, more than 200 people died as a result of the weather.

Two consecutive weekends has seen a frigid Arctic air mass move deep into the nation's midsection, with temperatures (and especially wind chill factor) falling far below zero in many places. At one place last weekend, the wind chill hit a bone-chilling 100 degrees below zero.

Prior to the latest round of cold weather, Northern California was hit by floods of rain in places. In one area, several people were killed, and their homes were reduced to just a pile of rubble, when a mountain top gave way and came hurtling down upon them.

Florida has suffered losses in its citrus crops; the city of Chicago recorded its worst weather in a hundred years. Southern cities such as San Antonio and Atlanta were experiencing snow and ice. Even Galveston and Padre Island received snow. We're not sure whether those places ever had recorded snow previous to last week.

Meantime, those of us in the Texas Panhandle have been spared a heavy toll for the winter weather thus far. We have had a couple of very cold blasts, but nothing that we could not stand. And the moisture has been practically non-existent.

**THE SUPER BOWL** will be played this weekend, and admittedly the game will command a lot less interest, since the area's favorite team, the Dallas Cowboys, will not be participating.

Oh, most sports fans will watch the game, I'm sure, but it just won't be the same without Tom Landry's boys.

One thing about it, ye editor will be able to watch the game without running a good risk of having a coronary on third down and long, etc.

We were glad to hear this week the compliments by Dick Vermeil and one of his Philadelphia Eagle players, toward the Cowboys. The player said that he believed that the best team in the NFL wouldn't be in this year's super bowl. He, like everyone in this area, thinks the best team in the league was—that's right—the Dallas Cowboys.

**SPEAKING OF THE SUPER BOWL**, we heard this week just what the sponsors are shelling out for the commercials on the TV coverage of the "big event."

One source said that a 30-second spot during the Super Bowl telecast cost an advertiser \$345,000. With the same money, it was pointed out, you could pay 17 people a yearly salary of \$20,000 or 20 people \$17,000.

That's a lot of cabbage to have to pay out. But I suppose the folks who buy the spots can afford them. And you thought our advertising in the Star was high???

## Jerry R. Lewis Named New City Manager

Jerry Richard Lewis was hired this week as Friona's new city manager.

The announcement of Lewis' acceptance and confirmation by the Friona City Council ended a month of interviews of prospects for a replacement of Arley L. (Jake) Outland, who will end 20 years as Friona's City Manager on January 31.

Lewis, 31, is a native of West Texas, born in Stamford. He currently is living in Missouri City,

Texas (near Houston), where he served as director of Parks and Recreation for the past three years.

Prior to his current position, he served a year as Superintendent of Recreation for the City of Lewisville, and earlier (August, 1975 to November, 1977) worked as Director of Recreation for the City of Sweetwater.

Upon graduation from Abilene High School in 1969, Lewis joined the Navy. While in the Navy, he took special training in advanced first aid, small boat handling, fire fighting, navigation, riot control, wilderness survival, personnel management and leadership, career counseling and use of heavy equipment.

He received his bachelor of science degree from Abilene Christian College in 1975, and has completed professional development courses at Texas A&M in park planning and design; park maintenance and executive development and planning.

Lewis lists his hobbies as sports, woodworking, travel, youth work, silversmith and livestock.

In his present position, Lewis has had charge and overseen the operation of administrative functions, legal matters, real estate and land economics, planning and research, engineering, construction, traffic control, maintenance of grounds, building, and equipment, among other things.

"We feel extremely fortunate in being able to secure someone of Lewis' ability as our new city manager, and we look forward to having him in Friona," said Mayor B.K. Buske.

Lewis is expected to be here in early February.

## Commissioners Talk Re-Mapping Issue

The decision on re-drawing the county's commissioners precincts, voting precincts and justice of the peace precincts was tabled until Monday, January 25 by the Commissioners Court, after meeting in a special session this past Monday.

A group of nine Friona citizens met with the court on Monday, seeking details on the commissioners' plan to divide the precincts.

Richard Collard, County Democratic Chairman, cautioned the court to make sure of where it stood legally before making a final decision.

However, further checking by the court indicates that the matter may have to be resolved, and quickly.

Both County Judge Porter Roberts and Collard now agree that the re-mapping will probably have to be approved, in order that the county not be slapped by lawsuits for not acting.

"I hate that this was not completed in 1981, instead of rushing it through on an election year," Collard said. He said this was his biggest objection to the proposal, plus the fact that it may not have been given sufficient publicity prior to action by the court.

The plan, as proposed by the law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley of Austin, would place the city of Friona into three different commissioner's precincts, and three voting precincts.

Precinct four, the Lazbuddie area, would be expanded by bringing a corridor two miles wide up the east side of Highway 214 and into Friona. A good portion of Friona would then be annexed, mainly the "old town," east of Main Street.

Areas shifted into Precinct 4 would also include two blocks of Cleveland and Pierce Streets, from Highway 60 to 14th Street, plus an area from the east side of Maple Avenue eastward, including the apartments and trailer park.

The other portions of Lakeside Addition, Welch Acres, etc., would remain in Precinct 1 (Ernest Anthony's precinct).

Precinct two, now represented by Jack Patterson, also would take in a small portion of Friona. This precinct would incorporate everything north and west of Highway 60 and the city

area west of Highway 214, including Lakeview Addition, Hicks Addition and Western Addition.

Under the current proposal, Patterson's precinct would include all of the City of Bovina.

Precinct 3, the Farwell precinct, adds some area in the rural portion, but does not figure in splitting of towns.

The city of Friona, then, would

benefit by having a say in electing three of the four county commissioners. This is a provision of the "one man, one vote" act under which the re-mapping was ordered.

Some election officials have thought for some time that dividing the Friona voting box would be an improvement, since it is by far the largest voting box in the county. The current proposal would accomplish this.

## McGehee Is Candidate

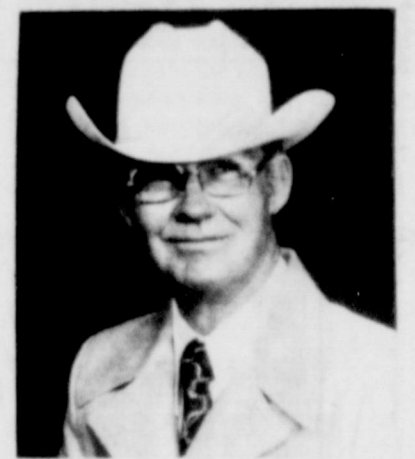

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

**55 YEARS AGO—JAN. 21, 1927**

The Star office is in receipt of a copy of a petition sent in by Judge J.C. Temple, of Farwell, praying the Commissioner's Court of the county to take immediate steps toward securing a farm advisor for Parmer County. Whether this comes as a response to the plea put forth by the Star a few weeks ago, we do not know, but we do know that the Star is still sold on the idea, as was stated in that article.

**50 YEARS AGO—JAN. 22, 1932**

Sanitary engineer S.A. Gunn was a visitor in Friona last Thursday, and while in town spent some time checking over the city's water system. The system received the approval of the engineer. He said it was equal to that of towns elsewhere in the state. Gunn also checked the city's sanitary toilet system, and encouraged all citizens to follow the city ordinance by having them installed.

**40 YEARS AGO—JAN. 23, 1942**

Price Brookfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.P. Brookfield of Friona, is riding to fame on the strength of his part in the winning record of the mighty Buffalo basketball team of West Texas State. An Amarillo news story of this week states that "Brookie" is the spark plug of the team, which is standing 16-1 for the

season and has been swept into the national spotlight, billed as the "world's tallest team."

**35 YEARS AGO**

**30 YEARS AGO—JAN. 17, 1952**

Fire early Wednesday morning swept through the Friona Poultry and Egg firm here, destroying merchandise and equipment of several thousand dollars value. Much of the building was a total loss. All equipment, including office machines in the front of the building, was lost. S.T. Thornton is owner of the firm.

**25 YEARS AGO—JAN. 17, 1957**

Dr. Leon Hill, Texas humorist, traveler, philosopher and author, will be the featured speaker at the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday. The result of a brainstorm session by the Friona school board on Monday night was the board's decision to "centralize" its facilities on its present site, rather than moving some part of the system to the acreage in the Staley Addition in the western part of town.

**20 YEARS AGO—JAN. 18, 1962**

Carbon monoxide poisoning was

blamed for the death of one man in Friona last week. Twelve other persons were treated at Parmer County Community Hospital after receiving doses of the gas.

Leo McLellan, 58, former postmaster, was found dead in his home Thursday morning. His wife, Lillian, and son, Joe, were also found unconscious and were rushed to the hospital, where they were at first given no more than a 50-50 chance for survival.

**15 YEARS AGO—JAN. 19, 1967**

After almost seven years in business, Friona Lanes, Inc., will close on Friday, according to W.H. Graham, owner. The bowling establishment was built in 1960 by Ed Hicks, Dean Bingham and Doyle Elliott. Graham purchased the business from Hicks in 1963. Eddie Irwin leased the business the past year.

**10 YEARS AGO—JAN. 20, 1972**

Postal receipts at the Friona post office set an all-time record, for the calendar year 1971, according to Wright Williams, postmaster. At the same time, Williams announced that the Friona post office will advance in rank, becoming a first class office on July 1, 1972.

The Cunningham triplets, Sherry Ann, Corey Dale and Shelly Gail, observed their first birthday Saturday, January 15. They are the children of Mr. and Mrs. James Cunningham of Friona.

**5 YEARS AGO—JAN. 23, 1977**

Gibson's Discount Center was the target of thieves twice last week, and the after-hours visitors have virtually wiped out the company's gun department. Mike Carr, manager of Gibson's Hereford store and acting as spokesman, said that in the neighborhood of \$1200 worth of merchandise was taken, the bulk around midnight Friday, January 14.

New officers have been elected by the Friona Fire Department for 1977. Re-elected as Chief was Ralph Shirley. Glenn E. Reeve, Jr. was re-elected as assistant chief, and Porter Roberts was named secretary.

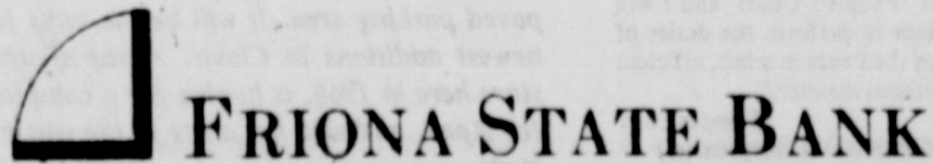

## Commissioners Pass On Various Matters

Parmer County Commissioners have been discussing the re-apportionment of the county's precincts in recent meetings.

At the regular meeting January 11, the court approved the latest proposal by Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley, Austin law firm, for re-drawing the county's precinct and voter precinct lines.

This proposal leaves the city of Bovina intact, and gives a portion of Friona to Jack Patterson of Precinct 2. It also gives a part of Friona to Commissioner Raymond McGeehee of Lazbuddie.

The latest proposal showed projected population as follows: Precinct 1: 2,749; Precinct 2: 2,720; Precinct 3: 2,810 and Precinct 4: 2,759.

The court also had hired workers to spot check in the city of Friona to see if the present population was about the same as it had been when the 1980 census was taken.

In a special meeting of the commissioners on Monday, a group of Friona citizens met with the court, basically protesting the fact that the city would be divided into three voting boxes, thus causing confusion as well as added election costs.

The court agreed to postpone action on the subject, but told the group it needs to take some affirmative action as soon as possible, as the deadline for filing for 1982 elections is rapidly approaching.

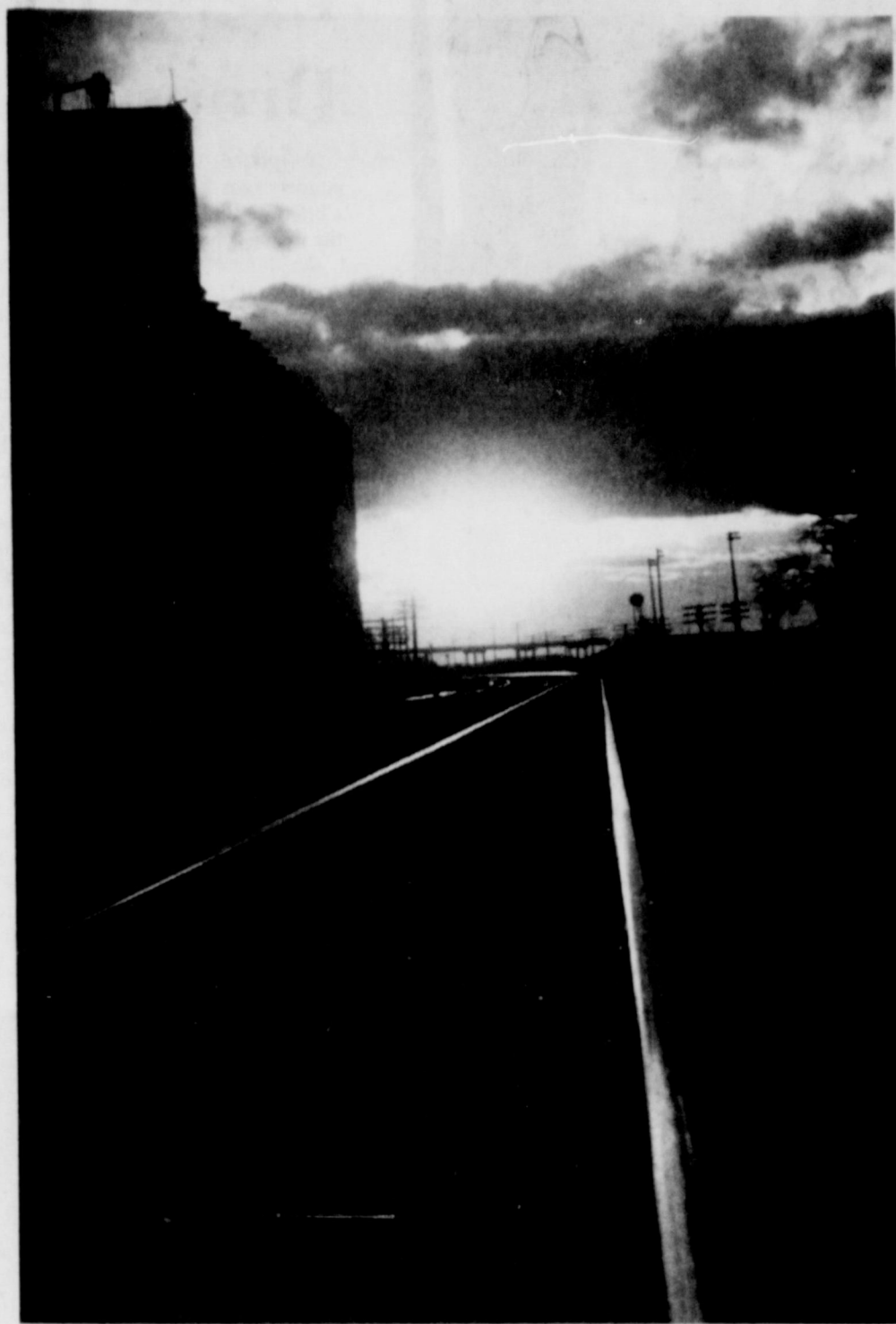

## Telephone Excise Tax Drops 1%

Telephone users throughout the country got at least one gift for Christmas that isn't the wrong size or the wrong color.

On January 1, 1982, the federal excise tax on telephone service dropped from two per cent to one per cent.

Nationwide, the one per cent reduction should save telephone customers approximately \$516 million, according to estimates by the U.S. Independent Telephone Association.

The tax was imposed by Congress as a "temporary" measure during World War II. Congress voted in 1970 to gradually eliminate the tax, reducing it one per cent per year beginning in 1973 and continuing until 1982 when the tax would be eliminated.

However, the Fiscal Year 1981 Budget Reconciliation Bill, signed by former President Jimmy Carter on December 5, 1980, contained a provision maintaining the excise tax on telephone and typewriter service at the two per cent level during 1980. And this year's tax bill further postpones the phase out, keeping the tax at one per cent until January 1, 1985.

## Contract Awarded To Cancer Program

The statewide toll-free telephone service that answers Texans' questions about cancer has been refunded as part of a three-year contract from the National Cancer Institute (NCI).

The \$833,610 contract was awarded to the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute to continue its public education program, the Cancer Information Service (CIS), which operates the toll-free telephone line.

Since it began in 1975, the CIS staff of trained volunteers has assisted more than 40,000 Texans with their cancer questions and concerns.

The contract will enable CIS to continue its present activities and expand educational programs directed to minority audiences and those at high risk for cancer.

The Texas CIS is one of 17 such regional centers established to help ease the public's fear of and confusion about cancer by providing rapid access, via a telephone line, to the facts about the disease. The program is part of M.D. Anderson's Department of Public Information and Education.

"Early detection, successful treatment and even prevention of cancer depend greatly on each person's health habits and knowledge about the disease," said Dr. Charles A. LaMaistre, president of the UT

Cancer Center. "CIS helps bridge the gap between cancer knowledge and personal action by providing people with accurate, up-to-date cancer information and by helping make them aware of the methods for early detection and prevention that can help save lives."

The toll-free phone service operates from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, in English and Spanish. Callers are given information over the phone and receive printed material, if they request it. No caller is required to give a name or address.



## County Has 11 Deaths In Year

In an official Department of Public Safety press release from the Amarillo office of the DPS safety education service, it was stated that in Parmer County alone in 1981, there were a total of 11 persons killed in 132 accidents, with 51 injury accidents totaling 106 persons injured and 73 property accidents.

The press release also indicated that in the month of December there were two fatal accidents with a total of four persons killed and six persons injured with four property damage accidents recorded.

In District 5B, which takes in the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 2481 accidents investigated by the Texas DPS, and according to Captain Bob Russell of the DPS, Texas Troopers investigated 91 fatal accidents with a total of 104 persons killed, 875 injury accidents with a total of 1426 persons injured and 1515 property accidents for the 1981 year.

However, within the month of December alone, in the same district, there were 221 accidents investigated by the DPS resulting in 11 fatal accidents with a total of 16 persons killed, 72 injury accidents with a total of 109 persons injured, and 138 property damage accidents were recorded for December 1981.

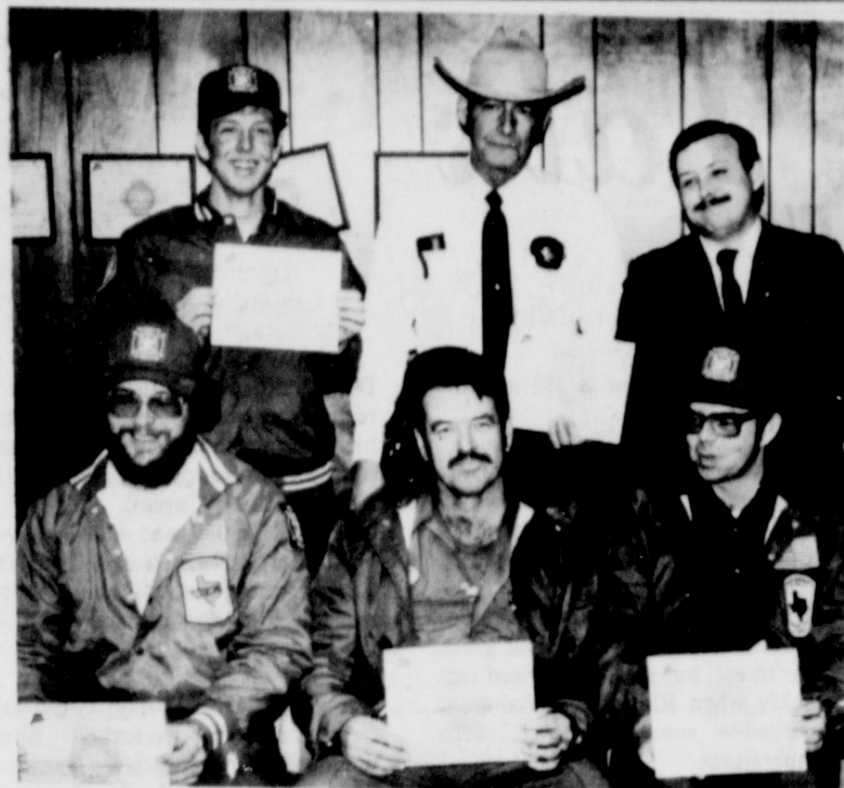

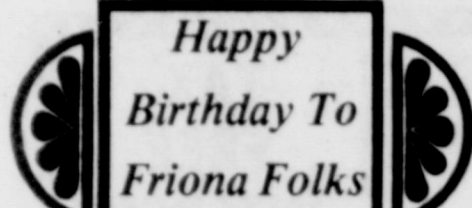
Bill Stephens was admitted to Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo

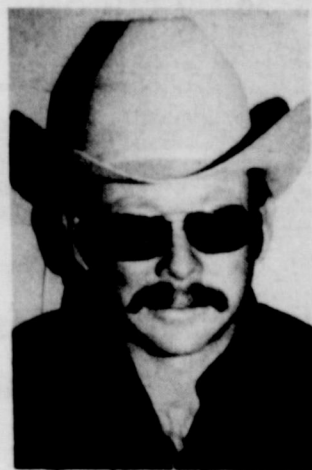
