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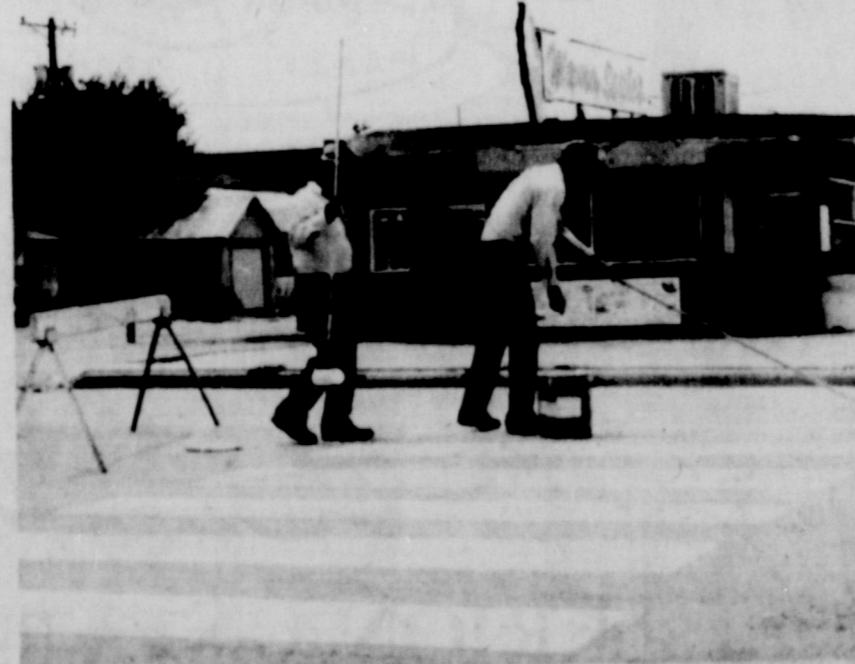
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"The water in the draw (Tierra Blanca) was almost up to the bridge. The draw was full of water. It was the most water it has had in years," he added.

Reports said that the dam on Running Water Draw east of Lazbuddie, which had caught a good amount of water from earlier rains this summer, was beginning to collect a good lake of water from this week's moisture.

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The Friona school chief announced that all students who have moved into the community and who did not attend Friona schools at the end of last school year need to report to the respective principals to pre-register.

Such new students should report Monday through Wednesday, August 17-19, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Those in kindergarten through fourth grade report to Freeman Melton at the grade school office. Grades five through eighth report to Cecil Maddox at the junior high building, and grades 9-12 report to Hal Ratcliff at the high school.

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WE ARE GLAD to see that writers in sections of the country other than the farm belt recognize the worth of the farmer, and what a disaster it would be if they were put out of business.

We appreciate Friona City Manager Jake Outland bringing us the following column, which we enjoyed very much, and decided to present for our readers. The author was Charley Reese, writing for the Oceanside, California, Blade-Tribune:

"I don't know if you have been to Washington lately or even to your own state capital, but if you have, you will have noticed that they do not grow beans there.

Now, let us suppose you are hungry. When you are hungry, what you need is food--beans, for example. You can't eat a Federal Reserve note. You can't eat a copy of the statutes. You can't eat a speech or compassion or commitment to the poor or even concern. Nope, what your belly wants is beans.

There is only one way you can get some beans. Some human has to produce them. Earth has to be plowed, seeds planted, the sprouting plants watered and fertilized and protected from insects. Then the beans have to be harvested, stored, transported, processed and packaged.

The government and the politicians are not involved in this labor. Both are non-essential. You can have food and not government, but you can't survive with government and no food. If it comes down to it, the politician is dispensable; the farmer is not.

I have made this explanation of the obvious because in our complex society today it is no longer so obvious. Most of our attention is focused on government. We act as if government were the source of wealth when government no more produced wealth than a salt flat produces lettuce.

Think about this while you hear all of these people and groups wrangling and fighting over the federal budget. Do you know what they are fighting over? Paper. The only thing the government can give away is what it produces, and the only thing it produces is paper; fiat currency, notes, checks, drafts, purchase orders, and bonds. You can't eat them, wear them, or dig a hole with them. They don't even make good fuel for a fire.

The wealth of the United States cannot be found in Washington, in the New York Federal Reserve Bank or in the vault at Fort Knox. For a moment, forget statistics, dollar valuations, and definitions. These are all illusions--a collection of mental concepts.

The wealth of the United States consists of land, water, minerals, plants, tools, buildings, machines, crops, food stores, and manufactured products. It also consists of human beings, their knowledge, their skills, and their energy. The one common characteristic of this wealth is that it is finite--limited as to amount at any given moment.

The Congress can pass a law, the Supreme Court can uphold it, and the president can proclaim it: Every American shall have one pound of beans, and you know what? Not so much as a single sprout would appear. If you want beans, you need farmers, not senators, presidents and justices.

The truth is so simple we often can't see it. Our welfare depends on the private sector, not on the government. The government is parasitic. Its only legitimate role is to be a policeman and protect the private sector from raiders. Lately, it's gotten into the business of confiscating wealth and redistributing it. Nevertheless, it can only confiscate and redistribute what the private sector produces. If you like to eat, you'd better be more concerned about the climate in the farm belt than the political climate in Washington. . . .

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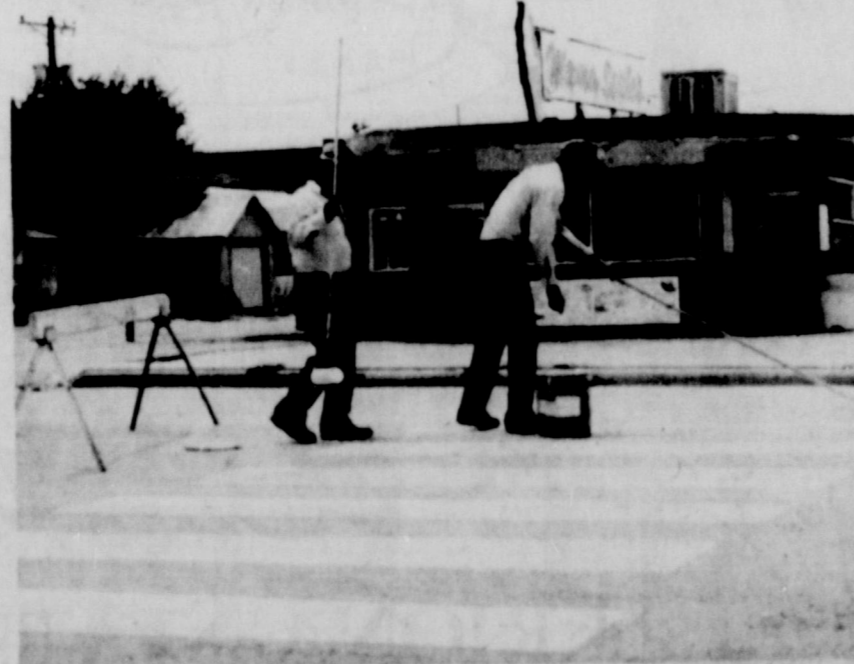

would be retained as an access road to the grain elevators. This construction would require a right of way of either 140 or 210 feet wide, depending on the alternative selected.

Because of the channel configuration of Running Water Draw, a right of way width of approximately 100 feet wide and 1,600 feet in length will be required at the draw near Bovina for the construction of an undivided facility and will not differ from the existing right of way.

Little or no changes will be made through the cities of Friona and Bovina as portions of U.S. 60 are currently being upgraded.

Changes for Friona on Highway 60 include the construction of a six lane undivided section between SH 214 and Spur 270 and from the eastern city limits to 1,400 feet east and the construction of a four lane undivided section from Spur 270 to 1,000 feet southwest of the Frio Bridge.

Some of the social impacts upon the residents of the counties in which this will take place include the relocation of one household in Black, and one household in rural areas between Friona and Bovina if the four lane undivided highway goes through.

If the four lane divided highway goes through, three households in Summerfield, one in Black and two in the rural area between Friona and Bovina would be relocated.

The land use would stay virtually the same in the rural areas, which would mean they would still be devoted to farming. Access to public facilities and services, such as schools, hospitals, churches, and

other facilities of this type would be improved by either of the alternative proposals and the action should make these accesses much safer for emergency vehicles.

There would be some relocation in Black and Summerfield, but there is no sign of relocation for those living in Friona, Bovina or Farwell.

In the relocation of businesses, there would be a relocation of one business in Summerfield (post office and store), two in Black (grain storage, office and scales) and one in Friona (scales and barn) if the four lane, undivided highway becomes a reality.

If the four lane divided highway comes through, there would be one Summerfield business relocated which is the same as mentioned, two in Black, which is the same as mentioned, one in Friona, which is the same as mentioned, and three in Bovina, which were not mentioned.

According to the consulting engineering firm, there would be more revenue generated by this improvement as more traffic would be coming through the towns.

The ecology would not be altered significantly. The loss of wildlife and wildlife habitat will be minor because the proposed right of way is contiguous to the existing right of way. There are no endangered species native to the study area.

The prime farm lands which will be taken in the right of way is less than one-tenth of one per cent of the total prime farm land in Castro County and less than one per cent in Parmer County.

Air quality will not be affected significantly by the project, and noise levels will not be at an exceeding level

at the end of this project.

The Ogallala Water Aquifer nor any other ground water source will be affected by the proposed action.

Some of the comments made at the meeting included these: **Judge Porter Roberts:** "I am not talking for the commissioners, but for myself. We need something for the heavy traffic flow. I don't know the right answer...I think all of the commissioners feel as I do that this could be an asset to the county for years."

**Mayor B.K. Buske:** "We have talked to the council and they have talked to the citizens of Friona and it seems to be favorable to have a four lane undivided highway...negative comments are concerning FM 1731 which is going to be messed up and we need direct access to other areas and need regrading of Austin and Stephens drive."

**Joe Helton, Texico, N.M.:** "I would hate to see the cities of Farwell and Texico bypassed by this project. This is no good locally. It hurts communities and we are interested in the local people. We do need to improve the roads but hate to see the present right of way abandoned. I say we keep the present routes through the little towns."

**Martha Hamilton, homeowner in Black:** "I am not against this, it is just that the highway would be in my front door. I am for an undivided highway with the location further out. We want some type of alternative."

**Fred Chandler, Farwell:** "I am concerned about the Farwell cemetery if this is to be two miles out of town. You will need more than 150 feet which is proposed."

**Dennis Single, Friona:** "Will the proposed highway utilize the work which has already been done on the highway?"

**Fred Church:** "With the new right of way at Frio Draw, what will happen to the country club?"

The city of Friona's official measurement came to 3.17 inches; divided up this way: Saturday, .17 inches; Sunday, .78 inches; Monday, .63 inches; Tuesday, 1.10 inches; and Wednesday, .49 inches.

This brought the total for the month of August to 4.66 inches, and for the year to 14.32 in Friona, whose average for the previous three years was 16.06 inches, according to weather recorder Jake Outland.

Most farm observers indicated that the bountiful rains will be all that most of the row crops will need to mature and make a good crop.

Crops in the area, for the most part, are about as nice as they ever have been, and the current moisture will only improve the yield potential.

Due to the price of natural gas and electricity used by farmers in their irrigation programs, the rains of this week and the summer season have been worth several million dollars, in utility savings alone.

Matches are subject to change without notice due to conditions beyond the promotion's control, such as injuries, accident, illness, travel delay and weather conditions where wrestlers are in air route.

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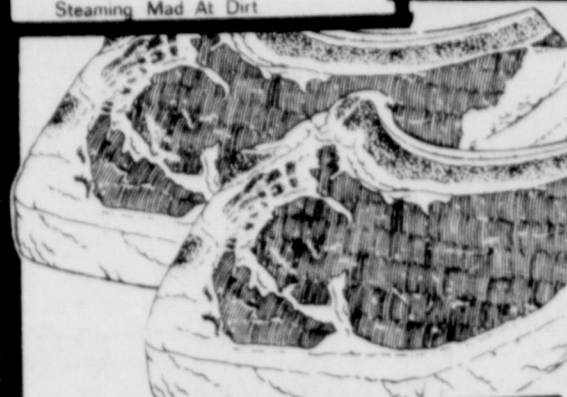
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
