A fire Wednesday night demolished the inside of the living quarters of the store, and also smoke-damaged all of the contents of the store, which was owned by Buster and Jan Steinbock, of Lazbuddie.

According to Lazbuddie Fire Chief, Glenn Lust, the west part of the building, which included the living quarters, consisting of two bedrooms, a living room and a bathroom were already burning by the time the Lazbuddie firemen arrived on the scene at 11:10 p.m.

There was no actual fire in the store itself, but the contents suffered heavy smoke damage from the fire.

The Steinbocks bought the store from longtime owners, Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Clay, about a year ago.

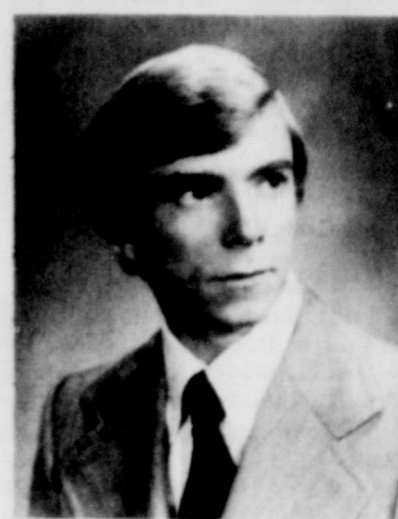

Soil Stewardship Week Observed Nationwide

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will join in the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 16-23, according to an announcement by Raymond Schueler. The theme of this year's celebration is "A Time for Tenacity."

"This is 'A Time for Tenacity' in our faith, in concept, in communication, in cooperation, in the political arena, in experiments and research, in leadership, in priorities, and in total commitment," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in the 16-page Soil Stewardship Week booklet. Forward for the publication was written by President Ronald Reagan.

NACD has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme each year is distributed through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, churches, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.

"With the growth of population and the world demand for food and

with the clearing and development of most land that is suitable for cultivation, we must turn our attention to the task of saving every acre," Schueler says. "The dream of adequate supplies of food and shelter must cover a period that extends far into the future because this is the only world we have and the total heritage of our descendants," he concluded.

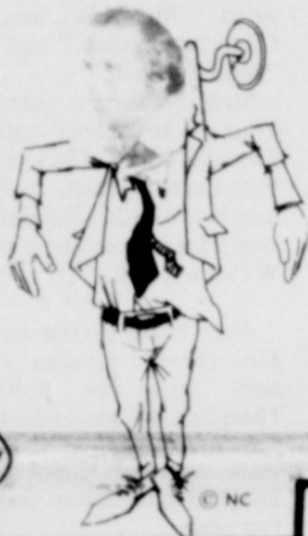
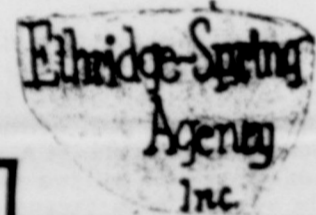

Notice is hereby given that DEAF SMITH ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective June 13, 1982, or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The proposed rates will effect a 12.28 per cent increase in the gross revenues of the Utility based upon the twelve-month period ending December 31, 1981 as the test year.

The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. Ex-Resident Dies At 54 In Oklahoma

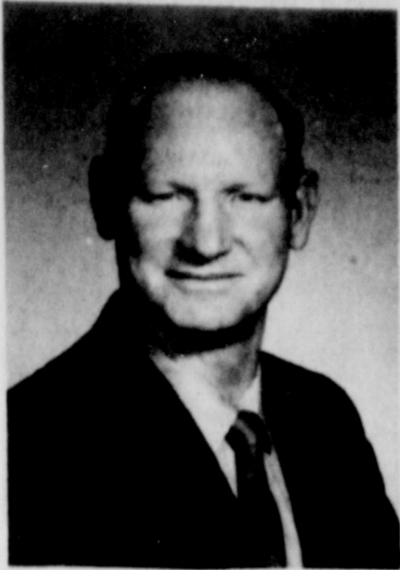

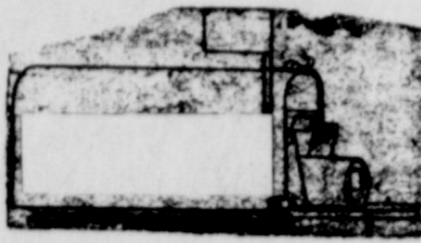

I would like to thank all those who supported my father in the recent commissioner's election. I know he has enjoyed serving as the commissioner of Precinct 2 during the past three and a half years, and will continue to serve to the best of his ability until January 1.

I would also like to take this opportunity to respond to some comments that were made prior to the election implying that my father has not supported the town of Bovina and that he did not spend as much time as he should have in carrying out the duties of the commissioner's job, including care of the roads.

Some of the accomplishments that I know of during his term include: (1) Helping the Senior Citizens secure funds for their building; (2) Supporting and securing money for the ambulance service and the fire department; (3) Upgrading the county equipment; (4) Helping the City of Bovina keep their dirt streets in good condition; (5) Maintaining the county roads as well as possible, considering weather conditions and the miles of road to be maintained; and (6) Being influential in getting new paving projects started in the county.

I know of several instances where he put the welfare of the taxpayers and the business interests of the county above individuals who expected special, favorable treatment. In fact, I feel that this very quality of my father was

what cost him the election.

I only hope that Precinct 2 will be so fortunate as to get another commissioner who will be as conscientious, fair, and honest as my father has been.
