
along with everyone else's. In the first place, we never have felt as though the "insanity" plea was fair, but simply a scam devised by the legal profession as a last-gasp effort to get their clients off the hook when it is a well-accepted fact that they are guilty of whatever charges for which they are being tried.

By the same token, the legal profession might as well introduce "not guilty because my client was enraged at the time he was charged for murder"; or "not guilty by reason that he had a bad day at the office," or how about "because he just didn't have a happy childhood."

The non-conviction of John Hinckley, Jr. for the shooting of President Reagan marks a high point for defense attorneys in this country, and one can only hope that the outrage from the American people will cause the court system to take a second look at some of its legal loopholes, which allow murderers to go free, rapists to freely roam the streets, and those convicted of driving while intoxicated or under the influence of drugs, to continue to operate their vehicles until they have slaughtered thousands of innocent victims.

The rights of the criminals have more than been served during the past generation. At this point in time, it is imperative that the leaders of our country recognize the importance of protecting the rights of its lawabiding citizens.

If Lee Harvey Oswald had been able to stand trial for the assassination of President Kennedy, we wonder if his defense could have been as successful as was that for John Hinckley. Somehow, we doubt that it would have. Due to the extreme national feeling of loss, we feel it would have been virtually impossible to have found 12 people out of the entire nation's population who would not have voted to throw the book at Oswald.

Lucky for the local residents, the Friday morning shower was minus any of the hail which has plagued area farmland for the past month. But there were times during the heavy shower when it seemed like it might commence to hail at any minute.

And, if Hinckley's aim had been an inch or two better the verdict rendered this week might also have been different.

But, due to his acquittal, has not the courts further endangered the lives of public officials, since wouldbe assassins can now say to themselves "I can get away with it anyway."

In a time when violence needs to be quashed, when lawbreakers need to be shown that offenders will be punished, we feel that the jury in the Hinckley case took a giant step backward in making it safe for our elected officials, particularly the president.

Luckily for President Reagan, the medical staff at George Washington Hospital was a good one, and was able to save his life that afternoon in March of 1981. They received the thanks and admiration of the entire nation.

Unfortunately, the prosecuting attorney and his staff of lawyers was not quite as skilled as the surgeons, because they could not convince 12 people that Hinckley was guilty of an act that virtually the entire nation was able to witness on their television screens.

It was an historic verdict, and an interesting one. And, we predict that the verdict will be much-discussed for a number of years.

We just wonder if the 12 jurors will be ready to shoulder the responsibility, the next time that Mr. Hinckley, or any other would-be assassin commits an act during a time of "temporary insanity."

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George Taylor's Rites Are Held On Tuesday

The city fathers thought the \$5,000 price tag was too high, and the cleanup was too much extra work for maintenance workers. Besides that, the police chief said the Fourth of July crowds and traffic were getting too difficult to handle.

So Independence Day came and went. There were the usual activities--picnics, barbecues, softball games in the park, and boating excursions on the river.

But nearly everyone I met sensed that something important was missing from the festivities.

"It was a little like Christmas without a tree and lights," wrote newspaper editor Earl Reeves.

"A boom and a sparkling burst in the night sky may not make a whole lot of fiscal sense," Earl continued, "but it does wonders for one's morale and sense of tradition."

Most of our townspeople apparently agreed with Earl's assessment, I know I did.

This year, the city's chief concern was not to cut costs, but rather to avoid a repetition of last year's lackluster holiday

A bit of extra cash was found, much more was raised from private contributions, and now the whole town is looking forward to this year's fireworks display.

The episode has helped us all appreciate the fact that a town needs more than streets and firemen--even when money is tight.

I hope there'll be some booms and sparkling bursts in your town, too, on this Fourth of July.

The ladies of Friona and the surrounding community are protesting the presence of the bench, as during the busy harvest season many of the wives or daughters come for the mail and they claim that there are already too many men loafing there to stare at them. 35 YEARS AGO ---

30 YEARS AGO-JULY 3, 1952 Early signing of right-of-way easements is necessary to expedite construction of the rural telephone line mapped for this area, Leo Forrest of Hereford has explained. Miss Mary Reeve is working on the project in the Friona area, and Mrs. Floyd Schlenker is working on the project in the Rhea community. Contract for the construction of the lines is hoped for by July 30.

25 YEARS AGO-JULY 3, 1957

Contracts were let this week to Kerr and Middleton of Lubbock for constructing additional farm-tomarket roads in Parmer County. Two projects are involved. One is from FM Road 690 at Oklahoma Lane south and southwest to the Bailey County line, where it will join another paved road already existing. The other will link Rhea with the two FM pavements running north of Bovina and west of Friona. The

combined length of the two projects is about 14 miles. A rattlesnake struck Monday afternoon from its hiding place in

wheat stubble, biting Pamela Ann Jones, 13. She was treated in Parmer County Community Hospital and reported in satisfactory condition by officials at the hospital.

20 YEARS AGO -- JULY 5, 1962

There have been a lot of unconfirmed reports about fish being found in irrigation ditches, barrow ditches and the like, but H.G. Houston, who farms three miles southeast of Friona, has gone them one better. Houston captured one of the phenomenons in an irrigation ditch on the J.L. Stowers farm Monday morning and brought it to the Friona Star office for photographing. The specimen was about two and a half inches long, and was sort of silvery colored, with flecks of gold.

15 YEARS AGO -- JULY 6, 1967

The Friona Industrial fund drive brought in a total of \$104,164.94, according to a report this week from the Friona Industrial Development Corporation. Members of the nonprofit corporation said they were making the announcement in the response to many inquiries as to the amount the drive raised, and to the dispersal of funds. Only one check has been drawn from the account at Friona State Bank, and that was for the purchase of land for the Missouri Beef Packers' site, in the amount of \$95,000. This leaves a balance in the fund of \$9,164.94, which members of the corporation hopes will continue to grow, for possible future use by prospective industries.

10 YEARS AGO -- JULY 6, 1972

The striking employees of the Friona Division of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. voted July 2, 1972 to end their five-month-old strike by accepting a new three-year contract. The employees are represented by local P-777 of Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen, AFL-

5 YEARS AGO .- JULY 3, 1977

Parmer County once again rated high in the 1977 Fed Cattle Production report for the High Plains, compiled by Sam Thomas and the Agricultural Development Department of Southwestern Public Service. Parmer County had to settle for fourth for total cattle fed among Texas counties for 1976, with 282,062 head of caule. Parmer's one-time capacity is 273,500, just below Deaf Smith's capacity.

County Commissioners' Court Gives Approval For Various Programs

Approval of expenditures for various programs highlighted the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court June 11.

Payment of \$1,151.08 to Lewellen Construction Company for the addition of a door to the jail was approved.

Approval was granted for medical bills for indigent children in the county, amounting to \$63.50, plus an optometrist's bill in the amount of \$90.00.

Judge Porter Roberts, who also is acting Veterans County Service Officer, was given approval by the commission and urged to attend a VCSO orientation school in Austin August 3-4-5, with the Veterans Affairs Commission paying the expenses.

Approval was granted to the organizers of Farwell's Lorder Town Days celebration to use the courthouse lawn for concession stands, as it has been in the past.

Sheriff Bill Morgan discussed the requirements of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. One thing needed to maintain certification is an exercise yard, according to Sheriff Morgan. Morgan had received an estimate on a fence for such yard at \$2,250 for 100 feet of fence, ten feet tall.

A motion was approved to build the fence, plus the addition of a guardian light on the parking lot back of the courthouse.

Motion was approved to pay the May boarding care bills on the five county foster children in the amount of \$1,147, which amount will be reimbursed to the county.

After a discussion with Mrs. Benna

Felts, County Treasurer, a motion was approved to divide a \$100,000 certificate of deposit from the county's general fund and secure three certificates in the amount of \$25,000, maturing in 30 days, with the remaining \$25,000 being transfered as cash to the general fund.

After considering three estimates, approval was granted to allow Grover Meeks to build a wall in one office in the courthouse to allow a private office for Justice of the Peace Albert Smith and to cut down the congestion and confusion in the County Judge's reception office. Cost of the new wall will be \$427.00.

Motion was passed to check on getting some spraying done for bugs on the second floor of the courthouse

Approval was given to Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, to attend afternoon classes at Texas Tech for three weeks, while working each morning.

Soil conservation work was approved in precinct three for five locations, as soon as county machine are not in demand for use on county roads. The county is to be reimbursed for costs of such work.

Commissioner Jack Patterson had a problem referred to him concerning a fence belonging to Ted Walling.

Approval was granted to seek bids for used pickups for Precincts 3 and 4, such bids to be opened June 28.

A motion was approved to hold a "proposed use hearing" on the use of the county's revenue sharing funds at 5 p.m. on June 28, at the County Courtroom in Farwell.

Pallbearers will be Tommy Barker, Fred Barker, Jr., Steve Gregory, Ernest Anthony, James Anthony and Mark Anthony.







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



Two Frionans Complete Electric Course

Two members of the Friona High School chapter of Future Farmers of America were among the 82 FFA boys--and one FFA girl--who successfully completed a course in farm electrification at a Southwestern Public Service-sponsored workshop in Amarillo, Wednesday, June 16.

Vohnya Tongate and Terry Petchinsky attended the three-day workshop, the twentieth sponsored by SPS.

This was the first SPS-FFA workshop ever in which a girl was a student. She was Kathy Karber, a Booker, Texas, high school senior.

The students learned how to wire buildings, how to build and use electric controls, or how to build electric motors. They also were

taught how electricity is made, and first aid and safety tips.

Five students were selected by the workshop faculty as winners of trips to the National FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo., in November. SPS will pay the students' expenses. The top students were Max Hector of Frenship High School, Dennis Stuart of Mobectie High School, Kelly Kunka of Follett High School, David Abell of Ralls High School, and Kynan Sturgess of Dumas High School

Berl Springer, chairman of the SPS Board of Directors and Chief Executive Officer of the Company, presented awards Wednesday to the five trip winners and to the other students who successfully completed

communities, from Guthrie, Okla., and Clovis, Roswell and Tucumcari, N.M. Workshop administrators were assisted by three students: FFA Area One president Tom McDonald of Texline, and Area One vice presidents Bret Whitten of Bovina and Patrick Railsback of Idalou.

Five vocational teachers paid by SPS taught the three courses. They were assisted by 21 adult FFA advisors and by SPS personnel.

The "Farm Wiring" course emphasized safe and efficient wiring of two- and three-way switches, proper wire splicing, and how to make a meter loop. The skills can be used in homes, barns, sheds, or other places electricity is needed. Students in the "Electric Controls"

The students came from 42 Texas course learned how to tie in threeand four-way switches, how to set up photoelectric cells for automatic lighting, and how to set up two- and three-pole relays.

The "Farm Motors" course taught students how to operate, repair and build small electric motors.

Tuesday afternoon the students toured SPS's Harrington Station, a giant coal-fired power plant at Amarillo which has a generating capacity of 1,122,000 kilowatts.



"She was a highly-motivated student," said Scott. "She had an idea what she wanted to do."

Fashion Revue Set June 30 In Farwell


The gazebo in Farwell City Park will be the setting for the 1982 4-H Fashion Revue. The style show will take place on June 30 at approximately 11 a.m.


During the clothing project 4-H'ers learn various aspects of clothing. This includes consumerism, textiles, creation, design and grooming.
