THIS WEEK WE want to make a tip of our hat to some folks who are doing a fine job, in our estimation.

We would like to start with new Friona City Manager, Jerry R. Lewis. Ever since arriving in Friona February 1, Lewis has been "in motion."

We have hardly been to a public gathering or civic function of any nature since Lewis' arrival in Friona that the city manager was not in attendance. He has met with virtually every club and organization, and has expressed an interest in every facet of Friona's city life.

Lewis has taken charge of such projects as the city's water improvement program, and is helping to maintain an orderly completion of this million-dollar project, which hopefully will be completed by this August.

Another project which Lewis jumped into "on all fours" was the swimming pool renovation. The municipal pool and its facilities were at the stage where the pool virtually could not have opened for 1982 without a major overhaul.

We personally know that the pool, and its dressing room facility has been a matter of concern for the city council for quite some time. It has been the intention of the council to get some improvements done, but this spring, with Lewis at the helm, the needed work was finally accomplished.

Lewis utilized city employees to rebuild the dressing room-entrance area, saving taxpayers a considerable amount of money. A number of employees worked countless hours in order that the pool might open for the 1982 season.

Lewis is quick to pass the compliments on to the members of his staff, who put in the extra work to salvage one of the city's few recreational spots. Several city employees gave up their Memorial Day weekend, working until 8 p.m. each day, to complete the needed work.

Lewis also placed the local softball program under the city's wing, and is interested in the success of this program.

He is vitally interested in many more projects. We feel that Friona is fortunate in having secured Lewis' services. As they say about the character Calvin Armstrong in the production "Texas," he is a "Regular whirlwind of activity."

OUR PLAUDITS ALSO go this week to all of the various leaders and officials of the Friona Public Library, on the occasion of Open House for the library's new facility.

The library was one of the first civic projects with which we became acquainted after arriving in Friona. In the summer of 1963, we were contacted by members of the Modern Study Club's library committee.

The Study Club was in the process of establishing a local library, having sensed the need for such a facility. The club placed its collection of books at the Friona Woman's Clubhouse, which was the library's first home.

In a short time, the clubhouse could not hold all of the books, and the old Syndicate Hotel (American Legion property) was secured for the library's home. The old white building became home for the library for almost a generation of Friona children and adult workers.

The City of Friona made the library an arm of the city, and began providing books on a regular basis.

The opening of the new library represents a dream come true for countless people, beginning with the Study Club members, various library volunteers and employees, and library board members.

Having to buck the tide of "more pressing needs," the issue of a new library was "shelved" on numerous occasions.

But its time finally came, and thanks to a wonderful public response, the city now has a facility of which it can justifiably be proud.

City Sets Battle Vs Mosquitoes

City Manager Jerry R. Lewis pointed out this week the steps which the city has taken toward the control of mosquitoes.

"Since the recent rain, the mosquito larvae have had time to hatch. The city is in the process of spraying and fogging. We are running our fogging equipment all over town. If you think we have missed your street, give us a call," Lewis said.

The city manager pointed out that in order to stay abreast of newly-hatched larvae, it is necessary to run the fogger about every third day.

The city also plans to do some spraying by air where possible and practicable.

"We are doing everything in our power to enable residents of the city to enjoy being out of doors during this season, but we also need to ask their help in the matter," Lewis said.

The city manager asked citizens to help the situation by picking up and discarding all old tires, and to eliminate all stagnant water by turning over cans, barrels, etc.

"Residents also need to cut their tall grass, since this is where the mosquitoes stay during the daytime.

"If there is a large area of water without fish or waterfowl, mosquitoes can be controlled by pouring oil on top of the water," Lewis said.

Beginning Monday, June 14, city employees will be mowing lots which have grown up in weeds and grass. Owners will first be contacted and asked to do the cutting, and if they cannot, the city will do the work, and assess the owners for the cost involved.

"If you have an area that fits in this category, and you recognize that you cannot cut the weeds, give the city a call, so we can schedule the work," Lewis said.

"I feel that we can lick the mosquito problem, but we definitely need the help of all residents in order to do so," Lewis concluded.

Schedule Shapes Up

Plans are progressing toward the city's July 4th celebration, according to D.L. Harguess, chairman.

The Chamber of Commerce has announced that it will sponsor a volleyball tournament July 5th at the Community Center. Teams entered may be women's or mixed, although there may be no more than three men to a team.

A tennis tournament also will be held. Those wishing to enter may call the chairmen of this tournament, Paul J. Smith and Dale Houlette.

The chamber will also sponsor its annual ping-pong tournament the afternoon of July 5th.

Other events, sponsored by the Friona Evening Lions, include sack races, bike races, a turtle race plus prizes for the various "best turtles" and a softball throw.

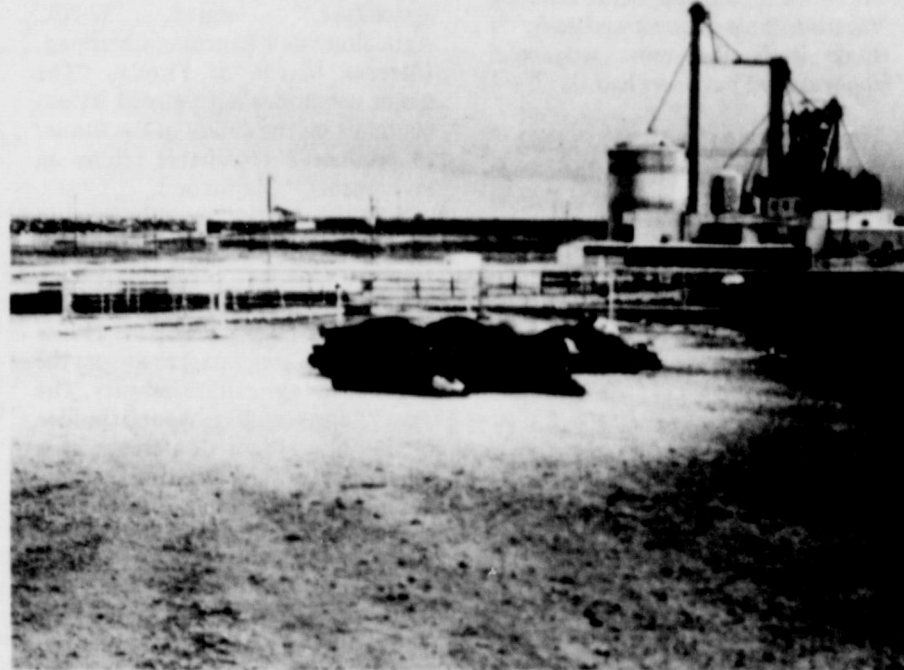

SPS Accepts Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced it would accept a nine per cent rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 per cent of the 12.7 per cent Texas retail rate increase requested by the Company.

Okla. Lane Area Battered By Hail

Parmer County was once again hit by stormy weather Thursday evening, and the loss toll may once again be high in some areas.

Greatest loss from the Thursday storm appeared to be at Bovina Feeders, located 6½ miles west of Clay's Corner.

A spokesman for the feeding operation said Friday morning that as many as 500 cattle were drowned. "The toll may be as high as 1,000 cattle. We had 21 pens under water," said Ronnie Hanaberry, assistant manager of the feedlot.

Hanaberry said that it apparently hailed for two to two and one-half hours, from marble to golf-ball in size. It also came a flood of rain, which caused the lower end of the feeding installation to be under water. Stacks of ice from the Thursday hailstorm were still evident on Friday.

"The rain gauge showed 4½ inches of rain, but I'm sure it couldn't have caught it all," the feedlot spokesman said.

The control room of the feedlot's mill was flooded, and had shut down the feed mixing operations on Friday morning. "We've got to pump the water out of our basement," Hanaberry added.

More crop damage was sustained from the storm, particularly in the Oklahoma Lane area. At least one field of wheat had been reported as wiped out by the hailstorm, which is the third one for that area this spring.

Golf-ball sized hail was also reported southwest of Friona during the storm, although the city was once again amazingly spared any major hail damage.

One motorist, enroute to Clovis on Highway

60 during the storm, reportedly lost their windshield, and they had to pull off the road. "It was scary," the source said.

Road graders were being run in the Oklahoma Lane area Friday, in order that the rural roads might be usable.

From Friona on eastward, the Thursday storm left mainly rainfall, with some scattered reports of hail damage. The official measurement in the city was only .17 inch, although farmers in the outlying area reported as much as an inch of rain. Some were lucky enough to get only rainfall, which was much needed.

Gail Morris, manager of Bovina Feeders, said that the feedlot carried insurance against such losses. It was hard to know the exact number of cattle which perished, because it was slow work, having to pull the dead cattle out one at a time with bulldozers and tractors.

The cattle drowned because they could not get out of their pens. There were three pens at the yard in which no live cattle were found. The feedlot lost all the cattle in their hospital "holding pens," about 180 in all.

The night watchmen at the feedlot were caught on the north side of the installation and could not get back to the office due to the hail, otherwise it was thought they could have opened some of the flooded pens, and perhaps saved some of the cattle.

Most of the hail damage was between State Highway 214 and Oklahoma Lane Road 1731. Ice was stacked on the dirt roads, making them virtually impassable (thus the maintainers being run). This reporter's vehicle was stalled on high center for a time at such a place.

City To Tackle Stray Dogs

The City of Friona is getting ready to crack down on its ordinances regarding stray dogs, City Manager Jerry Lewis said this week.

"We're getting far too many complaints—something like a dozen or so per week. Many of the calls involve the same dogs, which may be running loose in groups," Lewis said.

The city manager said that the city has an ordinance prohibiting stray dogs from running loose, and that effective immediately, it intends to enforce the ordinance.

"All dogs picked up will be treated as strays, unless they have tags and have been vaccinated.

"If we pick up a dog which has done damage to property, this will be taken into city court, where damages could be assessed against the dog's owner," Lewis said.

A group of four ladies appeared before the city council at this group's regular monthly meeting this past Monday, complaining about the situation regarding stray dogs. The council agreed to seek a solution to the problem.

Apparently, the solution lies in the enforcement of laws already on the city's books, which the city now plans to do.

Lifesaving Class Slated

An advanced lifesaving class will be held beginning on June 14 in Hereford. This class is required of most lifeguards. The class will be held at the Hereford City Pool on Park Avenue, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

Experience. The films were produced by the Texas Panhandle Historical Society and have been previously shown on the Bedford Forrest show, on channel 7, at the Canyon Museum, the Amarillo Civic Center and throughout the area and were well accepted and appreciated by the viewing audience.

The films, which direct the history of the early Panhandle, will be available for check-out through Friona's Library by reservation.

WTCC Asks Reagan For Ag Help

The WTCC Board of Directors has called on President Reagan to convene a nationwide conference to comprehensively address the problems facing agriculture.

"Attention should be directly focused on operating, marketing and regulatory factors affecting agriculture," stated WTCC Agriculture and Ranching Chairman, Clarence Martin of Friona. "The major conditions have placed serious restraints on the ability of the farmer to produce a reasonable return on investments," Martin said.

WTCC officials recently met in Washington with Congressmen Kent Hance, Charles Stenholm, Jack Hightower, Marvin Leath and Kika de la Garza (chairman of the House Agriculture Committee) to discuss the plight of the agriculture industry. The Texas Representatives viewed the idea of a White House Conference as a major step toward directing national attention to the complex problems of the agri-economy and its importance to the overall strength and security of the country.

The WTCC has a history of actively supporting the agricultural industry and affirms the farmer's right to a reasonable return for his efforts.

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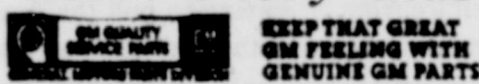

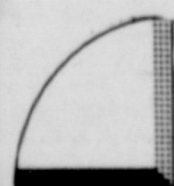

New Assn. Begun In Panhandle

There is a rather new organization in the Texas Panhandle which might be of service to some members of our community. It is the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association.

Alzheimer's Disease is a disorder of the brain, causing loss of memory or serious mental deterioration. It is estimated that the disease affects from 500,000 to 1.5 million middle aged and older Americans.

The terms presenile and senile dementia are used to describe any kind of severe mental impairment in older individuals. Many of these persons are victims of Alzheimer's Disease. Others suffer from a variety of other conditions. Diagnosis of the specific type of dementia is very important since some types, other than Alzheimer's Disease, can be effectively treated.

At first, patients suffering from Alzheimer's Disease exhibit only minor and almost imperceptible symptoms that are often attributed to other illnesses. Gradually, however, the person becomes more forgetful. As memory loss increases, changes also appear in personality, mood and behavior. The person may neglect to turn off the oven, misplace things, take longer to complete a chore that was previously routine or repeat already answered questions. Judgements, concentration, speech and physical coordination may also be affected. Some individuals show confusion and restlessness and may require special assistance.

Although the person with Alzheimer's Disease is often unaware of, or may deny the full extent of his

or her limitations, especially late in the course of the illness, the development and course of the illness are a source of deep frustration for those afflicted and for their loved ones.

As yet, the prevention or cure of the disease is not known. However, medical care can relieve many of its symptoms and proper guidance can assist the person and family in coping with the illness.

The Alzheimer's Association seeks to educate the community about the

disease, provide support for patients and family, to enable families to help each other through the exchange of solutions of day to day problems, and to encourage research.

The organization, based in Amarillo, has a video tape from the National Institute on Aging which discusses this disease and its effects. A member of the Association will be willing to visit any church or community group and discuss the disease. Contact person in this county is Rev. Skip Sircic at 247-3635.

Around The House In Parmer County

Wicker.

It's spelling has changed over time, but its meaning hasn't.

Wicker, one of today's "fashion furnishings" is something that's woven, mostly from rattan, which includes cane, pole, reed, and peel. It's also made with willow, straw, rush, raffia, palm, dried grasses, spun wood pulp (fiber) buri, or bamboo.

Wicker comes to consumers worldwide as headrests, floor mats, hats, shoes, tea strainers, spice containers, all styles of boxes and baskets—even houses and hearses.

But the way we know wicker best—what we think of when we "think wicker"—is furniture.

Wicker furniture has had its fashion ins and outs over the history of home furnishings, but it reached a popularity pinnacle during Victorian times.

People were wild about wicker. They put it into every room in the house.

They're doing it again today—probably for the same reasons: wicker is natural, homemade, comfortable.

Wicker is new and, at the same time, old. It's rustic, yet exotic. And although it may take the most simple or the most elaborate forms to reflect the taste of the times, it always maintains an integrity of its own.

Wicker is homey—simple, practically, naturally, comfortably homey, and that appeals to everyone.

An important part of keeping that "forever-new" look in your wicker furniture is keeping it clean.

Go over it thoroughly with a soft brush and warm soapy water. Use a toothbrush for hard-to-get-at places.

Wicker pieces made of reed and willow (both natural and painted) should be periodically wiped off with a soft wet cloth.

It this type of wicker becomes brittle, take it outside and hose it off. The water will "feed" the reeds and ensure greater flexibility.

Wicker made of either fiber (twisted paper) or sea grass should never be hosed off because water will weaken the weave as well as the individual fibers. To clean this type of wicker furniture, use a damp cloth only.

Very diluted domestic bleach will whiten soiled reed and willow pieces that have been left in their natural state, but this procedure should be used with great caution and only if scrubbing with warm soapy water does not do the job.

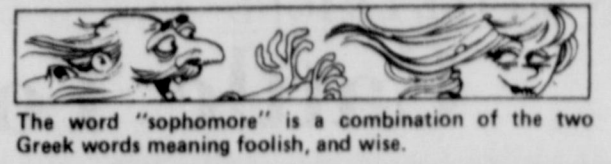

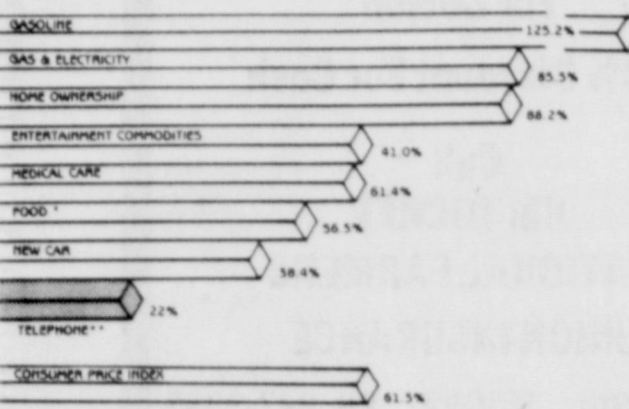

Much discussion dealt with the budget and the staffing pattern for the conference. Annual reports from committees and task forces were heard, and there were many moments for worship and fellowship.

Officers were elected and installed and a variety of resolutions were discussed and adopted. Keynote addresses were given by Dr. Malcom Warford, president of Eden Seminary and Dr. Joseph Evans, secretary and past president of the United Church.

There were also workshops to attend and opportunities to relate to delegates from churches all over Texas and Louisiana.

Highlights of the annual meeting included continual support in the area of new church development, satellite meetings in many of the local New Orleans churches and general support of the conference-wide priority on family life.

W. Millican Is TCLRS Enumerator

While counting sheep may be a sure-fire way of going to sleep, for Wilda Millican of Friona it is just part of her job as field enumerator with the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service (TCLRS). And if sheep are not on the agenda, then she may have to count anything from mother cows to the number of bolls on a cotton plant.

Millican has been with the TCLRS since 1974 and is currently an enumerator in Parmer County. Her warm, outgoing personality has made her some lifelong friends, and many farmers and ranchers look forward to her visits.

Making her survey routes with maps, tape measure and questionnaires in hand; a full tank of gas in

the car; and a warm smile for everyone she meets, Millican travels Parmer County gathering information which helps keep crop and livestock producers abreast of the constantly changing agricultural situation.

Field enumerators provide the vital link in the data collection services of the TCLRS, because they are the only personal contact farmers and ranchers have with the agency. Currently there are over 100 enumerators working on farm and ranch surveys across the state.

Most enumerators have an agricultural background, and they are certainly familiar with the plight of the Texas farmer who is caught in a

squeeze between low farm prices and high production and interest costs.

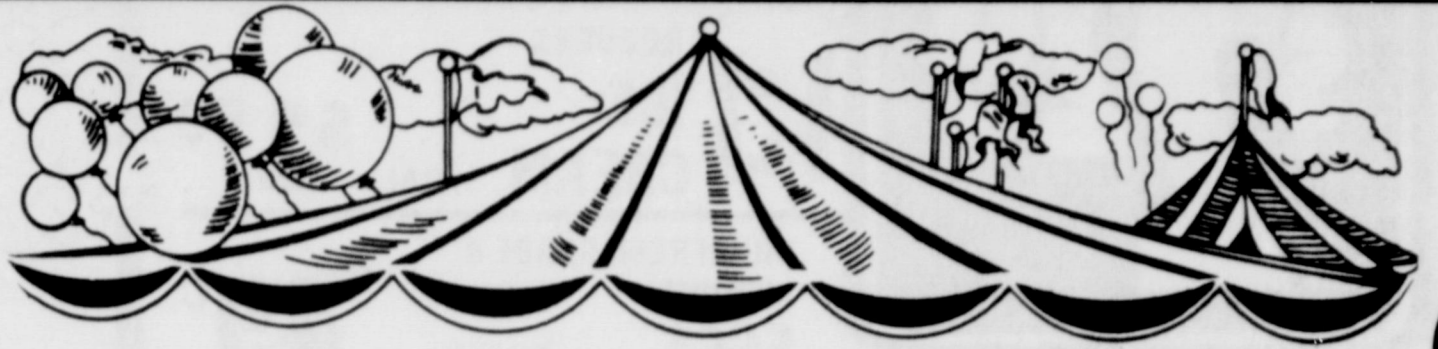
Beginning in late May, the enumerators will be contacting randomly selected farmers and ranchers in Texas to collect data pertaining to specific land areas. Armed with aerial photographs, they will travel farm-to-market roads to find a land segment, and sometimes a stock tank provides the only landmark.

Information gathered from the confidential, personal interviews will be used in helping to set the first major planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories for 1982. While participation is voluntary, the farmers' cooperation is vital in developing reliable

indications about the current agricultural situation.

The TCLRS, a cooperative agency of the United States Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Agriculture, is responsible for setting State and County agricultural estimates.

State Statistician Doug Murfield noted the high quality of the Texas field enumerator and the good working relationship many of them have with area farmers. They have been called upon to be auto mechanics when a family's car would not start, and one Central Texas enumerator even stayed to iron a shirt for a farmer to wear to church.



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
