

Rain General In Friona Territory

The rain that fell throughout the immediate Friona territory on Wednesday afternoon of last week was large enough to relieve the pressure of continued drought on the wheat crop of the locality.

At Friona and immediate sur-rounding teritory an estimated half inch of rain was received, which seems to have wetted the surface to the depth of the underground moisture, and has brought new life to the wheat and placed the soil in fine condition for gardening and the planting of row crops. Several farmers are planning to begin such work in the near future, and some have already begun. At the Spohn neighborhood, some six or seven miles west of Friona, it is reported that a heavy hail which covered the ground like a blanket of snow to the depth of two inches or more was accompanied by a heavy fall of rain, making a depth of moisture of two inches or
