Floyd County Commissioners court this week made plans for the expenditure of the remainder of the \$300,000 road building fund voted by the taxpayers of the county in 1948, and set up five projects which they estimate can be built with the amount of money available in the fund, amounting to \$133,000 in round figures.

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# Views and Comment

**Weather-wise** The Hesperian is amazed at the kind of weather that has prevailed most of this winter. We are not sure the polar axis has not slipped a cog. The men who measure glaciers away up north where it seems terribly cold, say some of these big mountains of ice that move slowly but with great force to root up mammoth trees and push aside hill-size boulders when they are "growing" — they say most of these glaciers have lost their oomph and are receding. One such lost a thousand feet in five summers. This may be part and parcel of the recent maneuvers of the weather that whips an old-fashioned norther into the country only to have it "slide off" east about the time it gets to the north line of Kansas. We are unwilling to agree with this trend of thought. It is said that the comparable years in the eighties when Texas was hit by the two-year drouth similar doings went on among the weather. And we have had a lot of cold in Texas since that time. Maybe it is just laying up for this spring or for next winter or the next. Don't get to thinking about the receding glaciers and give away your winter clothes. Also keep some forage feed handy in case ice covers the grazing land. Texas weather is mighty changeable. It has done such a thing as come a freezing rain on the Fourth of July.

They sure ought to turn things over to The Hesperian and get them straightened out, and for quick. Like this big government spending bringing prosperity. We don't know that it won't, but that is not an infallible test. For it was only back in 1945-1947 that the spending was cut from \$99 billion to \$49 billion and taking the country over there was there ever a more prosperous two years than in 1947-48? Any way you take it government spending takes away more than it replaces in the real goods and services that make up our way of life and make real prosperity. We must spend as much as we must for defense but we must not imagine too many needs, because if you imagine past the peoples' pocketbooks you imagine them into poverty. The Confederacy and the people who lived under it affords a good example. For a time the inflation brought a wave of prosperity but when the people got to the point they spent all their substance for defense they had neither defense nor substance.

Experience is what you get while looking for something else.

Senator Tom Connally speaks the sense of the people when he says this country should have broken off diplomatic relations with Hungary two months ago. The mock trail of the fliers who were downed while on a peaceful mission, the \$30,000 per head ransom on charge of espionage, make up too flimsy a record. The state department may know good reasons why official relations should not be severed with such a country but they have not divulged them to the public which foots the bills. The senator is right that a gang of ruffians is not entitled to be treated like anything but ruffians.

Who is it that is making the high cost of living high? Possibly the time is past when Floyd county people, as a whole, will pay a great deal of attention to hogs, chicken, eggs, milk, cream and the like for a livelihood. But to those who do pay attention to such things the severe drop in these commodities, excepting milk, could be reason for the cost of living to go down. When hogs drop from 24 cents to 18 cents, chickens from 24 to 18, eggs from 60 to 30, the cost of living has gone down for somebody. Also when cow hides from which some shoes are made are a drug on the market, the cost of keeping the kids in shoes for school surely has reason to go down.

EVERYBODY but us is not trying to do the right thing, everybody but us. See it in the papers, plain as can be. Nobody trying to be fair, everybody trying to get to the government, to the customer, to the consumer. Everybody trying to run something by the newspaperman, everybody trying to get special privileges over at the court house, down at Austin. You hear it on every side. True to a very, very limited extent. Most everybody is still a good person, trying to do the right thing as he is given the light to see right. Don't you believe all of that stuff. You keep your faith in humanity.

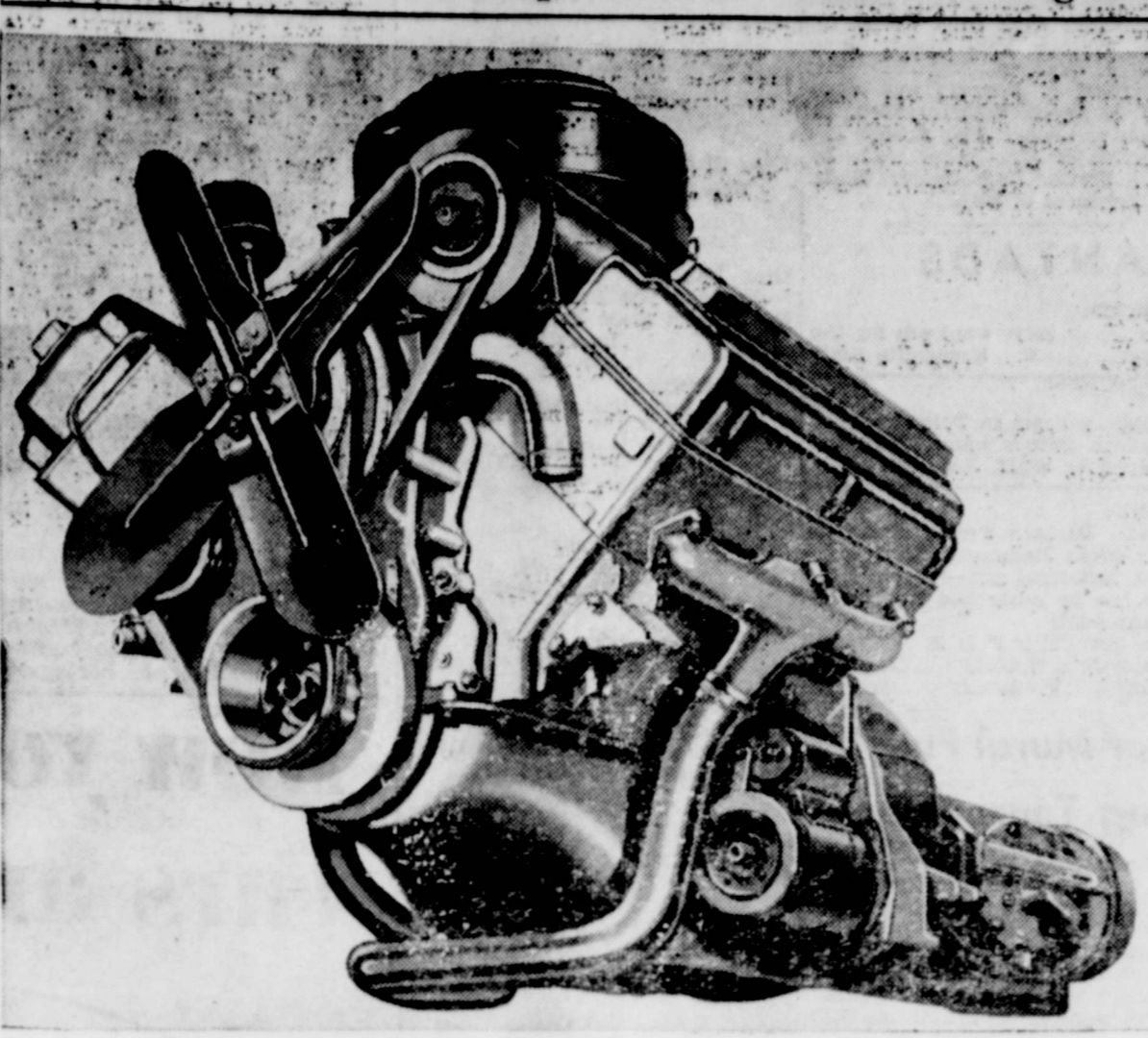

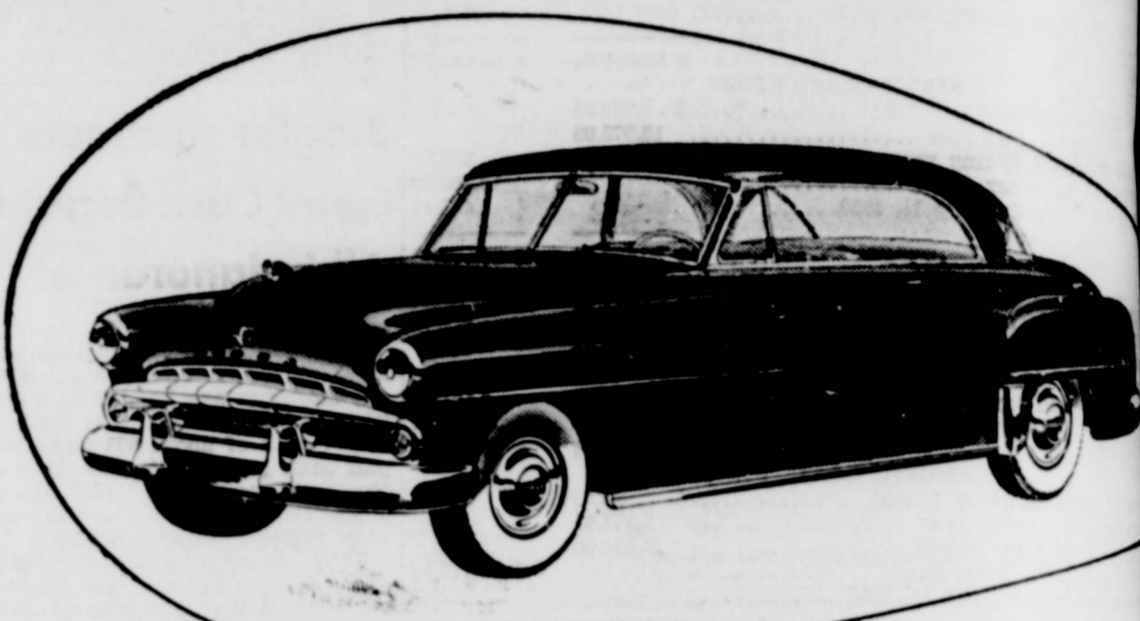

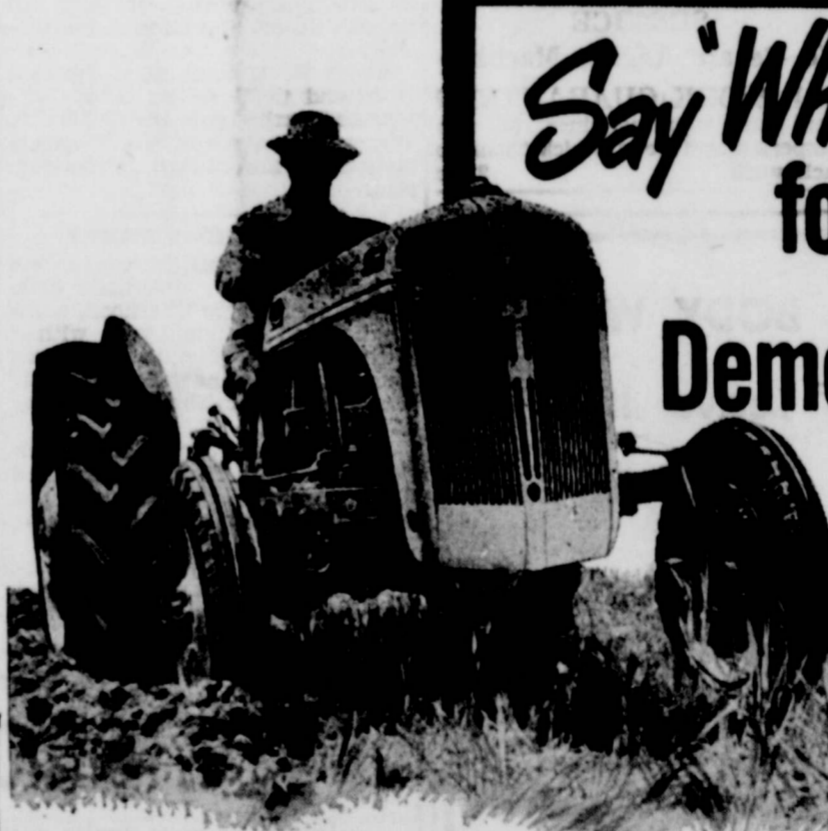

 A catalogue holds a number of pictures in brightest design and pansies, carrots and in my hand is summer by all!  
 temperature low, there's snow on the walk.  
 weather itself is enough to appeal, but  
 the book, see each lovely thing,  
 decide then and there to order all!  
 weather has been so very fine, there is no moisture for us, good to have warm weather, hearing it said, look out

for March! But do we not always have to look out for this stormy month? This Monday morning the clouds are a light gray under a deep blue sky, and they are traveling east. I watch them from my window as I write and wonder where they will stop and what they will do. They make such lovely patterns of fleecy wool against the blue.  
 Our house smells of soap. Not the perfumed modern kind but the old-fashioned lye soap. I open the doors and unstop the anti-smell, but nothing does any good. The soap is the stronger odor. ## GOOD HEALTH



1. WHAT IS FLUORIDATION OF WATER?

It has been found that children can lessen their tendency to tooth decay if drinking water contains one-millionth part of fluoride. Since tooth decay is the most prevalent childhood illness next to the common cold, many cities are adding fluorides to municipal water supplies when these salts are not already present. The cost is very small. Parents, however, should consult their family dentist about their children's teeth.

2. WHAT ARE HORMONES?

Hormones are substances given off by certain glands of the body. When these glands do not function properly, the human body

develops deficiencies which your doctor can treat with drugs produced from similar glands of animals. Some hormones are being produced synthetically (artificially).

3. CAN MILK BE HARMFUL?

Unless properly pasteurized (heated enough to kill the germs) and kept clean, milk may be a dangerous spreader of tuberculosis and brucellosis (undulant fever) and other diseases. Such diseases can be transmitted from cows to humans. It is important that citizens see to it that the milk in their communities is pasteurized.

**THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION** is as follows: WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes herein-after stated; therefore

**BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS:**

I. That an election be held on the 8th day of March, 1952, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 1**

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED SIXTYE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$116,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of paying off, refunding and cancelling an equal amount of the outstanding indebtedness of the City's Electric Light System, as evidenced by bonds known as "City of Floydada, Texas, Electric Light Revenue Bonds, Series 1947", dated June 10, 1947, being Bonds Numbered 30 to 145, inclusive, of said series, in denomination of \$1,000 each, issued pursuant to an ordinance adoption by the City Council of said City on the 25th day of June, 1947, recorded in Book 6, page 235, et seq. of the Minutes of said City Council; said \$116,000 new revenue bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty-five (35) years from their date, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (3-1/2%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's Electric Light System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 2**

"Shall the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, be authorized to issue TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$279,000) of revenue bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing improvements, enlargements, extensions and repairs to the City's Electric Light System; Said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty-five (35) years from their date, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed THREE AND THREE-FOURTHS PER CENTUM (3-3/4%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by an exclusive first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's Electric Light System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

II. In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election shall contain this clause: "The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised, or to be raised, by taxation."

III. That said election shall be held at the City Hall, in said City of Floydada, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

IV. That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: J. G. Wood, Presiding Judge; E. P. Nelson, Judge; Mrs. E. P. Nelson, Clerk; and Mrs. Scott King, Clerk.

V. That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

VI. That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with House Bill Number 357, passed by the Fifty-first Legislature in 1919, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$279,000 ELECTRIC LIGHT REVENUE BONDS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$279,000 ELECTRIC LIGHT REVENUE BONDS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

AS TO EACH OF the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions, respectively.

VII. That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted in three public places in the City of Floydada, Texas, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Floydada, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

VIII. That said revenue bonds are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond or bonds, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of an indebtedness against the City's Electric Light System for the purposes hereinabove stated, and which bonds, if approved by the qualified voters voting at the election herein and hereby ordered, are to be issued as one series.

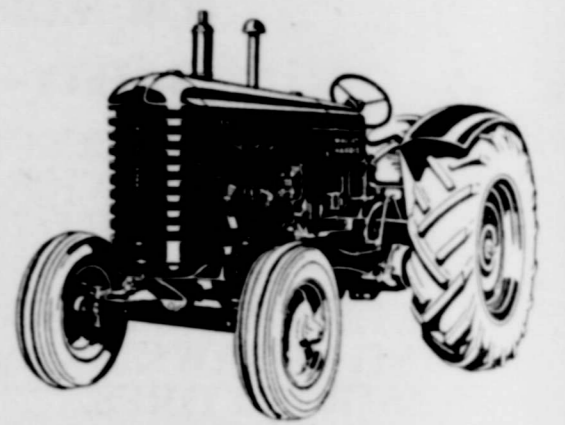
