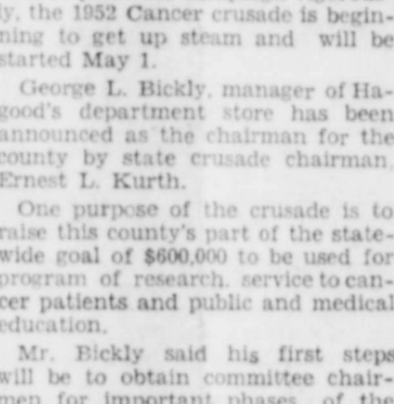
TB Patch Test Due Next Week

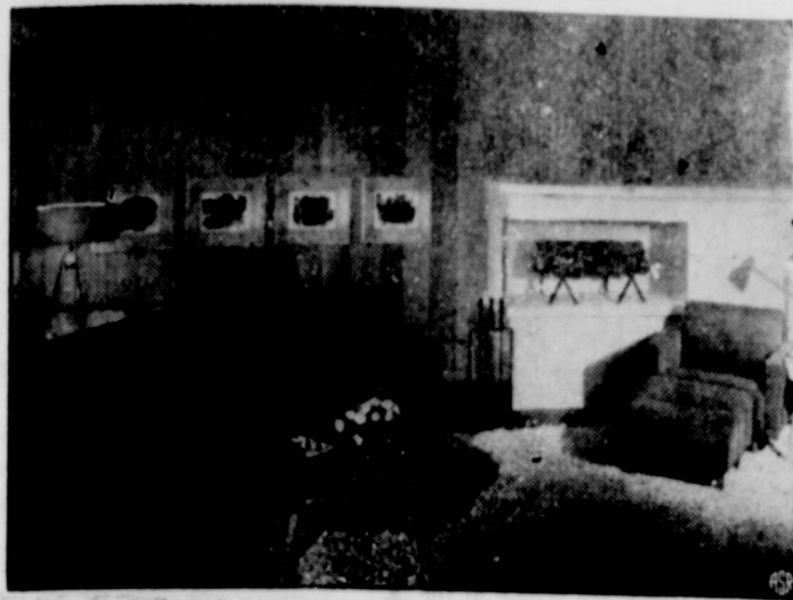

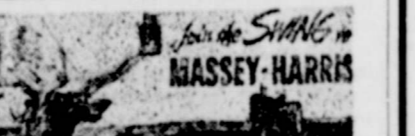

While neither picture is the true one, perhaps we do need shaking up once in awhile — by an earthquake or a thought — to give us perspective on ourselves.

port of the treasurer to the rural electric concern's members it is shown that the gross sales for the year ran to \$342,694.65 and that the net of receipts for the year over all expenses was \$17,414.26.

Breakdown of the expenses showed electric power purchased at \$120,213.60, operating and maintenance \$83,701.27, depreciation \$70,083.98, taxes and insurance \$6,616.22. The interest bill for borrowed money and for amortization to REA ran to \$44,685.32.

### Borrowings Are Heavy

At this time the enterprise has under way construction jobs for which a \$100,000 cash fund is currently being expended. The net value of the system is now set at \$2,480,188.48.

Borrowing of the rural electric has been huge. Since its inception the total funds allocated from the Rural Electrification Administration has been \$2,559,680.92, of which \$172,494.44 has been paid back.

### Use of Power Increases

The tax bill of the coop this year was \$4,328.31, according to the president's figures presented at the meeting, which includes property taxes and social security taxes, and the organization has paid \$45,682.13 interest on their long term debt.

Manager Henry's report showed a marked upward trend on the use being made by members of the electric energy supplied by the concern. For instance, the average monthly kilowatt hours used per home or farm jumped from 132 in 1950 to 153 in 1951, the per cents of number of minimum users dropped and the monthly revenue per mile increased from \$14.50 to \$20.11. Henry's figures also revealed that:

The miles of line now in operation is 1,429, serving 2266 consumer homes;

The average wholesale cost of energy purchased for the year was .00778.

The loss of energy purchased in process of transmitting at from the high lines to the consumers homes was reduced from 19 percent to 17 percent from the previous years;

The cooperative has a tremendous volume of irrigation business.

# City Contracts For New Engine

Purchase of an engine, for which bids were received by the city last week, was consummated by the council Friday night last, for delivery indicated in January of 1953, to be installed in the municipal power plant.

Bid of the Cooper-Bessemer company for an engine of 1740 horse power, rated capacity 1230 kilowatts per hour, was adopted. The bid price was \$156,783 and the council took an optional air intake cooler as added equipment, which added \$1,600 to the cost price.

The new engine will use the radiator type of cooling system instead of the cooling tower, Al R. Fuchs, utilities superintendent said.

Mayor J. A. Patterson, Councilman D. T. Mayo and Mrs. Fusch made a three-day trip last week before the council took final action. They viewed engines in operation at Coleman, Brady and Vernon during their absence.

The new engine to be installed can be used with diesel fuel, natural gas or as a dual fuel spark ignition power plant, making changes optional with fluctuating supplies of the types of fuel.

# Views and Comment

Saturday's city vote will choose a city alderman to take the place of Jimmy Willson, town boy moved a few blocks out into the country. Doubtless he has found out by now that there is not much difference between "town" and "country". Meanwhile, the geography of the thing and the laws of the land call for the residents of the municipality to choose a successor. The date is Saturday of this week, not a few Saturdays away. So far as we know at this writing there will be only one name on the ballot, that of Leonard Matsler. If he is chosen he will be the "new blood" on the council, new in point of years in public affairs. Matsler will have positive ideas, we believe. If he is elected and accepts he will assume his part of the responsibility. There are times when public servants have to let the hair go with the hide. There are also times when a diplomatic approach to a problem pays the biggest dividends. Matsler is good material, but untried. In the lingo of the live stock man he is a promising prospect.

Also, when you vote Saturday you'll have a chance to express a preference for the candidates now in sight for president of the United States. It's a straw vote, of course, with no official standing. But it will be interesting to see what the people are thinking, perhaps better said, to whom they are listening. Also of more direct import right now to Texans is the vote on whether to send an instructed or an uninstructed delegation to the Democratic National convention from Texas. The way it is stated on the ballot:

Governor Shivers and those who support his ideas think that Texas democrats have had enough of sending a "rubber stamp" delegation to the national convention. He thinks we need to restore the state's voice of authority in national councils of the party, there to help make and mould its policies and choose its candidates. "Loyal" Democrats, on the other hand, want a pledged delegation from precinct, county and state—pledged to support the national nominees of the party regardless, as has been the rule in this state since 1932. What Floydada

people will do about this will be the first straw in the wind and should be of statewide interest, coming just before the precinct convention on May 3. Important? Why, yes!

It may be the people are wrong who think Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is aiming at a figure for exchange station rates higher than their customers are willing to pay. It may be the customers are unaware of what a great convenience the telephone is and that in the pinch they are going to be willing to go up with the telephone company and continue the service in their homes and shops. Certainly a telephone is not just a convenience but a necessity in a very large per cent of the offices, stores, shops and homes. We note that in the president's (president of the telephone company) letter, making his annual report to the stockholders, says throughout the country there is strong demand for more telephone service . . . . . and the volume of long distance messages rose to a new high level. Regulatory bodies are giving the nod to increased rates in many states. From the letter one concludes, though the president does not say so, that the telephone people are keeping the road hot to the offices of the regulators. In practically all the states they go to the statecapital and present their case for a whole state at a time, get their raise and go on their way. In Texas they still have to go see the city councils. Texans seem to like it that way.

The Hesperian, the writer in fact, in a story last week, had the income increase granted by the city council for the telephone exchange here at 65 per cent, a figure which members of the council immediately jumped on as being erroneous. Where we got the figures at 65 per cent we don't know. Most such statements are made by writers (and talkers, too, for that matter) who assume that some statement or other they've seen in writing or heard is correct. Check, check, check. That's the word in a newspaper office. Once in a while you nod, or unthinkingly assume something and begin from there. You always wish you had not. Members of the council say the increase at the business telephone level is nearly 36 per cent, that is the increase from the rate that has been effective since 1948.

## Summer Month Polio Control

AUSTIN, Texas — Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State health officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during the summer months.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the housefly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate community sewage disposal systems are not available or feasible, it is important to build and properly maintain sanitary septic tanks. In the event a water carriage system of sewage disposal cannot be secured it is important that at least an approved pit toilet be constructed and properly maintained.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth, and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State law con-

cerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

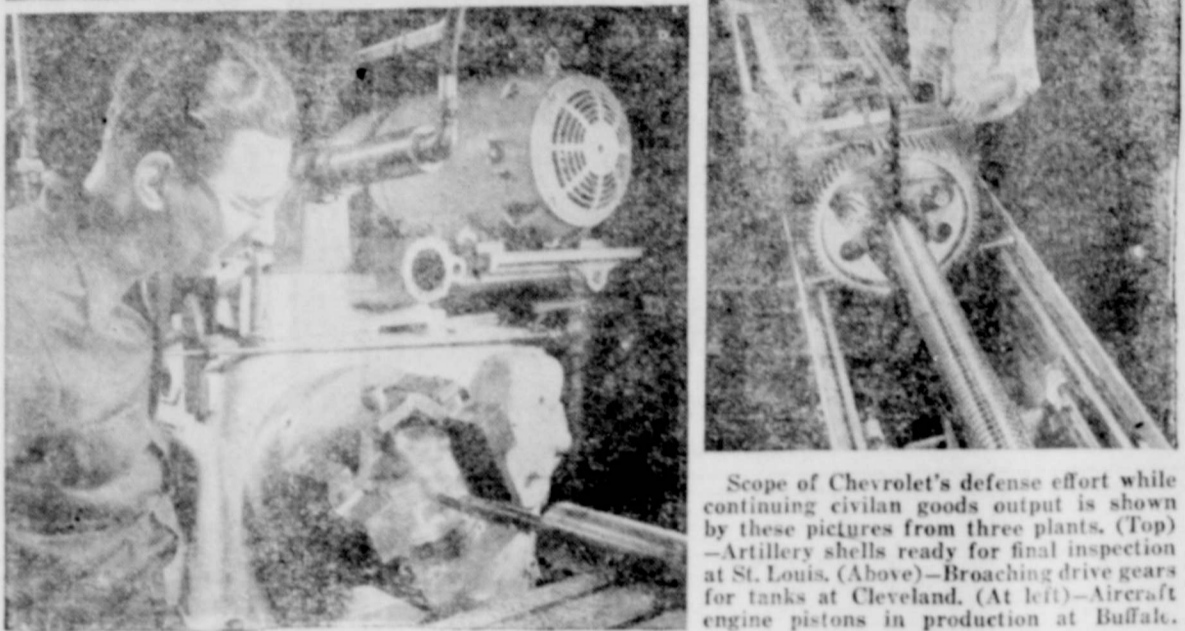
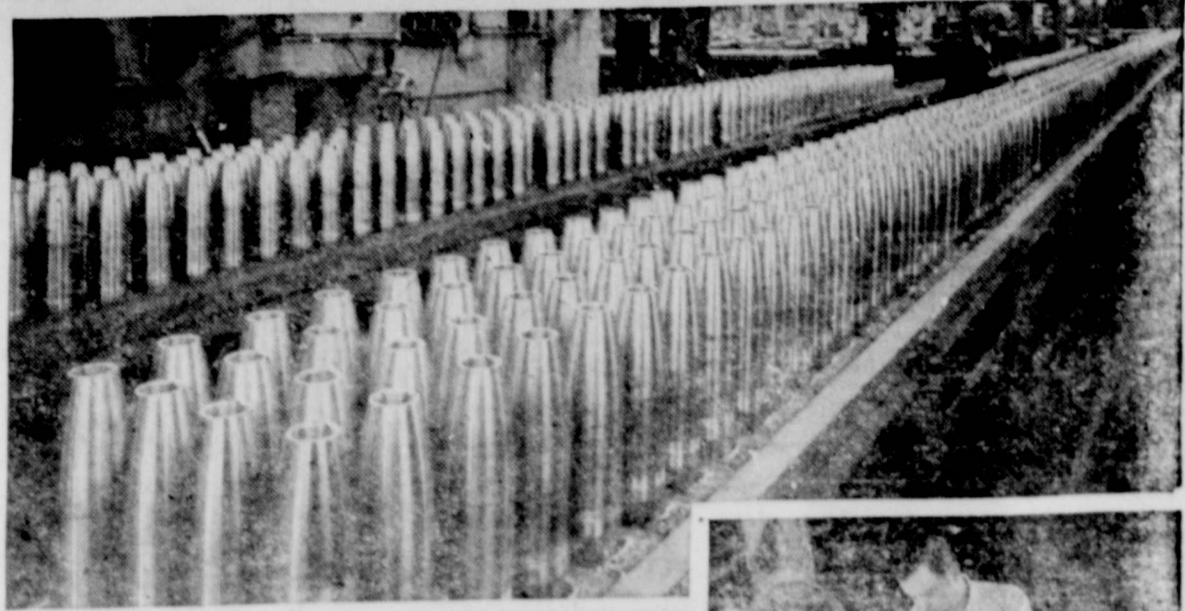
