

AUSTIN, Texas - Dr. Geo. W Cox, State health officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during the summer months.

Strict sanitary meausres must be lieved that this infection as transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measurers must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measurers must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the housefly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. 



