

EXPLANATION OF WEATHER FLAG DISPLAYS.

The display of weather flags indicates the probable weather for the 24 hours from 7 p. m. of the day on which they are displayed to 7 p. m. of the following days. When the weather changes demand it this period is divides into two 12 hours periods ending 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. of the following day.

The white fiag alone indicates fair weather with stationary temperature for the entire period.

The white flag with the black triangular or (temperature) fiag above isdicates fair and warmer weather; with the black flag below, fair and colder weather.

The blue flag alone indicates rain or snow with sta- preference. tionary temperature; with temperature flag above it rain or snow and warmer; with temperature flag below it rain or snow and colder.

The flag half white and half blue alone, indicates local rain or snow and stationary temperature; with temperatemperature flag below, local rain or snow and colder.

When more than one flag is displayed they are to be hours ending 7 a m, of the following day. Should the Denver Road!" temperature flag be displayed between them it is to be W. F. STERLEY, A. A. When the 3 flags are displayed on evual distance apart the temperature flag at top means warmer for the entire 24 hour period, and at bottom colder for entire 24 hour

"I think it is time, furthermore, to demolish the fiction that there is an unwritten law established by Wash ington that no president of the United States may accept a third term. The facts are, as any student of the times may discover, that it was fear of defeat which impelled Washington to decline a third nomination. Beiog a federalist he was the object of very violent attacks on the part or the democrats of his day, and recognizing the growing strength of his opponents he doubted, as I believe, his ability to again secure an election if he it's enough.

This will be interesting to those who have given Washington credit for honesty. It would detract somewhat from the tame of the "Father of His Country" if he really refused a third nomination because he feared defeat and then urged as a reason for his declination a lofty and patriotic sentiment. But now that the Declaration of Independence has been cast aside as rubbish and the constitution separated from the flag, Washington might as well go with the rest.—The Commoner.
