### BOB Club Renews Challenge To Civic Leaders of Floydada

Floydada's Books on Bikes Club, youngsters who make it their business to see that shut-ins have access to the books of the Floyd County Free Library, are in the news again this week.

This time they have come up with a challenge to the city, to individuals, business firms and civic clubs with a plan to put trash disposal containers at places all over the city for the use of the public.

They hope by this means to get the litter of cartons, loose papers and trash off the streets. Busy and careless shoppers every week dump literally hundreds of pounds of cartons, boxes, paper bags and wrappers on the streets to add to the sanitation problems of the community and make litter strewn areas for wayward winds to whip into unsightly pockets on adjacent premises as well as in alleys and on street corners.

But this will be a thing of the past if the club can get the city, business firms and other civic minded persons to go along with their plan, which they demonstrated last week-end.

The club took \$43.34 of their Parents Magazine Achievement Award of 1956 and bought a large trash disposal container, which they publicly presented to Mayor Lewis Norman. They envision scores of others getting in on the plan so that wherever large shopping crowds gather

or attend sports and other events they will be near a rubbish disposal container. With a bit of education and promotion the greater part of the litter that is now thrown on the ground will go into these containers and be carted away.

The boys and girls of the Books on Bikes Club made their first bid for a cleaner city campaign on Sept. 17 at a PTA meeting, the first of Andrews Ward School for the year. The club was then and there presented the Parents Magazine check for \$40 for their "outstanding service to the community by young people."

The achievement award was presented by Rev. Tilden B. Armstrong at that time. The Books On Bikes Club was named one of several winning organizations in the nation's communities to get the Parents Magazine Young Group Achievement Award.

Mrs. Kleder Parris and Mrs. Lee C. Goughly, who have collaborated in guiding the youngsters, this week

said the city council has promised to map out strategic spots at which the trash disposal containers should be located, and will get them served, possibly three to a block, in the down-town area. The idea was presented formally to the council at its Monday night meeting by Councilman Farnell Powell.

Incidentally the Books on Bikes Club has flourished since its first organization. For a year and four months the youngsters of the club have not missed a Saturday morning taking books on bikes to shut-ins and to others who could not make use of the library facilities otherwise.

The members of the club have taken the rest of their award money and put it into two big world globes, one of which they presented to the library rooms at Floydada and the other to the library rooms at Lockney.

Parks and school grounds as well as the down-town business area have serious need for disposal containers for the litter which is now being thrown on the ground to make unsightly streets and premises.

#### C of C Drive For Members Inaugurated

The Fall Membership Campaign of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce opened on Tuesday when one hundred and sixty five letters were mailed from the Chamber office to prospective members urging residents and business firms in the immediate area to join the Chamber of Commerce and support Chamber projects.

The letter signed by President E. C. Carter and the Board of Directors listed special projects which the Chamber of Commerce sponsors each year and the amount of money spent on each project. In addition to the four listed projects, sixteen other services and activities of the Chamber of Commerce in agriculture and livestock, retail trades development, industry and new business, recreation and health, and civic improvements were given as deserving the support of Floydada and Floyd County citizens.

"You can't sell apples on a desert island," the letter says, pointing out that each Floyd County family must depend upon their neighbors to buy their products and services and, therefore, each shares the responsibility for the county's growth. Chamber of Commerce memberships are \$1.00 and up per month for individuals and \$2.50 and up per month for business firms. There are one hundred and ninety-one members now on the Chamber of Commerce membership rolls. Members of the Board of Directors hope to add many more names before the membership campaign closes next week.

#### Kick-Off at 2:30 To Renew Rivalry of Long Standing

Floydada High School's homecoming football game tomorrow is scheduled to get underway at 2:30 p. m. It will be the first afternoon contest for Westernfield this season and also for the participating teams, Floydada and Spur.

The game will be preceded by the crowning of the homecoming queen and there will also be a big halftime show featuring the Spur and Floydada bands.

Ex-students will be recognized during the festivities and those who have returned to Floydada especially for the big day will be seated in marked sections of the stands so they may visit and see old friends while here.

School is being dismissed at 12:00 noon in order for the student body to enjoy the afternoon program.

Though Floydada has been eliminated in the district title chase Friday's game here is an important one. The old adage that there is seldom a district champ until Floydada and Spur plays is definitely true again this year. Three teams of district 2AA will be affected by the outcome of the game here even more than the Whirlwinds.

At present a three way tie exists between Spur, Lockney, and Abernathy for the number one spot. Lockney holds a win over Abernathy and has lost to Spur; Abernathy holds a win over Spur and has lost to Lockney. Spur holds a win over Lockney and has lost to Abernathy.

The way it stacks up at present Spur will be going all out to down the Winds and stay in the tie. Lockney will be rooting for a Floydada victory that will eliminate the only team which has defeated them and leave the Longhorns in the lead or in a tie with Abernathy.

ABERNATHY would prefer a Spur victory which would keep the Bulldogs in the tie situation since Abernathy could not afford to wind up in a two-way tie with Lockney. Floydada, of course, will be out to win for their homecoming crowd, also a victory over Spur would be about their only claim to fame for the season.

The district-wide interest in the game here coupled with the homecoming and the fact it is an afternoon game, and all others are due to be played at night, is expected to draw an overflow crowd.

District fans will have ample time to see the Spur-Floydada game here and then go on to see their home teams at Tahoka and Abernathy where the other two contests are being played. If the weatherman is kind it should be the largest crowd of the year for Floydada.

IN LOOKING over the records of Spur and Floydada this season most everything points to the Bulldogs as favorites. They hold victories over Crosbyton 7-0, Tahoka 48-7, Slaton 52-6, Post 14-13, and Lockney 26-0. The Dickens County boys were tied 13-13 by Matador and have lost 18-12 to Hamlin; 19-6 to Anson; and 23-0 to Abernathy.

Floydada on the other hand has only three wins to its credit; a 24-7 victory over Rails; a 12-6

#### Flurry of Oil Leasing Noted In Two Areas

Seaboard Oil Company has recently had recorded oil and gas leases on approximately 8,600 acres in north and east Floyd County, and Phillips Petroleum Company also has picked up a few leases in the general vicinity of Center.

Records last week disclosed that Seaboard had checker-boarded their holdings from about Hillcrest, where they obtained a 960-acre 10-year lease on the land of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Garrett, (Sec. 32 in D-1 and West half of 19 in D-1) to the north line of the county, where they took a lease from the Howards on Section 13 in Block B-5.

Other Howard leases recorded included Sections 63, 91, 93, 79, 85 and 86 in Block G & M, and the north 3/8-section of Section 81. Also recorded were 230 acres of the north half of Section 20 in D1 from the E. P. Smithersman, the northwest quarter of Section 30 in D1 from H. E. Bradshaw and the east half of Section 42 in D1 from the John W. Wilsons and the Menard Fields.

Down payment is not shown in any of the leases recorded but \$1 a year renewal for 10 years is indicated.

Phillips activities have included leases on scattered small tracts including 128 acres in the southeast one-fourth of Survey 16, Block T, and 32 acres out of the northeast corner of Section 14 in Block T, from Mrs. Mabie Smith and husband, Carl Smith, also the southwest fourth of Section 10 in Block T and the northwest fourth of Section 80 in Block D3 from Glad Snodgrass, and the north half of Section 23 in Block 1, AB & M Survey from Floyd Montgomery.

#### Aid Amendment Carries 6 to 1 In Light Vote

The amendment to the state constitution to make assistance to disabled by the state a part of the organic law got a big majority in a light vote Tuesday in Floyd County.

Not a box in the county had as many as 75 votes and two or three boxes reported as few as six.

The amendment, which gives the legislature the power to provide for assistance not to exceed \$20 per month out of state funds for needy individuals who are disabled by reason of mental or physical handicap, also carried throughout the state, according to Wednesday reports.

#### NO MAIL DELIVERY NOV. 22

With the prospects of two Thanksgivings this year it appears mail delivery will be made on Nov. 29 when the schools and practically all other places in the town will be observing a holiday.

On Nov. 22 the post office will observe their Thanksgiving and there will be no deliveries.

In order to avoid Friday delivery of the paper next week The Hesperian is planning to push up their deadline at least 24 hours and make Wednesday delivery of the paper.

Merchants, advertisers and correspondents are asked to please keep this schedule in mind and rush their copy for our next issue.

At the post office the streamlined pens, tied to the lobby desks with chains, are still being taken regularly. Postmaster Edward Wester said this week.

Wester quit putting out the new bowl point pens for a time when the vandals first swiped them, then jerked off the chains from the desks.

However, Wester says he has instructions now to keep feeding the pens to 'em and he issued a warning this week to innocent persons not to allow themselves to fall victim to circumstances with one in possession. More than a dozen are afloat in Floydada, he said. Commenting on this petty theft he said:

"The Post Office Department has furnished ball point pens for public use and the Floydada Office has experienced inconveniences to themselves and their patrons by unthinking persons lifting them.

"These persons are getting themselves into trouble with Uncle Sam. The thefts, even though the pens are of small value, are crimes against the government.

"Best leave them chained down.

Penalty for theft is \$500.00 fine and/or one year in prison.

"The Post Office Department's name is stamped on them, making it all the more hazardous to break the chains and take them. They can't be used in public with Property of U. S. Post Office printed on them so they are of little value after one goes to the trouble of breaking the chain."

A NEW kind of vandal made a bid for recognition Saturday night when he hurled a railroad spike through a plate glass window at Southwestern Public Service office next door to the post office.

A bashed in window and a spike in the floor were mute evidence of the vandal's work found by Fred Thaxton Sunday morning at Public Service.

A vandal with railroad spikes also left his "card" in Jim Elliott's car at 611 South Main St. Elliott's car windows were bashed in and two of the spikes were found on the floor of the car the next morning.

A spike was thrown through a window at the Bob Muncy elevator office on Highway 70 northwest of Floydada.

In Crosby County the idea of a public free library refuses to go down, although strong opposition to the plan has been voiced.

Monday afternoon several civic leaders from Crosbyton and Ralls again viewed the Floyd County Free Library and brought along with them members of the Crosby County Commissioners Court, who had an informal visit with the Floyd County Commissioners and spent an hour at the library here, checking on organization procedure and plans used to keep the library functioning.

In the party were Commissioners Ragsdale Davis and Leelan Caddell, Roy W. Karr and County Judge Cecil Berry.

These were entertained by members of the Floyd County Library Board and Friends of the Library in the library rooms, along with Mrs. Thomas G. Lyle, Mrs. Joe B. Shaud, Mrs. John Thomas, Mrs. O. C. Thomas and Mrs. W. W. Watkins of Ralls. Mayor C. H. Lodal and Publisher Hubert Curry of Crosbyton.

They were shown the Floydada facilities of the Floyd County Free Library by Mrs. W. R. Daniels, Mrs. H. F. Jackson, Mrs. James H. Barnard, and Mrs. Billy Staniforth, and told of similar facilities at Lockney.

Mrs. O. C. Thomas of the Crosby County group said that strong backing for the library to serve their people continues to develop. Members of the Commissioners Court there, including Commissioner Bill Henry who is ill in a hospital, look with favor on the organization of the library, and the promoters have

hopes that the county library will materialize in the not too distant future.

Funds that must be provided presents the principal problem, it was indicated.

In Floyd County the library is maintained by gifts of money and books in addition to the levy of a five-cent ad valorem tax.

In spite of being hampered by lack of funds the library here has functioned successfully. Library rooms at Floydada and Lockney are being patronized by hundreds of persons. The Library Board and Friends of the Library are studying ways and means of making the library facilities available to wider areas of the county.

Monday's group from Crosby County was the second within the year to make a pilgrimage to the Floyd County Library in a study of the organization and its possibilities for their people.

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## Casa deAmigos Closing Season; Plan for 1957

Rev. William Scholes of Chicago, Regional Director of the Migrant Ministry Division of the National Council of Churches' Home Missions Department, was in Floydada on Saturday looking in on the local migrant ministry project, Casa de Amigos.

Before the migrant season closes, Rev. Scholes is touring the area and asking for suggestions and making plans for next year. This is no little undertaking. He says, as he is responsible for the long range planning in an area from Indiana to North Dakota and from the Mexican Border to Canada. Rev. Scholes is a Presbyterian minister. His home is in Chicago.

Complimenting local churches for their cooperation in sponsoring a program for migrant laborers, Rev. Scholes indicated that he and the migrant ministry were well pleased with the success of the Floydada project.

Since the Floydada Migrant Center opened on Sept. 29, Ben Zermano, Southwestern University Senior, has supervised the activities at the center. Zermano directs the work of local center volunteers, has charge of toys and games for the children, conducts short religious services on Sunday, shows educational and religious films, and encourages Spanish American families to use the facilities offered at the migrant center.

During the week he also has a series of similar programs at various migrant camps in Floyd and Hale Counties in which workers are urged to contact their local church and minister when they return home.

Four to six local residents staff the center each week with Zermano. Workers estimate that around two thousand people have attended the center during the seven week-end it has been open. Rev. Tom Condon is chairman of the Floydada Migrant Ministry Committee.

When the center closes its 1956 season on Saturday, Ben Zermano leaves for Waco, Tex., where he has been appointed the pastor of a Waco church.

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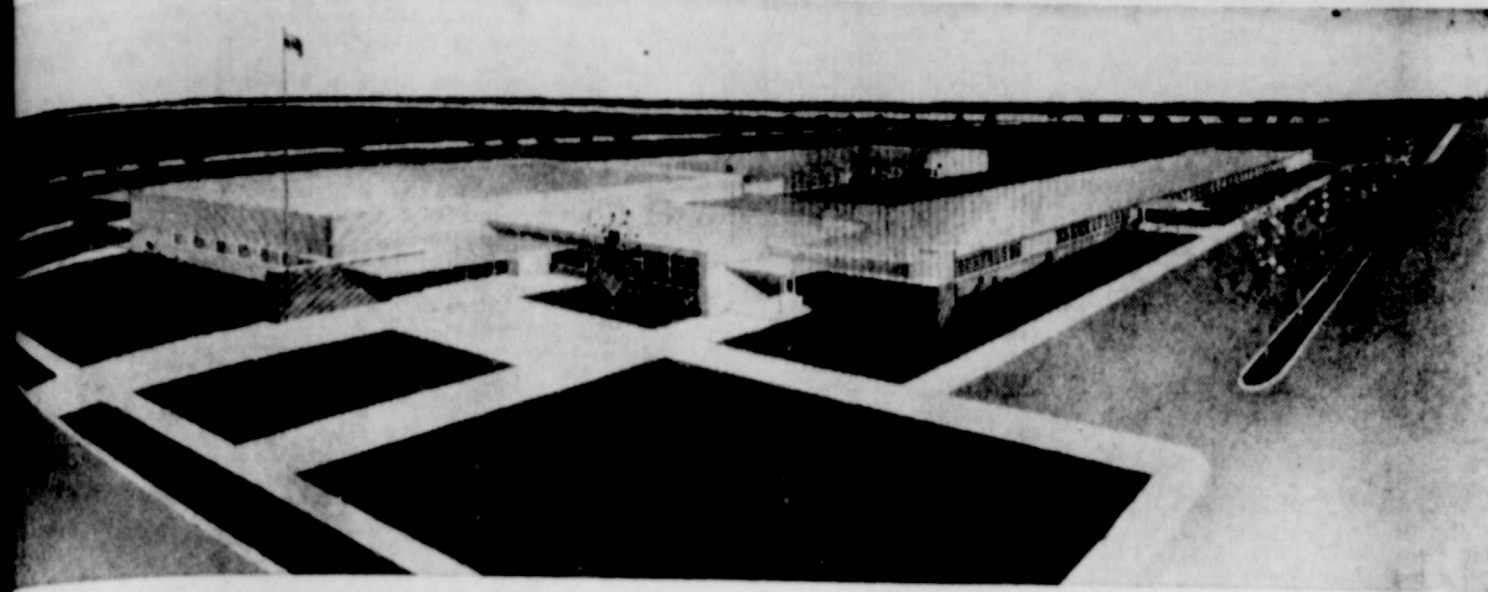

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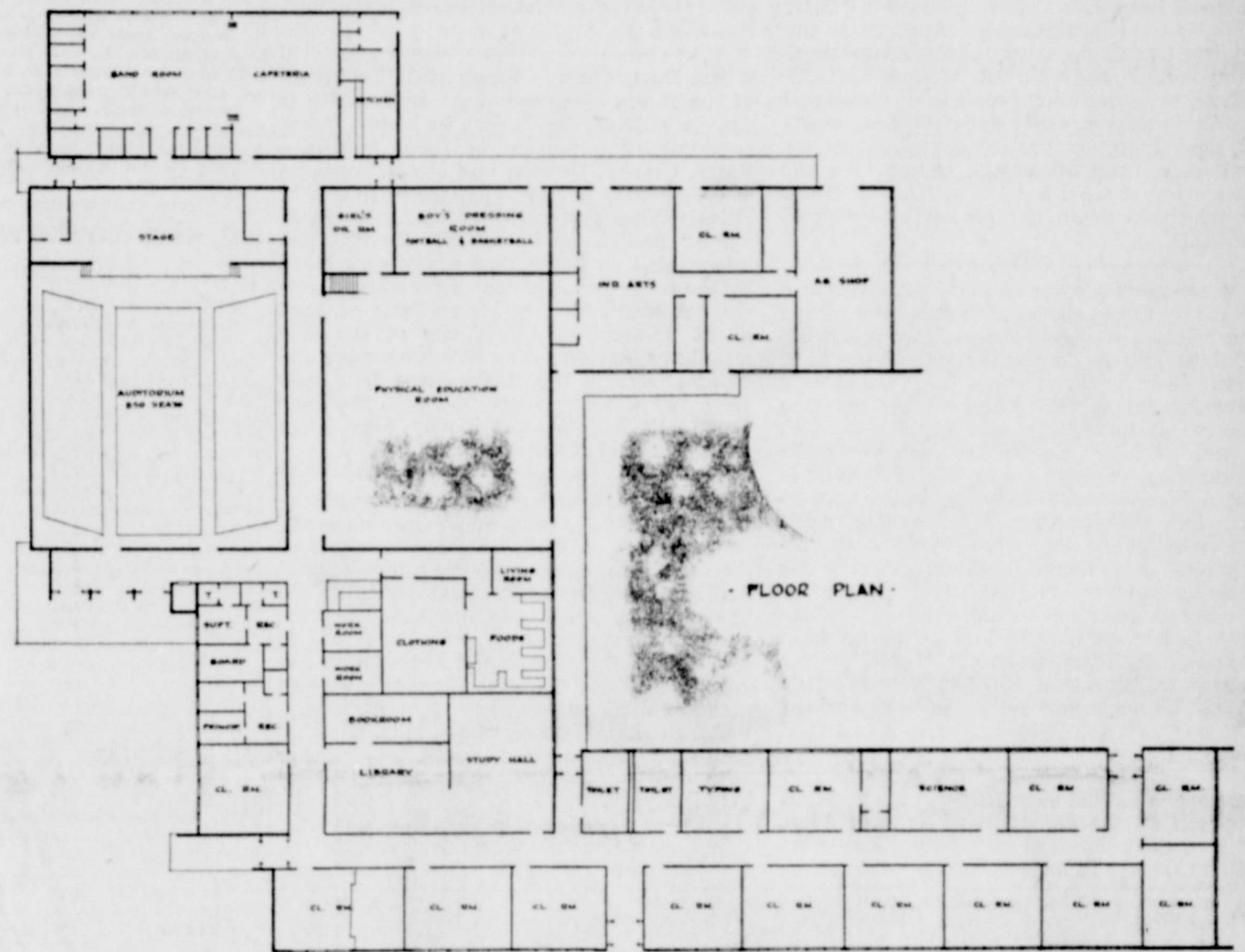


Architect's Drawing of New School Building Now Nearly Completed.

### IEWS AND COMMENT

**Home Coming Tomorrow.** Ex-students of Floydada High School, members of the school's present-day student body and the faculty of the school, are looking forward to tomorrow's gathering of former students. It will be the second effort to have a re-gathering of the faithful. Apparently it is to be a huge success, with a relatively large number of former students due to "come home" to the scenes of the youth. These hope to renew old friendships and get a new look at the scenes dear to the days of their youth. The community at large is hopeful that the exes will "have a good time". It is especially desirable that we make a good impression on these visitors.

**Public school exes** here Friday will not get to see the completed new high school building which the school board had hoped to have in use by this time. Local exes will try to show them the new but incomplete plant, where they had hoped to have the reunion this year. Patrons of the school, and some who are not, are impatiently wondering why the workmen do not complete their jobs and move on to something else. The answers to their questions we do not know. Apparently the school officials do not, either. One of those things that go with all (?) present-day efforts to get building people to go ahead and get the job done. They get something started, then disappear for days on end, come back and do a little, disappear again. We are wondering if we'll have a new school house in which to begin the second semester of school.

The community's good name is at stake in a mild way in the endeavor to make the return trip pleasant for the exes to Floydada. Some of these left the "day after school" and have never been back. Others have made only rare returns home. Thinking in this vein the recent survey conducted by the C. of C. Retail Trades Committee revealed the astounding view of many that Floydada is not a friendly community, especially to newcomers. Perhaps they do not exactly mean "friendly", they may more nearly mean "attentive." A stranger in the midst calls for attentiveness to his first requirements, including good shelter, a wholesome atmosphere of helpfulness, a quick look at his needs in shopping facilities, social life, recreation and school facilities for his family. Floydada should be made into a place not alone to eat live and earn daily bread but also into a good way of living.

Do you speak well of your town? Do you find yourself on the defensive when the subject of Floydada is brought up? Why allow yourself to do so? It is just exactly as far from

Chicago to Floydada as it is from Floydada to Chicago. Your community has many, many things to offer the homeseeker that he cannot even hope to obtain in many other communities of far greater wealth and position. Your attitude, remember, will be reflected in the new resident's mind. Don't apologize for your town for your own sake. Help get the things out of the way you want to apologize for. It can be done. The state of mind has a lot to do with the way you receive new people in the community.

**Women! Hear This.** You do a lot of things to please other women but you cook to please your husbands. True, you make salads too often, but in the main you try to please the taste of the head of the household. Well, a man's idea of good eating is a hearty beef dinner, especially with these nipper days. Beef is about the cheapest food you can buy and your husband's vote goes for a stick-to-the-ribs main dish like a rolled rib roast of beef. Why not serve it one meal soon with oven-browned or baked potatoes, or broiled tomatoes topped with fresh, crisp onion slices and stuffed olives? Extravagant! Not at all.

**Worst Dust Storm.** Every violent evidence of the forces of nature that comes along is usually dubbed the "worst in history," but residents of a portion of four counties—Floyd, Crosby, Dickens and Motley, an area about a county in size—gaze the prize to that Friday thing two weeks ago when a northwester really did its stuff. Traffic was interrupted so badly that many cars stood by the roadside for hours. And where fields did not have cover the top soil was whipped about unmercifully. Residents of the area may have just forgotten how unmerciful the storms were in the thirties and they may have not gone through that Thanksgiving Day in 1926. Be that as it may, they call it the worst dust storm ever.

Plains farmers who got into a jackpot over the price paid for labor of Mexican nationals last year are in better position this season. An official declaration of the prices prevailing has been the means to this end. The Texas Employment Commission issues the announcement and the farmer goes by it in his hiring. Last week-end the commission wired all offices the price for both first and second pulling was \$1.50 per hundredweight, based on irrigation acreage only. Several plains farmers, none we know of here, are still wound up in lawsuits over the prices paid last year.

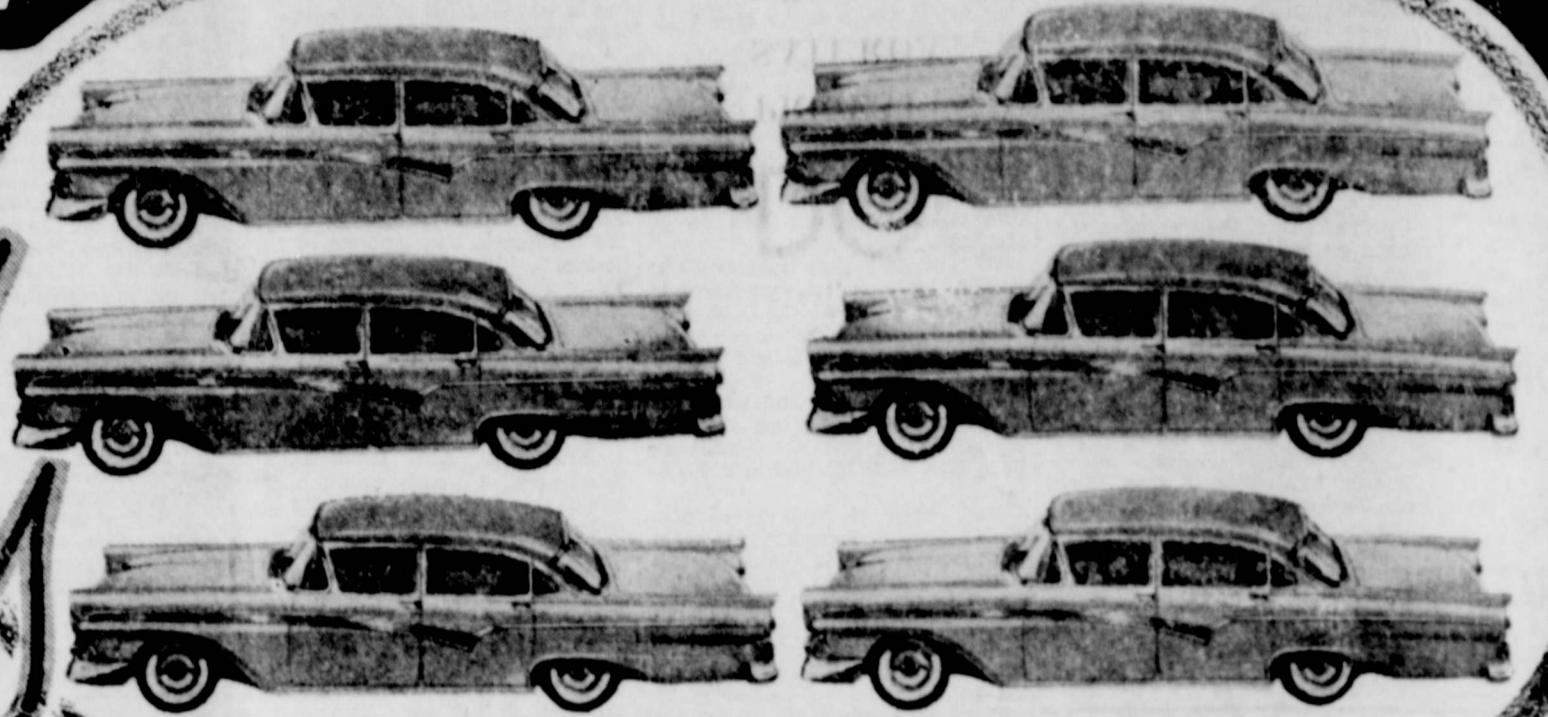

# Speedy Longhorns Down 'Winds 33 to 21 In Bruising Battle

Lockney's Longhorns combined a speedy offense with a rugged defense as they downed the Floydada Whirlwinds 33 - 21 to gain the county football championship. It was the first win for the 'Horns over the local team since 1951.

The Friday night battle was a fine one for both clubs. Both went all out for the victory. Only an occasional flare of temper was noted in the hard fought game, and players from the two teams exchanged best wishes at the conclusion of the exciting contest.

For the Longhorns it was a combination of lightning speed and fine blocking that sprung their backs loose for long yardage, probably the most yardage the locals have yielded this year to a running attack.

Floydada on the other hand found their running game pretty well bottled up and struck through the air for a big part of their gains.

**LEADING** the Lockney attack was halfback Jerry Williams who struck for 152 yards in 18 carries for the 'Horns. Stovall led the Floydada ground game with 43 yards in 19 carries, and Ronnie Downing's passing arm hit 'Wind receivers for 158 yards on 10 of 25 passes thrown.

The Whirlwinds made 12 first downs and four penetrations while accounting for 236 yards rushing and passing from scrimmage. Lockney made a total of 338 yards from scrimmage almost all from running and gained 14 first downs and 7 penetrations.

Opening the game Floydada received and John Hanst kicked off for the Longhorns sending one into the end zone. Putting the ball in play on their own 20 the 'Winds fumbled and Lockney recovered on the 23.

After gaining 5 yards to the Floydada 17 Bill Race finished the job for the Lockney Longhorns and went the distance to score. Gene Handley passed to Race for the extra point and Lockney went ahead 7 - 0 with the game less than 21 minutes old.

**THE LONGHORNS** then tried an onside kick which they recovered on the Floydada 44. This bit of strategy did not pay off however as Floydada held and forced Lockney to punt from the 44 to Don Colley on the 'Winds 15.

Floydada was held again and Bill Patterson's punt was partially blocked, going from his 18 to Nelson Wofford on the Floydada 34.

Lockney was again held for downs and fumbled on the fourth with the ball going over to Floydada on the 'Winds 29.

The Whirlwinds failed to move the ball and Patterson punted from his 29 to Gene Handley on the Longhorn 24. The Lockney team started an offensive that carried to the Floydada 42 where they fumbled and Rusty Tinnin recovered for Floydada at that point.

**FLOYDADA** then started a drive that died on the Longhorn 26 when Handley intercepted to give Lockney possession just before the first period ended.

The Longhorns were held and Handley punted from the 'Horns 26 to Ronnie Downing on the Floydada 40. Downing ran the ball back to the Lockney 21 where he was forced out of bounds. Floydada failed to cash in on the fine return however as they were held at the 18 and the ball went over to Lockney at that point.

Lockney advanced the ball to their 46 before Jerry Williams broke through his right side and raced 54 yards for a score. Williams then tried to circle right end for the extra point and failed. Score Lockney 13 - Floydada 0.

After receiving the Whirlwinds mastered one of their best offensive drives of the night as they drove down field fast on a mixture of passes and running plays to gain the Longhorn 1 from which point Downing scored on a keeper. Stovall drove for the point after and the score was 13 - 7. Long gainers in the scoring drive were passes from Downing to Stovall for 30, to Bill Patterson for 20 and to Colley for 6.

The half ended shortly after the kick-off with Lockney in possession.

**OPENING** the third period Lockney drove down field to the Floydada 15 where they fumbled and Danny Shipley recovered for the 'Winds.

Floydada couldn't move the ball however and Patterson kicked from his 20 to Nelson Wofford on his 43 who returned it to the Floydada 48. The Longhorns soon struck again with Arlie Pinner going the final 33 yards on a quick dash for the goal line. Pinner then ran the point to bring the score to 20 - 7.

Following the kickoff Floydada was held and forced to punt. Patterson booted from his 26 to the Lockney 20. The Longhorns then drove upfield to their 42 where they fumbled and Ranny Vickers recovered for Floydada.

The Floydada running game aided by passes from Downing to Grant and to Stovall covered the distance with the score coming on a 21-yard heave with Stovall on the receiving end. Stovall ran the point and the score was 20 - 14. The remainder of the third period was spent in defensive play with the teams exchanging punts. At the quarter ended Floydada had kicked short from their 22 to their 28 to give Lockney possession at that point.

Opening the final stanza the Longhorns made a first down on the Whirlwind 16 and two plays later Bill Race scored from the 15 and then ran the point. Score Lockney 27 - Floydada 14.

**FOLLOWING** the kickoff Floydada put on a drive that carried to the Lockney 23 where it died when Downing hit a dry streak with his passing. Lockney punted out and Floydada's next drive was cut short when Williams intercepted. The Longhorns made a first down on the Whirlwind 6 before Handley scored from the 1 on a sneak. 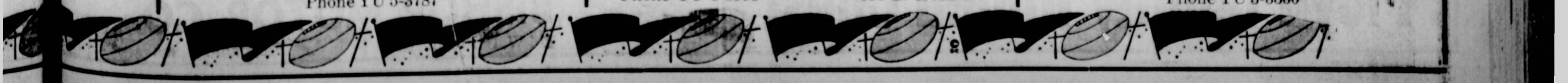

### Soil Conditions Improved By Burs

New research by the cotton industry indicates farmers should think twice before allowing that by-product of the harvest — cotton burs — go to waste.

Some areas of Texas cannot return burs to the soil without special treatment to kill pink bollworms. But once protective procedures are observed, the burs can be a real boon in stretching benefits of rain and maintaining fertilization.

Preliminary studies show that on bur-treated soil, wind erosion is lessened because of the better condition of the soil. It is also known that burs mellow the soil and make it spongy and easier to work. Water penetration from rainfall is greater and evaporation is minimized.

Crop yields and their relationship to burs is being studied. On one test farm, five tons of composted burs increased the yield of cotton lint by 65 pounds per acre; 10 tons of composted burs increased the yield of lint per acre by 275 pounds.

Cost of bur usage varies but the general figure is about \$2.50 per ton. The burs themselves usually are free, with the farmer paying only for the spreading. When this spreading is done by the individual, the cost figure is less.

Effects of burs on the land remain for an extended period. Definite increased yields from one application of burs has been noted for a three or four-year period.

Increased yields made by farmers using burs in an area usually spurs others to action. The increased water holding capacity is most attractive to irrigation farmers who are confronted with annual underground water level declines.

## Highlights And Sidelights From the State Capitol

(By Vern Sanford, Texas Press Association)

AUSTIN, Tex. — General election results, nationally, have added new suspense to the already tense issue of who will succeed Texas' Gov.-Elect Price Daniel as U. S. Senator. At stake is whether Democrats or Republicans will control the U. S. Senate, when Congress convenes on Jan. 3.

Democrats now have a precarious 49 to 47-member advantage. But it would be 48 to 48 if a Republican replaced Democratic Senator Daniel. GOP Vice Pres. Richard Nixon can vote in case of a tie. Therefore this one vote, which Texas could bestow upon him, in a round-about way — could determine the balance of power. Most important of all, it could decide which party could organize the Senate and appoint the all-important committee chairman.

This possibility puts Gov. Allan Shivers in the national spotlight again. And Senator Daniel.

Texas' conflicting election laws have clouded the issue as to whether Governor Shivers legally can call a special election before Jan. 15. That's when Daniel takes office as governor. Thus because Daniel's letter of resignation from the Senate specifies Jan. 15 as the effective date of his resignation.

Shivers contend that inasmuch as Daniel did not resign, effective immediately, there is no vacancy until Jan. 15. Daniel argues that Shivers has the power to call an election. Both point to different provisions of the poorly drawn election code.

Unless Congress is in session, a governor cannot make an appointment to fill a vacancy. Therefore, should Senator Daniel resign effective today, Shivers could not name a successor until Jan. 3... opening day of the new Congress.

Shivers feels that Daniel should resign outright, thus paving the way for an immediate election. The governor is required to call an election within 90 days from the effective date of the resignation, and not before 30 days have elapsed. This means that the governor could call for an election in December — or he could designate a January or February date.

Whatever course Daniel pursues, Shivers undoubtedly will have a chance to appoint a temporary replacement. First, because Shivers is not likely to call for a December election. Second, if Daniel submits a new resignation before Jan. 3, effective immediately, Shivers automatically can name a successor on Jan. 3. And third, if Daniel sticks to the Jan. 15 date, Shivers will have from 12:01 a. m. on the 15th until Daniel is inaugurated at 12 noon, to name a successor.

**DROUGHT AUTHORITY GIVEN**

Gov. Shivers has been authorized to designate Texas farmers eligible for reduced railroad rates. Secy. of Agri. Ezra Benson asked the governors of seven drought-stricken states to indicate persons qualifying for this aid.

Railroads have offered free return transportation for cattle shipped from dry areas to western grazing areas. Designated persons also can receive a 50 per cent reduction in rates on hay shipped from western states to drought regions.

**FARM INCOME UP** — Improved methods have kept Texas' overall farm income up, despite drought setbacks.

Cash income for January through September totaled \$1,108,000,000, an increase of \$13,000,000 from last year, reports the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Average for the dry years of 1951-53 was six per cent above 1947-49.

Irrigation, conservation and improved crop varieties are credited for the increase. Some areas, the bureau noted, have not had a major crop in five years. Offsetting these are such areas as the Panhandle-South Plains region where "spectacular results" have been achieved with irrigation.

**SHIVERS BUYS HOME** — When Governor Shivers becomes MR. Shivers next January, his family will move from one historic Austin mansion to another.

He has purchased Woodlawn, 103-year-old residence bought by Gov. Ellisha M. Pease when Pease retired from office. Seller was R. Niles Graham, grandson of Governor Pease.

Known locally as "The Pease Mansion," the 17-room antebellum home still contains century-old furnishings. Its new owners plan only such remodeling necessary to accommodate their family.

**CONSTRUCTION SPIRALING** — An all-time record for 1956 with a healthy boom carrying over into '57 is foreseen for the Texas construction industry.

Awards through October totaled \$1,049,179,948. This was only slightly less than the total for the whole 12 months of 1953, the highest previous year.

October awards of more than \$84,000,000 did not include a Texas Highway Department contract letting. This means the November figure, with two months of road contracts, likely will be large.

**BOND ELECTION UPHOLD** — State Supreme Court has upheld and clarified a new law for unlimited issuance of bonds by school districts.

Validity of some \$75,000,000 in school bonds was affected by a test case from Hamilton County.

Voting in bond elections is limited by the Constitution to property-tax payers. An act for school bond elections passed by the last legislature further restricted voting to those who had rendered property on the county tax roll.

High court ruling removed this restriction, but upheld constitutionality of the rest of the law.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Nov. 29 has been proclaimed as Texas' Thanksgiving Day by Governor Shivers.

This is in accordance with legislative action setting the last Thursday in November as the state's official holiday. Federally, Nov. 22 will be observed.

Construction of a \$30,000,000 federal dam and reservoir at San Angelo has been approved conditionally by the State Water Board. Law requires recommendation by the governor also before the project can be undertaken by the Department of Interior.

U. S. Dept. of Agriculture has upped its estimate of Texas 1956 cotton crop to \$3,600,000 bales, a 140,000-bale increase over last month's prediction. But the new total is still under last year's crop of 4,039,000 bales.

Dollar value of Texas farm and ranch land increased one per cent during the past year, compared to a three per cent gain for the nation. Average acre value of Texas rural land was estimated by USDA at \$63.13. National average was set at \$68.65.

SEMINOLE, Nov. 12 — Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday in the South Seminole Baptist Church for Mrs. A. W. Haywood, 84, who died here Thursday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Sam Malone Sr.

Burial will be in the Seminole Cemetery. Mrs. Haywood, the former Miss Margaret Ella Powell, was born at Caldwell. Her first husband, Dan Jenkins, was elected as the first sheriff of Floyd County and served in that office until his death in 1896.

She was married to A. W. Haywood in 1908 at Roaring Springs. They moved to Gaines County in 1907 and ranched in West Texas and New Mexico until a few years ago. They observed their 51st wedding anniversary last May.

Survivors include her husband, another daughter, Mrs. Dan Keen of Baton Rouge, La.; five grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

**MRS. HOFFMAN ON GRADUAL ROAD TO RECOVERY, BELIEF**

Mrs. John Hoffman, who has been ill since February is continuing to make gains against a stubborn illness. The general state of her health may now be said to be much improved.

She and Mr. Hoffman were on a brief shopping visit in Floydada from the farm southwest of town Saturday afternoon and she has been out recently to one or two social events.

She may have to go back to Mayo, depending on clinical reports, sometime after the new year, Mr. Hoffman said.

## Lettuce Price Holds Up Well

LOCKNEY — The price for lettuce is holding up well this week with 24-head carton bringing \$4.60, according to word from the M. W. Wiley packing shed here. The yield and quality are also very good and Mr. Wiley said last Tuesday that one farmer here was clearing \$1,000 per acre above cost of harvesting, packing and selling. Other farmers are not doing quite that well but most of the lettuce crops are good.

The cabbage yield is also good but the market is slow with the price running about \$16.00 to \$17.50 per ton.

The Wiley shed shipped 70,000 pounds of green tomatoes Monday of last week which will be the last of the tomato harvest since the frost and cold have finished the tomato vines.

Carrots are bringing about \$30 per ton in the field and quite a few fields will be harvested within the next 10 days, Wiley said.

**Possum Kingdom Enlargement Plan MINERAL WELLS** — The Six-Dam Program proposed by the Brazos River Authority includes a provision for enlarging Possum Kingdom Reservoir. The enlarged reservoir will contain 918,000 acre-feet of water and will cover 25,800 acres. This increased storage capacity can be accomplished by raising the present dam fifteen feet.
