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




Architect's Drawing of New School Building Now Nearly Completed.





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

This possibility puts Gov. Allan Shivers in the national spotlight again. And Senator Daniel.

Texas' conflicting election laws have clouded the issue as to whether a special election before Jan. 15. That's when Daniel takes office as governor. This because Daniel's letter of resignation from the Senate specifies Jan. 15 as the effective date of his resignation.

Shivers contend that inasmuch as Daniel did not resign, effective immediately, there is no vacancy until Jan. 15. Daniel argues that Shivers has the power to call an election, Both point to different provisions of the poorly drawn election code. Unless Congress is in session, a governor cannot make an appointnent to fill a vacancy. Therefore, should Senator Daniel resign effective today. Shivers could not name

a successor until Jan. 3. . . . opening day of the new Congress. Shivers feels that Daniel should resign outright, thus paving the way for an immediate election. 
