"The purpose of this second period is to take care of late fruits available for canning. If you have already received sugar for home canning during the first period and can establish eligibility for additional sugar, application may be made to your War Price & Rationing Board for it", according to George H. Wilson, District Food Rationing Officer.

The rationing official stated that if you did not apply during the first period for the first allotment, you may apply now and attach to your application spare stamp No. 37 for each member of your household for whom you are applying. Failure to apply during the first period will not prohibit your receiving the maximum amount granted for home canning if you can establish eligibility for all of it, he said

SEEDS of ADVICE

The Garden Club



Cultivating and Feeding Chrysanthemums

(Note-This timely advice on the proper care for chrysanthemums during the summer months was prepared by Mrs. J. P. Slaton, member of the Garden Club.)

Now is the time to look after those chrysanthemums if the best blooms are expected in the fall. Well cared for plants will go through the season without suffering any real check in growing. They are of course better able to resist disease and insects than are uncared for, stunted or weak plants.

Good cultivation should be given during the summer growing season. Persistent cultivation-which means keeping the surface soil loose at all timesis first in importance. Next in importance is watering. Knowing when and how to water is somewhat of a horticultural accomplishment and the whole secret in watering chrysanthemums is watering only when needed and ther to water abundantly. Since they are spaced some distance apart chrysanthemum plants need to be watered individually.



"Lasting power is won, not through the compulsion of matterial force which only builds up hate and counterforce, but through the winning of men's minds and hearts," says the Hon. Francis B. Sayre, of Washington, D. C. "A Christian peace demands elimination of the old conception of balance of power a conception premised upon each nation's self-sufficiency and utter unconcern for the humanity. The Christian conception of human brotherhood will take its place. This means international organization to make peace secure. . . . Peace will be built upon the suppression of discriminatory and antisocial practices in the field of international trade and finance."

Ministers and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church, interested in the carrying forth of a missionary and evangelistic service to deaf people, have organized a society in New York City for that purpose. According to the Rev. Guilbert C. Braddock, editor of "The Silent Missionary," and one of the leaders of the society, it aims to "preach the gospel to the deaf; to train men to minister to the deaf; to organize and advance the work in new missionary districts; to disseminate information about the missions to the deaf; and to advance the deaf in all matters educational and social, to their benefit as a




