## Hot Weather Versus Overweight

Those extra pounds may add up to added discomfort during the hot weather months ahead. Some careful planning now plus lots of will power could lighten the load a bit.

There is no safe way to get rid of excess weight overnight. There are some important factors to consider in starting a weight reducing campaign, though.

First, check with your doctor before starting any plan to lose weight. Many factors play a part in whether a person should reduce and how fast he should lose weight.

Studies have shown that the most effective weight reduction diets are low calorie, high protein and low carbohydrate. However, a variety and a balance of essential foods is still needed by the body.

Nutritionists point out that it's easier for a person to stay on a reducing diet which includes a variety of foods as well as foods which are familiar to the individual. This is safer than following a fad diet for a week or two and more effective than staying on a fad diet for a short time then going back to your old eating habits.

A good breakfast is always important, even in a reducing diet. Each day's food intake should include two to three cups of milk.

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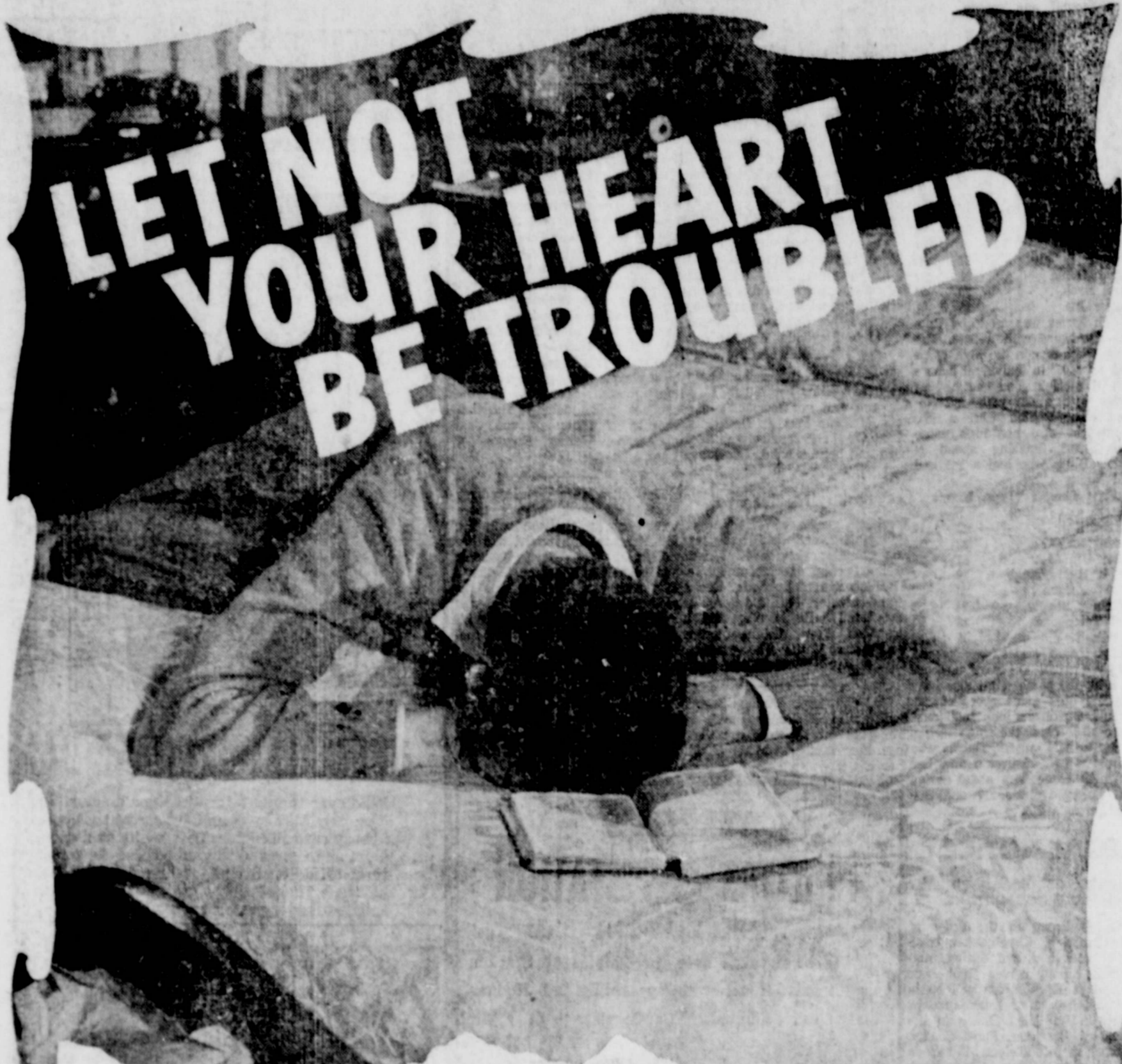

Texas Highway Department makes a strong appeal for safe driving. Its publication was declared legal on grounds that it is not aimed at attracting tourists to Texas. The Attorney General will allow advertising of Texas with state funds.

Expense of the brochure, said Wilson's opinion, "will be refunded to the highway program many times due to the great increase in automobile travel and the resultant increase in gasoline taxes."

**SECOND GAS TAX UPHELD** — State Supreme Court has ruled that the state has a right to collect a tax on gas when it is taken from the ground a second time.

Francita Gas Company had been taking gas from the ground in Jackson County, running it through a cycling plant and then re-injecting it into the ground.

It paid a tax for the first extraction, but protested state demand that it pay again when it took the gas out again. Supreme Court held the company had to pay the "7 per cent of fair market price" production tax for the second extraction.
