



Americans, traditionally overfed at Christmas, went back to shorter rations Tuesday morning when most meats which have been point free for several months were returned to the ration list and point values were again placed on nearly all canned vegetables and canned pre-

The acton, OPA explained. was taken to conserve food stocks which were believed to be dangerously low. Anticipated increase in military needs and the probability of large food shipments to starving civilian populations in Europe are also believed to be causes of the new rationing order.

In adding to the list of rationed food, OPA also took occasion to cancel many outstanding stamps for both canned goods and meats and raised the ration value on some already rationed foods, such as butter which now requires 24

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

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

A Normal Boyhood Was Jesus', Under Parents' Influence

The International Sunday School Lesson for Jan. 7 Text: Matthew: Chapters 1 and 2

A LESSON on the childhood of Jesus comes as a fitting aftermath of the Christmas season, in which all interest has centered upon the little town of Bethleem and the wonderful birth of the babe in the manger.

The story of the boyhood is less colorful and less complete. In fact, except for the very colorful story of Jesus in the Temple, there is only the statement that He "increased in wisdom and stature and in favor with God

Was there ever so much expressed in so few words? How easy it is to fill in the picture of the boyhood in that simple home in Nazareth - a normal boy, growing up in the home of a devout father and a loving and diserning mother.

It is not difficult to estimate the nfluence of Mary, as she kept all the marvelous things of His birth and "pondered them in her heart," nor can we underestimate the wholesome influence of Joseph, as the boy helped him in the carpenter shop.

But the supreme influences were undoubtedly those of the Old Testament religion. Attached to the synagogue was the school; but in the service of the synagogue itself the Shema, consisting of Deuteronomy 6:4-9, occupied a place of importance similar to that of the Lord's Prayer in modern worship.

But more earthly influences. ilso, were preparing the Saviour for His mission. Nazareth was a meeting place of north and south, of east and west, with mingling of races and languages -a fitting place for a boy to grow up who was to have a world

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


