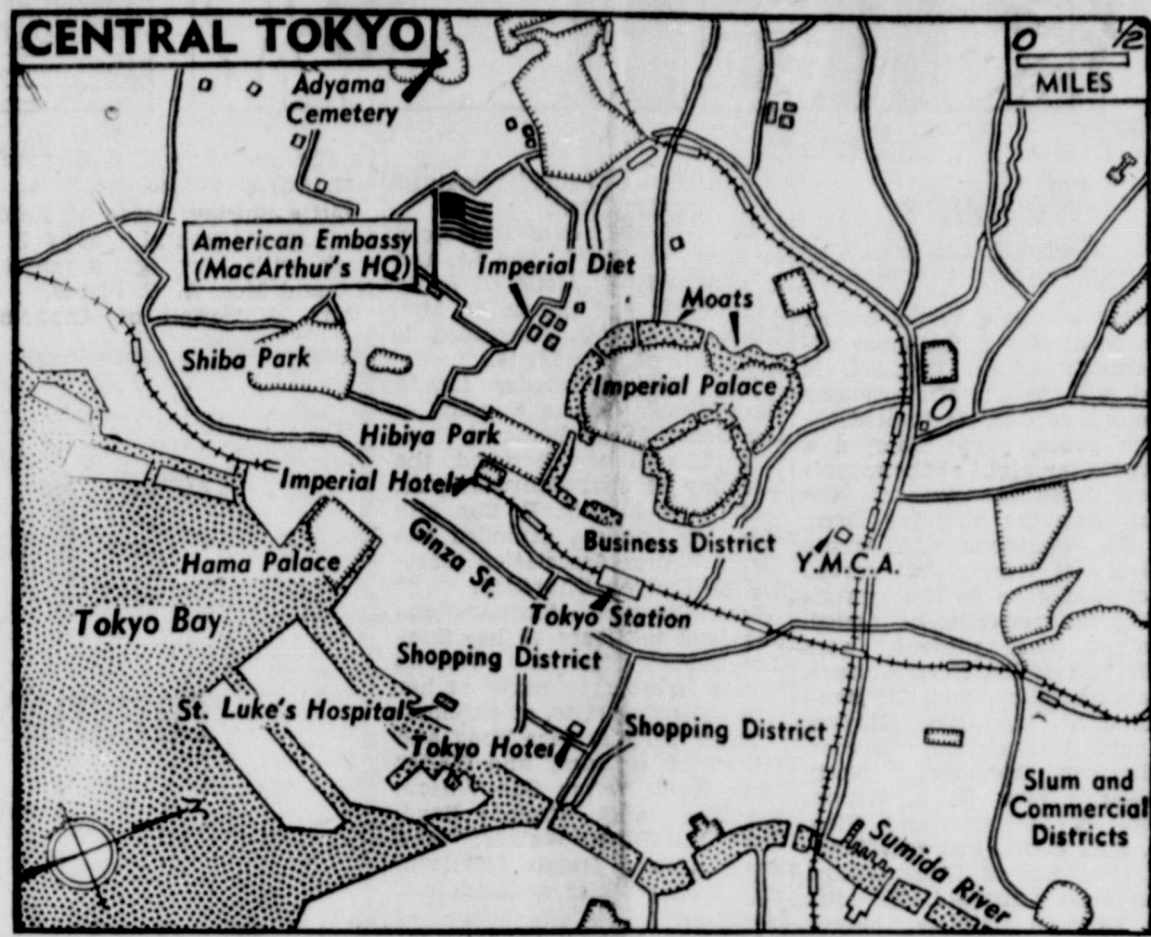
Cecil Jones, who has been farming in the Lakeview community for the past few years, moved with his family last week to Stratford.

Loan Wheat May Be Sold To PMA at Parity

A wheat purchase program similar to the one in effect last year was announced today at the county AAA office with a statement that farmers putting their wheat into a CCC loan will have the option of selling the wheat next spring to the Production and Marketing Administration at 15 cents a bushel above the applicable loan value, less charges.

The 1945 loan rate averages \$1.38 a bushel, or 90 per cent of parity figured at the July rate of \$1.35 a bushel, and the 15 cent payment will bring the rate up to parity level.

The purchase program is applicable to both farm and warehouse stored wheat; and as was the case last year, no storage payment will be made by the government.

The date for sale of unredemmed wheat has been set at Apr. 1, 1946, according to the announcement.

All Slaughter Controls Off

All slaughtering controls on the amount of meat anyone may slaughter and transfer have been abolished, the District Office of Price Administration has announced.

On Sept. 8 OPA ended controls over how much livestock could be slaughtered and where the meat was to be shipped. The pricing order limiting the maximum percentage of good and choice cattle that a slaughterer may kill during an accounting period was revoked Sept. 12.

Farmers and other slaughterers may now slaughter and sell all the meat they care to without regard to quantity. However, they are still required to observe the rationing and price control requirements which still remain in effect.

## Range Conservation Measures Financed On Budget Plan

Water conservation and range improvement programs have been put into effect by many Deaf Smith County farmers and ranchmen, it was revealed today in a report by F. G. Collier, director of the Deaf Smith County AAA office.

Under the present conservation program, the county is allotted a budget for such work, Collier said. The allotment of \$11,839 for the construction of dams, tanks and terraces and the drilling of wells has already been spent, and applications for an equal amount of construction are now on hand.

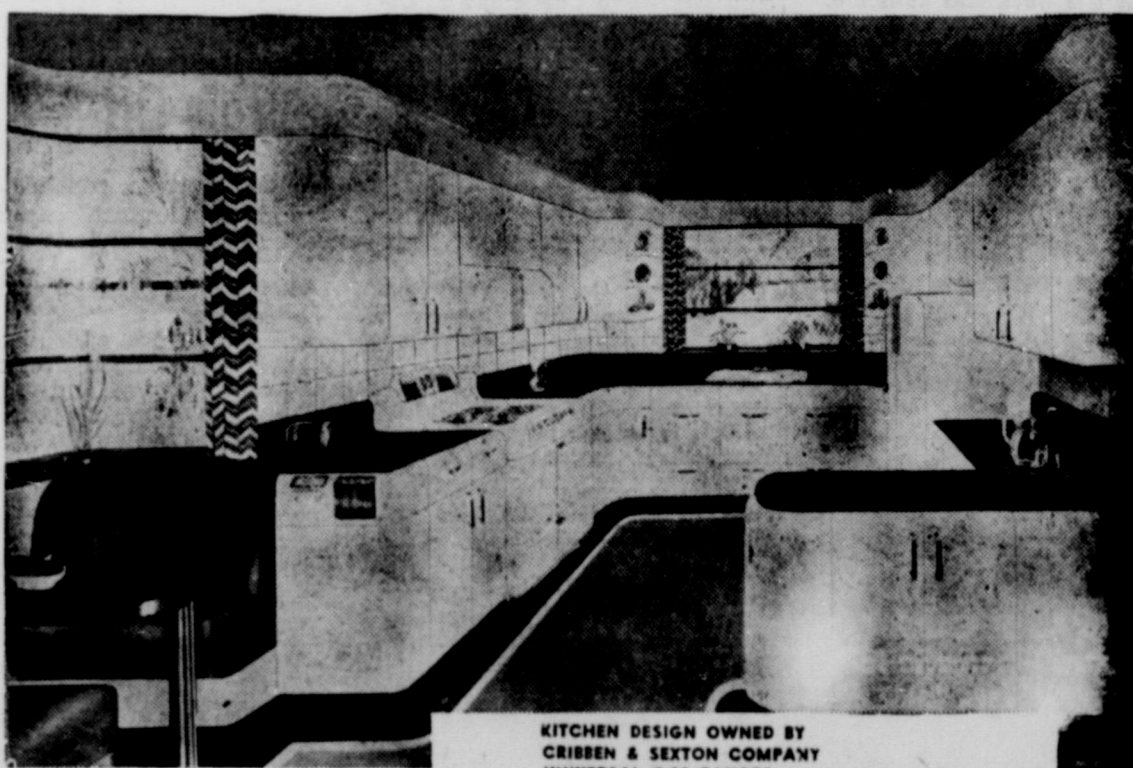

Atchley, pioneer residents of Deaf Smith County, looked back over 50 years of married life Sunday as they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary, a day few couples are privileged to share. Open house was held at their home in Summerfield from 3 to 7 o'clock with their eight daughters acting as hostesses. Guests were greeted by Mrs. C. B. Thomas, oldest daughter of the couple. Mrs. R. D. Lance, Jr., presided at the gold and white guest book and the house party was made up of the daughters and granddaughters of the couple. The refreshment table resplendent in the golden anniversary colors, held a three-tiered anniversary cake topped with miniature bridal couple. A bright sheen of flowers formed the table centerpiece with crystal and silver appointments completing the arrangements. Out-of-town guests attending the celebration were Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Wright, Leah Wright and Mrs. Delbert Crosthwait, all of Olney, Mr. and Mrs. Paul J. Marceau and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Knox and children of San Antonio; Mr. and Mrs. W. E. They love to tell about their elopement and wedding and the children and grandchildren never fail to get a thrill out of the story. Like most men Mr. Atchley would rather leave out any display of sentimentality but he had a big time cutting the anniversary cake with Mrs. Atchley. Both are still active members of the Summerfield Baptist church. Of their 12 children, nine are still living. They are Mrs. Mary Bell Staats, Summerfield; Mrs. C. B. Thomas and Mrs. R. D. Lance, Hereford; Mrs. Virgie Hill, Vega; Mrs. Annie Hawkins, Lamesa; Mrs. Lorene Knox and Mrs. Ruth Marceau, San Antonio; Mrs. Gertrude Wade, Summerfield; and Cpl. Thurman Atchley who is stationed at Del Rio. Three grandchildren have also made their home with the Atchleys. They have 17 grandchildren, two of whom are serving in the United States Navy. the family later moved to Hereford, where they lived until about 1925. Mrs. Wheeler died in 1938. 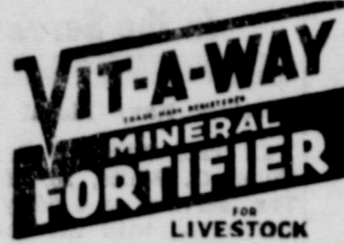

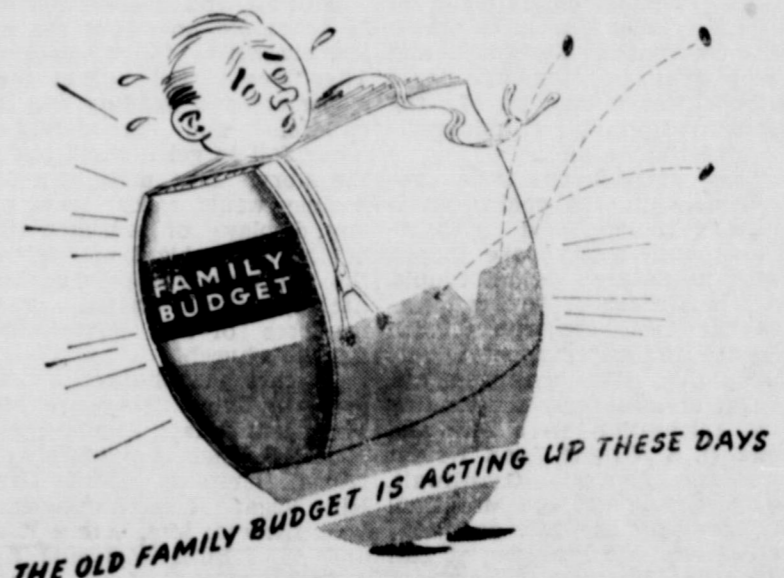

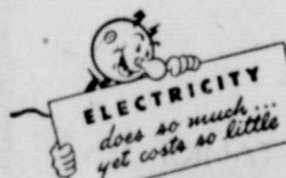
