

Mayor Jimmy Seay said that he had recently completed a lot of careful study of the overall water situation and specifically the Mackenzie Water Authority, and he said that he felt that the council should take a stand on it, since there was a possibility of losing the water rights for the dam this fall.

The council voted 100% to favor the water Authority. It is probable that the next meeting of the Mackenzie Water Authority board will set a vote date for approval by the voters

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR CLEARING WEEDS AND RE-MOVING TRASH, REFUSE, GARBAGE OR RUBBISH FROM LOTS WITHIN THE CITY OF FLOYDADA; PROVIDING FOR SUCH CLEANING AND REMOVAL BY THE CITY MANAGER OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA IF NOT DONE BY THE OWNERS, LES-SEES, OCCUPANTS OR OTHER PERSONS HAVING CONTROL OF SAID LOTS; PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; CREATING A LIEN FOR CHARGES SO INCURRED AND PROVIDING MANNER OF FORECLOSURE THEREOF: Section 1: GROWTH OF WEEDS DEEMED NUISANCE. Every growth of weeds, over 12 inches high or over 12 inches long, growing, standing, or remaining upon any lot or parcel of land in the City of Floydada, Texas, shall be deemed and held to be a nuisance.

Section 3: PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF SECTION 1. Any owner, lessee, occupant or other person having control of any such lot or parcel of land who shall allow or permit any weeds over 12 inches high or over 12 inches long to grow, stand or remain or who shall at any time allow or permit any trash, refuse, garbage or rubbish upon any such lot or parcel of land and the curb of the land lying between such lot or parcel of land and the curb of the adjacent street or upon the half of the alley next adjacent to such lot or parcel of land shall be deemed guilty of maintaining a nuisance and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS. Section 4: LIEN MAY BE FORECLOSED BY CITY, All such sums paid out by said City may be collected and the said lien foreclosed by suit brought by the City for that purpose, or as hereinafter provided.

Porcine image scrubbed in House

Mudslinging at pigs called dirty politics

Even stone-faced Rep. H. R. Gross (R) of Iowa must have cracked a secret smile the other day as the House sang its praises of a prize Midwestern product-the noble hog.

Most House colloquies, one must admit, tend toward dullness. This one proved a real "bear.

It was all the idea of Iowa Rep. Fred Schwengel (R), critic of the trucking lobby, congressional reformer, history buff, and, it turns out, a promoter par excellence.

"My purpose here," Mr. Schwengel explained, "is to further correct the general image of that much maligned animal, the 'picked-on porker.'

"I like pigs, and I honestly believe that most pigs like me. Hogs are beautiful. Some of my best friends are hogs.

"Against all those who would besmirch them, I stand ready to speak in their de-

fense-even on the floor of the House of Representatives."

The nation's pork industry, the congressman disclosed, feels deeply disturbed over the pig's public image. It ranges from avarice to plain stupidity.

To counter this, Mr. Schwengel passed around green-and-yellow buttons for each member to wear in his lapel. A gift of the National Pork Producers Council, they proclaimed: "Hogs Are Beautiful.

"Such phrases as 'Dirty as a pig,' 'This place looks like a pigsty,' and so forth have conditioned the consumer's mind since childhood," Mr. Schwengel lamented, "It would be strange indeed if there were no negative ruboff on pork and pork products."

Emotions seconded

Such ecstatic praise brought other Midwesterners to their feet.

"We have all heard the expression 'beau-tiful people,' " another Iowan, William J. Sherle (R), pointed out. "Some probably wonder how they got that way. It was because they consumed those beautiful hogs from Iowa.

"One of the most beautiful things about a hog," he added, "is that every part of it

label could be difficult.

can be marketable except, as the old Iowa saying goes, the squeal. Not to be outdone, Rep. Ancher Nelsen (R) of Minnesota offered a personal glimpse

of swinedom.

"There are those who say that pigs are

not clean," he said. "I can honestly say that I slept in the pig house during the time of the farrowing of the spring litters.

"It must certainly be said that if you gave that lowly animal a chance, he would be clean. If the pigsty is unclean, it is not the fault of the pig but the fault of the man in charge.

Mr. Nelsen opined that Minnesota pork is just a little bit superior" to that of Iowa. Mr. Schwengel tactfully said he would let the record speak for itself.

That brought a snort from Rep. Paul Findley (R), whose hometown of Pittsfield, Ill., has acquired the title, "Hog Capital of the World." Pike County in Mr. Findley's district produces 100 million pounds a year.

"While city dwellers may envision hogs in terms of mud, squeals, and grunts," Mr. Findley declared, "I have seen many an animal that deserves the word beautiful." That beauty-especially the economic splendor—isn't just in the eye of the butcher, insisted Rep. Wiley Mayne (R), also an lowan. American farmers received \$3.8 billion last year from the sale of hogs. And Iowa, the nation's leader, contributed more than \$1 billion to that figure.

That's not exactly hogwash.



Beef May Be Expensive On The Table, But Only 85% Of Parity On The Hoof

"Prices recieved for beef cattle during April 1969, averaged only 85 percent of parity," said Lloyd Bergsma, Executive Vice-President of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, with headquarters in Amarillo, Texas. "Recent publicity given to beef prices is unfair in that it failed to tell the complete

story", Bergsma stated. "It is true that beef prices have increased during the past year, but", Bergsmacontinued, 'you could hardly say they are out of line when they are 15 percent below parity". Bergsma said, "With per

capita beef consumption about double that of 15 years ago,



Fresh out of law school at the University of Texas, T.F. Houghton came to Floydada in the year of 1902, bought Lot in Block 61 on the north side of the square, built a tworoom frame office and hung out his shingle.

He was aggressive, energetic and out-going. It was not long until he had a good practice.

As I recall it Mr. Houghton made his home with Mr. and Mrs. V.J. Hall, parents of Floydada's distinguished Claude Hall, for two or three years.

In general a non-conformist, he was a "barbarian" at the University. He battled the fraternities to a fare-vou-well from "Barb Hall" in 1899 and 1900. He told me he made his way through college by selling spectacles from door to door, better said, from farm to farm.

Mr. Houghton went down-state to take a bride, I can't recall where, nor exactly when, but it was 1909 or before, for in that year he built the big, two-story frame building where he resided, at the corner of Main and Houston, (102 E, Houston) until his untimely death in 1920, due to diabetis. (At that time this disease was among several for which medical science had not found a cure.) His brother, Dr. W.M. Houghton, signed the death certificate.

If I knew I have forgotten what Mr. Houghton may have told me about the place of his birth and his boyhood. The story of his death in The Hesperian probably told.

Mr. Houghton held no political office, never sought political preferment. And it is my belief that he was a member of no local organization.

Postscript: After some apple-checked little fellers began to show up in the Houghton household Mr. Houghton built the well-house still standing near the southeast corner of the sturdy dwelling.

A well and windmill furnished fresh cool water that flowed through troughs in the well house. In these troughs the housewife stored milk, butter, and cream during the heat of summer.

"All segments of the beef producing industry have made rapid strides in improving their production efficiency, Modern research and technology are utilized to a high degree throughout the industry in bringing to the consumer the high quality beef products she has available to her in the retail store. The beef producing industry is very competitive, and all segments are making every effort to carry out their phase of production in the most economical manner. The industry does, however, want to share in the growth of the Nation's economy."

Ralph Wayne Reports On Current Legislature

AUSTIN - With June 2nd as the deadling for the 61st Legislature, Rperesentative Ralph Wayne of Plainview took time out from a busy schedule of committee meetings and floor work to report on the progress of this session.

"It is refreshing to see the leadership of the Legislature, notably House Speaker G. F. (Gus) Mutscher and Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, working well together for the benefit of all the citizens of Texas," the District 78 Representative said. "It makes the legislative procedure much more effective when the two key leaders of our State, along with Governor Smith, can all sit and reason together. Texas is fortunate to have these three outstanding public ser-

vants." Now serving his third term in the House of Representatives, Rep. Wayne is carrying a total of 22 bills and eight resolutions during this session. Saying that 1430 bills have been introduced in the House thus far, the Plainview House Member said that he believed it was as important to correct or stop legislative as it was to introduce new bills.

He said that he is opposed to the current minimum wage bill and has worked for the past week to pass an amendment that would exclude agricultural workers, with the exception of piece-rate workers, from the minimum wage bill. Forcing farmers to pay \$1.25 per hour to workers who are already receiving such fringe benefits as a truck or housing would effectively do away with a number of farm jobs now available. Rep.
