## City Manager Is Employed By Council

The Friona City Commission, consisting of Mayor Glen Reeve, and Commissioners, F. L. Spring and Carl Maurer, have recently slightly changed the method of administering the city's business affairs by employing a City Manager rather than leaving the City Commission to look after and manage all the details of the city's business.

Wright Williams, who recently received his discharge from the Armed Service has been appointed to the position of City Manager, and took over the work of the office on Wednesday morning, January 1. Mr. Williams had lived and worked in Friona for many years before entering the Armed Service and is well and favorably known to all our people.

The new arrangement relieves John White of the duties of City Assessor and Collector and City Secretary, which position he has held since July 1, 1945. It also relieves Carrol Day of the duties of Superintendent of the City Water Department, which he has also held for the past six months.

## Fast Way to Kill Orchard Larvae

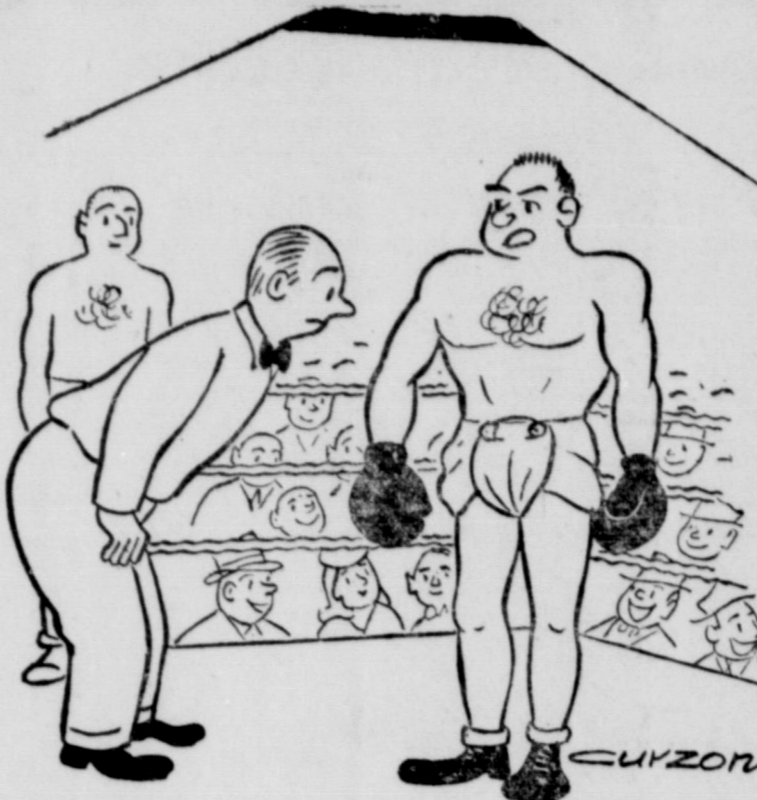

**New Employers Must File S. S. Numbers**

Every day new places of business are being opened in the Panhandle area. In many instances these businesses are being operated by returning veterans or by other individuals who are going into business for the first time.

The manager of the Amarillo Social Security Board Field Office, J. R. Sanderson, wishes to remind these individuals that each new employer should file an application with the Social Security Board for an identification number for his business. This is necessary even though only one person is on the payroll, and perhaps works only part time. Each employer is required to keep a record of the worker's Social Security account number for use when it comes time to make out the Social Security tax return to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

New employers may secure identification numbers by calling at or writing to the Amarillo Social Security Board Field Office which is located at 324 New Post Office Building. Employers who live outside of Amarillo are invited to write and request a representative of this office to contact them personally when next he is in their community.

**Farm Goals for Texas Will Be High in 1946**

COLLEGE STATION, December 31—Texas farmers have been given the green light for large scale production of field crops, livestock, milk, and poultry and poultry products in 1946. Suggested production goals for next year were accepted by a large group of farmers, and representatives of the Texas Extension Service, Production and Marketing Administration, teaching departments of the A. and M. College of Texas, and other agencies working with agriculture at a meeting on the College campus December 17. The goals will be carried to the counties in two-day educational meetings conducted by the A. and M. College Extension Service, with representatives of state and Federal agricultural agencies participating, during January and February.

Among major products a goal of 190,740 pigs for spring farrowing was set; cotton, 7,000,000 acres; milk, 4,467,000,000 pounds; turkeys, 4,465,000; hens and pullets on March 1, next, 27,518,000; sheep and lambs, 10,091,000; eggs, 220,818,000 dozen; acreage of legumes and grasses (alfalfa and sudan), 94,000; cattle and calves (at year end), 7,600,000; milk cows, 1,396,000; chickens raised, 36,539,000.

The suggested goals for small grains and other field crops included: Wheat (acreage planted) 5,200,000 acres; corn, 4,950,000 acres; oats, 1,830,000 acres; barley, 434,000 acres; sorghum for grain, 4,500,000 acres; sorghums for all purposes (except for syrup), 7,800,000 acres; peanuts for nuts, 605,000 acres; flaxseed, 100,000 acres; sweet potatoes, 56,000 acres; all potatoes, 61,000 acres; commercial potatoes, 24,700 acres; and tame hay, 1,550,000 acres.

The goals suggested for sweet potatoes, flaxseed, corn, tame hay, legumes and grasses,

wheat, cotton, cattle and calves, and spring pigs, represent increases over the 1945 indicated planted acreages and livestock units. Sheep and lamb numbers are unchanged from the 1945 goal. Other goals are lower than the 1945 indicated totals.

B. F. Vance, state director of the Production and Marketing Administration presiding, said that acreage allotments and marketing controls would not apply to 1946 crop, livestock, poultry and dairy production. He added that crop acreage represented in the goals exceeded 1945 planted acreages by more than 1,000,000.

"Our best ambassadors to Japan are the American troops—they embody the American ideal of democracy," General Douglas McArthur told Bishop James C. Baker, of Los Angeles, when the latter visited Japan recently as part of a delegation to study religious conditions.

"I have never been so proud of the American soldier as I am today," continued the General. "We could have given orders, but we could not have so easily restrained the men; but they have a control developed in the American home, in the American school, and in the American church. There is a remarkable friendship developing between the American soldier and the Japanese people."

Because conscientious objectors in civilian public service camps throughout the nation receive no compensation for their work, and it even costs them considerable to feed and clothe themselves, a large number of dependent wives and children have suffered severely, according to an investigation made by the Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church. The Commission is asking the Methodist Church to allocate some of its relief funds for the assistance of these fam-

ilies; and it is asking church members to contribute for the support of the Methodist men in these camps. The Commission is also asking President Truman to pardon before Christmas all conscientious objectors now in prison; and it is asking that men be demobilized from the objectors camps as rapidly as they are from the armed forces.

**Price Control On Tires Will Be Continued**

The removal of tire rationing on January 1 has no bearing whatever on price control over tires and other rubber goods. E. H. Norton, Chairman of the Area Price Board, said today.

Tires are still short and it is obvious that with so many people needing and trying to get scarce tires there will be a tendency to bid prices up.

This bidding up of prices on scarce commodities is the stuff of which inflation is made, the Price Chairman said, pointing out that ceiling prices on all goods must be adhered to until the supply becomes plentiful enough to remove the threat of inflation.

For the benefit of former 'A' gasoline book holders who have not been able to buy tires since the war started Norton said that the top legal price for any 600x16 four-ply passenger tire is \$16.38 and that a 650x16 four-ply tire is \$19.75.

The Price Chairman also suggested that drivers take the best possible care of their tires remembering that it will still be several months before everybody who wants tires will be able to buy them.

Consumers should keep in mind that all dealers are required to supply a sales ticket or an invoice showing the size of the tires and the price per unit. Where doubt exists as to tire costs the sales receipt may
