Star Lites

THE LATEST EXAMPLE of a cross-country traveler this past week, a mule-drawn covered wagon, set us to thinking about all of the various people we have interviewed and photographed during the past three decades, who were making trips through the county, usually down Highway 60, on various crusades.

One of the most memorable characters we've met was Bob Wieland, who in June of 1984 was in the middle of a coast-to-coast trip from Los Angeles to Washington,

Wieland was a 36-year-old Vietnam veteran, who lost both legs in the conflict. Wieland completed his "Walk for Hunger," having secured sponsors who paid him so much per mile. He travelled over 2,400 miles, pulling himself along by his muscled arms and hands. Scooter Russell interviewed Wieland, and he was photographed both at Bovina and Friona.

Perhaps the most poignant of the travellers, at least to Ye Editor, was the Tom DeMarco family, who passed through Friona and Bovina in November of 1989, with his wife and five small children. Their mode of transportation was also a bit off-beat: a covered wagon pulled by a balky 30s-model Allis-Chalmers tractor, that had its share of break-downs.

The DeMarkos pulled into Friona on Thanksgiving weekend, and the First Baptist Church's benevolent committee fixed a Thanksgiving dinner for the family. Carol and I helped organize this, and we got to have dinner with this young family, looking for a new life in a most unusual manner.

In 1984, Jennifer Roy was a visitor. She had started on the West Coast, east-bound in her covered wagon pulled by a donkey.

Bob Wieland wasn't the only crippled person we've interviewed and photographed that was making a cross-country trip in spite of their physical defect. In mid-May of 1970, David Ryder came down Highway 60. The 22-year-old English citizen was left a cripple by polio. He was making his coast-tocoast trip on crutches, to increase the awareness for the physically disabled, and to show that handicapped persons aren't necessarily helpless.

In March of 1989, young Bill Duff, a Texas native and a paraplegic due to an auto accident, wheeled through Parmer County in a wheelchair. "Wheels Across America" was Duff's program. He was out to demonstrate that although many doors are closed to disabled people, many others remain open. While in Friona, he was given a room at the Holiday House Motel by Doris and Edward

White. We have interviewed and photographed two different crosscountry projects who were on horseback, and they were 31 years

In August of 1962, a pair of German brothers, Peter and Wolfgang Stoerchle, were in the midst of a 2400-mile horseback jaunt, that started in Toronto, Canada. They had been living in Canada a couple of years, working and saving money so they could see the U.S.A .-- on horseback. Pete Mace, who was working as advertising manager of the Friona Star, and his wife Barbara, took the young men in for a couple of meals

and furnished their beds. This past June, Bob Tierney rode through Bovina and Friona on his horse and pulling a couple of pack mules. Tierney also had a physical defect, having lost his leg in an accident. He was raising money to start a youth ranch for crippled children in Tennessee. He was travelling from San Diego to Lawrenceburg, Tennessee, and had a travelling companion as far as Clovis, N.M.

Another 1962 traveller was Nate Aller of New York, a cross-country biker, who was getting riding experience in hopes of making an (Continued on Page 1-A)

Car-Truck Mishap Claims Two Lives Bovina

Clovis man were killed Sunday in Parmer County.

The accident occurred at 2:12 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of U.S. Highway 60, Texas Highway 86 and Farm-to-Market Road 1381 about eight-tenths of a mile west of Bovina on Highway 60, the Department of Public Safety

A Kenworth truck pulling a livestock trailer was eastbound on Highway 60. A 1978 Datsun was stopped at the intersection facing northbound on Texas Highway 86.

The Datsun, driven by James Matthew Gray of Clovis, pulled out from the intersection and was attempting a left turn in front of the truck when the vehicles collided. The accident cut the car in half, the DPS said.

The truck continued eastbound and crossed the westbound lane and rolled over 1 1/2 times.

DPS officer Trey Ellis stated that Gray was pronounced dead at the scene by Judge Vi Hutto, Bovina precinct judge. Lawrence O. Duff, 34, of Clovis was listed in critical condition with multiple fractures, abrasions and internal injuries in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Duff was a passenger in the car, driven by Gray.

Four-month-old Carolyn Cecelle Davis was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Robert Alexander of Friona. She was a passenger in the truck, driven by Michael Don Jenkins, 24, of Hereford. Another truck passenger, Sherry Dawn Davis, 19, of Hereford was in fair condition with lacerations at Parmer County Community Hospital.

Jenkins was treated and released with cuts and bruises at Parmer County Community Hospital in

None of the passengers or drivers were wearing seatbelts, Ellis added.

A four-month-old baby and a Everyone in the accident was initially taken to Parmer County afternoon after a truck-car accident Hospital, and car passenger Lawrence Duff was airlifted to Amarillo.

Emergency workers from Bovina, Friona, Farwell, Texico, and Hereford were on the scene. Two emergency helicopters were flown in as well: one to the scene and one to Parmer County Hospital

Ellis made a special point that the accident site was flooded by curious onlookers. "They hinder rescue efforts," he added. "Charges can and will be filed against gawkers in the future," he noted.

Highway 60 was closed from the intersection of the accident to the intersection of Highway 60 and Farm-To-Market Road 1731.

City, County At Impasse On Rural Fire Payments

The City of Friona and Parmer County have hit a brick wall in negotiations for paying the City for expenses incurred in fighting rural

This is a sticky problem which has been on-going for at least the last 25 years.

Friona City Manager Paula Wilson points out that since 1989 the ratio of fire responses by Friona Fire Department has averaged 30 per cent within the city limits and 70 per cent outside.

Further, the City of Friona's volunteer Fire Department has responded to 43 per cent of all rural fire calls in Parmer County this

For the past few years, Parmer County has re-imbursed the city on a "flat rate" basis, paying Friona \$4,000 per year for fighting rural

The figures show that the fire department's expenses for 1992-93 have amounted to \$53,505.83.

The City requested that Parmer County re-imburse the city with the City of Friona figuring the actual expenses, less 20 per cent. The ratio of city fires to county fires would then be totaled, less accidents and false alarms. The city was asking for quarterly payments, beginning January 1, 1994.

But after discussing the proposition this week, county commissioners would not agree to the proposal.

This is the approach most counties use to pay for their rural fire calls. This is not a problem unique to Parmer County," Mrs. Wilson said.

In light of this, the Friona City Council decided at its last meeting that the city would quit responding to rural fire calls, falling back on an ordinance (#481) that it passed in October, 1973, for the fire department to answer fire calls only within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, and within a onehalf mile radius of the city.

The \$4,000 yearly payment is the amount that the county pays fire departments at Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Rhea-Hollene each year, yet it was pointed out that Friona's department fights 43 percent of all the rural fires.

In 1992, the county did pay onehalf the purchase price (\$22,000) for a GMC fast-attack vehicle, which has been used considerably in rural fire calls.

The city plans to revert back to the 1973 ordinance on October 1,

'ax Notices Appear Be Misleading

A tax notice published in the Friona Star and paid for by Friona I.S.D. may leave some local taxpayers scratching their heads in

The notice incorrectly states that the school tax rate will grow by 638 per cent. But in publishing the notice, local school officials are only complying with a state law.

"This is one of those situations where the law doesn't make any sense, but we must nevertheless comply with it or risk serious consequences," said Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of schools.

Friona I.S.D. is required by the state's "truth-in-taxation" law to publish an official notice reporting last year's tax rate, the proposed tax rate for this year, and the percentage

However, due to a drafting oversight in the new school finance law, the notice significantly understates the tax rate for last year and produces a misleading comparison between last year's and this year's school taxes.

Under the previous school finance law, the county education district (CED) levied part of the taxes used for operating schools and the school district levied the rest. Under the new school finance law, CEDs are eliminated and all school taxes are levied by the school

Last year, the county education district imposed a tax rate of \$.8250 (per \$100 of value) and Friona I.S.D. imposed a tax rate of \$.16 for a combined school tax rate of \$.9850. This year, Friona I.S.D. is

proposing a tax rate of \$1.09.

Because of the mistake in the new school finance law, Friona I.S.D. is required to report a 1992-93 tax rate of \$.1707, a 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.09, and an increase of 638 per cent, when in reality the rate will increase by 10.65 per cent.

At that time, Dr. Gary A. 1960s. Shilling, a noted economist, presented some convincing evidence that inflation was ending-moderation in government spending; deregulation; improved productivity; high real interest rates, which encouraged savings and discouraged speculation; declining oil prices; and more. Shilling listed more than 46 investment losers and 25 winners if inflation \$1.5 trillion would move into ended. High-quality stocks and bonds were among his big winners.

That year, 1983, ended with a 3.8 per cent inflation rate, the lowest in more than ten years, and it continued to decline. The Dow passed the magic 1000 mark and was on its way to tripling. As interest rates fell, bond prices rose. Yet, even though inflation averaged only 3.7 per cent during the next seven years (1983-1989), six-month CD rates remained high, averaging 8.38 per cent.

The public was not convinced inflation had ended and that interest Amarillo--Estelle Caffey. rates would drop. In the 1960s, when inflation averaged slightly Amarillo--Naomi Stephens. more than 2.5 per cent, three-month Real returns (interest minus and Irene McFarland.

During the '70s and '80s, when In 1983, for example, the inflation rose and interest rates per cent to 6 per cent after-inflation return, investors reduced their equity assets to a low of 14.29 per cent of household financial assets and moved into short-term CDs and Treasuries.

> Today, we are back to the low inflation and interest rates of the Short-term income investments are unattractive, forcing investors to look elsewhere. Stocks and mutual funds as a percentage of household assets have recovered to about 20 per cent from the lows of 14 per cent in 1982, and that percentage could gradually increase to the 30 per cent to 35 per cent levels of the 1960s.

> If this were to occur, about stocks and mutual funds. This number is particularly impressive considering that the market value of all stocks traded on the New York Stock Exchange are now approximately \$3.7 trillion.

> Although financial history does repeat iself, no one can accurately predict the future. The past should serve only as one example of what may occur in the months and years to come.


