The Consumer's and Wheat Growers have offered to furnish the main lobby of the Hospital. Certainly we of Pamer County are grateful for this gift.

The local Lion's Club has divided into two teams to help sell memberships in the Hospital, the leaders of the groups being Joe Poindexter and Pete Buske. Much interest is being shown as the losers have to eat burned beans while the winners sit across the table eating steak.

On Dec. 7 the Directors of the

Hospital will go to Rhea for a rally and Pie Supper. Others are invited to go along. Again, let us continue our support of this great undertaking.

Memberships now number 382, and with the different sales teams doing some personal work in the country this week no doubt we will reach 400. The goal for Christmas is 500.

The Board of Directors hired Walker and Atcheson of Lubbock as architects for the hospital. Work and study will begin soon on plans. Surely within three or four months the building can be started.

Those persons interested in memberships should get them soon so that the Directors can better estimate the size of Hospital needed. They do not want to over build, but on the other hand do not want to have to add on to the building soon after it is in operation. Such a condition means that memberships would have to be limited.

Clayton Milhoan Rites Held At Wildorado Church

Last rites for Clayton Milhoan were conducted Monday afternoon of last week at the Palo Duro Baptist Church at Wildorado at two o'clock, with Rev. Godwin officiating.

A veteran of the Pacific fighting Clayton died Saturday morning, Nov. 17, at Harmon General Hospital at Longview, Texas.

He entered the service in March, 1941, and took part in four major Pacific battles with the First Cavalry Division. He took sick in April, contracting a disease that no one was able to diagnose and was sent back to California in July, then in August to Longview where he remained with his wife until his death.

In July, 1942, Clayton Milhoan and Catherine Gatlin were united in marriage and were together at all times until he was called for overseas duty in June. To this union was born one child, a daughter, Treva Kay. She and her daddy did not have the privilege of getting acquainted until she and her mother went to his bedside in August at Longview.

Survivors include his wife and baby, of Friona; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Milhoan, Wildorado; three brothers and four sisters and many other close relatives and friends.

Participating in the last rites were a military escort from Amarillo Army Air Field, and members of Havens Post, No. 168, American Legion, of Vega. Funeral arrangements were conducted by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

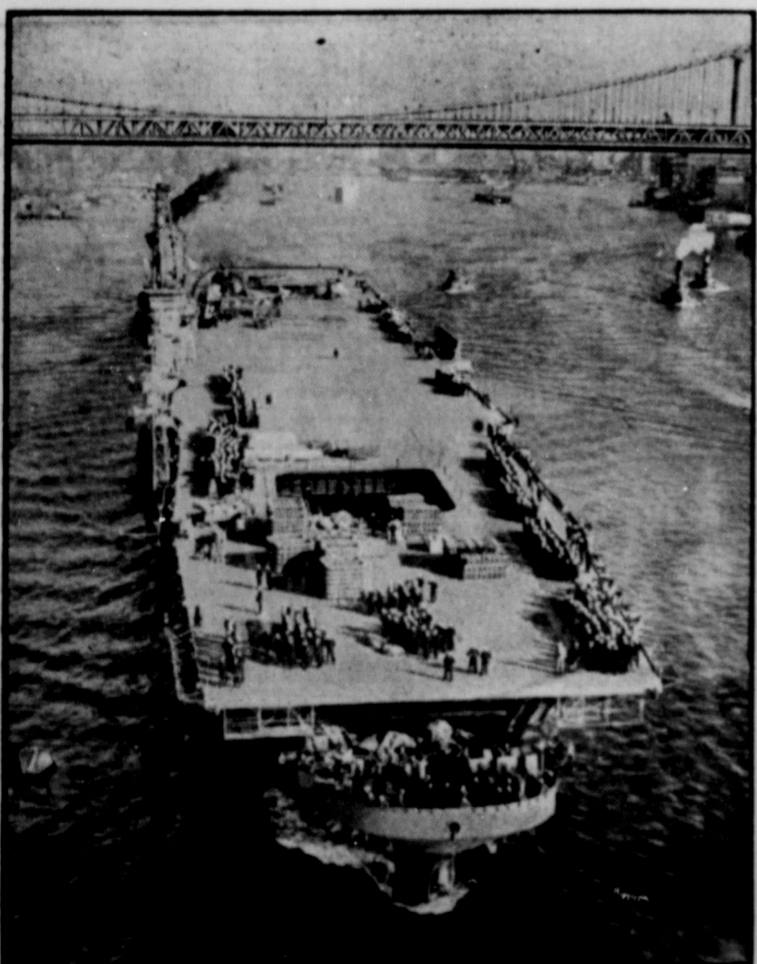
Deaton Operates Magazine Agency
