Friona scored first run in the second inning on an error, and a single by Barrett. Tucumcari scored two runs in the third inning by two errors and a hit by Jemeniz.

Friona scored the tying run in the 8th inning on a home run to left by Barrett, and Tucumcari scored two runs in the 11th inning on hits by Junior Mitchell and Jell Mitchell, and Smilowitz, and an error by Sylvester in the right field, to take the lead again, and Friona scored one run in the 11th inning on hits by Schlenker and Lodon. Schlenker had 4 stolen bases in this game.

Well, our weather is nothing to brag on, but it beats none—a lot. It is still very dry and unusually warm for this climate, and the mercury has been playing around in the top of the tube for the past two weeks, but the nights have been mostly cool.

Some sorghum crops have been panted, much of it broadcast, for stock feed, and the few local showers in the past few weeks have supplied enough moisture to bring most of it through the ground, but it will soon be needing more rain. The crops that are under irrigation are as promising as usual, or perhaps a little better than the average, and there could be considerable feed crops produced with a little more moisture.

The hot spell has lasted longer than usual, and we are expecting a favorable "break" soon.

The sermon was another of those "common sense" sermons, with a clear exposition of things it seems are so simple that everybody ought to realize to be the truth, even though they had no bible to tell them so, but it seems that a lot of people are not looking for a thing so simple in their religion.

It just looks as though I will have to swear off going to Sunday School and church, as it is breaking into my politics, and in a year like this, it seems that politics should come first, then if there is any time left after taking proper care of the

heat exhaustion the patient's suit one from the other. With skin is cold and clammy while with sunstroke, the skin is hot and dry.

A simple rule may serve as a guide and avoid confusion regarding the treatment. Briefly it is this: If the patient is cold, make him warm; if he is hot, make him cool.

The following measures will help prevent heat exhaustion among farm workers: Drink cool water and lemon or other citrus fruit juices, avoiding alcohol and ice water. Eat vegetables and light, easily digested foods. Wear light, loose clothing; avoid over fatigue; bathe daily; get plenty of sleep. Replace body salt lost through

College Will Get Living Quarters From POW Camp

CANYON, Texas July 10—Two hundred additional ex-servicemen will find comfortable liv-

ing quarters on the campus of West Texas State College as a result of action of the Federal Public Housing Authority this week in granting to the college buildings from the Prisoner of War Camp at Hereford, Texas.

The buildings will provide twenty-five units for four three-room apartments each which will furnish living quarters for their families.

A barracks style dormitory will be made from another building which will accommodate an additional 100 single ex-servicemen.

These emergency housing units will be placed on the college campus at points where service lines are easily accessible. According to President Hill, they will be used as long as the housing emergency continues and ex-servicemen will have priority in their use for the entire time.

Conner Hall another dormitory for ex-servicemen will be ready for occupancy this fall. It will accommodate 100 single men.

Veterans Vote Free Without Exemptions

Veterans of World War II who have been discharged from the army within 18 months of the date of election will be entitled to a free vote in the Democratic Primary next week, Sheriff J. O. Newell pointed out this week.

Veterans in this group will be able to vote simply by presenting their discharge papers to the election judges at the polls.

Cards advising veterans of

this privilege were mailed by Newell to all the county's ex-servicemen this week.

Veterans who claimed legal residence in this county at the time of entering service will be eligible to vote regardless of whether or not they have been in residence here for the past six months as required by law. In other words, veterans who have just returned from service, but who previously had claimed legal residence here, can vote in this county.

Twenty-one year old voters who are casting ballots for the first time this year should have exemption certificates, but will be allowed to vote without them by establishing their age and eligibility with the election judges.

Texas Safety Association Pledges Aid in Lowering Traffic Deaths

AUSTIN, July 17 (Special)—In the face of an already 45 per cent increase in traffic fatalities over last year, the Texas Safety Association today accepted a charge by governor Coke Stevenson to mobilize public support for a safer Texas.

Announcement of its designation by the governor was made by A. F. Allen, president of the Association, upon receipt of a letter from Stevenson.

"Since my inaugural address as Governor, I have stressed the importance of highway safety as essential to modern, progressive government," Stevenson said. "There is no more tragic waste of human lives, no more unnecessary background to human suffering, no more needless source of economic loss than traffic accidents."

"The current critical traffic accident situation is a positive challenge for public action to every Texas citizen. Unless vigorous concerted application of proven methods of traffic control is made, Texas faces the greatest accident toll in its history."

"To that end, I call upon the Texas Safety Association to coordinate the practical recommendations of the President's Highway Safety Conference and to mobilize public support for a safer Texas."

"Your worthy organization has rendered invaluable service to the people of Texas through its program of traffic, industrial, school and home safety. I know that its leadership in the present emergency will be no less effective."

President Truman's Highway Safety Conference held in Washington this May was attended by twenty members and officials of the Texas Safety Association. Recommendations of the national conference parallel in large measure those of the Texas Emergency Traffic Conference and the Texas Safety Conference according to Allen.

"The principal elements of this uniform traffic control

Prune Shrubs Now Or Wait A Year Says Specialist

COLLEGE STATION, July 12—Prune shrubs now or wait until next year, says Sadie Hatfield, landscape gardening specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Prune out also all dead and diseased limbs and any branches which crowd other plants or get in the way of windows or paths.

Soil Testing Lab At A & M College Offers Services

A soil testing laboratory has been set up at Texas A. and M. College to make chemical analysis of soil samples. The service, as set up by the Board of Directors, is open to the general public. The laboratory will be operated by the Division of Chemistry, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in cooperation with the School of Agriculture and the Extension Service. Fees will be charged ranging from 25 cents for PH. test to 7.50 for a complete soil analysis.

"An analysis of a sample of soil improperly taken is without value," Dr. J. F. Fudge, who is to be in charge of the laboratory, pointed out. He urged that persons wishing to submit soil samples write to the Soil Testing Laboratory, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas, and ask for sampling directions.

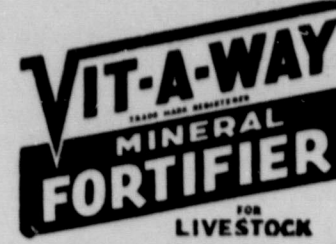
Information with reference to the soil, its use and location, is also needed, and a form provided by the laboratory must be filled out and returned with the soil sample.

After the analysis is completed the results will be turned over to the Extension Service where M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist, and his associates will make recommendations for the improvement of the soil in the light of the chemical content and history.

The county agricultural or home demonstration agent in the county concerned will receive a copy of the analysis and recommendations, and will be able to aid in the solution of any other problem which may arise.
