Funeral services for Marion Kendrick Smith, pioneer citizen of the Panhandle who died Sunday morning were held at the Methodist Church in Bovina Tuesday afternoon. Because of the failure of one of Mr. Smith's sisters, Mrs. W. C. Perry of Earlymart, Calif., to arrive in time for the funeral, interment did not occur until Wednesday when Masonic rites were held at the cemetery.

Born June 3, 1877 in Burnett county, Tex., "Smithie" as he was known to old time cowboys from the entire Panhandle region, came to this territory in 1896 and worked first for Moore, Williams and Good He was for some time manager of the VVN ranch in Bailey County.

Mr. Smith had for many years enjoyed the fellowship and good work of the Masonic lodge. He is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Ed Brown of Marble Falls, Tex., Mrs. W. C. Perry of Earlymart, Calif., and Misses Marie and Loula Smith of Bovina, Tex.

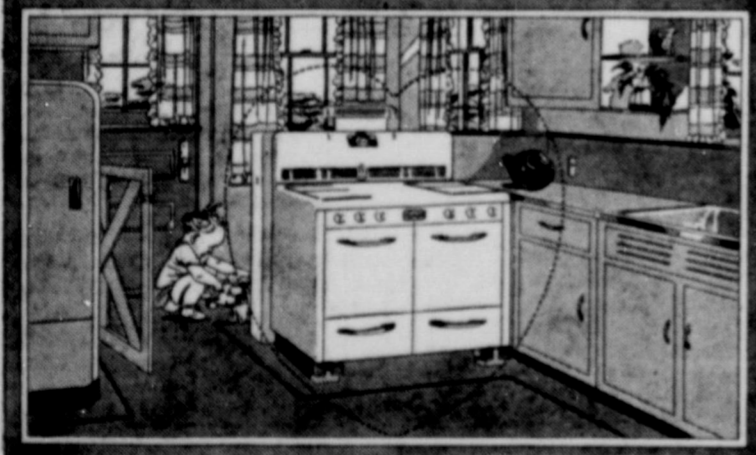

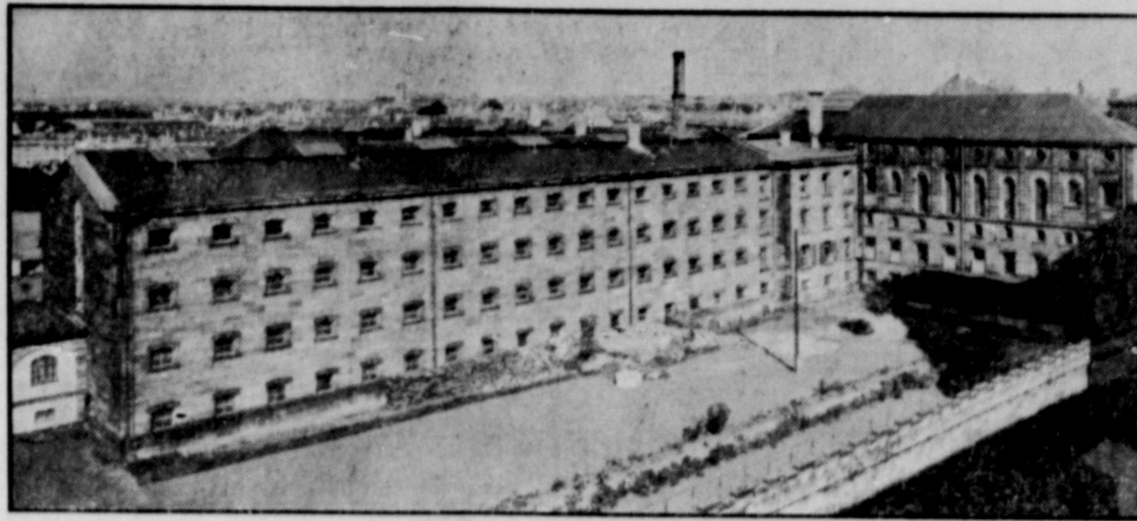

**Information Please**

by MISS LAURA MAE McFARLAND

(to answer your questions about THE PARMER COUNTY COMMUNITY HOSPITAL)

(This is the first in a series of question and answer reports concerning the Parmer County Community Hospital.)

Q. 1. What will a Community Health center cost?

A. Costs will vary with the completeness of the service desired and the size of the group over which the costs will be spread. Life and annual dues go to provide for the costs. Volume of membership will make the project go, and grow.

Q. 2. What is the Life Membership?

A. This is an amount assessed against each family for building and equipping a health center. The cost of a Life Membership in the Parmer County Community Hospital is \$100, payable only once, of course. Such a fee makes one an owner of the

hospital, and entitles him to a vote in the management.

Q. 3. What are the annual dues used for?

A. Annual dues build up a fund from which doctors, nurses, and other technical workers are paid. Experience has shown that complete medical care can be provided at an annual cost of \$20 to \$30 per family. The dues vary with the size of the family, \$12 for one person, \$18 for two, \$22 for three, and \$25 for four. All families of more than four pay \$2 per person extra.

Q. 4. Are doctors available?

A. The Directors feel sure of being able to get good doctors. Many doctors who are returning from the armed forces into civilian life will locate where there is good equipment, and a place where there is opportunity for service.

Q. 5. Who will control the Community Hospital?

A. The members at their regular meetings will have final control. They elect directors who carry out the wishes of the membership. Members by-laws are rules for carrying on the business of the Hospital.

Q. 6. What are the duties of the Board of Directors?

A. Directors will employ management to handle details of the business of the Health Center, and to carry out the policies of the Directors. They control expenditures of funds, require strict accounting of the funds spent, and will report on their stewardship to the members.

Q. 7. Who are the Directors?

A. Elected by the people in a meeting Aug. 14, at the American Legion Hall, the Directors are: Joe Poindexter, chairman; Sloan H. Osborn, secretary; G. B. Buse; J. L. Shaffer; and Frank A. Spring. These men will serve for one year, or until the Hospital is built and in operation, after which, a plan for the election of others will be approved by the members.

Q. 8. How was the charter obtained?

A. By preparing articles of incorporation and sending them, with ten dollars, to the Secretary of State requesting a charter under Article 302, title 32, Section 2A, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas. The Directors signed the application.

Q. 9. Since members who pay the Life Membership fee own the hospital, can they receive hospitalization free?

A. No. Since the membership fee pays for building and equipping the hospital, members still must pay, when hospitalized, for food, laundry, drugs, and dozens of other expenses required to make a hospital function smoothly. These may be provided to members at cost since the institution is non-profit. See a copy of the Service Plan for the details of the costs.

Q. 10. Can non-members receive services in the Hospital?

A. Yes, but they pay rates in line with those in other hospitals in this section.

Q. 11. Can physicians not on the regular staff do work in the Community Hospital?

A. Any licensed M. D. may do so, but said member will have to pay the fees to said doctor.

Q. 12. Must membership be paid in cash?

A. No. A plan for convenient payment may be arranged, whereby the fee will be in by the time the hospital is in operation.

Q. 13. When are annual dues payable?

A. A few weeks before the hospital is ready to be in operation, notices will be sent out for dues. When a Constitution and By-Laws are adopted a regular time for the payment of the annual dues will be approved by the members.

Q. 14. Can the membership be transferred?

A. Yes, with the approval of the Board of Directors, and a charge of \$10 to the Association.

Q. 15. Are memberships limited to any specified territory?

A. No. members may come in from any section of the County or States.

Q. 16. How soon can we have a hospital?

A. The co-operation of the people in buying memberships will have a great deal to do with that. If every one waits to buy until he sees the doctor and sees the building get started, then there will be a decided delay! Certainly we must have faith and courage to dare to do in order to get the project started.

Q. How soon will we have a doctor?

A. It is hoped that we may have a doctor on the field before the hospital is ready to operate.

### Fruit Cake Steamed In Pressure Cooker Is Moist, Keeps Better

In reply to a number of requests received from H. D. Club members and others, Miss Sadie Lee Oliver this week gave the fruit cake recipe which is rapidly becoming a favorite with Deaf Smith County housewives. Cooking in a pressure cooker, Miss Oliver points out, permits the cake to brown and at the same time prevents it from drying out.

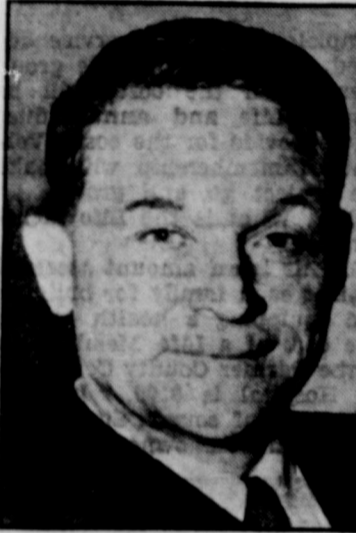
Following is the recipe and instructions for baking in pressure cooker.

- 1 lb. grapefruit peel or citron.
- 1 lb. pecans or black walnuts.
- 1 lb. candied pineapple
- 1 lb. candied cherries
- 3 lb. seedless raisins
- 1-2 cup fruit juice or sweet pickle syrup

- 1-2 lbs. figs or currants
- 1-2 lb. butter
- 1-2 lb. brown sugar
- 6 eggs.
- 1 lb. flour
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1-2 tsp. cloves
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1-4 tsp. allspice
- 1-2 tsp. salt

Wash and dry currants. Cut grapefruit peel or citron and pineapple in one-half inch cubes, leaving cherries and nuts whole. Cream the butter, sugar and beaten egg yolks. Mix flour and spices, add flour and fruit juices alternately. Add fruits and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Last of all, add the beaten egg whites. Mix dough thoroughly and place in baking pans which have been lined with brown paper which has been oiled. Cover the top of the pan with heavy brown wrapping paper which has been oiled. Tie the paper securely around the edge of the pans to prevent water getting into the cake. Place the pans in the cooker and pour boiling water into the cooker half way up the pans. Place the top on the cooker but do not fasten the clamps. Keep at the boiling point 55 minutes, then clamp the lid securely on the cooker. Close the petcock and raise the pressure to 15 pounds for 15 minutes. This dries out the crust. Makes 11 pounds.
