CHRISTIAN UNITY
Religious groups are saying much today about "Christian Unity." All are being urged to "work as one" people for the salvation of the lost of America and the world. No one who knows the teachings of the Holy Scriptures would deny that this should be done. "Unity" is certainly a Bible doctrine, and division is not only contrary to the teachings of God's Word but is sinful. Those who are guilty of causing division, or perpetuating it, must have on them the blood of all who have been influenced to line up into parties, factions, and denominations. It is, indeed, a serious matter.

In His prayer to the Father for the disciples, Jesus said, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; that they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us; that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. And the glory which thou gavest me, I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one." (John 17:20-22) Some have been known to fly in the face of this language uttered by the Son of God and encourage factions and the work of the devil. The inspired Paul said, "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgement." (1 Cor. 1:10) Here is the purpose of his injunction: "For ye are yet many, for whereas there is among you envying, and strife, and divisions, are ye not carnal, and walk as men?" (1 Cor. 3:3) To be divided religiously is to be carnally minded, and Paul said in Romans 8:6, "To be carnally minded is death." Thus, we must "dwell together in unity"—the unity taught in the Bible—and these responsible for the divisions shall suffer the death of which Paul speaks. That death is a final separation from God. (II Thess. 1:7-9).

The only basis for Christian unity or fellowship is taught in I John 1:7, "If we walk in the light as he is in the light we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his son cleanseth us from all sin." Christian unity and fellowship are not obtained by a merging of denominations, or forming some kind of "federation" in which we mutually agree that we will tolerate each other's errors and while we continue to belong to different parties and factions we will at the same time cooperate with each other and not criticize the other's errors. The principle of the only "real unity" is given by John. It is not something born of an "agreement to agree to disagree," but is the definite result of "walking together" in the same light.

Amos asked, "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" Disagreement is not unity. We might agree to let our differences be dormant, and seemingly we will be united, but in reality there still lives

that "disagreement" and so long as it lives there will live the seeds of division. The only perfect basis for "unity" is "agreement" and "Walking in the light as he is in the light." Then the natural and only result will be just Christian unity—the result of "convictions being alike and not from a human federation."

We, of the Star force, had seen many irrigation wells in action, but one good Sunday afternoon when our friend A. O. (Art) Drake, came by our shop and invited us to take a ride out in the country with him and see his well, we had never seen the process of running water onto the land where the crop was growing. Art's well is located about two and a half miles southeast of Friona, and was in operation supplying water for irrigating forty or sixty acres of nice looking barley, and we were deeply interested in watching Art as he waded about in the growing corn and the water that was flowing through it, as he opened the channels of some of the shallow sluice-ways and clogged others up with the wetted soil. We learned, also, that merely pumping the water is not all there is to successful irrigation. It just looked to us like really old downright hard work. Art also had a small acreage of rice looking wheat, that will soon be in full head. The remainder of his farm is leveled ready for a soaking before planting it to row crops.

We are informed that 100 irrigation wells within the Friona trade territory. Thanks, Art for the trip.

We asked him about the grinding of the blade of our paper cutter, but he did not know about that. This young man will also be equipped to make keys for the various kinds of locks. In fact, when he gets his business started, he will soon become an indispensable man about town.

Another thing, that we do not wish to omit is the fact that Friona has, what seems to be the most popular square-dance club in the Panhandle. Yes, we mean just that. Members of this social club include many of the most popular and most highly respected people of the Friona community. They not only have received an abundance of pure recreation for themselves, but are frequently invited to visit other towns and communities to help the people of these places to execute the square dance in the form of the reel, the cotillon and the waltz dance, and include a polka and a schottische occasionally. All these dances produce or create courtly or stately bearing or posture and graceful movements.

Neither Ben nor Ed are any longer what we term as "old men," yet one could hardly think of them as old men, and they enjoy the esteem, respect and good wishes of all their neighbors.

Wood, is that the nightly games of dominoes are still in vogue and that it is still tit-fort as to who shall wear the belt as the champion. The best we can make out of their combined information is that A. W. says that F. S. is getting old and peevish and sometimes fretful and that he just has to allow him a few games to keep him playing, and FS holds that the only time AW can make a game interesting is when he has his hide full of peanuts, and that without peanuts, there would be little interest in playing with him.

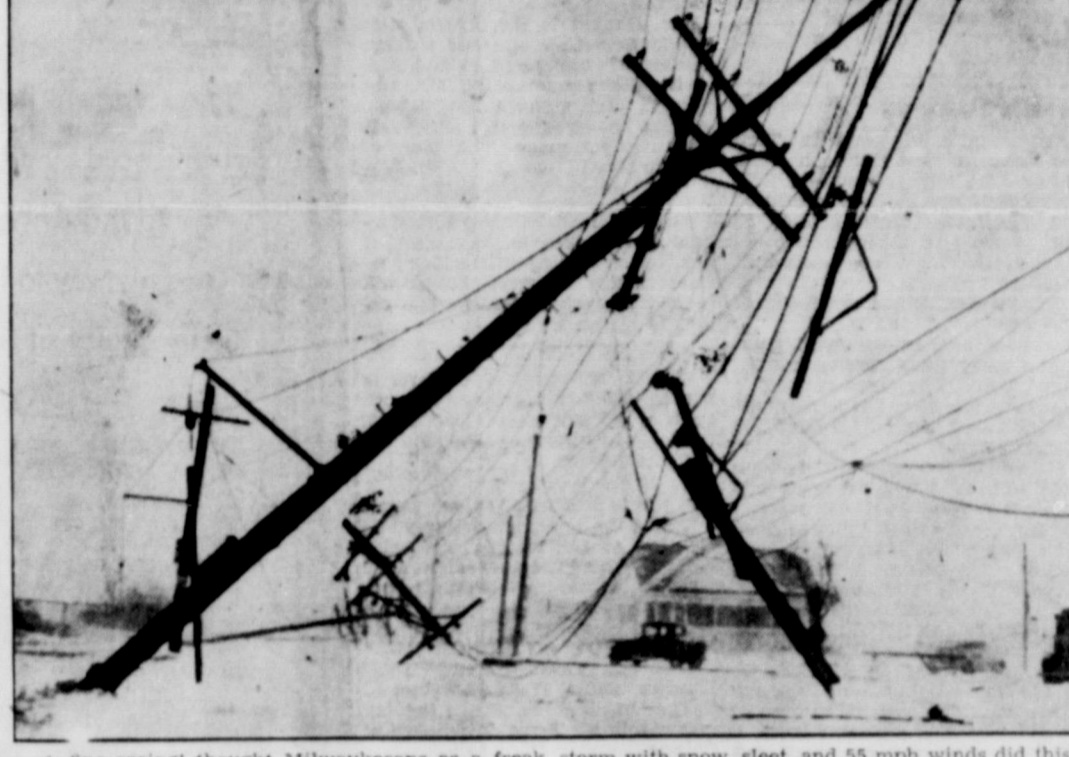
SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION ELECTIONS

SAYS LIMITED HUNGER GOOD FOR SOUL
Texan Ends Grass Diet On May 8 After 66 Day Run

TAYLOR, May 10—Elmore R. Torn of Taylor and Austin ended his strict grass diet in Saturday, May 8, after 66 days duration. Taking part with him in his first meal of round beef steak, black-eye peas, turnip greens, corn bread and country buttermilk were his family—Mrs. Torn, Elmore II, and Patricia Ann.

Torn said he would continue dehydrated cereal grasses as a prominent part of his diet and that his study of food chemistry would be intensified. From all accounts his strict diet of grass is without precedent in modern history.

At the end of his grass diet Torn was convinced that Chlorophyll had a chemurgic potential not yet fully evaluated. Too, he was confident that dehydrated cereal grasses, in time of need or emergency, could be substituted for a large amount of calories.

Torn—in his self-imposed diet of Cerophyl—substituted less than 100 calories of dehydrated cereal grasses for more than 2700 calories of other foods. The average caloric intake for the more than two months this grass diet was only around 250 calories per day.

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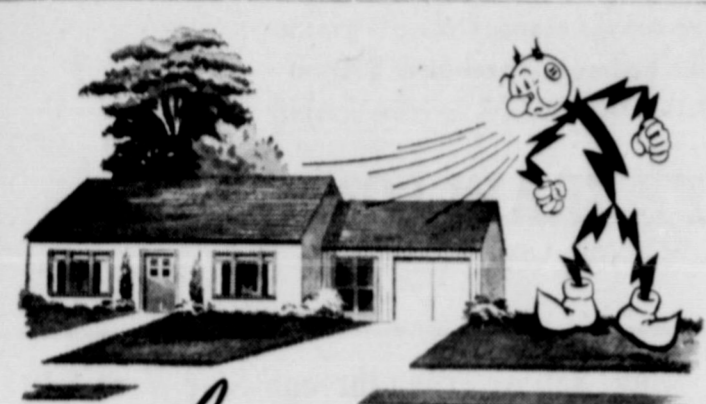

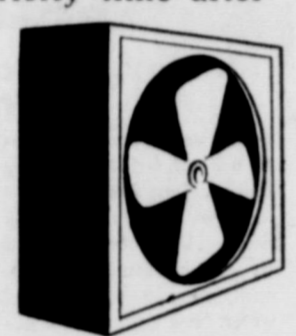

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MARKETS

(USDA)—Uneven trends at southwest farm markets left some products selling higher and some lower than a week ago, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Oats and white corn scored further gains for the week, and wheat showed some strength, but sorghums and barley closed a couple of cents lower by Monday. No. 2 white corn sold around \$2.79 a bushel in bulk carlots at Texas common points, and No. 1 wheat \$2.52 1/2. No. 2 white oats brought \$1.37 to \$1.39 at Galveston.

Cattle sold unchanged to \$1 lower than a week earlier at Texas markets and steady to \$1.50 higher at Denver and Kansas City. Oklahoma City paid to \$2 for top choice fed steers Monday, a new high for recent months, and Denver gave \$29.95 for choice heifers, highest since last September. Choice fed steers brought \$32 at Kansas City also, and good yearlings ranged around \$29.95 at Wichita. Medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings ranged at \$23 to \$28 at Texas markets.

Moderate upward and downward movements during the past week left hog markets mostly 50 cents to \$1 higher on butchers and unevenly 50 cents lower to 50 cents higher on sows. Good and choice medium weight barrows and gilts ranged largely from \$21 to \$22, and sows from \$13 to \$14.50, though Texas markets paid to \$17.

Lambs started the new week generally 50 cents to \$1 higher than a week ago, while ewes and feeder lambs showed less strength. Medium and good spring lambs sold from \$23 to \$28 at Fort Worth, as good and choice grades moved largely from \$26 to \$26.50 at Oklahoma City, and \$26.50 to \$27.50 at Wichita.

Mill buyers actively sought staple and combed grease wool in country areas.

Egg markets picked up sharply last week, following the government announcement of price support at 35 cents per dozen to the farmer and 37 cents delivered to drying plants. Poultry followed slightly weaker trends. Heavy hens brought 24 to 28 cents a pound in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and fryers 38 to 40 cents.

Spring vegetables flowed to market in increasing volume last week, but railroad embargoes on strike-threatened lines cut sharply into rail movement over the weekend. Short water supplies began to hurt crops in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, where both white and bantam corn brought lower prices, and early tomato shipments sold away below last year's levels. Onions leveled off after recent declines, and cucumbers started moving at \$6 a bushel. Citrus changed little.

Active export trade with Cuba held rice markets firm last week. Feed ruled unchanged to lower, with alfalfa meal and meat scraps showing greatest weakness. Scattered and narrow demand for hay centered on the better qualities. Seed peanuts advanced to mostly 22 cents a pound, as planting increased in southern sections.

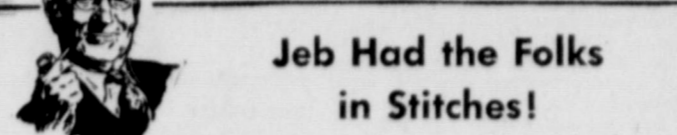

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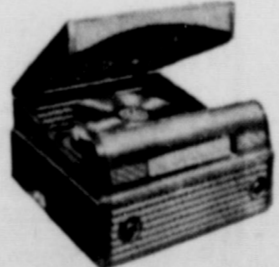

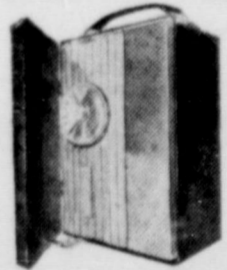
