BROTHERHOOD TO AID COAL MINERS

Convention Pledges Its Assistance, "Morally and Financially."

Houston, Tex.—The convention of the Brotherhood of Railway Firemen and Engineers Friday took the first step toward a great labor alliance when it formally endorsed the striking coal miners; passed resolutions stating "their fight is our fight," and promised every needed assistance, "morally, financially and otherwise." The action followed the program outlined at a meeting in Chicago in February, when President John L. Lewis of the mine workers advocated a union of the great labor organizations of the country.

The resolution supporting the mine workers said that at present an organized attack is being made on labor, and that only by uniting can it be resisted. A special committee is studying the question of appropriating \$50,000 monthly for ten months for the coal miners. In addition the convention authorized President Carter of the brotherhood to expend such sums for their assistance as may be necessary, giving him a free hand.

A resolution protesting the decision on the child labor law handed down by the United States supreme court and written by Chief Justice Taft was approved today in the convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

New Picture of Washington.
Lexington, Va.—Arthur Dawson, official portrait painter of the United States Military Academy, announced Tuesday he had discovered at Washington and Lee University at Lexington an original painting of George Washington by Gilbert Lee. The painting is estimated by art experts to be worth from \$75,000 to \$100,000.

Tarkington Wins Prize.
New York.—Booth Tarkington again has won the Pulitzer prize of \$1,000 for the American novel best presenting the "wholesome atmosphere of American life and the highest standards of American manners and manhood." Columbia University announced this week. The prize winning novel was "Alice Adams."

Marlin Mayor's Body Recovered.
Marlin, Tex.—Searchers last Monday recovered the body of Frank Stallworth, mayor of Marlin, from the Brazos river, into which the mayor was swept when the Belton bridge, five miles west of Marlin, caved in two weeks ago.

School Bond Vote Ordered.
Hallettsville, Tex.—The county commissioners held an election to determine whether there shall be issued bonds in the sum of \$5000 for building a new school house.

Fort Bend Jail Empty.
Richmond, Tex.—For the first time in the memory of the oldest inhabitant the Fort Bend County jail has been empty of prisoners.

Loans to Farmers of Texas.
Washington.—Approval of 23 advances for agricultural and live stock purposes aggregating \$985,000 was announced Monday by the war finance corporation. Distribution of the loan included \$200,000 in Texas.

Ten German Sailors Killed.
Berlin.—The German battleship Hanover and the torpedo boat S-18 collided during night maneuvers Thursday night near Saxnitz. Ten sailors on the S-18 were killed.

Agent Distributes Chickens.
Georgetown, Tex.—Three thousand baby chickens have been distributed among the farmers and chicken fanciers of this section of Williamson County by County Agent G. L. Crawford during the past 15 or 20 days.

Gusher Near Vinton.
Lake Charles, La.—It is estimated by oil experts that a 15,000-barrel gusher came in Wednesday in wildcat territory in the west side of Vinton oil field, owned by Marrs McClain.

British Officer Shot.
Cairo, Egypt.—Wilfred Cave, a British officer, assistant commandant of police at Cairo, was shot and killed Thursday while returning home from a bicycling trip.

Buffalo Increase.
Wainwright, Alberta.—The increase in buffalo in the park here during 1921 was 534, the herd now numbering 5152.

Ten persons are known to have been killed and at least sixty injured in an explosion in an ammunition factory at Blauenas near Vienna, Austria. The force of the explosion destroyed or damaged all the houses in the town.

Signature by President Harding of the bill recently passed by congress to strengthen the Harrison anti-narcotic act was announced Friday at the White House. The president also has signed department of interior appropriation bills.

FREIGHT RATES CUT 10 PER CENT

Cost of Shipping Live Stock Cotton and Other Basic Products Will Drop.

Washington.—Railroad freight rates to be reduced on July 1 by amounts equal to 10 per cent of their present levels under a decision of the interstate commerce commission announced Wednesday. Practically all classes and commodities of traffic are affected by the decision which marked the conclusion of the investigation begun last autumn by the commission, on its own initiative, into the reasonableness of existing freight levels.

Agricultural products in all sections of the country side of New England, live stock and Western grain, and grain products are the chief commodities excluded from the reduction, these comprising the freight classifications on which reductions recently have been put into effect. Passenger charges and Pullman fares also are left unchanged by Wednesday's decision.

Statistics have agreed that the reduction in freight rates ordered by the interstate commerce commission Wednesday amounts to exactly 10 per cent and not to 14 per cent, as was claimed shortly following delivery of the opinion. This percentage of reduction is found to be correct as applied to all of the rate groups, and that the reduction is 10 per cent of the present rates, or, more explicitly speaking, the rates in effect after the percentage increases under ex parte 74 had been applied.

As an illustration, rates in the Western rate group took a 35 per cent increase. Where the rate was \$1 it became \$1.35.

The commission's opinion cut that percentage to 21 1/2 effective July 1, which makes the \$1 rate \$1.21 1/2, or 13 1/2 less than the existing rate. This is a 10 per cent drop.

Roughly speaking, the Southwestern shipper may take his freight bills for any given period since the rates under case ex parte 74 have been in effect and with a reduction of 10 per cent under the decision of yesterday.

The 20 per cent in live stock rates of more than 50c per 100 made some time ago and listed to expire June 30 will not expire on that date, but continue so reduced. That, however, being 20 per cent reduction, would receive nothing additional by the opinion.

Prison Inmates Increase During Month, Report

Austin, Tex.—The monthly report of the board of prison commissioners of the Texas state penitentiary for the month of April, just issued, shows that there were 3411 convicts on hand at the end of the month. The report shows that there were 3333 on hand on the first of April, 165 new convicts were received during the month, nine were recaptured, one was returned by a sheriff and three were returned for violation of parole.

During the month 80 were discharged, eight escaped, six died, four were delivered to sheriffs and two were paroled.

A recapitulation of the distribution of the forces shows the total number of convicts in Huntsville prison to be 389; total number in insane asylums 186; total number on state owned farms 2809; and the total number on state leased farms 197.

Those that died during the month and the place where stationed were in the order named: Needham Timmons, Darrington; Howard Robinson, gunshot wound; Blakely; Gus Armstrong, Ramsey farm; Harrison Madison and Isaac Jones, Wynne; and Nieves Zaccus, Rusk asylum.

The largest number of convicts received were from El Paso county. There were 29 convicts sent to the penitentiary from there, during the month. Of the larger counties of the state, Tarrant county sent nine, Harris four, Galveston six and Dallas three.

Other counties contributing more than five inmates to the penitentiary were Wood with seven, Fort Bend six, Caldwell seven and Fannin six.

VOLUME OF CRUDE EXPORTS LARGER

Washington.—Crude oil to the amount of 38,000,000 gallons was exported during the month of April, as reported by the department of commerce, it having a total value of \$1,750,000. During April a year ago the exportations of crude were 31,000,000 gallons, but valued at slightly more than \$2,000,000.

For the ten months crude oil to the amount of 316,000,000 gallons went abroad, valued, however, at only \$13,000,000, compared with less oil for the same ten months of last year, with double the value. There was an increase from 210,000,000 to 221,000,000 gallons of refined products which went abroad in April of this year, the value of which was \$2,750,000, or \$9,000,000 under April of 1921. For the ten months, however, the exportations of refined products amounted to \$250,250,000, about half of the value during 1921.

The exportation of gasoline and other light products for April was valued at \$12,500,000, illuminating oils \$7,600,000; gas and fuel oil, \$1,500,000, and lubricants \$6,000,000, all of which were decreases compared with the same month a year ago; while paraffin to the value of \$626,000 was a slight increase.

Total Lost in Ship Wreck.
Brest, France.—The British vice consul has announced that 102 of those who were on board the British steamship Egypt, sunk off the island of Ushant Saturday, are missing, of whom 18 were passengers and 86 members of the crew. Twenty-eight passengers were saved, together with 204 members of the crew. Mrs. M. L. Sibley and Miss V. M. Boyer, American missionaries, are among those missing and presumably lost. Many of the dead brought in by boats were wearing life belts. They had evidently died from exhaustion.

Young McAdoo Marries.
New York.—William G. McAdoo, Jr., son of the former secretary of the treasury, was married at the municipal building Monday to Mrs. Mollie Tackaberry Ferguson. The bride, who said she was born in England, was divorced last March from Armour Ferguson of New York. Both gave their ages as 27.

Retired Rear Admiral Dead.
Dobbs Ferry, N. Y.—Rear Admiral Henry M. Dennison, U. S. N., retired, died Tuesday at Dobbs Ferry.

Denies Revolution.
Washington.—American Minister Wilton at Sofia, in a report to the state department this week, denied that a revolution had occurred in the Bulgarian capital and that King Boris did not flee, as recently reported from Vienna. The minister said conditions in Sofia were normal, though the political situation was threatening.

Glaciers Are Melting.
Geneva.—The heat wave in the Alps region has broken a ninety-year record for the month of May, the thermometer at a number of points registering 90 degrees Fahrenheit. Snow and glaciers are melting rapidly and the Rhine and Rhone rivers are rising.

Sell Big Lot of Wool.
Corstensa, Tex.—The wool growers who live near Corstensa sold 8000 pounds of wool at from 15 to 25 cents per pound.

STATE BUDGET MAY NEED \$26,500,000

Estimates to Be Made Now for Expenses for the Next Two Years.

Austin, Tex.—The state board of control is forwarding the budget requisition blanks to the heads of the various state departments and institutions on which to itemize appropriations needed for the two years beginning September 1, 1923. It was the board of control law that inaugurated the first budget system for Texas and the board is asking that this data be supplied as early as possible and not later than July 1. Its members propose to visit the various institutions and departments during late June and early July preparatory to formulating the budgets for the biennium.

Chairman S. B. Cowell of the board estimated this week that the aggregate to be recommended for the two years will be about \$26,500,000, as against \$24,478,000 two years ago, when its first budget was constructed. An increase of 8 per cent is expected.

Two years ago the requisitions by the various departments and institution heads reached \$40,000,000, and was cut to less than \$25,000,000. It is expected that the demands to be made this two-year period will be as large as usual and will be cut again.

"We hope to find enough money to resume a modest building program," said Chairman Cowell, "especially at the state asylums, which are now crowded beyond capacity. We also have a crying need for dormitories at the College of Industrial Arts, the A. and M. College, Grubb Vocational College and the John Tarlton Junior Agricultural College. Besides that the main building and auditorium at the North Texas Normal have been condemned and that institution will seek funds for new construction."

Mr. Cowell said that while the units constructed at the Northwest Texas Insane Asylum at Wichita Falls contemplate 2,000 patients, the dormitories can be crowded to accommodate only 400 inmates and that all of the other insane asylums are caring for more than their recognized capacity. Large additional dormitory facilities, therefore, are needed at Wichita Falls. Two new dormitories are also needed at the Rusk asylum, one for whites and one for negroes.

According to Chairman Cowell the Tarrant county jail recently sent nine patients to the Wichita Falls and now has thirty-one more awaiting accommodation in the asylums. Other jails contain insane, he declared, until the present capacity of all the institutions will be filled.

Originally the Wichita Falls asylum was designed to accord the latest scientific treatment to the insane and to take only those cases classed as having a chance for recovery or material improvement, but because of the many insane in the jails it has been found necessary to receive all classes at the newest state institution for the insane.

The blanks adopted by the board of control are made so as to afford instant comparison of all items and whether same are new or not. The sheets are divided into four groupings. The first group asks for the appropriations by items, each of the years ending August, 1921, 1922 and 1923. The second group calls for the amounts expended, by items, for each of the years ending August 31, 1921 and 1922. The third group seeks the amount requested by items, for each of the years ending August 31, 1924 and 1925, and the last group is for the board's recommendation in every instance for each of the last two years.

INSPECTION OF STATE'S SHORT ROAD COMPLETED

Austin, Tex.—Lieutenant Governor Lynch Davidson, chairman of the board of managers of the state railroad, visited Austin this week following an inspection of the property, which has been relaid with eighty-pound steel and is now operated by the Southern Pacific under lease.

Governor Davidson says the roadbed is in fine condition; that the heavy mogul locomotives operate over it; and that trains have made as high as fifty miles per hour. He also declared that the company is doing a fine business with a 100 per cent increase for May over April and that next month it will handle 150 cars of tomatoes originating on its rails. The passenger business is also reported as satisfactory.

Death Follows Identification.
Waco, Tex.—At the home of the young woman whom he assaulted Thursday night, after killing her escort, a negro, Jesse Thomas, who was positively identified by Mrs. Margie Hays, 26 years old, as her assailant and the slayer of Harrel Bolton, paid the penalty with his life Friday. He was shot and killed by Sam Harris, father of Mrs. Hays, who began firing as soon as his daughter exclaimed "that's the man, papa." The body was later burned by a large crowd.

Texas News

The issue to raise the school taxes in Center was defeated in an election Saturday by a vote of 143 to 107.

The De Witt County Poultry Association has been reorganized with an active list of members.

A good roads bond issue of \$500,000 was voted Saturday by good roads district No. 1 of commissioners precinct No. 3, Fort Bend county.

The attorney general's department has approved a \$150,000 bond issue of Robertson county road district No. 7, the bonds maturing in forty years and bearing 5 per cent interest.

According to W. R. Nesbit, county farm demonstration agent at Palestine, 150 acres in sweet potatoes have been pledged by local growers who have formed an association for co-operative marketing.

The state fire insurance commission has awarded the maximum good fire record credit of 15 per cent off the final rate to Rusk and Lyford on three-year loss ratios of 212 and 319, respectively.

The Texas railroad commission has approved the application of the Orange and Northwestern railroad company en route arrangement, at Orange, on cordwood in carload lots when used in the manufacture of paper.

One span of the Jones iron bridge across the Brazos river west of Bryan on the Brazos county side of the river has fallen from the piers, and that important thoroughfare is now closed to traffic. The accident was caused by erosion of the bank due to the continued high water.

The attorney general this week held that a corporation with dual purposes must pay the annual franchise tax on the full capital stock for each purpose enumerated in its charter.

The supreme court of Texas has declared unconstitutional part 5, of article 5695, revised civil statutes of 1911, concerning limitation of vendor's lien notes, holding that while the rest of the article was valid, this paragraph, which sought to make distinction between limitations on debts before and after June 14, 1905, was discriminatory.

Chambers county has called upon local interests to co-operate with it in building a hard-surfaced road from Beaumont to High Island, Galveston county. Jefferson county has a paved road to the Chambers county line and Galveston county has a paved road from High Island to the Chambers county line. There remains a link of about fifteen miles to be hard-surfaced.

New regulations governing the dipping of hogs when shipped for immediate use are expected to be drafted with the return to Fort Worth of K. E. Bogg Scott, chairman of the live stock sanitary commission, who is in South Texas on a tour of inspection.

At the closing business session of the fourth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Plainview, Texas, A. B. Spencer of Crosbyton was elected president, while as vice presidents the following were named: J. A. Kemp, Wichita Falls; Carl S. Guinn, Hallinger; J. F. Hartford, Post; G. E. Lockhart, Tahoka; C. H. Fulwiler, Breckenridge, and Dr. P. C. Coleman, Colorado City.

Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Ed Hall has inaugurated plans for the creation of an independent nonpartisan Texas bureau for the supervision of workmen's compensation insurance ratings and regulations.

All South Texas has joined in the war on the Texas fever cattle tick, T. W. Hawkins, state district tick inspector, declared this week upon his return to Houston from a trip to Washington, Austin, Waller and other nearby counties. The tick fighting organization of inspectors for Harris County has almost been perfected and tick eradication, which thus far has been sporadic, will within a few days be thoroughly systematized and each inspector assigned to a section of his own.

Indications are for an East Texas tomato crop of approximately 1,600 cars, according to a survey being made by experts.

A \$500,000 bond issue has carried in road district No. 1 for the purpose of constructing a hard-surfaced road from the Fort Bend County line through Sugarland to the Brazos River, together with several lateral roads, absorbing an issue of \$108,000 of a \$150,000 issue made some years ago.

When this road is completed and the bridge constructed over the Brazos at Richmond it is probable that it will be extended on west to the county line. This will give Richmond an excellent highway to Houston.

CROP CONDITIONS IN SOUTH TEXAS

Farmers Preparing for Shortage in Many Lines That Is Likely to Come.

Houston, Tex.—The condition of crops in South Texas at this time varies from flooded farm to needs for moisture and anxiety over the amount of time available in which replanting may be successfully completed.

A report from San Augustine County stated that the cotton crop in that section is looking fairly well, considering the wet spring, and that the stand is fairly good, reasonably clean and moderately cultivated.

In Williamson County and also in De Witt County farmers are taking great interest in poultry. Through the poultry association of that county, many farmers are ordering infant chicks from Lockhart, New Braunfels and other Texas points.

The watermelon and cucumber crops in the vicinity of El Campo are reported to be in fine shape, the vines being long and in good color. Something like 125 acres have been planted there and shipment of cucumbers is expected to begin in two weeks.

The fields in the Lockhart section are too wet again for farming. The rains have made it impossible to continue operations for a few more days.

During the five days preceding the rain every farm animal in that section that could pull a plow or cultivate was mustered into service in an effort to save the farm from weeds and grass.

The same condition practically obtained at Timpan. The outlook for a harvest there has been greatly reduced on account of the recent rains. Indications in that section point to a shortage of crops of every variety especially corn.

Cotton.—Prices for spot cotton advanced 19 points during the week closing at 19.99c per lb. New York July futures declined 3 points, closing at 20.35c.

Fort Worth Stock Market. Fort Worth, Tex.—Moderate receipts arrived in all divisions of the stock yards Friday and the market was notably unchanged.
