Texas News

Feed crops in San Patricio county are good.

A new steamship service between Houston and Mexican ports has been announced.

The Woodville independent school district has voted to increase the local tax rate from 50c to \$1.

Bond issues of Houston totaling \$1,400,000 have been approved by Attorney General Keeling at Austin.

Growers of soft shell pecans in Lockhart report trees fairly loaded with nuts and the crop will be a very good one.

The Young Men's Business League of Gonzales has just completed an old-fashioned swimming hole on Guadalupe River near that city.

There are more new buildings in course of construction in Huntville at this time than for any one time since long before the war.

The hot, dry weather of the past few days has been ideal for the cotton crop and cotton fields in the Luling section are in full bloom.

The rice crop in that section of Jefferson county adjoining Hardin County on the southeast, is approximately better than at this time last year.

The work of excavating for the new fireproof school building of Groesbeck was started this week, and it is expected that work will be pushed with all possible haste.

Important matters in regard to Texas roads will be brought up at the gathering of the Texas Highway Association in Galveston, August 3, 4 and 5 it was announced this week.

The attorney general's department has approved an issue of \$300,000 street improvement bonds of the city of Breckenridge, the bonds maturing serially and bearing 6 per cent interest.

The railroad commission has approved the issuance of \$850,000 capital stock by the Wichita Falls & Southern Railway Company, and the registration of first mortgage bonds aggregating \$488,000.

The special election held in Bowie County voted in favor of the issuance of \$65,000 bridges bonds by a close margin. The voting of these bonds means that three bridges will be built without delay across Sulphur River.

Reconstruction of the railway bridge across the Rio Grande, connecting Eagle Pass with Piedra y Negras, was agreed upon at a conference of officials of the Southern Pacific railroad and the Mexican National lines. The old bridge was destroyed by the recent heavy flood.

It was announced this week that the leased wire in the United States department of agriculture will not be opened until September 1, instead of July 1, as previously expected. When opened it will carry full market reports for the Texas department, which will disseminate it over the state.

Members of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union of Texas will open their twentieth annual convention July 11 at Corro, Texas, and will remain in session three days, or until all business has been completed. Officers for the ensuing year will be elected and plans made for marketing the produce of this year to the best advantage.

Texas has about 4,600,000 beef cattle upon her ranches in addition to about 1,500,000 dairy cattle. The state leads in beef production. Texas also leads in the number of goats, with approximately 1,700,000 and mules with a total number of 850,000. There are 990,000 horses on Texas farms, 2,573,000 sheep, 2,225,000 hogs and 29,800,000 chickens and turkeys.

The Rio Grande, which for two days had poured an unprecedented volume of water along its course from the Big Bend country of Texas to the Gulf of Mexico, has passed the danger stage everywhere.

Texas is coming rapidly to the front as the producer of the most diversified farm crop of the union. The plains regions are rapidly developing into great wheat and grain sorghum producing areas, while the Rio Grande valley, gulf coast country and East Texas regions are rivaling California and Florida as producers of vegetables for the early markets of the North.

Texas possesses one of the largest iron ore deposits in the United States. This deposit underlies 5000 square miles of land in the vicinity of Rusk in East Texas and contains a 60 per cent metallic brown ore. Attempts to develop this deposit have not been very successful to date, due to the lack of a source of fuel, but new processes of retorting lignite are expected to produce an abundance of fuel for this purpose within the next few years.

In the number of cases filed and opinions written, the term of the court of criminal appeals which ended June 25 at Austin, is without precedent, according to Olin W. Finger, clerk of the court. Cases filed numbered 768, which is 252 more than filed during the preceding term and 352 more than the 1929 term. The increase over the last term was practically 50 per cent at the term just ended. There were 801 cases disposed of on original hearing and 147 on motion for rehearing, making a total of 748 opinions handed down by the court.

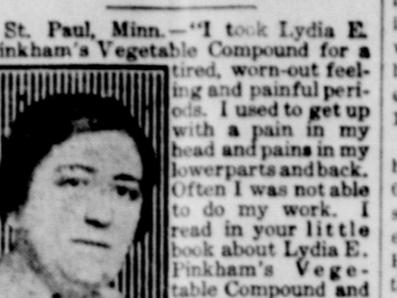

Millions Are Paid To Osage Indians

Pawhuska, Okla.—The Osage Indians, the richest aborigines in the world, were made millions of dollars richer Wednesday when all records were broken at the oil and gas lease sale held by the government at Pawhuska. Exactly \$10,887,950 was realized from the auction, of which there were 163 tracts, sold for \$502,950.

The Gypsy Oil company holds the high record for bids by paying \$1,600,000 for tract No. 42, located in the southeast quarter of section 24-27-5 east. The Skelly Oil company and Phillips Petroleum corporation bought the second highest priced tract, being No. 27, located in the southwest of 19-27-6 east, for which \$1,585,000 was paid. The Gypsy Oil company paid a cool million dollars for tract No. 30 in the northwest of section 29-27-6 and the Phillips Petroleum corporation bought tract No. 43 in the southwest of 24-27-5 east for \$1,005,000.

A high mark was reached on the west side of the Burbank pool, when Waite Phillips paid \$665,000 for tract No. 46, located in the southeast of section 35-27-5 east.

CANTALOUPE ACREAGE OF SIXTEEN STATES 58,310
Washington.—The acreage of cantaloupes in 16 of the late-producing states is estimated by the United States department of agriculture at 58,310 acres, as compared with 47,230 acres in 1921.

Colorado has the largest acreage with 16,000 acres, as compared with 8200 acres last year. Next is Arkansas with 8610 acres, as compared with 10,290 acres in 1921; California, 7830 acres, as compared with 6500 acres last year; and Maryland 6310 acres, as compared with 5480 acres.

The commercial acreage of late onions in 20 states is estimated by the department at 43,325 acres, as compared with 42,370 acres this year; New York has 7620 acres this year; California 7300 acres. The acreage in Texas has increased from 800 acres last year to 2500 acres this year.

The commercial acreage of late watermelons in 11 states is estimated at 45,700 acres, as compared with 43,410 acres in 1921. Missouri is the largest producing state with 10,410 acres. Oklahoma is next with 7310 acres.

Search for Oil.
Marlin, Tex.—The search for oil in Falls county is becoming widespread. In addition to the operations in the Deer Creek section, seven miles west from Marlin, where the Gray & Hennessy company has a well at 1047 feet, yielding, estimated, 100 barrels per day, there are a number of isolated tests being drilled and as far westward as Rosebud.

Several Bonds Approved.
Austin, Tex.—The attorney general's department has approved a \$10,000 bond issue of Bexar County Common School District No. 45. The bonds mature serially and bear 6 per cent interest. Other issues approved are: Anahuac Independent School District, \$15,000; maturing in forty years with 15-year option, 6 per cent; Peniel Independent School District, \$2,000, serially, 6 per cent.

Mexia Has Vast Output.
Mexico, Tex.—During the last twelve months the Mexia field has produced more than 27,000,000 barrels of oil, for which between \$30,000,000 and \$40,000,000 has been received by companies and individuals interested in this vast output. There are more than 475 producers in the field.

Leopard Caught.

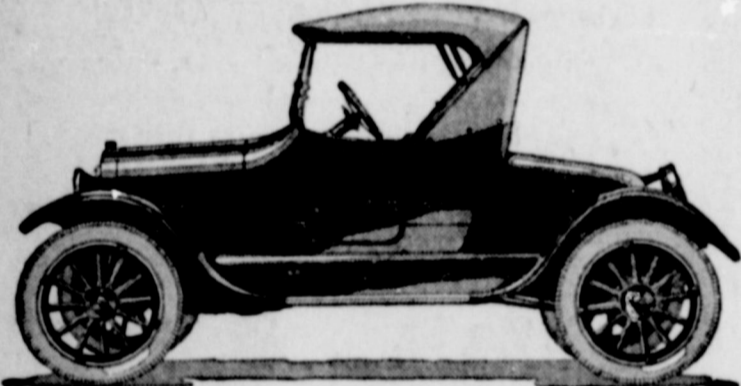

BRITISH OIL CAMP TAKEN BY REBELS

Demand Ransom for the Surrender of Property and Employes.

Washington—The state department was officially advised in a message from Charge Summerlin at Mexico City Thursday of the release of Bruce Bielaski. Mr. Summerlin said he had received a telegram from Punta Ixtla, near where Bielaski was captured by bandits, stating that he was there "safe and well."

Advices Friday to the state department from Tampico served to change materially the situation in the Mexican oil region resulting from the holding for ransom, by a rebel band, of 40 American employes at the Aguaba camp of the Cortez Oil Company, an American-owned concern. Consul Shaw reported that the rebel chief, Gorozave, and his men left the camp Monday morning after a 24-hour stay. The message, dated Wednesday, seemed to have cleared the air, but on its heels came another dispatch, filed by the consul, saying that the rebels had seized the Pecera camp of the British owned La Corona company, and that about half a dozen Americans were among the 85 men held there.

In demanding 9000 pesos for the surrender of the Pecera property and the employes, the rebels fixed July 2 as the date by which payment must be made. Whether the 15,000 pesos demanded at the camp was paid, was not stated in any of the messages received.

The state department promptly instructed Charge Summerlin at Mexico City to make representations in regard to adequate protection for any American held in connection with the new raid on the British-owned company. Mr. Summerlin also was directed to press Mexican federal authorities to capture and punish bandits who captured A. Bruce Bielaski.

Beyond these new representations to the Oregon government, there was no indication the state department intended to move at present. It was pointed out that the department was not in possession of any information tending to show that the raids in the oil region were more than they appeared to be on the face of Consul Shaw's reports, the operations of bandits levying or seeking to levy tribute on the oil companies. If President Oregon or his officials have any data tending to show that his political enemies are responsible for the outbreak in the Tampico region they have not seen fit to communicate that information to Washington as yet.

In any case, both official and unofficial advices showed that the Oregon government was moving additional troops into the Tampico district for the evident purpose of suppressing rebel or bandit activities. It is generally assumed in Washington that sufficient troops will be distributed about the district to prevent such raids as those of Gorozave as quickly as possible.

It was evident also from the reports, official or otherwise, reaching Washington from the oil region during the week, that communication with the outlying camps is slow, at best, and that detailed accounts of what took place at the Aguaba property have been unavailable as yet to Consul Shaw. He did report, however, that Gorozave, on leaving the American camp Monday, threatened to return and seize the nearby British Pecera camp and also property of the Mexican and Gulf Oil Company in the same region. The rebel chief made good on a part of this threat at least.

Killed Along Mexican Border.

Calexico, Cal.—Twenty-one men have been killed in and around Mexico, Lower California, in the last two weeks, according to official reports in Calexico, just across the international line. This compilation was made Thursday following the discovery of eight dead Mexicans two and a half miles east of Calexico, one of the bodies being in an irrigation ditch on the American side of the boundary.

Names of Rathenau Murderers.

Berlin.—The police officially announce that the murderers of Dr. Walter Rathenau, foreign minister, were Ernest Werner Techow of Berlin, Fischer alias Vogel, a Saxon, and Knauer, alias Koener or Kern, of Mecklenberg.

Robstown Guard Recognized.

Robstown, Tex.—Company C of the 141st infantry, Texas National Guard, with headquarters at Robstown, has received federal recognition as a guard unit, according to Captain Taylor Nichols, company commander.

Highway Being Marked.

Center, Tex.—Under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce, the Roger Q. Mills highway has been marked through this county. It traverses Shelby County from north to south, passing through Center and entering Nacogdoches County at Grigsby.

Russian Leader Suffers Stroke.

Berlin.—Nikolai Lenine has suffered an attack of spinal paralysis according to Emile Vanderveide, former Belgian minister of justice.

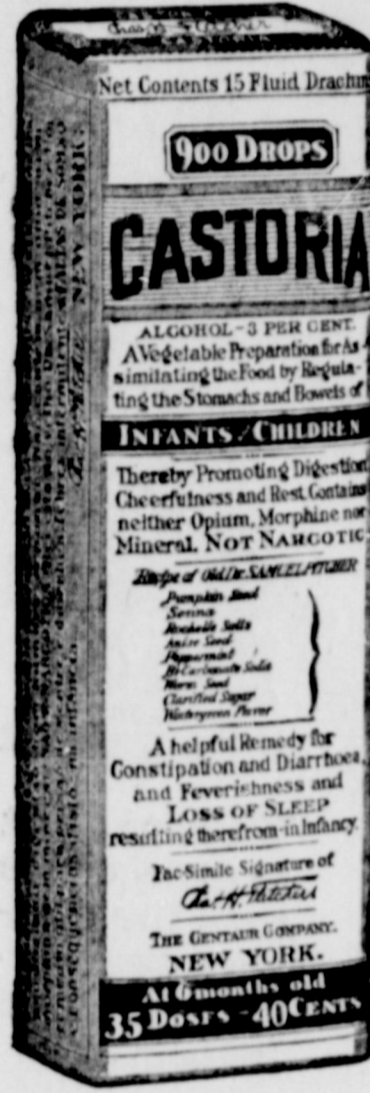

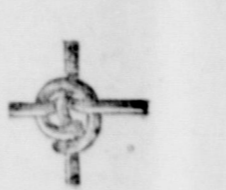
