District Court convened Monday morning with Hon. Judge Joseph Jones presiding and District Attorney J. Q. Henry and Official Court Reporter, R. R. Morgan present. John Bolin and Jesse Mansfield acting as bailiffs.

Among the out of town Attorneys attending District Court are: Wright, of San Angelo; Teagarten, Houston; W. W. Boggess, George Thurmond, and C. C. Belcher, Del Rio; Whittaker of El Paso.

The grand jury convened Monday morning and remained in session until Thursday, bringing in three indictments.

Among the civil cases disposed of by the court were: I. E. Gartin vs. G. J. Meckel dismissed by agreement. Jesse Dunne vs. Edward J. Dunne, divorce granted plaintiff. Juanita Vasquez de Ortez vs. Estebane Ortez divorce granted.

In the case of Ben Dawson vs. the G. H. & S. A. Railway, the Court instructed the jury to bring in a verdict in favor of the defendant.

In the case of Jack Dale, charged with theft, the jury brought in a verdict of a two years suspended sentence.

The case of Frank Nowak, charged with swindling, went to trial at 9 o'clock this morning.

STRIKERS DANCE A BIG SUCCESS

The dance given last Saturday night at the Aviation Camp by the striking shopmen of Sanderson was a big success, socially and financially.

The dancing started about 8:45, and from that time until midnight it was one continual round of pleasure, scores of people dancing to the delightful strains of music. The dancing took place in the barracks, which were well lighted and there was plenty of room. A piano had been moved out early in the evening and with it a guitar, violin, and cornet there was lots of good music for the occasion.

Miss Katherine Hall performed at the piano, assisted by Miss Kathleen Buck and Mrs. Ray Callwell. Roland McConnell played the violin, Juan Lopez the cornet and Anarato Falcon the guitar. The piano used for the dance was furnished by Mrs. John Whistler. John Neal was chairman of the music committee.

A free jitney service was established by the strikers, running every few minutes from the Bohlman corner to the camp and many people were hauled to the camp and back in these cars. The crowd at the dance was the largest ever seen at an occasion of this kind in Sanderson, and showed the sympathy of the people for the striking shopmen.

Free lemonade was served to all on the grounds by the strikers.

One room in the barracks was set aside for Mexican dancers and they seemed to enjoy the evening as well as did the Americans.

One feature of the entertainment was an old-fashioned square dance, that was amusing and interesting to all.

There was no charge for dancing, only a free-will offering, and this netted the magnificent sum of \$59.72, about \$52 of this being clear money.

The committee in charge of the dance, and the striking shopmen as a whole, extend thanks to the people for their attendance and liberal patronage.

British Columbia Goat Farms.

There are several farms in British Columbia where goats are raised exclusively and which have herds of several hundred each. These farms not only make excellent profits on milk which is shipped to Vancouver, Victoria and other cities for the use of children and invalids, but on young animals that are sold to supply the rapidly developing market.

Goat breeding is being taken up by suburban city dwellers, the people of small towns and farmers. Goats are hardy animals and if permitted a good range will rustle their own living the year around. If kept confined, their upkeep is inexpensive while their milk sells for a much higher price than cow's milk. Yields of six quarts a day are common.

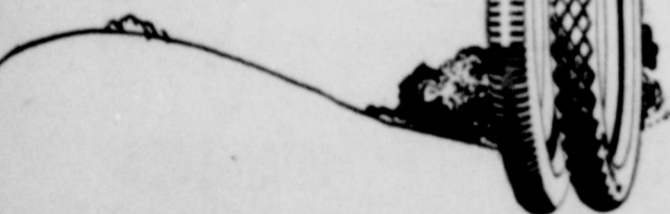

Texas News

The attorney general's department has approved a \$24,000 bond issue of Red River county road district No. 16 bonds. The bonds to mature in 40 years and payable in 20 and bearing 5 per cent interest.

Sixteen cases have been filed in the court of criminal appeals at Austin since the court adjourned for the term on June 23. Of these new cases five are appeals in cases where there have been conviction of violations of the liquor laws of the state.

Construction crews are working on the Trinity County link of the Jim Hoag highway. The work will be pushed as rapidly as possible.

Crop conditions in Victoria County are in exceptionally good shape and look better than they have for several years past. An excellent corn crop was made and the cotton outlook can not be overcast.

The Chamber of Commerce has taken up the matter of establishing a number of white ways in the business section of Corsicana.

The ferry across the Brazos river at Richmond has been opened for traffic and will be used until the new bridge is built across the Brazos, for which a bond issue of \$100,000 was carried in the election Saturday.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Freestone County Fair Association held at Fairfield the date for the holding of the fair at Teague next fall was set for Sept. 26, 27 and 28. On Sept. 28 it is planned to have an auction sale of thoroughbred stock of all kinds.

A fund of \$299,000, made available by the sale of bonds, which were voted something like two years ago, will be applied at once to an extensive highway building program throughout district No. 3, of which Kountze, the county seat, and Silsbee are the principal communities.

A foreign life insurance company must show that its authorized capital has been fully paid up before it can be granted a certificate authorizing it to transact business in Texas, according to an opinion given by the attorney general's department to Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Ed Hall.

There are now 3,521 convicts in the Texas penitentiary, the highest mark in fifteen years. The net prison population has been gradually climbing. It was 2,500 when Governor Neff was inducted into office in January, 1920. The highest record was slightly over 4,000 more than fifteen years ago.

At a meeting of the commissioners court of Washington County, plans were adopted as submitted by Engineer Bracher for the north and south highway through Washington County. This highway will be constructed when work is completed on the thirty-three miles to the east and west highway.

Coast guards in the Galveston district rendered assistance to 114 vessels, aboard which there were 550 persons, during the fiscal year just ended, according to the annual report of Captain James F. Phillips, superintendent. There were no casualties. The value of the property involved was given as \$222,995. Damage to the extent of \$46,405 was sustained. The recovery of the bodies of three victims of accidental drowning by members of Station No. 217 on Pelican Spit was also reported.

The combined grain exports from Galveston and Texas City for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$2,853,618 bushels, according to a recapitulation of Galveston figures for the twelve months, issued by H. A. Wickstrom, chief grain inspector of the Galveston Cotton Exchange and Board of Trade, and official totals compiled by the Texas City Board of Trade. The exports were divided as follows: Wheat, 45,399,895 bushels Galveston, 6,069,332 Texas City; corn, 9,525 bushels Galveston, 2,720,434 Texas City; rye, 627,280 bushels Galveston, 137,142 Texas City.

The federal prohibition agents working in Texas seized during June 46 stills, 26 still worms, 353 gallons of moonshine whiskey, 177 gallons of malt liquor, 62 gallons of wine, 7,195 gallons of mash and 742 containers used in fermenting mash, according to Federal Prohibition Agent David H. Morris. Agents also destroyed property amounting to \$2,200, seized and stored property amounting to \$6,842, and 130 pounds of sugar and 640 pounds of malt and hops. The agents arrested 368 persons in June for violation of the Volstead act.

A reward offered by the board of prison commissioners, with the approval of the governor, for the arrest and delivery of an escaped convict to the penitentiary authorities, or to any jail in the United States, after being identified, may be paid by the board of prison commissioners to the widow of a sheriff who, acting upon such offer, is killed by such convict in an attempt by such sheriff to apprehend the convict although the convict is killed by the sheriff in his effort to effect such apprehension, according to a ruling given this week.

ACREAGE PLANTED TO COTTON IN TEXAS

Figured at 12,312,000 Acres By U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Houston, Tex.—The Texas cotton acreage is estimated to be 12,312,000 acres, as compared with 11,193,000 acres, the revised estimate of acreage in cultivation a year ago, being an increase of 1,119,000 acres, or 10 per cent.

The condition of the growing crop on June 25, 1922, was 72 per cent of a normal condition, as compared with 72 on June 25, 1921, and 78, the average condition for the past ten years on June 25.

A condition of 72 on June 25 forecasts a yield per acre of about 137 pounds and a total production of about 3,525,800 bales, 500 pounds gross weight, not including linters.

In the northwest district, especially on the plains, where there was a greatly reduced acreage last year on account of the then existing low price of cotton, the land went largely to winter wheat, the reverse has occurred this year. The failure of most of the wheat planted, because of the fall and winter drought in that part of the state, with a prospect of a good price for cotton, has caused more than three-fourths of the abandoned wheat land to be planted in cotton, in addition to new lands easily converted in that section. Largely, the same is true of the middle west district, in the western part. In the south district, the increases which are large, are found particularly in the neighborhood of counties to Nueces, and south of that county to the Rio Grande river. Increases in the other districts would have been large, but for the almost continuous rains during April and the early part of May. That part of the center district, subject to floods and washing rains, as reported last month, estimated at 500,000 acres, has practically all been replanted to cotton and other crops. The net loss to cotton being about 200,000 acres. This loss, however, has been about overcome, by increased planting within the district, on lands not subject to floods, in all districts, the very open winter and the favorable condition for plowing, caused a greater preparation of land for planting than has been known in many years.

There has been a remarkable improvement over the very low condition reported last month. Never at this season, has there been a more healthy, vigorous crop than is now witnessed in the state as a whole. And except for parts of certain districts, where to many replantings occurred, there has never been a better stand. The crop is now estimated to be less than a month late, having recovered during the latter two weeks of the period, under influence of almost continuous dry hot weather. The plant is almost uniformly small for the season, account of lateness. With continued hot weather, however dry it may be, with the abundance of subsoil moisture, it is capable of continuing to retrieve lateness. The element against the crop is the prevalence of weevil in all districts infested last year. Thus far, the plant with little exception has not attained a size for fruiting to invite weevil ravages. Where it has begun to bloom, the dry hot weather has largely held the weevil in check under cultural methods.

Many bankers and merchants have called meetings of farmers, to advise and offer support in any way practical, affecting weevil extermination. Many are beginning to use calcium arsenate, according to the government formula, and others are pursuing cultural methods, or entrapping the insect, as they appear, by use of various machines now on the market.

Blue Sky Law Given Death Blow.

St. Paul, Minn.—Minnesota's blue sky law was virtually nullified by a decision handed down by the state supreme court holding that the law does not prohibit a person who is the absolute owner of stock issued by a company that is not selling its stock or securities in Minnesota, from selling such stock.

German Railroads Being Restored.

Berne, Switzerland.—The 150,000 freight cars and 5000 locomotives delivered to France by Germany since the armistice already have been replaced by new material, according to a Swiss delegate who has just returned from Berlin, where he attended a technical conference of railway men.

"America Will Go On."

Marion, O.—With an emphatic declaration that the constitution and laws sponsored by the majority must be enforced, President Harding, addressing his "friends and neighbors," who assembled at the fair grounds at Marion Tuesday to celebrate his homecoming, declared that menaces to arise, which must be suppressed by the government pending their effacement by public opinion.

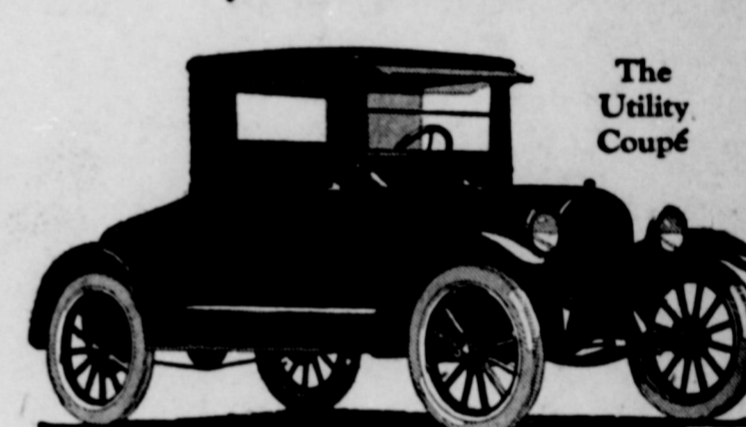
Boston and Montgomery.
