WAREHOUSING PLAN SUITS COTTON MEN

Strongly Indorsed at Texas
Farm Bureau Associa-
tion Meeting.

Dallas, Tex.—Unanimous indorsement of a project to form the Texas Cotton Warehousing Corporation as a subsidiary organization of the Texas Farm Cotton Association was given by approximately 300 county delegates to the first convention of member delegates of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association held Thursday at association headquarters in Dallas. The corporation will obtain immediately, or whenever advisable, by lease, purchase or construction, sufficient warehouses to handle any or all cotton which may be delivered by members of the association growing cotton in Texas, or others, according to the petition as indorsed.

The proposal for the establishment of the Texas Cotton Warehousing Corporation followed the complete indorsement of the first year's work of the cotton association by the convention and the plans adopted by the members for the enlargement of the association. A statewide membership campaign to be put on Aug. 1 to increase the membership at least 10,000 was approved by the meeting.

The rise in the price of cotton in 1921 was effected through the work of the co-operative cotton associations, John T. Orr, president of the association declared. If it had not been for the co-operative association the price would not have gone above 15c a pound, whereas an average middling basis of 18c to 19c was received, Mr. Orr declared.

The farm bureau movement in Texas has ceased to be a matter of finance, according to F. F. Florence, vice president of the Republic National Bank, who addressed the meeting. The banks are as anxious to get the co-operative marketing organizations' business as those organizations have been anxious to have the banks handle their finance, he declared.

"Prosperity depends on cotton," Mr. Florence said. "Cotton is the one crop that affects more people than any other crop."

Walton Petet, director of commodity of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, and for several months in charge of the field service work of the cotton association, announced that he will sever all relations with the cotton association and devote his whole time to the organization of co-operative associations for the handling of other commodities. True prosperity can not come from one crop, and new organizations will be formed to aid growers of crops other than cotton, he said. Texas was the pioneer in co-operative marketing of cotton, although the association is not yet a year old, Mr. Petet said. Following the lead of Texas, none other states now have co-operative cotton associations.

Geographic Center for Texas Is in McCulloch County

Washington—A point 23 miles northeast of Brady, McCulloch County, is declared by the United States Geological Survey to be the geographical center of Texas. In other words, were it possible to erect the state on a needle point, inserted at the designation given, the state would rest in balance. Figured another way, cut the map of the state on cardboard and it would balance in the same manner.

Likewise, the geographical center of the state of Oklahoma is eight miles due north of Oklahoma City, that of Louisiana is three miles southeast of Marksville and of Arkansas 12 miles northwest of Little Rock.

The geographical center of the United States is a short distance north of Smith Center, Smith County, Kan., and that of the North American continent is in Minnesota, northwest of Minneapolis a short distance. The geographical center and the center of population are different. The former would never change. In ordinary calculations, but the latter shifts each census enumeration. It is still near Bloomington, Ill. For the 130 years the center of population has steadily moved westward in almost a straight line.

San Antonio, Tex.—Building of a temporary fumigation plant by the government at Laredo to replace the one recently burned has released a considerable number of freight cars held on the Mexico side of the river and belonging to the International & Great Northern.

New York—Brooklyn bridge, a structural wonder of the world when it was built, is slowly sagging under the weight of its traffic burden after 40 years' service. New York engineers reported this week.

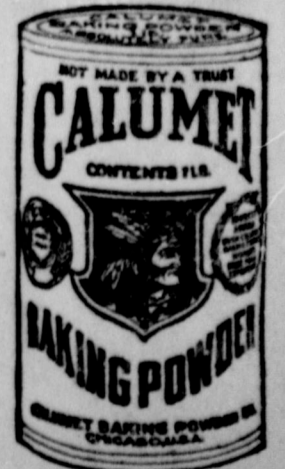

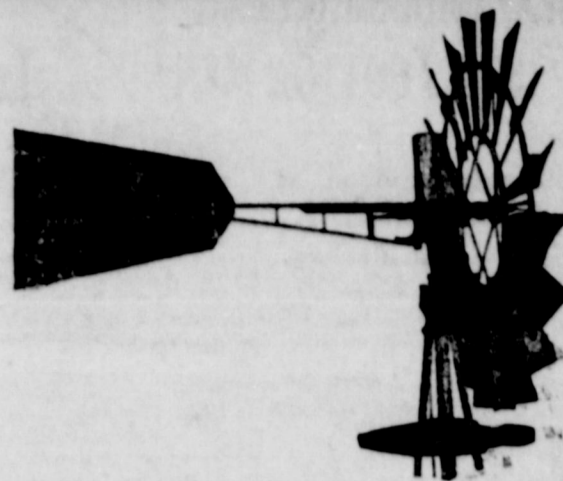

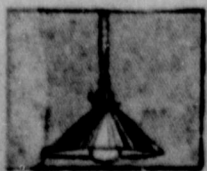
