# MORE TIME TO PAY GRANTED GERMANY

## Last Minute Agreement Is Brought About Through Belgium's Compromise.

Paris.—The reparations commission has relieved Germany of the necessity of making further cash payments in reparations for the remainder of 1922, but defers its decision on the question of a moratorium until radical changes in Germany's finances are carried out. These include the balancing of her budget, reduction of Germany's foreign obligations, currency reform and the issue of foreign and internal loans. In rendering its decision the reparations commission takes into account the fact that the "German state has lost its credit, and the mark has depreciated continuously."

Announcement of the commission's action was made by Sir John Bradbury Thursday after a session lasting one hour and twenty minutes. The decision was immediately communicated to the German delegates and the various governments by telephone. It is understood that Premier Lloyd George personally approved the settlement by telephone.

The decision came as a surprise to some circles, where it was expected that M. Dubois, representing France, would vote against any solution other than one complying with the original demands of Premier Poincare.

As accepted the settlement constitutes a modified form of the Belgian compromise proposal, and Belgium is given the honor of having brought about the last minute agreement, when a break in the commission seemed inevitable and the members of the commission felt that the very existence of the commission was at stake.

Premier Poincare gave his approval upon condition that Germany furnish a gold deposit sufficient to guarantee the deferred payments involved.

The text of the decision reads: "The reparations commission, after examining the new request for a moratorium, dated July 12, 1922, and taking into account the fact that the German state has lost its credit, both internal and external, that the mark has depreciated continuously down to three one-thousandths of its normal value, decides:

"1. To defer its decision on the request of the German government until the commission has completed its scheme for the radical reform of German public finances, including:

"(a) Balancing of the budget; (b) in the event of the governments represented on the reparations commission giving their prior consent thereto reduction of Germany's foreign obligations in so far as may be considered necessary for the restoration of her credit; (c) currency reform; (d) the issue of foreign and international loans in order to consolidate the financial situation.

"2. With a view to giving time for reparations and the carrying out of the measures referred to under paragraph 1 above, the commission agrees to accept in payment of the cash installments falling due August 15 and September 15, and unless in the meantime other arrangements are made of the further cash installments falling due between October 15 and December 31, 1922, German government six months' treasury bills, payable in gold and guaranteed in such manner as may be agreed upon between the German government and the government of Belgium (to which power the payments have been assigned)."

**General Grant's Daughter Dies.**

Chicago, Ill.—Mrs. Franklin Hatch Jones, only daughter of General U. S. Grant, one of the country's few "White House brides" and one of the nation's popular heroines of the century, died Wednesday. Mrs. Jones, who was affectionately known throughout the land as "Nellie Grant," is survived by her husband, a Chicago banker and former assistant postmaster general in the Cleveland administration; two brothers, Ulysses S. Grant, Jr., of California and Jesse R. Grant of New York; two children by a former marriage, Algoneron and Vincent Saratoris; and several nieces, among them Princess Cantacuzene.

**Report on Surplus Freight Cars.**

Washington.—On August 15 there were on American railroad lines 149,253 surplus freight cars in good repair and ready for service, but not needed by traffic demands. This was, however, a decrease of 13,527 from the number of cars so held on August 8. Both figures were reported Wednesday from the American railway association. Of the total August 15 surplus, 111,521 were surplus coal cars.

**Rent Houses in Demand.**

El Campo, Tex.—Rent houses are all taken and there is a demand for more. There is not a vacant business building in the town. Work is being pushed on the new school buildings.

**New School Building.**

Taylor, Tex.—Excavation has been made for the new high school building foundation. Number of blasts were made at one time. The new school building will have a solid foundation on a rocky formation.
