EXCERPTS OF INTEREST FROM HAWAIIAN ISLAND LETTER

The Hawaiian Islands appear to be quite popular with young people from this immediate part of Texas, as many of our readers know Misses Mildred and Margaret Thomson, daughters of Mrs. Carrie Lea Thomson of this place have been teaching on the island of Kani, for the past year and in a recent letter from Miss Mildred to her mother, she spoke of a Miss Eloise Pulcher, Marathon being expected on the next steamer, she also spoke of a Miss Hall, formerly of Sanderson, being located in Honolulu, where her husband is an army officer, further in her letter Miss Mildred tells of having the opportunity of visiting one of the islands, where conditions are being preserved as nearly as possible as they were before the coming of the white man. She says: "These are busy days for us. For the last few weeks we have had all our time taken. Friday morning, the 19th, Mrs. Rankin came up and said, if we cared to, we could start at noon with her to the island of Nuhua, an island near here under the private ownership of Mr. Aubrey Robinson. The Robinsons on Nuhua did not know we were coming. When we landed Hawaiians came racing on horseback from every direction, it is quite an event, it seems, when a boat lands. The inhabitants on this island are full blood Hawaiians—many have never been off the island which is 97 square miles in area.

Soon after our arrival we were served with young coconuts in the shell, with just the top off. The coconut had been on ice, so we drank the ice milk right out of the shell. The meat of the coconuts was so soft we ate it with spoons, as we could have eaten jelly. The house is monstrous—just like an enormous ranch home. Mrs. Rankin and we were given separate rooms, with private baths. We had a wonderful dinner, served in courses, at a long ranch looking table, a Chinese waiter served us. Delicious as the dinner was, there was one dish I could not touch, "pai," it is called. It is a native dish made from the taro plant. Those who have lived here a long time and the Hawaiians delight in it. The following morning, after an early breakfast, we went down to see them load cattle on the steamer. They drove the cattle out into the ocean until they were beyond their depth, when they could be easily pulled up to little tugs, by ropes tied to their horns, the fastening being made so that just their heads were above water. About six cattle were tied to one little tug and these tugs were towed by motor boats out to the steamer, where the cattle were hoisted to the deck by pulleys. During the four hours of the home trip the cattle were sea-sick and the native attendants were kept busy keeping them from lying down. They said that if they had been permitted to lie down twenty minutes they would have been so stiff they could never have been gotten up.

It was a very interesting trip for us and Margaret and I enjoyed it to the fullest. The Robinsons all returned to Kani with us. Yesterday afternoon, five of us, went to a "kitchen party" at Mrs. Rankin's. We had coffee, waffles, cake and gossip over the electric waffle irons and coffee urn. It was delightful because it was a little unusual. —Fort Stockton Pioneer.

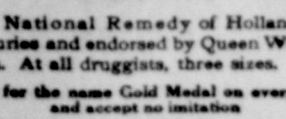

Texas News

The cotton crop in the Alvin (Texas) section has been practically all gathered, and a number of pickers have gone to other sections.

The citizens of Kenedy have determined to plant shade trees along the streets and the committee has selected pecan trees every 35 feet with an evergreen ash between.

The number of cars of citrus fruit that is estimated will be shipped from the Rio Grande Valley in the next 60 days is conservatively placed at 100, and the value of the fruit, based on prices paid California growers, is estimated to be \$200,000.

During the month of August, 121,000 head of cattle were dipped in Jefferson County, according to Dr. P. M. James of the federal department of agriculture. An injunction has impeded the work of dipping cattle in the county, according to Dr. James.

A tax on all forms of tobacco as a means of raising revenue for educational purposes will be proposed in a measure to be introduced in the next legislature, State Representative J. P. Rogers of Houston, author of the proposed measure announced this week.

A contract for surfacing about two miles of the road between Orchard and the Brazos River in the direction of Simonton will be awarded by the county commissioners within the next few days. The matter is being held up pending a decision relative to the use of gravel or shell.

There were 18,518 bales of cotton counting round as half bales ginned in Williamson County from the crop of 1922 to September 1, 1922, as compared with the 18,541 bales ginned to September 1, 1922, according to P. S. Ford, cotton agent for Williamson County.

The work of surfacing thirteen miles of state highway No. 36 between Rosenberg and the Austin County line via Orchard is now well under way. Most of the six-inch shell base has been laid and work of placing the four-inch gravel top is now in progress, after which it will be finished with a one-inch macadam topping.

The state railroad commission has set a number of freight rate hearings of interest to Houston for October 10. The docket includes cases proposing the adjustment of rates on lumber and articles of similar classifications, staves, flavoring syrups, coffee, floor sweeping compounds, grain reconignment charges and other rules and regulations.

Governor Pat M. Neff is going to Beeville on October 17, the opening day of the eleventh annual Bee County fair. He will open formally the fair in a brief address at the auditorium at the fair grounds, after which he will address the Confederate Veterans, their wives and the widows of Confederate Veterans.

Hearing on an application of the Southern Pacific Gulf Colorado and Santa Fe and Texarkana and Fort Smith railways, or revision of lumber rates from points on these lines to other Texas points, has been set for October 10, by the railroad commission. Application for revision of rates on kalsomine was set for the same date.

Thirty-two sworn statements from striking coal miners at Thurber and Mingus have been filed with United States District Attorney Zweifel at Ft. Worth regarding treatment of miners by Texas rangers. Filing of these statements follows a sensational charge of mistreatment of miners by District President John Wilkerson of the United Mine Workers of America and a counter denial by Ranger Captain Albrecht who investigated the charges.

A special rate of 80 per cent of the class A rates on orchard heaters shipped from San Antonio and Houston to the orchard section of Southwest Texas has been ordered by the state railroad commission. The commission also ordered that Fort Worth, Dallas, Sherman and Denison be considered in direct line of transit on cotton seed and other oils shipped over the Frisco lines.

Within the next few weeks the citrus fruit crop will begin to move from the lower Rio Grande Valley in commercial quantities. The value of the oranges, lemons and grapefruit expected to be shipped is estimated roughly at approximately \$500,000. At least 125 cars will be marketed this season, although some figures place the probable amount at nearly 200 cars. As citrus fruit is packed about 100 boxes to the car, it will be seen that the crop of 1922 will run between 125,000 and 200,000 boxes.

The Texas State convention of the D-C-D Highway association will be held at Huntsville, October 26 and 27, according to an announcement received from the association headquarters in Canadian.

Contract for operation of the Hickory street ferry across the Neches River at Beaumont, a link in the old Spanish trail, has been awarded.

Bonds Approved.
Austin, Tex.—The attorney general has approved the following bonds: Tahoka street improvement, \$30,000, serials, 6 per cent; Hamlin independent school district, \$25,000, serials, 6 per cent, and Dayton independent school district, \$11,000, ten-forties, 6 per cent.

Eleemosynary Establishments Have An Enrollment of 10,640.

Austin, Tex.—for the fiscal year ending August 31, it cost the state of Texas an average of \$21.10 per capita to maintain its wards in its various asylums and eleemosynary institutions. During August the average was \$19.15 per capita, and there was a decrease as compared to the entire twelve months. These figures are for thirteen state institutions and do not include those for the Northwest Texas Insane Asylum at Wichita Falls, which has been in operation only seven months, nor the blind institute, the deaf and dumb institute, and the negro deaf, dumb and blind institute, all of which have been closed in observing the summer vacation.

The total enrollment at the thirteen institutions was 10,640; the average present 9,227; number of employees 1,348; payroll \$59,873; average salary \$44.42; average number of inmates to each employe 6.84; expended for constructions \$192,968; total disbursements for salary and maintenance \$176,689; employees boarding in the institutions 1,231.

At the Wichita Falls institution there were 298 enrolled, 230 present, 72 employees; \$3,542 payroll; average salary \$49.20; average inmates to employe 3.19; salary and maintenance \$11,330; employees boarding in the institution 72; per capita cost for August \$49.26; for the seven months \$76.76. The average per capita cost for the other three institutions for the nine months of the scholastic term was as follows: Blind institute 55; deaf and dumb \$40.99; negro deaf, dumb and blind \$35.35.

Figures made by the auditing division of the state board of control show the average number of inmates for August, the number of employes for that month and the average cost per capita for each inmate during the fiscal year as follows: Confederate Home, present 337; employes 76; cost \$26.89; Confederate Women's Home, present 90; employes 25; cost \$36.90; orphan's home, present 503; employes 35; cost \$25.91; Girls' Training School, present 65; employes 27; cost \$70.59; Juvenile Training School, present 746; employes 51; cost \$17.75; Feeble Minded Colony, present 227; employes 33; cost \$19.61; Rusk Insane Asylum, present 611; employes 118; cost \$21.91; Terrell Insane Asylum, present 1,885; employes 221; cost \$15.57; San Antonio Insane Asylum, present 2,041; employes 221; cost \$14.82; Austin Insane Asylum, present 1,760; employes 209; cost \$16.73; Epileptic Colony, present 581; employes 82; cost \$22.09; American Legion Memorial Sanitarium at Kerrville, present 63; employes 31; cost \$114.73; and Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Carlsbad, present 321; employes 119 and cost \$46.59.

GREEK SOLDIERS REVOLT AND STORM PALACE
Mithyene—All Greece, including her islands, are aflame with the revolution on this historic island in the Aegean sea.

Seventy-five thousand disaffected soldiers were driven out of Smyrna by the forces of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, stormed the governor general's palace and imprisoned all the officials, including the governor and Generals Brack and Franco. They took possession of the telegraph lines and of the radio, so that Athens would not know a revolt was under way. Their next move was to seize the port officers and to take over command of the battleships Lemnos and Kilkos.

Then they commanded all the vessels in the harbor, including the Greek Trans-atlantic liners Megali Hellas and Patris. Before embarking for Piraeus on these vessels the soldiers paraded the streets with Venizelist banners and effigies of King Constantine.

Shouting "Down with Constantine," and "We want Crown Prince George," the troops fired revolvers and sang the "Venizelist hymn." While these demonstrations were in progress, 60,000 fugitives from Smyrna suffering from fright, hunger and exposure, were too stunned or dejected to participate in the insurrection.

Sultan of Turkey Abdicates.
Paris.—Mohammed VI, sultan of Turkey, has abdicated in favor of the heir apparent, Prince Abdul Medjid Effendi, according to a report sent to Constantinople. Prince Abdul Medjid, who is a cousin of the sultan, was born in 1868.

Haitian Bonds Sold.
Washington.—Bids for a \$16,000,000 issue of 6 per cent, 30-year bonds for the Haitian government have been opened by representatives of that government.

Trade Commissioner Named.
Washington.—Marcellus A. Cremer, Peoria, Ill., has been appointed assistant trade commissioner for the department of commerce at Rio de Janeiro, as announced Friday.

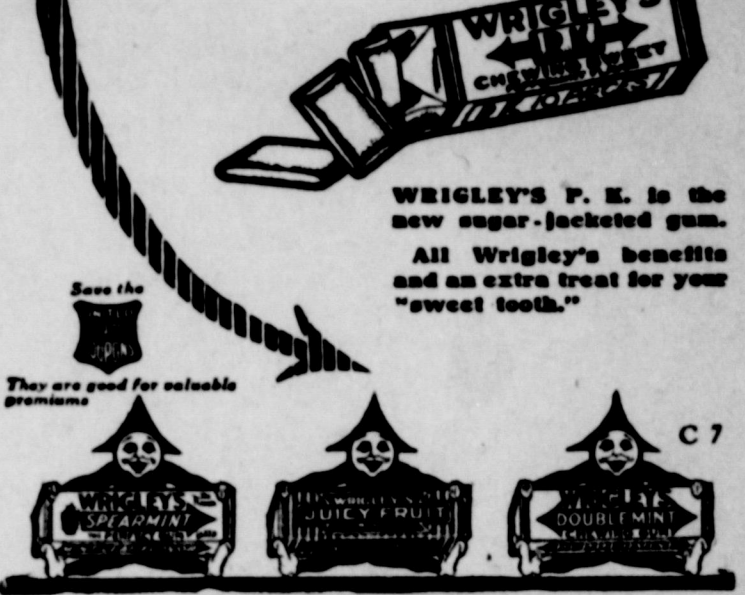

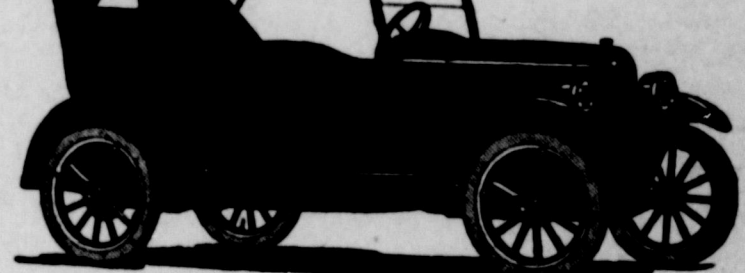
