Bond issues in the sum of \$150,000 for road improvement and park purposes were approved recently by Navasota voters, large majorities being noted in each vote. For roads \$90,000 was voted, with an additional \$50,000

Only six counties made application for road construction aid at the regular monthly meeting of the state highway commission at Austin, and all were taken under advisement. The counties asking for aid are Brewster. Brooks, Matagorda, Shelby, Rockwall and Travis.

Bell County cotton ginnings are over 50 per cent in excess of the same period last year, the government report showing 25,241 bales for 1922 as compared with 16.283 for 1921. The crop is estimated at 40,000 bales this year by good judges and its money value used in leading hospitals. 



NEGLECT OF CAR MOST EXPENSIVE

Overlooking Little Details Almost Sure to Cause Trouble and Unnecessary Repairs.

600D POINTERS FOR OWNERS

Proper Care of the Radiator and Reg ulation of Water Supply Important -Cellular Openings Should Be Kept Clean.

There is always a day of reckoning for those who neglect details in the care of their car and that day is just likely to come when you least expect it. What you think you have saved by neglect will be spent in expensive roadside repairs. Tending to details of thrice cheaper, and what is more relieves future worries.

One detail of your car which you should watch carefully is your radiator. Trouble is sure to follow unless it is kept full at all times. Form the habit of inspecting and refilling the radiator before the car is taken from the garage. When on long tours, especially if you have been doing considerable hill climbing, keep weather eye peeled towards the water

Water Supply Important.

Remember that the proper amount of water is as important as your supply of gasoline and oil. It is not a bad plan to examine the water supply every time that you stop for gasoline or oil. Use clear water, and if rain water is obtainable, employ it, as less scale and deposit will result.

The cellular openings always should he kept clean. Keep mud from remaining in them, as it cuts down radiation, and prevents proper cooling. and night driving. You should occasionally flush the entire circulating system. This may be done by disconnecting both the upper and lower hose connections and allowing fresh water to enter the filler neck, and flow down through the radiator and out the lower hose. The motor water jackets can be flushed out in the same way.

POINTS ABOUT COTTER PINS

It is Not Necessary to Bend Ends Over Flat Against Bolt or Rod, Says Motor Life.


After having slipped the cotter pin into place, do not bend she ends over flat against the bolt or rod, advises Motor Life. It isn't necessary to do this, because the cotter will lock just as securely if the ends are spread just enough to prevent slipping out. When the ends are bent considerably, it is harder to straighten them sufficiently for later removal of the pin and, further, the ends are very apt to break off when the part is in service, with the very probable result that the ill-treated cotter will slip out. Thus, instead of excessive end bending being an effective locking means, it is in reality no lock at all.

That, especially during the rainy season, care should be taken to keep the tires as dry as possible. Because rubber will cut easily when the edge of the cutting surface is wet-as evidenced by the fact that rubber workers dip their knives in water in order to facilitate their work—glass or even sharp tones are far more dangerous during or after a rain than they are when the roadway is perfectly dry. For this reason, even comparatively short drive on a sharp graves road on a wet day will cover the tires with small cuts into which dirt will creep and cause undue friction heat. even if the rubber is not cut through to the fabric.


Water also presents another danger to tires in that it tends to rot the base on which the rubber tread is applied, weakening the entire casing and leading to premature blowouts. Scraping against the curb often wears away the thin layer of rubber on the side of a tire and leaves the fabric exposed to the rain or water from the road, while sharper cuts in the tread of the tire will have the same harmful effect. 



Seventeen cents to 23c an hour, 13,-009 men, applying mostly to employes of Southern roads; 23c to 34c an hour, 109,864 men; 34c to 35c an hour, 35,975 men; 35c to 36c, 112,069 men; 36c to 37c, 872 men; 35c to 55c and above, 7.359 men. While these figures are averages supplied by 85 per cent of the railroads, they are generally accepted as typical of all roads.



COTTON CONFERENCE MEMBERS APPOINTED

Governor Names Men Who Will Represent Texas at Memphis Meet.

Austin, Tex.-Governor Neff this week announced the appointment of the five Texas members of the commission created at a conference of representatives of the cotton growers c. the South held at New Orieans last spring for the purpose of eradicating the pink boll worm, regulating co-operative marketing and warehousing of cotton. The commission is to meet at Memphis, Tenn., the latter part of November. In announcing the Texas members of the commission, Governor Neff stated that he was in hearty accord with the movement.

Texas will be represented on the ommission by E. A. Peden, Houston; James Young, Kaufman; D. C. Reed, Austin; Ervin Astin, Bryan; W. D.

The governor notified the Texas commissioners of their appointment in the following letter

"Last year, at the instance and urgent request of Governor Cameron Morrison of North Carolina, there were appointed by the governors of the twelve Southern cotton-growing states representatives to a cotton conference held in the city of New Orleans, for the purpose of studying the problems confronting the cotton industry of the South and making helpful plans with

reference thereto. "The report adopted by this cotton conference recommended the appointment of a permanent commission, to be organized definitely for the eradication of the pink boll worm, the regulation of co-operative marketing and warehousing of cotton. This, I believe, is a matter of great concern to the people throughout the Southern states, and the proposal for concerted activity for the betterment of cotton production and marketing has been approved by the United States commissioner of agriculture, who has promised the commission that he will attend the meet ing.

"I am in hearty accord with this movement. I feel that lasting benefit to all our cotton-growing states will result from the combined thought and efforts of such a commission; and believing that you will appreciate the extensive possibilities of the meeting, and its direct and far-reaching value to the cotton industry of Texas, and an active interest in the consideration wish to tender to you an appointment


