



David H. Morris, federal prohibition director for Texas, reports that during October the federal prohibition agents working under his direction arrested 321 persons for violation of the na tional prohibition act, seized 52 illicit stills and 27 illicit still worms, 203 gallons of moonshine whisky, 728 galions of choice beer, 79 gallons of grape wine, 5,771 gallons of corn meal mash and 173 fifty-gallon barrels used for fermenting mash in moonshine whis ky. All of the above, the director reports, were destroyed.



SEARCH AND SEIZURE

Judge Hutcheson Tells of Powers of Officers and Citizens' Rights.

Houston, Tex.-In no uncertain language Federal Judge J. C. Hutcheson, Jr., Thursday in federal court at Houston defined the rights of search and seizure under the national prohibition act. His opinion covered fourteen work." pages.

An officer without a warrant can has detected a violation of the law. to wear it." the judge holds. He may then make an arrest.

No search of a private residence without the authority of a warrant can ever be justified under the federal laws, the judge holds. No general exploratory search or seizure of persons, houses or effects can ever be justified either with or without a warrant, he

"A people which has guaranteed to them the right of the ballot," says the opinion, "and the right, individually and collectively, to manage their own affairs deserves to be and is proected against the prying impudence of a general search by persons merely because they have commissions as officers of the law.

"This protection is fully guaranteed, and no officer has the right upon mere suspicion to search the premises of any person for the évidence of the commission of any crime."

Concerning officers' rights, however, the opinion goes on:

"Congress, with reference to vehicles engaged in violation of the law, has life.—Boston Evening Transcript. treated them as personally committing crimes and has authorized officers to act toward them in the same manner they are authorized to act toward individuals in cases requiring arrests. Whatever of merit underlies the principle of common law that an offender may be arrested without a warrant to prevent escape applies in all its fullest vigor to swiftly moving vehicles, such as automobiles.

nounced. To Nov. 1 last year ginnings were 6,646.354 running bales, counting 110,-981 round bales as half bales and including 11.812 bales of American-Egyptian and 1,816 bales of Sea Island.

Ginnings to Nov. 1 by states follow: Alabama, 709,029; Arizona, 16,640; Arkansas, 820,031; California, 8,349; Florida, 22,446; Georgia, 631,854; Louisiana, 313,592; Mississippi, 839, 331 Missouri, 90,279; North Carolina, 577, 003; Oklahoma, 540,801; South Carolina, 413,481; Tennessee, 280,745; Texas, 2,855.606; Virginia, 13,503; all other states, 7,158.





Dallas, Tex.-Earle B. Mayfield's majority over George Peddy for Unit-States senator in the recent election probably will be under 120,000. Totals given out by the Texas ejection bureau November 8 gave him a majority of 112,818 out of 284,614 votes counted. In 320,340 votes tabulated his week he had a majority of 114,-340, gaining only 1522 in the 36,000 additional votes accounted for. This week's tabulation showed: Mayfield, 217,621; Peddy, 103,281.

Mayfield's majority, 114,340. Returns are from 161 counties incomplete, 69 complete, 30 counties unreported.

The count in the governor's race stands as follows: Neff. 224.748: Atwell 53,407. Returns are from 149 counties incomplete, 60 complete, 42 unties unreported.

Earle B. Mayfield, democratic nomi nee, Tuesday overwhelmingly defeated George E. B. Peddy, independent democrat and republican nominee, for the United States senate from Texas.






