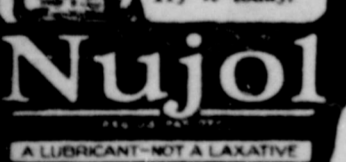

CONSTIPATION

Texas News

A bond issue of \$1,500,000 for good roads in Anderson county carried in an election recently.

The election to permit the Orange County voters to pass on the question of issuing \$250,000 navigation bonds for deepening Orange deep water to thirty feet will be held on December 30.

Harris County as a navigation district will vote December 30, coincident with the city democratic primaries, on a \$4,000,000 bond issue for extending port facilities on the ship channel.

Managing editors of Associated Press papers in Texas who compose the Texas Managing Editors' Association, will hold their annual meeting in Galveston, December 3 and 4 for consideration of various newspaper problems.

The oil fields of Texas have produced a total of approximately 720,000,000 barrels of crude oil since 1859, although no production of any volume was recorded until 1858, when Corsicana produced more than a half million barrels. Spindie Top came into the production column in 1901.

The attorney general has approved \$1,200,000 of road and bridge funding bonds of Tarrant County to take the place of a similar amount bearing 5 per cent. The new bonds yield 4 1/2 per cent. The attorney general also approved \$50,000 bonds for Henderson County levee improvement district No. 1; serials at 6 per cent.

The deficiency in the general revenue fund will probably reach high water mark in early December at about \$2,500,000 and thereafter begin to recede until it is wiped out in February. The November pay roll will add \$500,000 to the deficiency of \$2,000,000 on November 1, but some money is being received and warrants in small amounts are being called in from time to time.

In a letter to the banking commissioner, Attorney General Keeling asks that all violations of banking laws be reported to that department to the end that a stop be put to "the numerous and in some instances flagrant violations and disregard of the state banking laws." The attorney general declares that "the reckless, incompetent and criminal bankers must be driven out of business."

State Treasurer C. V. Terrell announces there is now available in the general revenue fund \$62,583, and all warrants against that fund up to and including No. 3156, will be paid when presented at the treasury department. The total net deficiency is approximately \$2,900,000; this will be increased to \$2,500,000 by December 1 on account of the November pay roll, which will be close to \$500,000.

By proclamation just issued the week of Dec. 3 to Dec. 9 has been designated as American education week, by Governor Pat M. Neff. The purpose in observing the special week is proclaimed to be "that all citizens of the American nation may in unison concentrate their efforts upon arousing sentiment for the improvement of our educational system and for definite instruction in American ideals of citizenship."

During the fiscal year ending with October, there were completed 3830 wells in Texas at an approximate cost of \$153,200,000. Many wells cost more than \$100,000 to drill to completion, the average cost in some fields where the pay is found below 3000 feet is around \$75,000, while the percentage of the shallow wells, which cost less than \$25,000 to drill, of the total drilled in the state is rather small. The general average cost is around \$40,000 per well. It is estimated that crude oil produced in Texas during the fiscal year ending with October was valued at \$215,350,000.

The average cost of maintaining the state's roads during October was \$27.52 each, as against \$22.24 average for the months of September and October. The first two months of the current fiscal year. The October report, as compiled by the auditing division of the state board of control, shows a total enrollment at all state eleemosynary institutions of 11,580.

The Texas railroad commission has issued notice of hearing for December 12 to consider the matter of increasing the minimum weight on green salted hides from 28,000 to 30,000 pounds per car. This in response to the application of the Texas carriers and of the Shreveport Chamber of Commerce, which alleges discrimination in that the interstate minimum is 30,000 pounds.

An illiteracy commission for the State of Texas in order that persons who can not read or write may be taught to do so, is favored by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction. In ten years there has been an improvement of only 1.6 per cent in illiteracy in Texas, Miss Blanton said.

The attorney general has approved \$30,000 Matamorra independent school district bonds, 10-20s, 1s.

Independent Democrats received \$73,295.15 and expended \$73,050.49 in the campaign of George E. B. Pedy for United States senator, according to a statement filed with the secretary of state by James P. Smith, acting secretary of a committee representing independent democratic interests in advocacy of the principles advocated by George Pedy. Mr. Smith says the statement is voluntarily made and filed.

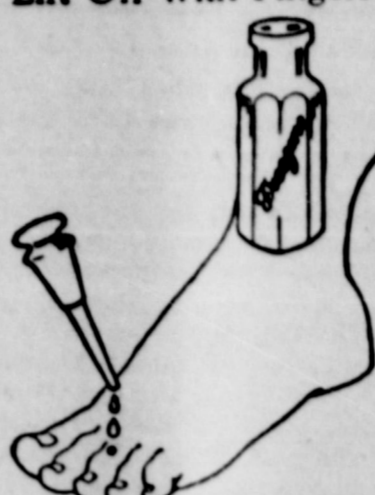

PLANS RELIEF FOR SCHOOLS OF TEXAS

Superintendent-Elect Outlines
Some Changes That are
Needed.

Austin, Tex.—Immediate relief for Texas schools will be asked by S. M. N. Marrs, recently elected state superintendent of public instruction when he takes office in January, according to his statement this week. The largest emergency appropriation possible will be asked for the schools, which Superintendent Marrs believes should be at least \$3 per pupil.

"Considering deficiencies, appropriations and tax rates, some \$4,000,000 will be available early in 1923 which the legislature can apply to school relief," said Superintendent-elect Marrs. "The schools got \$2,000,000 less through the per capita this year than last, and \$500,000 less through rural aid. Hence there should be at least \$3,500,000 soon available for appropriation to schools. If that much is appropriated the schools will still have less money per pupil than in 1921.

"No backward step should be taken. So I shall recommend appropriation of \$3 for each pupil, or as much more as may be possible. As there are 1,300,000 children, the minimum would be \$3,900,000. The best thing friends of Texas schools can now do is impress upon their representatives and senators the necessity of this appropriation being made at once."

Permanent relief can never be obtained by the schools coming tin cup in hand, to the legislature year after year, is the belief of the superintendent-elect. He has concluded that school finances can be placed on a sound, unfluctuating basis only through far-reaching changes in the laws of Texas. His preference is for a new constitution. He believes friends of Texas children should unite in working for constitutional or other changes necessary to give Texas children the kind of schools to which they are entitled.

TEXAS FAR AHEAD IN GINNING OF COTTON

Washington—Cotton ginned prior to Nov. 14 amounted to 8,869,857 running bales, counting 151,578 round bales as half bales and including 17,715 bales of American-Egyptian and 4,737 bales of Sea Island, the census bureau announced this week.

Last year to Nov. 14, ginnings aggregated 7,274,201 bales, including 117,569 round bales counted as half bales, 16,105 bales of American-Egyptian and 2,656 bales of Sea Island.

Ginnings prior to Nov. 14 this year by states follow:

BILL FOR CORPUS CHRISTI SHIP CHANNEL INTRODUCED

Washington.—The secretary of war would be authorized to contract for all the government's portion of the Corpus Christi harbor improvement, otherwise known as improvement of the channel from Aransas Pass to Corpus Christi, under terms of a bill introduced by Representative Wurzbach of Texas. The bill proposes an appropriation of \$750,000 to be applied to the improvement in accordance with the engineers' report to congress and to enter contracts for \$644,800, which is the remaining portion of the government's cost, or a total of \$1,394,800. In addition to this, local interests are to pay a large amount toward the cost of the important improvement for the new Texas harbor, the total of which is about \$5,000,000.

Reefs of Gold Found.

Cape Town.—Increased interest is being manifested in the lately reported discovery of gold-bearing conglomerate reefs in the northern districts of the Transvaal. It is asserted that reefs have been traced for over 70 miles in the Waterberg, Rustenberg, and Marico districts, with a prospect of their extension into the Bechuana-land protectorate. In February last a certain Potgieter of Pietersburg picked up samples of gold-bearing conglomerate near Vleetsport, in the Waterberg district. Two months later some prospectors located two gold-bearing conglomerate reefs in North Rustenberg, and a great hunt for options ensued.

Large Bond Sale Closes.

Paris.—France's latest bond issues of 6 per cent treasury notes, just closed, yielded \$1,990,000 francs, according to practically complete reports to the ministry of finance.

Pecan Crop is Failure.

Bastrop, Tex.—The pecan crop in Bastrop County is a failure this fall. Large groves that last year produced pecans by the carload will not yield any pecans at all this season. The heavy rains of a few months ago are said to have destroyed the entire yield this year.

Es-Governor Freed by Jury.
Panama, Fla.—Sidney J. Catts, former governor of Florida, was found not guilty by a jury in federal court on a charge of perjury.

URGENT REFORMS FOR PROTECTING YOUTH

Mothers' and Teachers' Congress Wants Social and Economic Changes.

Waco, Tex.—At its closing session Thursday the following officers were elected by the Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teachers' Associations: President, Mrs. S. M. N. Marrs, Austin; vice president at large, Mrs. Edward Kneeland, Dallas; recording secretary, Mrs. A. E. Howell, Waco; corresponding secretary, Mrs. H. B. Chamberlain, Henderson; historian, Mrs. Stella Porter Russell, Dallas. The office of historian is a new one.

The more important resolutions adopted were:

Lowering the scholastic age from 7 to 6 years and making the kindergarten age 4 to 4; indorsement of the Sheppard-Towner maternity bill and petitioning the legislature for adequate appropriation to make it available in Texas; favoring a scholastic per capita tax for 1923 of \$14; indorsing an appropriation of \$4,000,000 by the legislature for the next biennial for rural aid; making English the basic language in all public and private schools; pledging the efforts of the organization to aid in the forward plans for educational progress that are to be agreed upon at a conference of representatives of the five women's organizations in Texas to be held in Austin in December; state legislation to promote the extension of physical educational bills or other suitable legislation extending the cooperation of the government to the states for adequate aid in physical education; adoption of protective measures which the graduates of the state will ask from the next legislature; the erection of a psychopathic hospital, a hospital for venereal diseases and a maternity hospital for girls under 18 at the State Girls' Training School, Gainesville, and asking the legislature to appropriate \$245,000 for the budget for the support and maintenance of that institution for the next two years; better observance of the vital statistics laws of the state; condemning the sale of obscene literature to children of the public schools; indorsement of the campaign against cigarette smoking on the part of pupils; opposition to any change of the national prohibition laws.

ANNUAL REPORT OF STATE FIRE COMMISSION. Austin, Tex.—In the eighth annual report of the state fire insurance commission to the governor, claim is made that the commission is now being conducted on a more economical basis than heretofore, and that it is also being operated efficiently and fairly.

A statement of the benefits of the good fire record credits shows that in 1920 this credit was granted to 172 Texas towns for an aggregate saving in insurance of \$1,020,094. In 1921 it was awarded to 244 cities and towns for a reduction in the rates of \$1,518,356, while in 1922 it went to 233 cities and towns for a reduction of \$1,077,829. The annual premiums for this fiscal year in the cities and towns receiving the credit was \$9,888,026. During the five years ending with 1921 the fire liability assumed in Texas by licensed companies was \$7,563,369,010 and the net premiums during that period were \$85,467,360, with losses sustained of \$41,584,771 for an average loss ratio for the five years of 48%.

EXPRESS CLASSIFICATION APPROVED BY COMMISSION. Austin, Tex.—In an order issued Friday the railroad commission approved for use in Texas express classification No. 28, issued by the American Railway Express Company, under date of June 1 last, and which became effective July 15 on interstate traffic. Approval is given with several exceptions where disapprovals are noted. The following items of express classification No. 28 are disapproved and corresponding items carried in express classification No. 26 will remain in force:

Items 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 25, 26, 29, 30, 31, 32, 34 and 36 on page 35, and items 7 and 3 on page 36, applying on empty carriers returned. Items 1, 2 and 3 on page 43, applying on newspapers. Item 17 on page 48, applying on watermelons. It is further ordered that the application of official express classification No. 28 to Texas intrastate express traffic is not intended to and shall not be construed to affect the application to such Texas intrastate express traffic of the rates and regulations as embodied in local commodity tariff No. 130, R. C. T. No. 91, effective Dec. 16.

Cotton Crop Doubled. Bryan, Tex.—The ginning enumerator for Brazos county reports that up to November 1, 14,464 bales of cotton had been ginned in the county, compared with 6,169 at the same date last year, an increase of 7,295 bales.

Gather Potato Crop. Yoakum, Tex.—Farmers in this section are busy gathering their sweet potato crop since the recent rains. Sweet potatoes are being sold as low as 2c a pound.

SEEKS TO WIPE OUT STATE'S ILLITERACY

Commission Is Favored By Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Austin, Tex.—Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, is unqualifiedly in favor of an illiteracy commission for the state of Texas in order that persons who can not read or write may be taught to do so.

"In ten years," said Miss Blanton, "we have improved only 1.6 per cent in illiteracy. In 1910 the ratio was 9.9 per cent, and in 1920 it was 8.3 per cent in Texas."

Miss Blanton said the children are being taught in the schools under the compulsory attendance law, but that the adults are receiving no attention. It is the latter class she hopes to reach.

"In Kentucky they found the illiterates and then organized districts to teach them," she said. "Persons from 50 to 99 years old were taught to read and write in a few weeks. Teachers and other persons volunteered to teach one or two illiterates, and in that way the whole state was covered."

According to Miss Blanton 88 per cent of the enrolled children in Texas are in public or private schools, and the young people are taught in that way. However, Miss Blanton said that in some private schools, in isolated places, the schools are conducted in the language of the colony in that community, such as in Spanish along the border. In German at other places and one or two Polish.

One criticism of the results under the compulsory school law is the irregular attendance. Miss Blanton said: "The law should be enforced to require regular attendance. She thought, in order that the children might get the benefit of consecutive teaching."

BOARD OF CONTROL SAVES SOME MONEY ON CONTRACTS. Austin, Tex.—It is estimated by the state board of control that its cotton goods contracts are worth 25 per cent more than they were when the contracts were made last July. Cotton was down in price at the time and has been climbing since then.

All lines of groceries also have advanced slightly since the July awards. Because of the inability to get satisfactory sugar bids last July sugar has been purchased in the open market, a large supply having been bought at \$6.90. Since then the price has advanced to \$8. The amount bought at \$6.90, was stated, will last the state institutions until the new crop is had next January.

MEMBERS ARE SELECTED FOR NEW GERMAN CABINET. Berlin.—The new German cabinet has been announced as follows: Chancellor, Wilhelm Cuno; vice chancellor and minister of justice, Dr. Carl Heines; minister of foreign affairs, Herr Von Rosenburg; minister of the interior, Rudolph Oeser; minister of finance, Andreas Herms; minister of economics, Johann Becker; minister of the treasury, Dr. Heinrich Albert; minister of transportation, General Wilhelm Groener; minister of posts and telegraphs, Herr Stinzel; minister of food, Herman Mueller; minister of defense, Dr. O. Gessler; minister of labor, Dr. Heinrich Brauns.

Conference at Lausanne. Lausanne.—Very substantial progress toward a Near East settlement was recorded at the conference at Lausanne Friday. It came when the first submission accepted the report of its submission establishing a demilitarized zone thirty kilometers on either side of the Turkish western frontier, extending from the Black Sea to the Aegean Sea. The conference also arranged for a body to supervise a Bulgarian outlet to the Aegean Sea. Only two reservations to the program were filed. The Turks asked for a system of guarantees by which the demilitarized zone may be kept free from military defenses and troops.

Made Acting Postmaster. Lufkin, Tex.—Mrs. Susie Lang has been appointed acting postmaster of Lufkin to fill the vacancy made by the death of her husband, O. J. Lang.

Railway Pays Taxes. Brenham, Tex.—A check for \$7757.35 has been received by Tax Collector R. Y. Hoffmann from the Santa Fe railroad in payment of Washington county taxes for 1922.

Many Turkeys on Market. Rockdale, Tex.—Turkeys are coming into market in large numbers, a big crop of the birds having been raised this year or almost every farm. The price being paid is a pound.

Cattle Dipping Continued. Berclair, Tex.—Cattle dipping is being continued at Berclair. While many have dipped for the last time in November, from present prospects the dipping will be continued throughout the winter by the majority of the cattlemen.

Clock System to Be Installed. Lufkin, Tex.—The clock system of night watching will be installed at Lufkin soon. This will reduce the insurance rate 5c on the \$100.

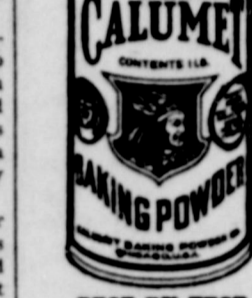

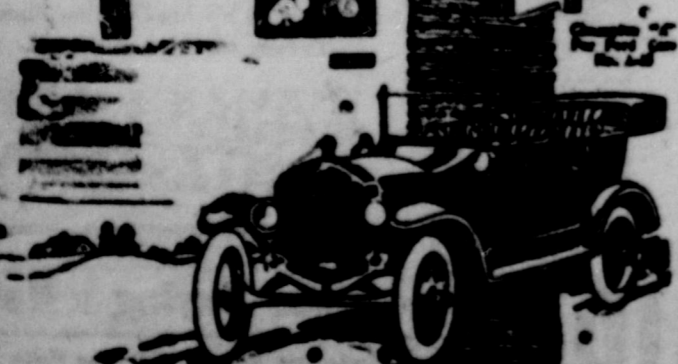
