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COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of Jodok



The longer I live and the more I cogitate and aphorize on things and conditions pertaining to this life that we are now blessed with, the more convinced I become that there is some mysterious power that affects, and in many cases, controls the mental attitude, and therefore, the intelligence of the human race as a whole in varying degrees and that of large numbers of people, one hundred percent.

As to just what this power may be, I confess my utter ignorance, at I am strongly influenced by the solution that is being given by many scientific writers and lecturers, who class it as a "cosmic influence." And among these scientists and deep thinkers, whom I greatly admire and whose attitude or reasoning I have great faith in, is Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, D. D., who in his book, entitled "Religion as I see it," makes frequent references to this "Cosmic Influence," and has made my own feeble conceptions of the mystery so much clearer, until this interpretation of the matter seems to me to be the most logical, reasonable and sensible that can be given. I call this power of force, "Cosmic Influence," "Universal Mind," "God" or what you may be pleased to call it. It is all the same, mysterious influence or power, to me.

My intellect or power of comprehension is entirely too feeble to fathom or understand much that is presented in the language of the scientist, and I have been reading a book written by one, LeCompte DeNouy, (I may not have that name spelled correctly) entitled "Human Destiny" and I frankly admit that much of it is too deep for me to understand, but there are many passages in it, that seem to me to be perfectly lucid and capable of my comprehension, and from such passages I gather that the author separates this Cosmic Influence, into what he calls "Cosmic Waves," through which it means it makes itself felt and absorbed by the human mind.

Well, just take the above paragraphs as preface to what I have in mind to say during the remainder of this effusion. One of these facts is that I frequently receive mental impressions or ideas, that are really original with me, and I so consider them, but within a comparatively short time thereafter, I read them in the writings of other people or hear them in sermons or public speeches, which most certainly destroys my mental illusion that they are original with me. However, these supposedly original ideas do not seem to come to me as a direct result of any special meditation, but frequently strike me at times when I am not at all concerned with such a subject, but seem, rather to come through some sort of mental absorption, thus substantiating the theory of the "Cosmic Wave."

Many of these adopted ideas are, by many of my friends, pronounced as fanciful, others are classed as practically lunatic. Others are just simply passive. John reads them and hands back the manuscript without taking any time to consider the contents, with the remark -- "That's all right." George simply will not read them, and gets around it by saying that he is not going to allow himself to become possessed of any such hifalutin' ideas or notions. Floyd, who was formerly a substantial backer of mine, has practically ceased to read my effusions at all, except upon my direct request that he read and comment thereon. At such times he returns my manuscript with some such expression as -- "If a man be crazy enough himself, he might consider such ideas as being sound logic, but -- It is largely owing to hearing such expressions as these I have just quoted, that I have termed myself "queer", because, when a person absorbs and adopts ideas

that are termed fanciful or lunatic by other persons who are of sound and mature judgement, he most assuredly must be "QUEER."

But, here again I find myself to be badly mistaken and badly confused since I have recently read an article in the Literary Digest, which states that all people have their own peculiar ideas or mannerisms. Therefore, the matter resolves itself into the fact that a man is queer if he is not queer, and in order not to be queer, one must be queer, and the queerer one may be the less queer he becomes. (N. Well--enough of this "queer" stuff. But it is queer how many queer interpretations, queer circumstances, queer conditions can be classified and expressed by this queer word, "queer", and I suppose no one but a queer person would ever notice that it is queer, except that it is spelled "Q-u-e-e-r."

Regardless of what I have read of other people's opinions, I still contend that I am "queer". But I am not ashamed of it. I strive diligently never to do, say or think anything of which I am ashamed. In that respect I am somewhat in the position of the man who went to a psychiatrist for treatment for some sort of mental disturbance and the psych. asked him if he was ever troubled with unchaste thoughts. After a few seconds of meditation the man replied -- "No, doctor, I rather enjoy them. And so, I rather enjoy being queer."

Well, for this year and this State, the election excitement is practically "All over but the shouting," but there is plenty of that going on. True, there will be a few contests to be settled by "Run-off" elections, but most of them, I presume, are practically settled already in the minds of the voters, I am speaking only so far as Texas is concerned; but, of course, the national presidential campaign will be in the height of its glory.

Will Register Next Two Months

Releases from Washington meanwhile repeated previous draft regulations in which President Truman has ordered all American men 18 through 25 years of age to register for the draft between Aug. 30 and Sept. 18.

No predictions have been made as to when actual inductions will begin, but the date cannot be until 90 days after President Truman signed the draft bill making it a law.

Eighteen-year-olds, not subject to the 21-month draft, may begin enlisting in the armed services at any time. Volunteers on this basis may serve one year, then find places in the reserves. By law 161,000 of the 18-year-olds may be accepted.

Whether a man is exempt from the draft makes no difference, he said. All must register, unless they now are in the regular force. Rev. Don Davidson, pastor of the Methodist Church at Hereford, called on members in this community Friday afternoon.

Friona Farm To Market Road To Be Improved by Commission

Judge A. D. Smith, County Judge of Parmer County, has received a letter from the State Highway Department, the contents of which is of interest to the citizens of Parmer County, and especially to those of Friona and Friona Precinct, and has very kindly allowed us to quote it in the Star.

The letter follows: Hon. H. D. Smith, County Judge, Farwell, Texas.

"As information we quote you minute passed by State Highway Commission of July 20th, 1948. In Parmer County, on Farm to Market Road, 299, IT IS ORDERED BY THE COMMISSION that the appropriation in the amount of \$8,900.00 be, and is here made to cover the cost of grading and placing a flexible base asphalt surface treatment from Friona, to the P. & S. F. Railroad a distance of 0.325 mile. This work was authorized by Minute, number Minute 25209.

News From Your COUNTY AGENT

County Agent, Ollie Limer, was notified this week that Darrell Norton, age 15, of Farwell, was the winner of the Sears Heavy Litter contest. This contest includes all the girls in the Amarillo area that has been placed in the hands of 4-H club boys by the Sears Foundation.

The Amarillo area includes eighteen counties that are in this program. Darrell's pigs were weighed at the end of 56 days. The nine pigs in the litter weighed four hundred and eight pounds, which was an average of forty-nine and three-tenths pounds per pig. For winning Darrell will receive \$50.00 in prize money. In producing this heavy litter, Darrell carried out all the importation and hog raising. At the end of two weeks the pigs were moved to clean ground and had excess to creep feeder containing protein supplement, grain and mineral which is very important in developing young pigs. Darrell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Norton of Farwell.

Donald Christian of the Oklahoma Lane 4-H club, took third place in the Amarillo area with his Sears boar, which entitles him to \$23.00. The boar contest was judged on the basis of the fees taken in on feeding and management. This makes a total of \$75.00 of prize money that Donald has received since he was given the Sears boar last year. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Christian of Oklahoma Lane.

All prize money in both contests were furnished by the Sears Foundation.

200 COWS PLEDGED According to the report of County Agent Ollie Limer, artificial breeding program of Parmer county will probably get into operation within the next few weeks. The association already has 200 cows pledged and in order to start operating 300 cows are needed. This program is open to any grade or pure bred dairyman who is interested in breeding his cows to high production registered Jersey and Holstein bulls. The bulls that will be used in this program at Tech College. This program should do much to improve the dairy herds in Parmer county. Parmer County A. C. A. News

Producers who have prior approvals for summer-fallow, chiseling, irrigation practices, seeding permanent pasture grasses, and many other practices should turn these forms in at the AAA office as soon as the practices become complete. If you keep the approvals, there is danger of losing them or forgetting to return them until after the deadline and as a result no payment is earned. In returning the prior approvals by mail be sure and execute the extent the practice was carried out and sign on the designated line.

We still have about \$15,000.00 in the county to spend on various soil building programs. In order to receive payment for any practice under the present program, you must get a prior approval from the county office before the practice is started. Remember this and do not wait until after the practice is complete as no payment will be made if you do.

We will send out form letters in a few days requesting the amount of acres grain sorghum stubble to be left on the land and the acreage you intend to seed to small grains on the contour this fall. It would be appreciated if you would fill in the amounts on this letter and return to the office. In case you fail to receive this notice within the next few days you may report the acreage at the AAA office.

Mr. Allen was taken to the Northwest hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises about his head and face. Mr. Euler's injuries did not require hospitalization.

Linsenfelder, more seriously injured, was still in an Amarillo hospital awaiting possible developments.

Following the accident the two Nazareth girls were carried into Canyon hospital. Allen and Linsenfelder were carried into Amarillo.

Children Should Have Pre-School Physical Check

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 29 — With the report of 77 new cases of chicken pox, 11 cases of diphtheria, 320 cases of measles, 75 cases of polio, and 499 cases of whooping cough occurring in the state in the week between July 10-17, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has made an appeal to all parents to have their children undergo a thorough physical examination before entering school next month.

The appeal was made to coincide with the announcements of the various opening dates of schools throughout the state.

"It is a medically established fact that a child's health has a direct bearing on his progress in school," the health officer said. "It is no longer sufficient to provide the child with books and new fall clothing. Today we realize the health factor must be considered if the child is to reach his optimum level."

Dr. Cox said that since the child spends most of his time indoors with large groups of children, it is imperative that he be immunized against communicable diseases when such protection is possible. The spread of such diseases is facilitated in congested classrooms.

He said the examination should include a dental check-up and inspection of the eyes, ears, nose and throat. The best health insurance for any child is constant supervision by the family physician and dentist.

Social Security Do's and Don'ts

When a worker starts a job in industry or business, he should show his social security card to his employer. The employer will count number in the company's records and use it to report the wages to the Social Security Administration.

To make sure every employee and his family receive all the insurance to which they may become entitled, employers should report all wages to the Government under the name and account number of each employee as shown on the worker's social security card.

If dies within 3 years after his discharge, social security benefits may be paid, if certain requirements are met, even if the deceased had never worked in social security employment.

Social security cards are not to be used for identification. They are issued to workers in business and industry to maintain social security wage accounts. Federal social security payments which a worker earns for himself and his family are based on these wage accounts.

Have you gone on a new job lately? Did you show your new employer your social security card, or did you try to remember the number? An incorrect number on your employer's tax returns may mean that you will not get credit for all of your wages.

Federal old-age and survivors provides monthly payments for insurance -- social security -- retired insured workers after they are 65 and for survivors of deceased insured workers. Fur-

ther information can be secured from your office of the Social Security Administration.

EMPLOYERS -- The payroll tax report, which you make every calendar quarter, must include the name, social security account number, and the amount of wages paid to each employee. Every business that has ONE or more employees is covered by the Federal Social Security Act.
