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OPENING OF THE SANDERSON SCHOOLS

The Sanderson Public Schools opened Monday morning, September 10th, with an unusually large attendance of both patrons and pupils, as well as other interested persons.

The school opened with the singing of America. County Superintendent of Schools G. J. Henshaw made a very pleasant and highly instructive address, asking for the co-operation of both pupils and patrons, also urging the pupils to spend their time profitably. Mr. Cavender then made a short address of welcome for the Trustees, followed by a few words by Professor J. A. White. Superintendent T. L. Williams then made an address, outlining his policies for the year.

After a few words of instructions, advice and encouragement the pupils repaired to their respective rooms where the formal work of organization began. By noon, much of the detail work had been accomplished and the pupils were dismissed until 9:00 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The enrollment for the first day was 228, of which 65 of this number being enrolled in the Mexican school. The enrollment by grades is as follows:

First and second grades, 29,
Third and fourth grades, 32,
Fifth and sixth grades, 35,
Seventh grade, 29.

The total enrollment for the high school is 44 pupils, 16 of this number being in the eighth grade; 19 in the ninth grade; 5 in the tenth grade and 4 in the eleventh grade.

A splendid corps of teachers has been secured for the ensuing year, and with the co-operation of the student body and the patrons, the Sanderson Public Schools should surpass in 1923-24 the previous high records made by this school.
