## Wind, Hail and Rain Hits Sanderson Sunday

Several Thousand Dollars Damage Done  
No One Injured

Considerable damage was done in the city last Sunday afternoon about 4 o'clock when it was hit by a 75 mile an hour wind and hail storm. The storm came up from the southeast and was so sudden that those of our citizens who were out in town barely had time to get to shelter. A cloud of dust passed through town from every direction followed by wind, hail and rain.

**Wool and Mohair Not Hurt.**  
The warehouse of the Sanderson Wool Commission Co., was unroofed and parts of the roof carried some distance. It was practically full of wool and mohair but there was no damage done to the contents. Monday what shacks were not carried off and placed in other buildings was covered up so that the rains Monday did not damage.

**Store Front Blown Away.**  
The front part of the building of the W. H. Farley store was blown off though no damage was done on the inside of the store. The back part of the store weakened by the wind going through the building.

**Ball Park Totally Wrecked.**  
There were a couple of hundred people watching the ball game between Sanderson and Marfa when the storm blew up. It came so suddenly that the spectators had no time to get out and were forced to stay. It seems that the worst place was at the park for timbers, planks, rocks, cans and debris was flying in the air. Practically every board and brace was blown away as well as the roof taken off the grandstand. Several automobiles were wrecked by flying timbers and tops of cars blown off but no one was injured.

**Hundreds of Windows Blown Out.**  
Nearly every house in town had from one to a dozen window panes blown out or cracked. Small buildings, outhouses and chimneys were blown down, and fences down all over town. It was reported that 158 small window panes were cracked and broken in the new Kerr Mercantile building.

Several roofs of houses were blown away. The east part of the engineers building located in the railroad yards was blown off and carried through a window into the roundhouse. All flowers and plants in the yards were stripped of their foliage as well as trees were damaged by limbs being broken off and leaves stripped off.

The damage was estimated as being several thousand dollars.

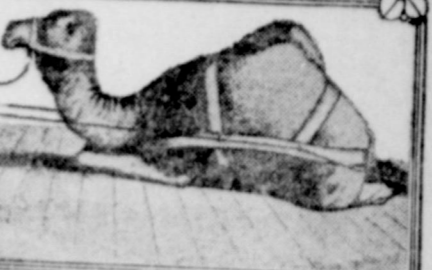

The Camels are Coming!



ABOARD FOR AMERICA! THE camels are coming! No, it isn't the old circus call, nor a paraphrase on words of the old poem about the Siege of Lucknow, nor an announcement of a new prohibition enforcement drive.

The camels, the servants of man since prehistoric times, are coming to Canada, there to work on the lands of certain farmers in Saskatchewan who believe that these ships of the desert may be superior to horses and mules as draft animals.

Over in Russia camels have been used for some time as farm animals and have proved their worth on the plow and the reaper. Several of these camels are already in service in Canada, and the Saskatchewan farmers have ordered 400 more from northern Russia.

At any rate, the experiment will be watched with interest by farmers in this country even though it probably will never be adopted on a large scale. It is interesting, also, to recall that the United States government once made a somewhat similar experiment, although for a different purpose.



In their quest and soon found that they were a difficult task. They visited Tunis, Salonica, Constantinople, the Crimea, Alexandria and Smyrna. The Crimean war was then in progress and England had bought up all the camels available in that part of the country.

Despite the apparent success of the experiment, however, an element of discord arose that was due to the temperamental incompatability of the camels and the men who had charge of them. The American mule skinner disliking the foreign beasts and as they became better acquainted

with the "general cussedness of them ornery brutes," the mule skinner came to love them less and less. So the reports that some of the camels had "become unmanageable and escaped into the desert" became frequent, albeit the camels were frequently aided in their "escape" by the men themselves.

Then the approach of the Civil war caused the attention of the War department to be turned to affairs of greater importance and the "camel corps" suffered from neglect. In 1861 the War department had 25 camels at various posts in California without being put to any use.

Similar experiments with camels were tried at one time or another in other states besides those of the Southwest. In 1896 they were used for a time for freighting between the gold camps of that state and in the same year a man named L. S. Musgrave appeared in Denver with two camels. He had an ambitious scheme for a system of camel transport from Omaha to San Francisco via Denver and Salt Lake City, but got little encouragement in the Colorado town.

Fox Fires No Longer Cause Childish Fear

Boys and girls nowadays seldom experience the thrill of seeing a mysteriously light glowing dimly in the depths of the forest or gleaming from some half-buried rotten log in a lonely swamp. The cutting away of the forests and the draining of swampy land have cleared from much of the landscape the causes which produce fox fire. In early days, however, the feet of pioneer children often were sent scampering home in the twilight when their owners came unexpectedly upon a light which seemed to have no source, says the Indianapolis News.

Half a century ago a group of hardy observers of the weather spent their winters on Mount Washington. They lived in a low stone house, chained to the solid rock, says a writer in the American Magazine. They found that the wind on the peak often blew 180 miles an hour. On one occasion it rimped across the summit at the rate of 180 miles an hour; three or four times as fast as an express train.

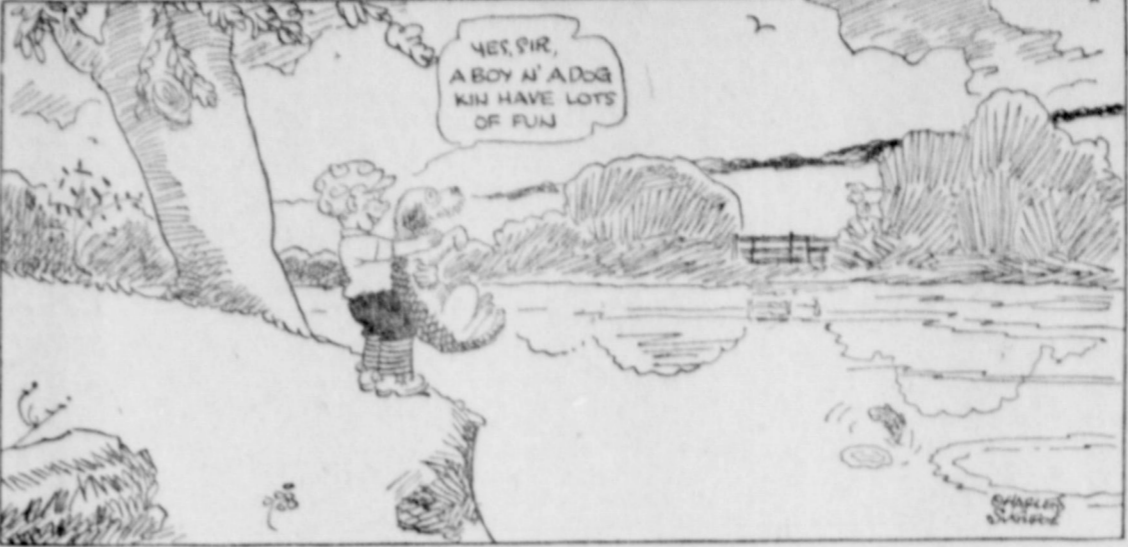

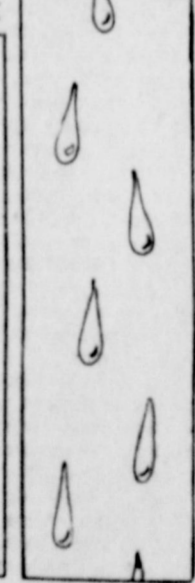
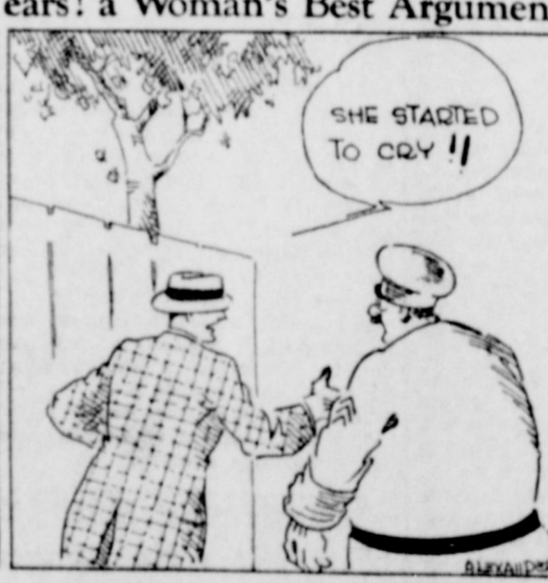

These towns—Brownsville to El Paso—that being the route which it is believed will shortly be designated as a military highway by the United States Government. Such a designation of itself must result in better roads and improved highway maintenance.  
Invitations will be issued to all town on this highway to join in the movement, and later a flying squad will visit them and urge a closer co-operation of interests. It is believed we now have the nucleus of an organization which can not but accomplish much good for every community in this area, and which has already received favorable comment in the San Antonio, San Angelo and Dallas papers. Other towns similarly located throughout the United States have pooled their interests in this manner, and the advantages resulting from such co-ordination have in every instance more than repaid the efforts incidental to organization.
