C. M. T. C. ENROLLMENT CAMPAIGN NOW OPEN

The opportunity is now offered to the young men of Texas to enroll for one of the Citizens' Military Training Camps this summer. These camps will be held in the 8th Corps Area as follows:

Fort Sam Houston, Texas, June 14 to July 15, quota 1,200. These camps are conducted by the Regular Army from funds appropriated for that purpose by Congress. They offer to the young men of Texas a splendid opportunity to acquire the rudiments of military training and at the same time spend a glorious vacation of 30 days without a cent of expense.

The Government pays the cost of transportation to camp and return. It furnishes free food, shelter, bedding and laundry service while in camp.

The camp authorities put on a splendid athletic and recreational program of entertainment.

The moral welfare of the young men who attend camp is carefully safeguarded.

Their physical welfare is safeguarded by medical officers of the Regular Army who are especially selected for their professional ability.

Blankets for enrollment may be secured from your county chairman, G. J. Henshaw, Sanderson, Texas. He will also arrange for the necessary physical examinations and inoculations.

OIL NEWS.

The oil and gas lease records show that Terrell County is still in the path toward oil and gas developments. The records reveal the fact that George D. Paine of Midland, Texas, recently made an assignment of an oil and gas lease on quite a bit of acreage in this county several miles north of this city to the Louisiana Oil Refining Company.

The records further show that Samuel Ohenstein, Leonard P. Jones, and L. O. Slocum have recently been making assignments on acreage in what is commonly called the Wooley-Jones Block.

The records show that the Trans-Pecos Development Company have been selling quite a bit of mineral rights on acreage in the vicinity of the well being drilled by the Keck Pecos Trust, and near the well being drilled by Jessie McPhee.

K. H. Evjen, a noted geologist, recently filed an oil and gas lease on 128.3 acres out of north part of section 533 B. S. & F. Ry. Co. survey which is a part of the Charles Chandler ranch, and this land is situated in between Independence Creek and the Pecos River, and is considered as one of the best prospects for oil in Terrell County.

Roy A. Reynolds, a consulting geologist of Fort Worth, Texas, recently acquired a lease on the west one-half and southwest one-quarter of section 120, block D 10, T. C. Ry. Co., and on the southwest one-quarter of the northeast one-quarter of section 120, block D 10, T. C. Ry. Co.

F. B. Crawley of Tulsa, Okla., recently acquired a lease on west one-half of southeast one-quarter of section 100, block D 10, T. C. Ry. Co.

Alfred Cummings et als recently acquired an oil and gas lease on the west one-half of northwest one-quarter of section 168 in block D 10, T. C. Ry. Co.

There are several tests for oil and gas being drilled in this county at the present time and are reported to be making good progress toward drilling. It is reported that several other tests for oil and gas are very apt to be drilled in the near future.

It is reported that a water well being drilled a short time ago about 11 miles west of this city on the Pecos-Terrell County line encountered a slight showing of oil in black shaly lime at the depth of 1,472 feet.

Numerous inquiries have been coming in almost daily for royalty interest in the various portions of this county.

CAPTAIN BARLER MAKES ARREST

The man, woman and negro together with the car were taken by the Captain to Del Rio Sunday where a complaint was lodged against them before a United States Commissioner in that city.

Two Mexicans, Ysavel Martinez and Juan Hivarra, who are employed on the Frank Harrell ranch east of town got into some difficulty last Saturday evening, growing out of a dispute in regard to the flocks they were tending, and engaged in a fist fight. One of the men, Martinez, drew a knife and stabbed the other man several times in the arm, hand and breast. Fortunately the wounds were not deep and after being attended to by Dr. Robertson the Mexican is getting along all right.

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION

Large Vote Cast Saturday Shows People Were Interested in Local Election

The largest vote polled in many years in a school trustee election in Terrell county, was cast here last Saturday when a number of qualified voters went to the polls to select a Trustee for Common School District No. 1, and for one Trustee for the County at Large. Ninety six votes were cast in the district school contest and seventy-six votes were cast in the county at large contest.

District No. 1, was fortunate in having two able, competent and loyal men in the race for trustee, Alfred E. Creigh and S. C. Bodkin. These men ran a very close race, Mr. Bodkin receiving 51 votes and Mr. Creigh 45. Max Bogusch received one vote for this office and Joe Nichols received one vote also.

Although there were no announced candidates for trustee for the county at large, Max Bogusch was easily the choice of the voters. The result for this contest was as follows: Max Bogusch 53, S. C. Bodkin 3, Al Creigh 4, J. D. Nichols 4, Clyde Griffith 3, John Nichols 2, Frank Harrell 1, W. A. Lattimer 1, W. R. House 1, John Stovell 1, W. E. Stirman 1, R. N. Allen 1, and W. E. Grigsby 1.

The interest shown in this election augurs well for the future. Too little interest has been manifested by our citizens in the past years in school elections and it has usually been a hard matter to get a mere handful of men and women to go to the polls and vote. The selection of school trustees is a very important matter; every man and woman should go to the polls and vote and when the election is over should get behind the trustees who are elected and back them up as long as they are right.

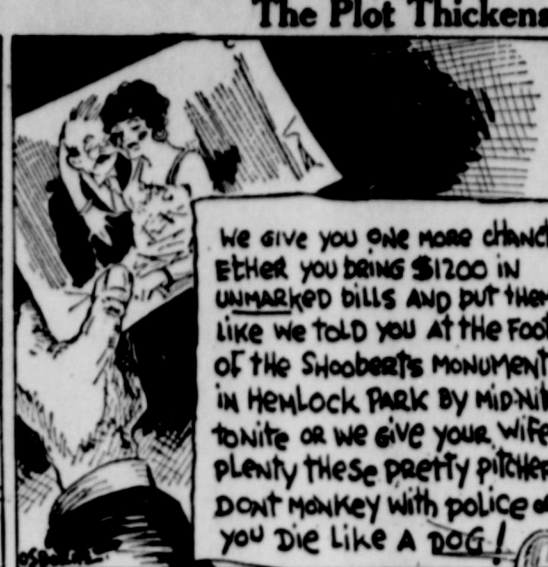

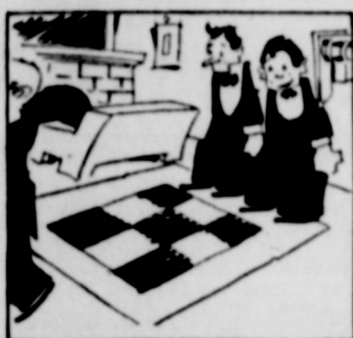

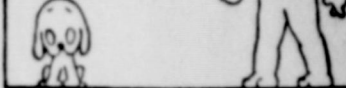

HJR No. 7

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary pro-

clamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

HJR No. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that court.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

point a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.
