

Where Rooms Are Kept Warm

There is a prevailing impression that clothes moths are active only in the spring and summer and that in the fall and winter it is not necessary to take precautions in storing summer clothing. The bureau of entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture says, however, that while moths may be more prevalent and noticeable as warm weather approaches, they are active throughout the year in apartments or other places where a steady temperature of 70 degrees F. or more is maintained.

Clothing and blankets in constant use are not often attacked. A woolen summer suit left hanging at the back of a closet, however, would exactly meet a parent moth's idea of a good place to lay her eggs. The following year the suit would likely be riddled with holes; and some of the larvae might crawl off and eat other garments, such as the evening suit that is only worn occasionally, or anything else that is not frequently brushed and shaken.

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At the end of their season any garments likely to be attacked should be thoroughly cleaned at home, brushed, beaten, and sunned, or sent to a dry cleaner. Then they should be neatly folded and put away at once in a tight red-cedar chest or other tight container such as a trunk or box which can be sealed. Chicken Wings and Backs With Eggplant

If you want a new casserole dish, have out the wings and backs the next time you cut up chickens to fry, and combine them with eggplant. These few pieces will never be missed from the platter of fried chicken and they will be enough to give savory flavor to the eggplant and make another substantial dinner dish. The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture suggests this recipe:

Wings of young chickens and pieces too bony to fry successfully are excellent prepared in this way. Salt the chicken, roll in flour, brown lightly in fat in a skillet and transfer to a casserole. Cook the eggplant, green pepper and onlon in the fat for about ten minutes, season to taste and add to the chicken in the casserole. Rinse out the skillet with one-half cupful of hot water, pour over the chicken and vegetables, cover, and cook in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) for about one hour. Serve from the dish.

Upside Down Apple Cake Is Novel and Good

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Apples are at their prime now, and a new way of serving them for dessert will be welcomed by all the family. Upside down apple cake is both novel and good to eat. As it is hot and hearty in itself, it is a good dessert to plan for one of the suddenly colder fall evenings, especially at a time when the rest of the meal does not seem quite as substantial as usual. The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture tells exactly how to make it.

1% cup butter cup sugar tsp. vanilla cups sifted soft-wheat flour 2 tsp. baking pow-

1/2 cup milk 2 to 4 firm-fleshed apples, depending on size 2 tsp. cinnamon mixed with 14 cup sugar

% tsp. salt

Cream the butter, add the sugar, well-beaten egg, and vanilla. Sift the dry ingredients together and add alternately with the milk to the first mixture. Spread a thick coating of butter on the bottom and sides of a square or oblong baking dish or a very heavy pan. Pare, quarter, and slice the apples thin, spread a single overlapping layer on the bottom of the baking dish, sprinkle with the mixture of cinnamon and sugar. Pour the cake mixture over the apples. The batter is rather thick and may need to be smoothed on top with a knife. Bake slowly in a very moderate oven (300 degrees to 325 degrees F.) for 45 minutes. Loosen the sides of the cake, turn it out carefully upside down, and the top will be covered with neat layers of transparent apples. Serve hot with hard sauce or whipped

SOME WORTHWHILE RECIPES THAT HELP IN PREPARING MEALS

The evils of life appear like rocks and precipices, rugged and barren at a distance: but at our fruitful spets .- Spectator.

The banana is one of our most popular and well liked fruits, one we can always find in our mar-

kets and it deserves a chapter all for itself. Banana Bavarois .-Scald one cupful of milk in a double boiler. Stir in two teaspoonfuls of gelatin previously soaked

in two tablespoonfuls of cold water. Add one cupful of sugar and when cold and it commences to set stir in one cupful of banana pulp

and one cupful of whipped cream. I pieces. Whip one cupful of heavy Pour into a mold and place on ice to set. Serve with:

Mousseline Sauce .- Bring one cupful of milk to a boil, add one-half cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of flavoring, mix well, set aside to cool, then add one-half cupful of whipped cream.

Banana and Coconut Dessert .- Cut four bananas each into four pieces, place in a buttered pan and sprinkle with three teaspoonfuls of lemon juice. Beat an egg white until stiff, add three tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar. Add one-half cupful of shredded coconut, put a tablespoonful of this meringue on each section of banana. Bake until brown. Serve with whipped cream.

Banana Bread Pudding.-Take three slices of bread or three rolls, break into small pieces. Pour over this two cupfuls of milk, one-half cupful of sugar, four bananas sliced, stir in lightly two beaten egg whites and bake for half an hour. Serve hot with a sauce using the two egg yolks beaten well, one-fourth of a cupful of sugar and a cupful of boiling milk; stir and flavor, then serve hot. A little lemon juice and rind may be used for the flavoring.

Banana Fluff .- Cut one-half pound of fresh marshmallows into small the St. Lawrence river.

Making Good Use of the Early Fall Apple Crop

During the fall the apple orchard sheds its treasures faster than they can be taken care of. Any apples that must be trimmed or cut up-windfall or damaged fruit-may be made into apple sauce, some of which can be stored for a few days in the refrigerator, and some canned by the waterbath process. Don't use much water in making sauce; just enough to keep ae apples from sticking to the kettle. Some people always strain apple sauce and some never do. If nutmeg is used for flavoring, do not add it until the sauce is served, for it is likely to make the flavor bitter on standing. The flavor of apple sauce may also be varied by adding lemon uice or cinnamon or cloves.

The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture gives the following very simple directions for cooking apple

Wash, pare, quarter and core the apples; or if the sauce is to be put through a colander, leave the skins on. Cook the apples until soft in a covered pan, using just enough water to keep them from scorching. If the skins have been left on, put through a colander. Sweeten to taste and add a few grains of salt.

Pour into the tray of the mechanical refrigerator or into an ice cream mold for freezing in ice and salt. If the latter, seal the opening with a cloth dipped in paraffin so no salty water can leak in.



Radio Messages First Sent During Civil War

While Marconi generally is credited | with being the inventor of wireless telegraphy, the first radio messages were sent during the Civil war, says C. Francis Jenkins, veteran inventor.

"Although Prof. Joseph Henry, in 1832, discovered that electrical oscillations could be detected a considerable distance from the oscillator, it remained for a Washington dentist, Dr. Mahlan Loomis, actually to send the first radio nessages," Mr. Jenkins

"In 1865 he built an oscillating circuit and connected it to a wire aerial supported by a kite. One station was set up on Bear Den mountain, Va., not very far from Washington, and a duplicate station was set up on top The time's up day after tomorrow mid- of Catoctin spur, 15 miles distant.

"Messages were sent alternately from one station to the other by dot and dash interruption of a buzzer spark circuit. Reception was attained by deflecting a galvanometer needle at the receiving point."

munity Scale Is Most Effective Means.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) If English sparrows are overabundant it may be the result of careless ness. The sparrows are canny for at an alarming rate. Carelessness in feeding poultry, a knot-hole in the granary floor, open doors and windows in farm buildings, or openings at the eaves create conditions that attract sparrows. Block the entries to their favored nesting places, and the birds are less likely to be troublesome.

Destroy Nests.

The next step in sparrow control recommended by the bureau of biological survey. United States Departto look up and down the enormous ment of Agriculture, includes the destruction of sparrow nests. Attacks of hog flu on broad sows and fattening shoats, feared and dreaded more than cholera by many live stock men, take a heavy toll every year with the coming of cold and stormy weather. Unlike cholera investigations, studies of flu in bogs have not yet revealed the exact cause of the disease. Veterinarians and live stock specialists find from observation and experience, however, that certain precautions in caring for the herd will greatly lessen the danger of sickness and death.

Making Silage

A method of making silage, known as the Ronning method, has come into use in the last few years and is considered the easiest known method of making silage. The standing corn is harvested and cut into proper lengths for the sile by a machine drawn and operated by a tractor. The cut corn is delivered to a wagon box drawn alongside. It is then hauled to the silo and pushed off into a blower which elevates it into the silo.





It was during this interval of betrothal before Joseph and Mary were married that God sent the angel Gabriel to announce to Mary that she was to be the mother of Jesus. More than seven hundred years before, Isalah prophesied that a virgin should give birth to a son whose name should be called Immanuel-God With Us (Isalah 7:14). Though at first perplexed, she accepted the annunciation with remarkable courage and devotion. Mary accepted motherhood at a tremendous cost. She was conscious of her virgin purity. She knew that to become a mother under such circumstances would expose her to suspicion and shame. This was the view that certain Jews took of the matter, for they cast into the face of Jesus, that he was born of fornication (John 8:41). Her faith was such that she responded with noble courage.

Puncturing Fruit Skin The bee is not a damager of fruitdoes not puncture the skin to get at the juice within. This has been iterated and reiterated, but is again mentioned because of a query from a reader as to how to get rid of bees which "ruin his grapes." Is poison sirup feasible? he asks. M. H. Kimball, assistant farm adviser of Los Angeles county. Calif., declares that the honey bee couldn't puncture the skin of a grape if it wanted to-its mouth parts are simply not made for that purpose. The bee will, however, take advantage of a break in the skin, whether natural splitting due to overripeness or from the attacks of other forms of life, and will gather at the new source of nectar. Because the bee is not a criminal, the law protects it against poisons.

by Use of Bordeaux Potato leaf hoppers may be controlled by using bordeaux mixture, whether the leaf hoppers are on the potatoes, beans, sugar beets, or other

In weather favorable to the leaf hoppers, it may take only a week or two to result in the loss of an entire crop where no control measures are put into effect. Leaf hoppers have fewer natural enemies than most other insect pests. Bordeaux mixture made according to the 4-4-50 formula is usually applied. High pressure is necessary for effective control. Thorough spraying is essential.

Grass Under Trees

In hot, dry summer, when available food and water are scarce, the tree with its deep roots and large leaf surface is too strong a competitor for the grass with narrow blades and shallow roots. For grass under trees, liberal watering and applications of nitrate fertilizer made at the rate of two pounds to 1,000 square feet of area, every two weeks during summer, are recommended as helpful by Ohio university specialists.

My in structor brought the ship back to level and turned around to look at mestudying my face to make certain his "examples" had made the impression he desired.

Flying a Pattern

How to fly a "pattern"—a square course about the field that starts from the ground, into the wind, and ends in a glide to earth, also into the wind, putting down approximately where the take-off started-is next taught. It starts "take-off and landing" practice.

My instructor taxied out to the starting point, zigzagging constantly to "clear" the blind spot caused by the motor ahead of us. After the two stops for "a look around" for other planes, he "blasted" the motor and we headed into the wind.

"Stay on the controls with me but be light on them," he instructed through the speaking tube connected to my belmet. "Notice that I push the throttle open slowly but steadily and as the ship starts forward I also push the stick forward.

"As I do that the tall will come up to flying position. I'll hold the stick forward for a few seconds as we run along the ground, then allow it to come back slowly, finally pulling it toward me slightly to increase the angle of climb."

With that he "gave 'er the gun" and we were off. At 1,000 feet we leveled off, he cut the motor's speed to "cruis ing" or 1.450 r. p. m., and signaled for me to make a right turn.

I made the turn, after a fashion, lev eled out again, flew a quarter of a mile straight, then, at his command turned right again. A mile straight ahead he called for another right turn and after I made it, cut the motor to

lilling and signaled for a glide, "About every 15 seconds open the throttle until all cylinders 'hit.' then cut it again," he said through the tube. "We 'clear' the motor to make certain it will function properly when

we need it." About opposite our starting point I turned right again, still glidingwith his frequent assistance-unheaded for the field. About 20 fee: from the ground, measured perpendi cularly, he spoke again.
