Chocolate Sundae Made at Home.

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of Agriculture.)—WNU Service. Chocolate sundae is one of the most popular of all soda fountain dishes. There is no reason why anyone who cares to go to the trouble of making ice cream once in a while should not frequently enjoy this excellent combination of chocolate sauce and ice cream right at home. Either vanilla or chocolate ice cream may be used, but vanilla seems to be generally liked.

Almost everyone has a favorite rectpe for vanilla ice cream, but in case yours is not at hand, here are two different ones from the bureau of home economics, United States Department of Agriculture. The first is for french vanilla ice cream, made with double cream and egg white and frozen without stirring in a mechanical refrigerator or by packing in the usual way in ice and salt. The plain mousse is very rich, especially when chocolate sauce is added to it. Small portions will be sufficient. Be sure to keep the chocolate sauce hot in the double boiler when this dessert is served. Sponge cake, sunshine cake, lady fingers or angel food would be a good choice to accoripany the chocolate sundae, rather than a layer cake with fring.

French Vanilla Ice Cream. 1 cuart milk % cup sugar % pint double cream % tsp. salt 1 % tsp. vanilla

Heat the milk, sugar, and salt in a double boiler. Beat the eggs slightly and mix in some of the hot milk. Pour back into the double boiler and stir constantly until the custard coats the spoon. Cool, add the cream and vanilla, mix well, and freeze. For the freezing mixture use one part of salt to six parts of ice and turn the crank slowly during freezing. Remove the dasher, pack with more ice and sait and let the cream stand an hour or more to ripen.

These proportions will make over four cupfuls before freezing, or, if the egg whites are not used, about three cup-

1 squares unsweet- 1/2 cup milk ened chocolate 1 ths. butter granulated is top. salt

Melt the chocolate in a double boiler, add the sugar, milk, butter and salt, and cook for ten minutes or until fairly thick. Add the vanilla, beat well, and serve hot over ice cream.

#### Fresh Cherries Will Make Welcome Desserts

(Prepared by the United States Department

of Agriculture.)-WNU Service. The cherry season is relatively short, and while it lasts it is a good plan to treat the family to fresh cherries as often as possible. The tart red cherries make excellent pies and puddings. There are several little "tricks of the trade" in making any ple from juicy fruits, in order to keep the undercrust from being soggy and the juice from running out. The bureau of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture explains what they are:

Fresh Cerrry Pie.

d cups tart julcy 2 the butter pitted cherries 14 tsp. salt ths. cornstarch Pastry 1 cup sugar

Simmer the cherries for five minutes and drain. When the juice has cooled, mix the cornstarch with it, cook until thickened, and add the cherries, sugar, butter and salt, and mix well.

Line a deep pie tin with pastry and bake until the crust is a golden brown. Pour in the hot fruit mixture, moisten the rim of the crust, and place the uncooked crust over the fruit. Turn the dough over the cooked crust tightly so the juice will not escape during cooking. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees F. to 400 degrees F.) for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown.

#### Machines That Are Almost Human By E. C. TAYLOR

Electric Fleas

D ID you ever watch a circus of trained fleas perform; see them imitating human beings in their stunts beneath a microscope?

Science has trained electric "fleas" to do much more. These electric "fleas" are wonderful creatures; they have been made to put out fires, guard money, turn on street lights and perform other marvelous tasks.

These "fleas" are cheap, too. For a nickel one can buy 230,000,000,000,000 of them and they are easily put to work, according to Dr. Philips Thomas, research engineer of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company laboratories in Pittsburgh, Pa.

An ounce of these "fleas" represents 100,000 kilowatt hours of energy. You press a button and 160,000,000 of them a second pass along the wires of your electric toaster at the breakfast table each morning.

Doctor Thomas christened them "fleas." These remarkably energetic creatures of science are simply electrons, the "building blocks of the universe." They are all exactly alike and can be depended upon in their actions.

Electric "fleas" made their public debut at the annual meeting of the American Institute in New York in February, 1929. They watched the guests at dinner, counted them and guarded them from a fire.

Instead of speakers, a pail of mixed gasoline and kerosene was placed at the head of the table. Beside it was a device controlled by a photo-electric eye. This is a vacuum tube resembling an electric light bulb and it is so sensitive that it registers the most minute changes in light faster than the human eye can perceive

Doctor Thomas struck a match to the pail of explosive mixture. It flamed, but just as the flames leaped high, the new mechanical marvel went to work. It promptly put out the fire. The light of the flames when it reached the vacuum tube started machinery that brought a fire extinguisher into play, and a blanket of gas poured over the flames quickly smothered them.

The instrument looked something like a hooded camera. It moved around until it pointed at the flames, and then released the streams of fireextinguisher.

Doctor Thomas predicts that this machine will eventually do away with expensive fire-fighting apparatus.

"It is almost human," he said. "I got too close to the fire while experimenting one day and it squirted all over me. I'll swear I heard it chuckle. It would be operated from co with a number of photo cell units and wide area lenses covering the floor. The present sprinkler system needs heat to turn it on. This will need only the light from the fire, and it would operate in the restricted sur-

face of the light." As another demonstration of what his harnessed electric "fleas" can do, Doctor Thomas presented "Rastus," his mechanical man, with an apple on his head and re-enacted the William Tell episode.

His bow and arrow were ultra-modern. It shot light rays instead of arrows. The light flashed and the apple fell. Rastus stood up and bowed and spoke a few words to his audience,

then sat down again. All this was done through the medium of the new vacuum tubes, in which the electric "fleas" perform at the bidding of their scientist-trainer.

Scientists are at work perfecting this device for work in the industries on large scale. New intimations are being given continually, said Doctor Thomas, of the vast scope of the tasks the electric "fleas" may perform. One demonstration showed that it

could be made to turn on and off the street lights of a city. The photoelectric tubes, highly sensitive to the fading light of day, turned on a series of street lights as dusk fell, and when daylight approached the next morning, it turned them off. This highly sensitive device operat-

ed by slight variations in light is now at work in many branches of industry. It matches colors, sorts fruit and vegetables and does many other tasks that place it in the class of thinking machines.

#### Uncompleted Palace

The edifice known as Dick's castle, near Nelsonville, N. Y., was intended for a residence. The building is a massive concrete structure of Spanish architecture, containing many spaclous rooms. If completed, this building would have been one of the largest and most beautiful residences in America, or at least along the Hudson.

### Work Begun on New U.S. Prison

#### Most Modern Institution in World Will Cost About \$12,000,000.

Lewisburg. Pa.-Preliminary construction has started on the world's most modern prison, the new United States federal penitentiary for the northwestern district, on a 26-acre tract in Kelly township, Pennsylvania.

Construction work of the general outline and the first unit is in charge of the Great Lakes Construction company of Chicago,

The contract, awarded for \$2,781,000, calls for completion of the first section, to accommodate about 1,500 prisoners, in 425 working days, The entire project covers a ten-year

building program, an expenditure of about \$12,000,000 and a penitentiary to accommodate 5,000 prisoners to be drawn from the northeastern section of the United States.

#### Wall 21 Feet High.

The builders' first task was grading the site by removing from 8 to 10 inches of top soil over the 26-acre area, jurisdiction over which has been ceded to the federal government by l'ennsylvainia.

The wall, which will surround the tract, will rise 21 feet and will be 8 feet below the surface. Estimates of materials to be used included 3,500,000 bricks, 650,000 square feet of cement block, 65,000 barrels of cement, 70,000 tons of sand, 60,000 tons of cut stone, and 30,000 tons of other stone.

Wells are being dug to provide adequate water supply. The Reading railroad has run a two-mile siding to the tract. Electric lines and telephone wires are being strung from here.

Within the walls construction will express some of the new ideas in prison arrangement and penal practice to be developed at the peniten-

The familiar "big house" of most prisons will be missing. Accommodations will range from a small block with inside cells for less tractable inmates to small dormitory apartments for the most peaceable prisoners, offering them living quarters on par with those of an average salaried person. Conduct and character will determine occupancy of the more favored dormitories.

Inside the walls, too, will be buildings providing kitchen, baking, refrigerating, butchering, and manufacturing facilities; classrooms and laboratories; a hospital; a radio room; a theater and auditorium and a comfortable library. Outdoors extensive fields for farming and dairying have been

#### For Hardened Criminal.

Direct sunlight and an abundance of fresh air will be provided in the plans arranged by Alfred Hopkins, New York architect.

There will be a small inside cell block for hardened or habitual offenders; strong outside rooms for prisoners whose records show some measure of trust can be placed in them; barracks for prisoners who show they can live peaceably with other prisoners; small dormitories subdivided into small wards for those prisoners who express the greatest improvement in character while imprisoned, and, finally, rooms approximating the comforts and conveniences of the living quarters of normal persons for those who are most advanced.

On admission the prisoner will be housed in a receiving building where examination.

Should he prove normal physically and mentally his first home will be the outside rooms. From that confinement he can advance by his own actions to the barracks, to the dormitories, and finally to the living quarters for the highest type prisoners.

The construction of the first unit will require a two-year period. It will accommodate 1,500 inmates and will cost approximately \$3,500,000.

#### Detroit Will Preserve Its Famous Courtroom

Detroit.-Although Detroit's historic old building is to be torn down to make way for a modern structure, its famous "million-dollar" courtroom, in laid with marble, will be preserved. The marble and mahogany will be carefully removed and installed in a new courtroom in the new building. The marble came from nearly every one of the 48 states and from many foreign nations. The new courtroom will be the finest and most costly federal courtroom in America.



He turned them out with such persistent regularity that the sporting writers began to take notice and dig into their records. They had to throw them away because the Babe made new ones, and continued to do so until temporary incapacity curtailed his output.

What has enabled Babe Ruth to achieve his reputation on the diamond? Some people will say that it is his powerful swing of the bat, made possible by great strength in his arms. This is true, but equally important is the good eyesight which is essential when a fast ball is coming toward the man at the bat.

It is not only the sturdy arms of Helen Wills, but it is also her steady eye that make her queen of the tennis court. Bill Tilden, Jack Dempsey, Bobby Jones and the other topnotchers in the field of sport owe their reputations and success largely to the fact that they are blessed with healthy eyes as well as strong bodies.

Good eyesight is also important to the thousands of sport fans who go to watch their favorites perform. One cannot truly enjoy any athletic game, whether in playing or watching, unless one has clear vision.

Without such good eyesight that a strategic situation may be seen accurately and understood at a moment's glance, one cannot acquire skill in any sport. Most professional athletes realize this, and therefore, take every precaution to keep their eyes in good condition. Sometimes it is necessary for the athlete to wear glasses, but this does not mean that his days of usefulness on the field are past,

It is interesting to note that a few of the best known ball players in the major leagues find it necessary to wear glasses. Lee Mendows, an outstanding pitcher in the National league for several years, wore glasses in the pitcher's box. Another pitcher who wears them is Vic Sorrell of the Detroit Tigers, who is one of this year's sensations. Others are Toporcher and MacFayden. Glasses are worn on the baseball field also by Chick Hafey, outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals, and by Mark Koenig, shortstop of the Detroit team in the American league. who is rather well known in New York city where he was shortstop for the Yankees for several years. Hafey and Koenig are the first fielders in baseball to wear glasses while playing.

Glasses are worn in other sports also. In tennis, for Instance, Watson a member of the United States Davis cup team, has worn glasses on the tennis court for a long time. And in golf, Willie McFarlane, former national open champion and now a professional in Westchester county, New York, usually wears glasses while playing.

In colleges and high school throughout the United States, athletic directors are specially careful about the eyesight of members of the various school teams. Incidentally, boys and girls of high school age seem to be most susceptible to accidents that involve eye injuries. Perhaps this is so because they are very active at that age.

The National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, in a survey of eye accidents, found a strange variety of hazards in athletics, in the home, and especially in industry. There was a record of a painful injury when, in wreatling, one boy's finger found its way into one of his opponent's eyes. Also, there was the incident of one basketball player who apparently confused the eyes of another player with the basket at which he was supposed to be aiming. One university student was so confident of his own abilities that he took off his mask while fencing and had one eye put out by his

opponent's foil. In many sports there are chances of injuring the eyes with a ball-golf ball, tennis ball, baseball, handball, basketball, football and others. Increase Moisture by Summer Fallow

Winter Wheat Is an Ideal Crop to Follow With.

(By A. L. Clapp, Extension Crops Spe-cialist, Kansas State Agricultural College.)

Summer fallow in wheat production acts as a moisture storing measure for the following wheat crop.

Winter wheat is an ideal crop to follow fallow, for fallowing the ground stores the moisture deeply in the soil, and the winter wheat roots have the ability to feed at least six feet deep, which is almost the possible depth of moisture storage with one year of fallow.

Summer fallow not only stores moisture but gives an opportunity for the wheat farmer to turn under the accumulation of straw and thoroughly decay it before the next crop is planted; an essential practice for maintaining soil humus and fertility.

A year of fallow will give time for some insoluble plant foods to change their form, become soluble and available to the plant. #### Anemia Among Suckling Pigs Can Be Prevented

Last year the Wisconsin experiment station told us that lack of iron and copper in the sow's milk caused anemia in suckling pigs, and that feeding these two minerals in suitable compounds to the pigs would prevent the disease.

In the preliminary investigations iron and copper were fed once daily, says the Prairie Farmer. We are now told that feeding a pig 150 milligrams of iron (ferric sulphate) and 25 milligrams of copper (copper sulphate) nce a week will prevent the disease, Druggists can make these solutions and tell you how much to feed to give each pig the above quantities of the required minerals.

At the Illinois station it has been found that applying a solution con taining iron and copper to the tests of the sow once or twice daily will prevent the discase. A corn sirup solution made by dissolving 15.7 grams of copper sulphate in a half liter of water, slowly adding with shaking 85.6 grams of powdered ferric citrate after the solution is brought to a boil, then adding a pint of corn sirup to the mixture was found especially easy to

#### Favor Small Container

#### for Market Tomatoes

The profit in early tomatoes grown for market depends a great deal on the type of package the tomatoes are sold in. E. R. Lancashire says that vegetable collecting trucks in southern Ohio offered \$1.25 at the farms for 10pound baskets of early tomatoes when 20-pound baskets were selling for \$1.50 in the Columbus market. The reasons why the smaller container sells to better advantage are: Straight sided small baskets permit packing fruits (if you grant the tomato is a fruit) of uniform size, whereas the 20-pound climay basket necessitates small ones beneath and big ones on top. Another thing, the two layers of tomatoes in the smaller basket are divided by corrugated paper, so there is less damage in hanling to market. A paper liner in the straight-sided basket will help the price, too.

#### Swine Feeding Tests

In Missouri swine feeding tests last year the addition of alfalfa meal to a corn and tankage ration increased the rate and economy of gains, 11 pounds of alfalfa meal replacing approximately 32 pounds of corn and 4 pounds of tankage. Adding small amounts of cottonseed meal or linseed meal and alfalfa meal increased slightly the rate of gain and decreased the feed required per unit of gain as compared to tankage alone, but large amounts of cottonseed meal had the opposite effect.





Famous Botanic Garden The Botanic garden in Washington was established by the Columbian Institute for the Promotion of Arts and Sciences, incorporated by an act of congress April 20, 1818. The present site was granted by congress in 1820 and there is a tradition that George Washington contemplated the establishment of gardens in this locality. Up to 1836 no improvements had been made. The tract was a stagnant and malarial swamp and congress was prevailed upon to make an appropriation of \$5,000 for improvements. The real beginning, however, of the Botanic garden dates from the Wilkes exploration expedition of 1838 to 1842. The staff included a botanist, W. D. Breckenridge, who brought back from an expedition to the South seas a large collection of specimens, including seeds and cuttings. This formed the nucleus of the botanical collec-

"Pain in most lower animals acts as a sort of burglar alarm, which has no feeling of itself but gives notice that something definite is wrong and can probably be set right by certain standardized actions. If animals really had the sensitive feelings that are sometimes attributed to them, what a horrible agony life in natural conditions would be for them. What nonsense it is to talk about the agony of a lobster being plunged alive into boiling water." While canned lobsters are largely used today, there is still a demand for the fresh lobsters, which are shipped alive and are conveniently killed by putting in boiling water, a process which changes the green shells to an attractive red.
