



Electric plating makes it possible to deposit nickel, gold, silver, or other metal on a cheaper metal much easier and cheaper than the old Sheffield method by which metals were welded to gether at high temperature. The article to be plated is immersed in a solution of the desired metal. An electric current passing through it attracts the fine metat particles. 




