Art Group Will Hold Exhibit

The Friona Art Association has announced plans to again hold a juried art exhibit during Maize Days but the rules will be somewhat different from last year's show.

Those entering pictures in the show must be members of the Tri-State Artists Association. Annual membership in the group is \$10.00. Entry fee for the show will be set at \$5.00 per picture with a limit of three pictures per person.

Art works should be brought to the Depot in the City Park on Saturday, September 18 from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Works must be framed and ready for hanging and may be in any of the following categories: oil/acrylics, watercolor, pastels/drawings, or "other" (which may include sculpture or other mediums). First, second, third and honorable mention will be awarded in each category, plus the judge's "Best of Show" and "People's Choice" to be selected by the public.

Judging will be held on Sunday, September 19, with the artist's reception and judge's critique to be held that afternoon from 3:30 to 5:30 in the Depot. Then the show will be open to the public on Saturday September 25 before and after the parade from 9 a.m. till 2 p.m. Artists are asked to pick up their works between the hours of 2 to 4 p.m.

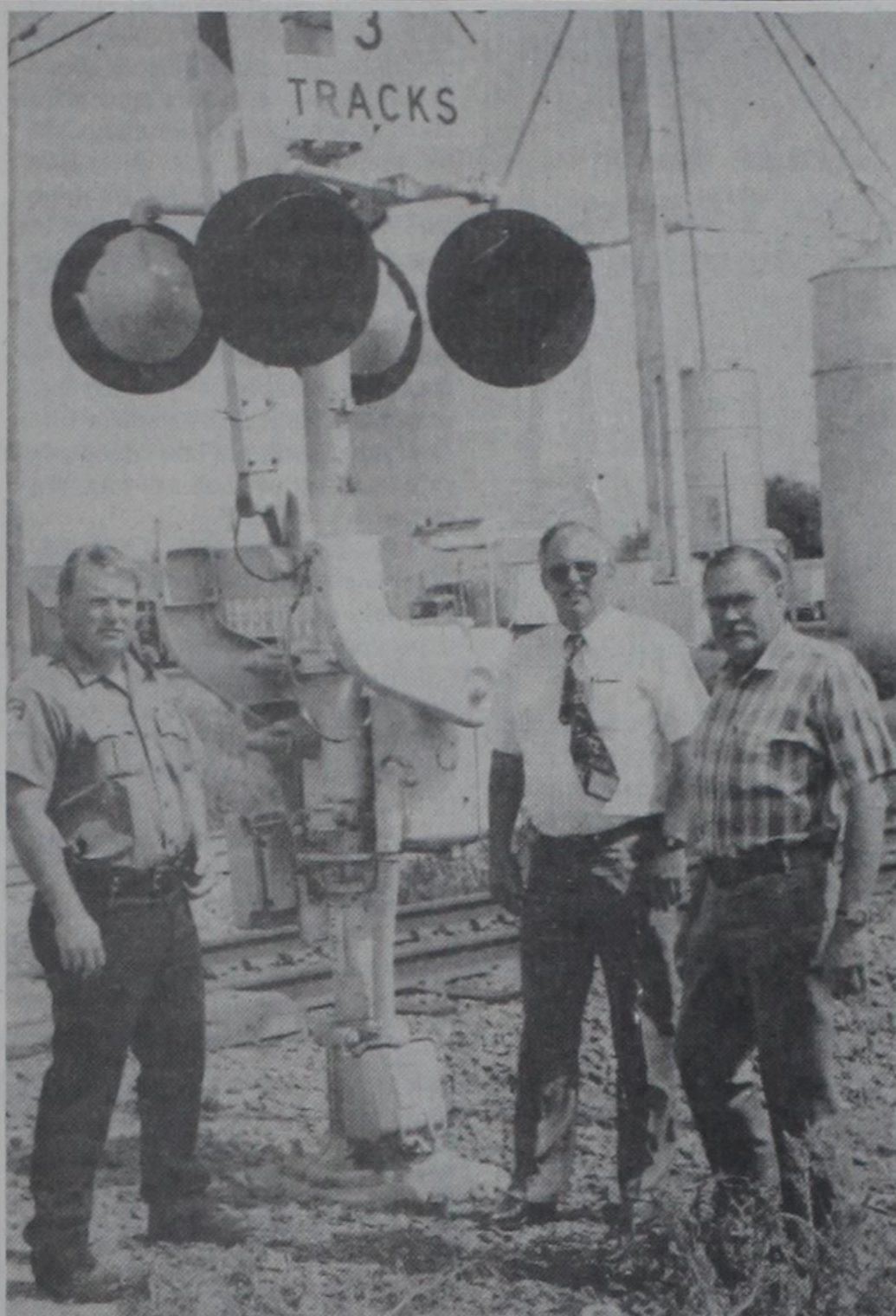
MDA Telethon Set This Weekend

County: "We Can't Supply Blank Check For Rural Fires"

As a follow-up to the article in last week's edition of the Friona Star, regarding the rural fire hassle between the City of Friona and Parmer County, County Judge Bonnie Clayton and Commissioner John Mars gave an interview with publisher Bill Ellis this week, explaining the county's side of the problem.

The county attorney strongly advised us against signing the contract offered to us on August 20 by the City of Friona, due to certain long-term liabilities that it contained," Mars said.

The commissioner said that the contract, a three-page document, was something that the county just could not accept. "The court felt like the City of Friona was asking us to supply them a blank checkbook for the rural fire calls," Mars added.

"Last week's article sounded somewhat like the county commissioners had been sitting back and ignoring the problem, when in reality we have discussed it at great lengths," the Precinct 1 commissioner explained.

Mars and Mrs. Clayton explained that the commissioners had decided to include in its 1994 budget a line item in the amount of \$50,000 for rural fire protection for the county.

Their initial idea was to give each of the fire departments \$5,000. That would leave \$20,000 in the budget to be divided up among Friona, Bovina and Farwell fire departments according to their percentage of rural fire calls.

In recent years, the county has paid \$4,000 to each of the county's fire departments.

"In addition, virtually every year we have made a contribution to the Friona Fire Department for its extra expenses. Sometimes it has been split between the fire department and the ambulance service," said Mrs. Clayton.

"We are interested in a long-term solution to the rural fire protection problem," the county judge concluded.

Exit Test Schedules Are Given

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or more sections of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) or the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test this fall.

Testing will be on the following dates: TAAS--October 19, writing; October 20, reading; October 21, mathematics; TEAMS--October 20, english language arts; October 21, mathematics.

Beginning the fall of 1993, ALL individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test (s) must register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements.

Only those who are no longer enrolled in school and have not met expectations on all sections of the TAAS must register. A registration packet may be picked up at any high school campus, district central office or education service center. In Friona, call or visit with Mr. Morgan at Friona High School, 247-3952.

Completed forms need to be received in Iowa City, Iowa no later than 5 p.m., September 28.

Texas R.R.C. Concerned By Rash Of Fatal Accidents

When a Clovis resident was killed at a Santa Fe Railway crossing at Farwell at an early hour Wednesday morning, he became the eighth railway fatality in Parmer County in less than a year.

What has caused this spiraling number of fatal crashes involving vehicles at railway crossings?

No one has an answer.

Two representatives of the Railroad Commission of Texas' railroad safety division were in Parmer County on Wednesday to make an on-site inspection, and to visit with local officials.

Everett Hendricks and Walter Gibson, both Railroad Safety Inspectors, admit that there is "no apparent reason" for the unusual rash of deadly crashes within the borders of Parmer County.

"You'll see it (fatal crashes) go in cycles like this, but in the case of Parmer County, it has just ballooned beyond the usual situation," Hendricks said.

"Motorists need to be made to understand the weight, speed, force, etc., of the trains. The railroad fatality is the most preventable type of traffic fatality," Gibson said.

The two representatives of the Railroad Commission spent Wednesday visiting with law officials, including Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, with officials at the Excel Corporation, and school officials.

"We would be happy to meet with any group or organization at any time, to discuss the situation," the commission representatives said.

They also pointed out that if any citizen has a suggestion about how to curtail crossing accidents, they welcomed their call.

"Motorists need to respect railroad crossings. It needs to be ingrained into their thinking, much as when the need for using seat-belts was being pushed. These fatalities can only happen at crossings," Gibson said.

"We're looking for answers to the problem. We're not necessarily here to tell the residents what to do," the RRC representatives said.

Wreck Toll Runs Past '92 By 11-0

Wrecks in Parmer County for calendar 1993 have killed 11 people, according to District DPS official Wayne Beighle.

At the same point in 1992, there had not been a single traffic fatality.

Five of the 11 1993 deaths have come at railroad crossings. There were three others the last quarter of 1992, or eight fatalities in a one-year period.

Fatalities have been as follows: February 28: one near Bovina; May 1: one at crossing near Lariat; June 11: Percy Merritt, inside Friona city limits; July 24: Manuel Garcia and Martin Barrientos, north of Friona.

August 16: Gregorio Gutierrez, Greg Gutierrez and Maria Gutierrez, crossing near Friona; August 22: Matthew Gray and Carolyn Cecelle Davis, near Bovina; September 1: Bouakhanh Thavonseouk, railroad crossing at Farwell.

Mrs. Young's Rites Held Tuesday In Hereford

Funeral services for Annie Pearl Young, 97, were conducted Tuesday morning at the Rose Chapel of Gililand-Watson Funeral Home with Doug Manning, pastor of the Fellowship of Believers Church, officiating.

Burial was in Hereford's Rest Lawn Memorial Park.

Mrs. Young passed away August 28 in Hereford.

She was born March 27, 1896, the third of eight children born to John Ruben and Emily Jane Martin.

When she was 11, the family moved by wagon to Broken Arrow, Indian Territory (Oklahoma), then to Texola, Oklahoma when she was 12 and to Erick, Oklahoma at age 18.

She met Ethridge Young at Erick and they were married in 1920 in Oklahoma City in a double ceremony with Mr. Young's sister and husband, Noah and Belle Ewton.

Mr. and Mrs. Young and their three children moved to Deaf Smith County in 1934, moving to Hereford in 1939. She lived at the same address in Hereford until her death, except living part of the time with her daughter in Friona.

Mrs. Young had been a member of First Baptist Church of Hereford since 1940, when she, her husband and children Edward and Frances were baptized together. The Faithful Workers class of the church adopted her as their "class mother." She was a faithful church member and attended Sunday School on a regular basis before health problems interfered.

Mrs. Young was a member of the American Legion Auxiliary. She was a self-taught seamstress, sewing for her family and at one time making little girls' petticoats for Neiman-Marcus.

She was preceded in death by her husband in 1968 and by a son Edward in 1984.

Survivors include one son, Neal Young of Hereford; one daughter, Frances Euler of Friona, six grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren; and one brother,

Chess Martin of Denver, Colorado.

Pallbearers were great-grandsons, Jim and Ryan Young of Edmond, Oklahoma; and Josh, Rory and Chip Malouf of Levelland.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

It is sad that there cannot be an agreement on things until you go to blows first. You would think that in a small area where everyone knows everyone that an agreement could be reached before things got to that point. It's just like Washington D.C. You kiss mine and I'll kiss yours, but you have to kiss mine first. Therefore, nothing gets done.

I have a thought for the city and county officials that are negotiating this deal. You say that as of October 1, the Volunteer Fire Department will not be making any calls any further than 1/2 mile out of the city limits.

This bothers me. I pay my school, county and hospital taxes. The only reason I don't pay city tax is because I do not live in the city. I do pay sales tax to the city on things that I buy. My house sets 4 and 1/2 miles from the city on the highway. If my insurance company finds out that I do not have access to a fire department, are my insurance rates going to go up in addition to the taxes I pay?

I would hate the thought of what I might do if my house caught on fire and the Volunteer Fire

Department could not come put it out because the county and city officials could not come to an agreement.

The city says it has an ordinance (#481) that says it doesn't have to go outside the city. You may have it, but has it ever been tried in court? I would say that if it were, I would be a little worried. I'd bet that 1/2 the jurors, or more, could be home owners, and probably some of them would live outside the city limits.

Don't you think they would put themselves in that position, and that could influence their decision? I don't think that I would take that chance. I would hate to see someone end up owning part of the city or county because of a lawsuit.

As far as the county paying \$4,000 per year to the city, don't you realize that everything else has gone up? Are you wanting a lot for a little? It just seems to me that if everybody would try to help one another instead of hurt one another, there is no telling what could be accomplished. Who knows, maybe we could even agree on something.

In case some have forgotten, we have a **Volunteer Fire Department**. A lot of the equipment they have, the men have raised the money for it, or it has been donated. I would also like to say that we have one of the best Volunteer Fire Departments there is. The men take pride in, and are proud of what they are doing. You

can tell by watching them in action. We are very fortunate to have those men.

I am not choosing sides in this matter, however, it needs to be resolved before something bad happens that someone will regret. I am not claiming to know all of what's going on, or know all the figures that are involved in this matter. I am saying that the ones that are involved in trying to come to an agreement, are paid and/or elected officials, by the people, for the people, and to help the people of the community, and the county.

If the county and city does not come to an agreement before October 1, then they are not doing their job! **BURY THE RIVALRY!! DO YOUR JOB!!!!**



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Latin American Markets Increase Beyond Mexico

"Texas last year exported \$4.3 billion worth of goods to the Americas to the south, not including Mexico," State Comptroller John Sharp says.

"That's a 40% increase since 1988, and it has created 82,000 good Texas jobs."

Texas trade with Latin America is explored in the latest issue of *Fiscal Notes*, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division. The *Fiscal Notes* article foreshadows a larger look Sharp is taking at this and other critical issues in *The Forces of Change*, which is scheduled to be released later this year.

Sharp said that Mexico is still Texas' largest Latin American trading partner, accounting for four-fifths of the state's total exports to Latin America.

"Texas did more than \$23.1 billion worth of business with the hemisphere in 1992," Sharp said, "and nearly \$19 billion of that was with Mexico, supporting some 360,000 Texas jobs. Clearly, our immediate southern neighbor is our most important Latin American trading partner--and will remain so for years to come."

Still, Sharp said that the other Americas to the south represent an enormous emerging market for Texas goods and services.

"The unique geography of Texas, which has set us astride the world's most dramatic boundary between an industrialized power and a developing one, highlights an undeniable link to the South," Sharp said.

"Texas should now seize the opportunity to become the catalyst for a new spirit of energy and genuine partnership with Latin America and the Caribbean over the next generation."

Sharp said that the continuing debate over the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) has underscored the importance of multilateral trade and investment growth among the nations of the Western Hemisphere.

"Since 1988, Texas trade with the Mercosur trading bloc--Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay--has increased 21%, from \$727 million to \$878 million a year.

Trade with the Andean Pact nations--Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, Venezuela and Peru--has increased 36%, from \$1.8 billion to more than \$2.4 billion a year.

"Trade with the countries in the Central American Common Market--Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras and Costa Rica--has grown 69%, from \$376 million to \$636 million a year," Sharp said.

Sharp also said that Texas' top five exports to Latin America last year were electronic and electrical equipment and parts--appliances,

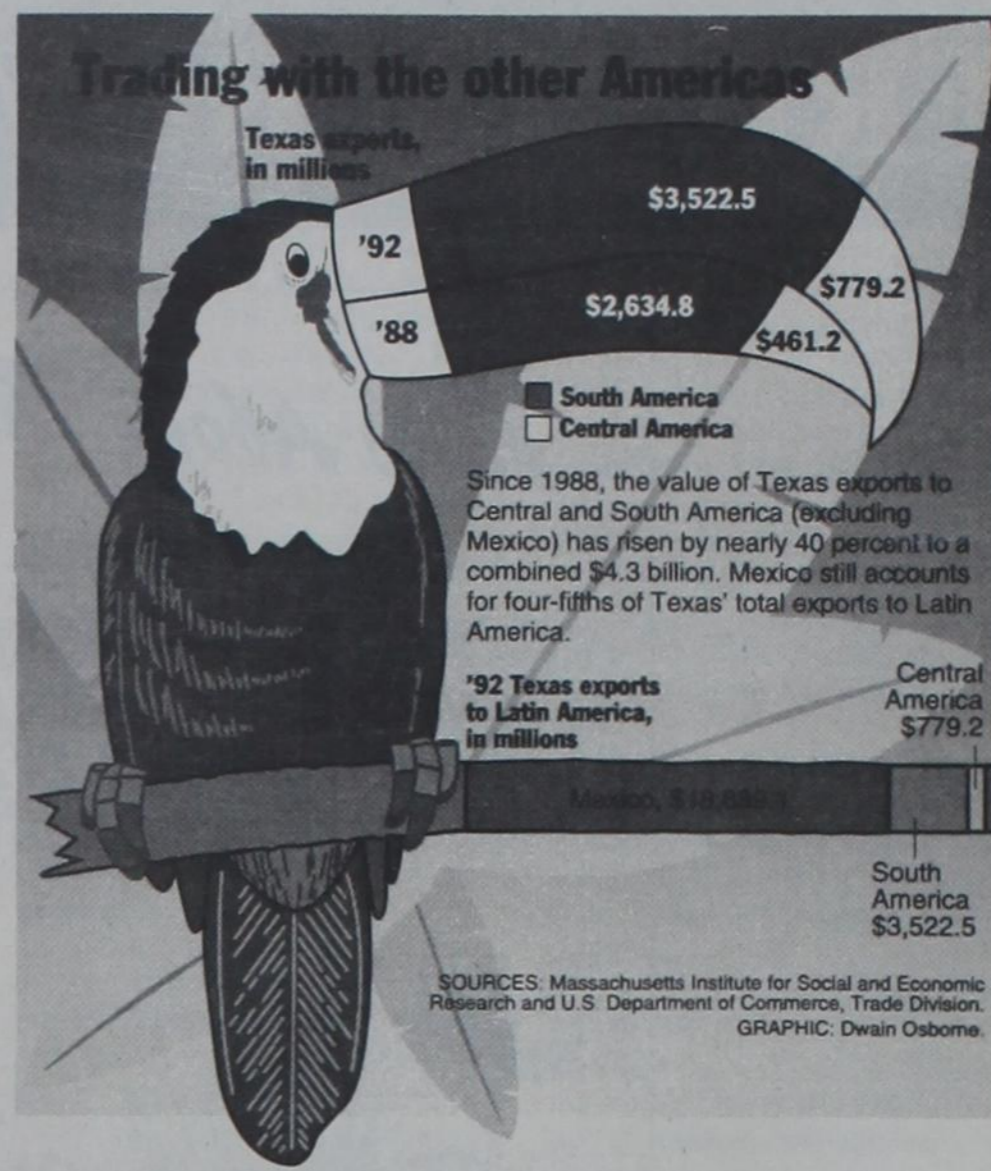
consumer electronics and communications devices--industrial and commercial machinery and computer equipment, transportation equipment, chemicals and allied products and primary metals. These five industries alone accounted for \$14.7 billion, or 63%, of the state's total 1992 shipments to Latin America.

"These emerging economies offer Texas the potential for unprecedented, dynamic growth," Sharp said. "Latin America's total gross domestic product is more than \$860 billion, a market three times as large as Central and Eastern Europe and greater than the entire Southeast Asian market, excluding Japan."

Sharp said that regardless of the ultimate fate of NAFTA and other trade liberalization efforts, Texas is positioned as a "natural bridge" among the nations of the hemisphere.

"The economic integration of the Americas is moving forward--with or without Texas participation," Sharp said. "Texas should lead the way toward general agreements beyond the specifics of NAFTA and help establish broad principles for the conduct of commerce throughout the hemisphere."

"This is the moment to consolidate our inevitable partnership with the rest of the hemisphere--and to devise a statewide economic strategy that places Texas securely in the center of a new hemispheric alliance," Sharp said.



Carnival Sets Dates For '93 Appearance

Friona Evening Lions Club announces that the carnival that their club sponsors annually will be in town September 7-11.

Westland Amusements of Odessa plans to bring ten to 12 rides, with things for the young carnival-goers to the older ones. This is the same carnival that appeared here last year, and it will be very similar as far as the rides are concerned.

A special promotion is being planned for Thursday, September 9, which will be Family Night. Tickets will be available that evening only at \$7 per person, which allows the purchaser to ride as many rides as they wish to all night long.

SPS Updates Officials On Texas Rate Review

Southwestern Public Service Company said this week it continues visits with city officials throughout its Texas service area to update them on a rate hearing that began August 31 in Austin.

"To date we have not been able to reach an agreement relative to our future retail rates," said SPS President Coyt Webb. "But we feel there is a lot of support to get this

divisive and expensive process behind us. SPS remains open to settling this case."

"Even though some parties have claimed that SPS is over-earning," Webb said, "SPS, just like most of the people in the area we serve, has had declining earnings. Last year our earnings were at a five-year low, and we won't do much better this year. Also, we think we have contributed to the well-being of our customers during these tough economic times by continuing to lower our rates and by actively pursuing new markets and operating efficiencies."

SPS filed additional testimony in the rate review this week and overall has prepared more than 20,000 pages of information and data. The rate review was initiated by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in October 1992.

"The company has provided answers to more than 2,100 questions submitted by regulators and intervenors," Webb said, "so we are not guessing at costs. SPS has examined every dollar. Based on this most recent cost-of-service study, if all of SPS's true costs to provide electric service were fully recognized, its average retail rate would increase by about one percent. But we did not initiate a filing to increase rates."

"We have acknowledged that some reduction in electric rates may result as a reflection of today's lower interest rates," Webb said. "But we disagree with the level proposed by other parties. First, the return on equity proposed is much less than what has been recommended for other utilities with much higher rates. And second, we believe it just makes good sense to reward outstanding performance, rather than impose a penalty. SPS's electric rates already are the lowest among all investor-owned utilities in the state."

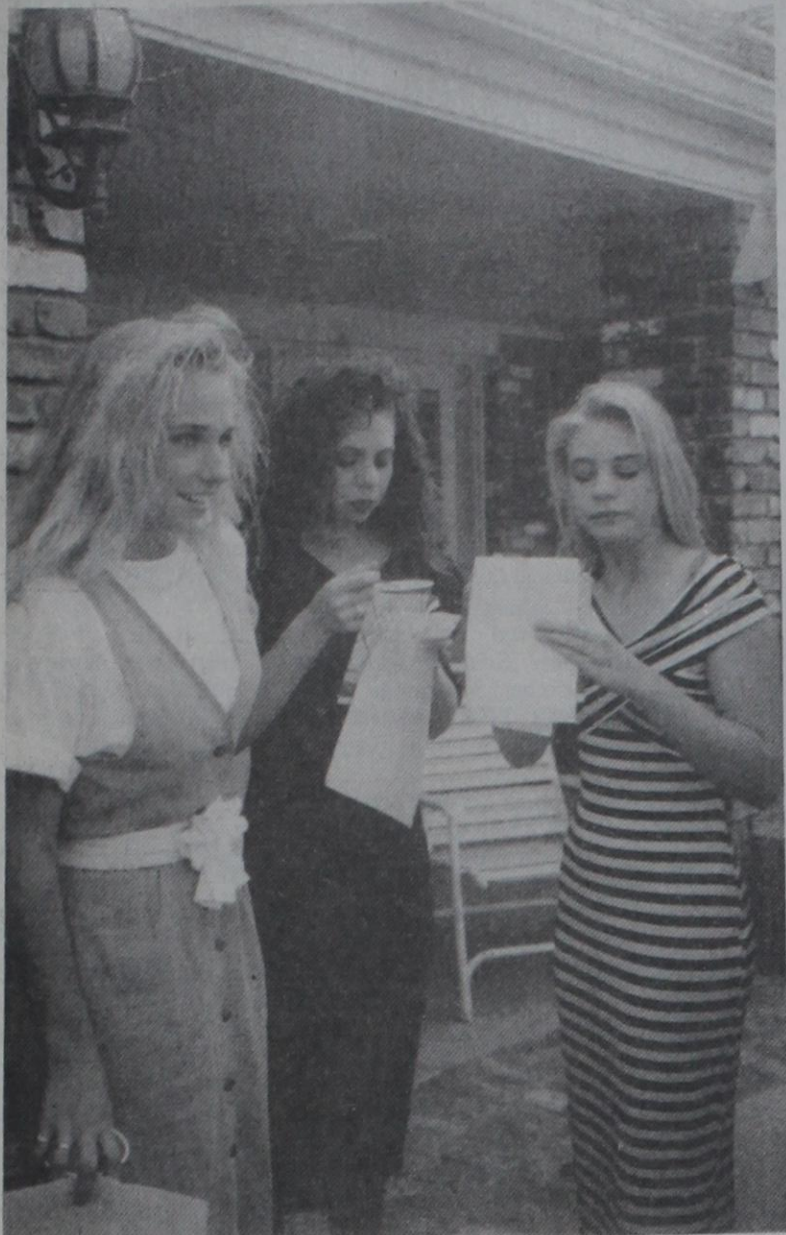

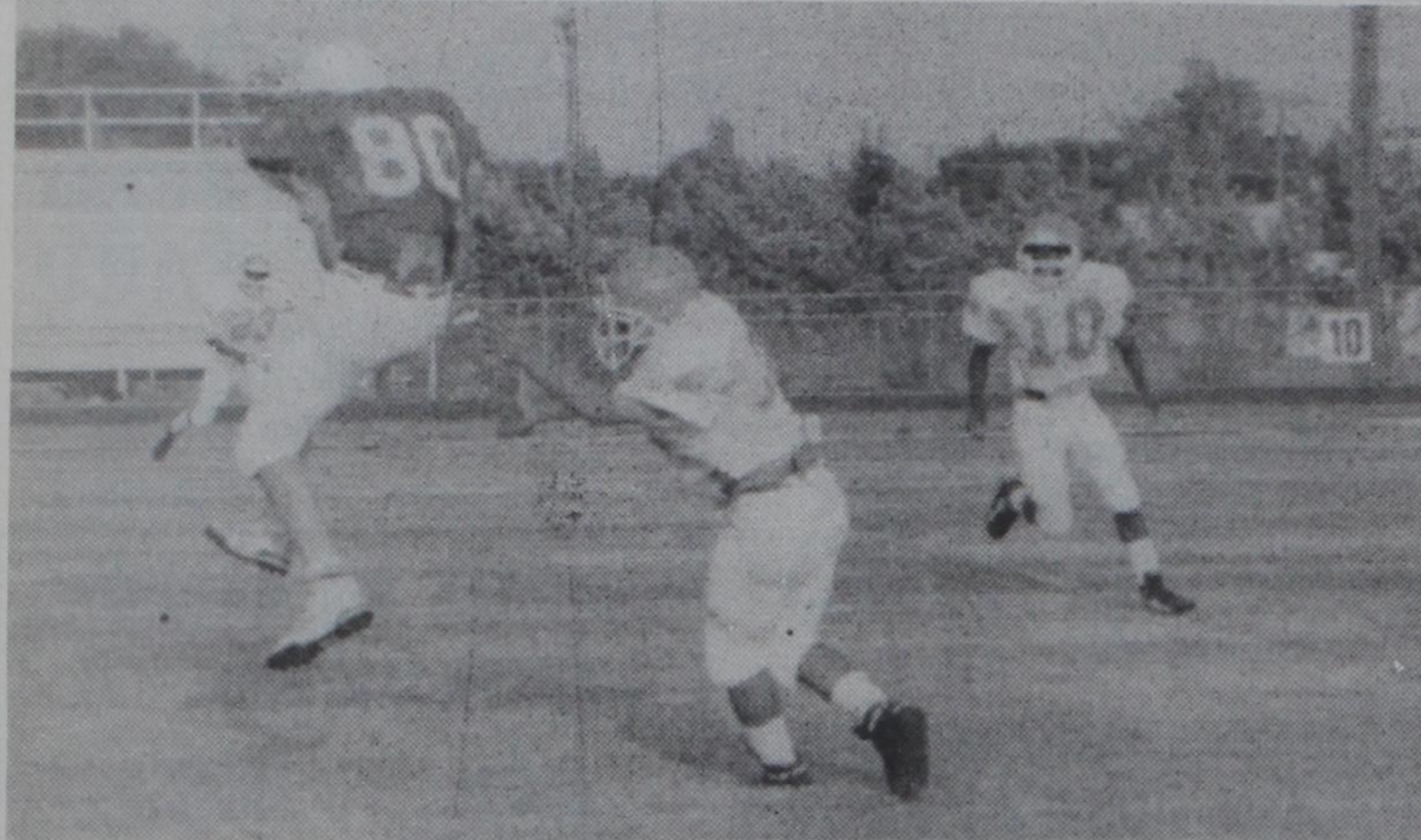

Chieftains Outscore Caprock Longhorns

They made it look easy. The Chieftains beat the 4A Amarillo Caprock Longhorns 2-1 in Friday's scrimmage, and they made it look easy...but it wasn't. "We worked out harder than any team in the area during spring off-season," said coach James Morton. Apparently that's just what the Chiefs needed.

The key to success was the offensive line: Dale Perez, Kit Preston, Luis Rodriguez, Sheldon Burleson, and Jason Medrano. The line provided a protective front for quarterbacks Blair Burney and Jay Belcher each to complete 2 passes, totaling 101 passing yards. The offense totaled 193 rushing yards and racked up two touchdowns. Juan Gamboa made several good runs. On an option from Burney, Gamboa made a 35 yard rush through the Caprock defense. Next, he ran 10 yards for the first touchdown of the game, and later ran 20 yards through the left side.

Chris Hanna was also hot as he crushed through the middle for a 45 yard run, and later made the second touchdown from the 5 yard line. Cory Hamilton caught two outstanding passes from Jay Belcher, totaling 39 yards, and Colby Carthel even got a 15 yard dash through the middle at one point in the game. "We were firin' off the ball, playin' like sharks, flyin' to the ball," said Carthel. The Chieftain option play is looking better all the time and they're using a running offense more this year.

The defense looked good, too. "When we had to stop Caprock on the 4th down, we did," said Coach Morton. Jason Medrano managed to stop Caprock for a loss of yards, and later combined efforts with Paco Reyes for a quarterback sack. Caprock was held on downs and stoppped for losses several

times with the game ending on Steven Ortiz's interception.

"During the first series, we executed well. We let down a little but the second series and Caprock came back more intense," said Coach Morton. Last year's team seemed to give up after a good play by the opposition, but you won't see that happening to this team of Chieftains. "We were puttin' the hurt on people instead of letting them put the hurt on us," said Luis Rodriguez.

Blair Burney completed two of seven passes for 62 yards, and had one intercepted. Jay Belcher completed two of seven for 39 yards.

Juan Gamboa scored twice and gained 10 yards, and Chris Hanna had a five-yard scoring scamper.

There is a whole new attitude on the Chieftain squad this year. "We worked hard during the off season. When you go through that together, you become committed to each other," said Colby Carthel. This varsity team is committed. They're not afraid of anything, including the upcoming game against River Road. When asked how they will deal with the speed of the River Road team, Luis Rodriguez replied, "We'll just have to wrap 'em up with good tackles."

If you want to see good football this season, the Chieftains

are the team to watch. According to Coach Morton, "We haven't even brought out the good stuff yet."

Don't Confuse A Small Company With An Emerging Company

Many small companies surprise investors with more stable earnings than the corporate giants that make up Standard and Poor's 500 Index. That's the message of a major mutual fund that deals in the stock of small companies.

The earnings of small companies followed by the fund have shown a standard deviation of only 13 per cent in earnings over the past three to five years. This compares to 17 per cent for the Standard & Poor's 500. This does not mean the market value of small-company common stock is not volatile. It is, but for long-term investors who believe earnings eventually determine the price of stocks, short-term fluctuations should not matter.

A small company is not necessarily an emerging company. Although small companies have a record of outperforming large companies over the long term, this data is based almost entirely on companies that have established earnings records.

Some emerging companies turn out to be excellent long-term investments, but many more are here today and gone tomorrow. It is not unusual for mutual-fund managers to invest in only seasoned companies with 40 or more years experience, according to Mutual Fund News Service in a report on small-company funds.

The same report noted that small-company stocks have historically prospered in multi-year segments. In 1991, for example, the Russell 2000 Index, the most representative small-stock index, rose 46 per cent. However, the same index fell 12 per cent from February to August 1992.

Was this the beginning of a decline for small-company stocks or just a normal correction? No one can say for certain, but small stocks have a history of peaks and valleys. For example, in the past four extended runs of overperformance by small stocks, there were 15 corrections. Mutual Fund News Service says these declines averaged four months and nearly 11 per cent.

Buying individual small-company stocks can be a roller-coaster ride, but if prudently selected and bought with a long-term investment goal, it can be profitable.

Ideally, a small company has a niche in which it's a market leader. The product or service it offers should be innovative and possibly a market breakthrough. Specialty retailers, entertainment and high-technology firms are examples of companies that may remain small while being well-established and highly profitable.

If you have limited research information and not enough time to adequately monitor an individual stock, a carefully selected mutual fund of small-company stocks can be a reasonable alternative.

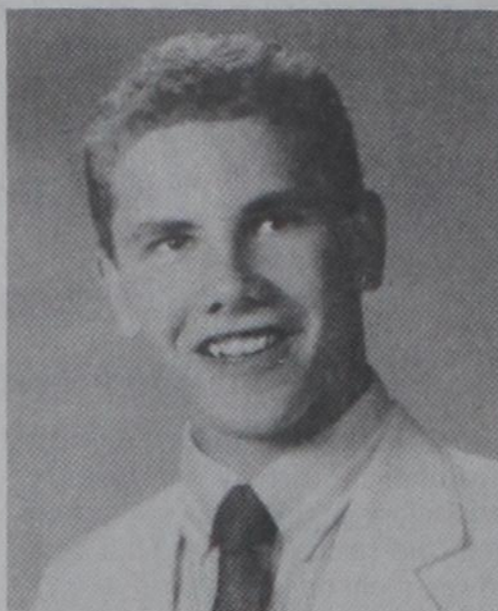

YOUR EYES



Your Computer And Your Eyes

At least half the people who work at computer terminals complain about vision-related problems. After working a long time, vision may get blurry; sometimes the muscles around the eyes feel strained. The eye professional calls this "accommodative spasm." That is, the worker's ability to focus on small print at the distance is cramping up.

Here are some ways to improve the situation. Most important is rest: at least 10 minutes away from the screen every hour, doing other tasks that don't require near vision. Generally, the screen should be 22 to 24 inches from the eyes and slightly below eye level. The screen should be placed so that glare from windows or lights does not reflect off it. Task lighting is usually directed to the material being copied and to the side off the screen rather than on the screen itself.

Special glasses help, too. Tinted lenses can soften the glare, and middle-distance correction helps the eyes focus on the small screen.
