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COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of Jodok

Just why cannot all people in the United States be as energetic as President Truman. Mr. Truman, it seems is continually on his job—that of making votes—politics. And why shouldn't he be. He has positively stated on various occasions, that he is a politician, and so far as I am aware, he has never claimed to be a statesman.

As to being on his job at all times, I refer to his recent speeches, when he gave his message to congress recently, and his "fireside chat," as Mr. Roosevelt termed them, which he delivered only a few days after the delivery of his message. Then again within the past few days, he was at Chicago, where he made two more speeches, and he, apparently does not resent the charge that they are all political speeches. In other words, they are calculated to have political influence.

And, in all these speeches he has used the pronoun, "I," without reserve, and he has proved his right to use that pronoun as frequently as he may desire, since it is conceded that it was through his own personal efforts that he won in last year's presidential election. Mr. Truman seems to have been the only person that positively knew that he would be elected. Therefore, he has an assumed right to say—"I did," or "I said," or "I will" etc. as his own pleasure dictates. Anyway, I, of all persons, should have no occasion to cast my jibes at Mr. Truman, since I use that same pronoun so frequently in these effusions, that some slight aspersions have been cast my way, for the same act.

My reason for the frequent use of the pronoun "I," singular, nominative, is not for the purpose of placing any anconium upon my own words or acts, or brilliancy of any sort upon myself. But in writing these effusions I find it necessary to refer to some person or persons as the subject of my amaleaditions, and by implication, I use myself as that person, because I am not afraid of myself, and no other person can assume the implication when I use the personal pronoun "I," which always stands for the first person, singular number, in other words, the speaker. I feel sure that in these effusions that there are very few, if any times, when I have used any other form of the personal pronoun, such as he, she, it or they, when the subject matter has been in the form of an epithet, rebute, condemnation, retort or degradation. At least I have always tried to steer clear of all expressions, which might be assumed as an implication by any other person.

1949 Is Worst Polio Year Texas Has Experienced

AUSTIN, TEXAS, July 21. With the alarming total of 922 Texans having been attacked by the dread disease poliomyelitis, 1949 bids fair to be the worst polio year the State has ever experienced, and health officials in every section of the State are exerting every effort to bring the disease under control.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has re-iterated his appeal for every citizen to cooperate in a continuous clean-up program, ridding their premises of all rubbish and trash piles, and any such filth as will afford breeding places for insects.

"This polio situation will never be controlled without the observance of stringent basic sanitation measures," the State Health Officer declared. "The filth on your premises may cause the disease to attack your neighbor; and the same condition on his premises may cause polio in your home. This problem of controlling polio is one demanding the

FM 299 To Be Paved To Bailey County Line

County Judge, A. D. Smith, has recently received a letter from the State Highway Department, relative to the paving of F. M. Highway No. 299, from its present southern limit, about four miles south of Hub, to Bailey County line, and Judge Smith has very kindly forwarded a copy of the letter to the Star office, and we are giving it here for the information of our readers. The letter reads as follows:

Honorable A. D. Smith, County Judge, Parmer County, Farwell, Texas.

"Senate Bill, 287, as passed by the 51st Legislature, provided an additional program of secondary or farm to market roads, for the two year period, beginning September 1, 1949. Based upon conference and studies of the Department Staff, and the Highway Commission, and action has now taken in designating certain farm to market road construction in your county. We are pleased to attach hereto, a copy of this action of the Highway Commission.

This letter will constitute an informal notice to you of the Highway Commission's action. You will be officially notified of this action by the Department in the near future."

To the above letter was attached a true copy of the part of the Highway Commission's report or recommendation referred to in the letter, which gives further information concerning the additional pavement on F-M Road, 299.

"IN PARMER COUNTY A FARM TO MARKET ROAD, from end of F-M, 299, 4 miles south of Hub to Bailey County line, a distance of approximately 11.9 miles, is hereby designated, subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate Bill No. 287 and subject to the conditions that Parmer County will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the State.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this order by the proper officials of Parmer County, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$85,000.00 and when right-of-way and funds are available, to proceed with construction and to assume the road for maintenance upon completion of construction.

It is a strange thing that a careless remark will often become a proverb or a nick-name and years, but nevertheless it appears to be a fact. We read in an Amarillo paper recently, that some teen-agers in that city had given it the appellation of "Little Chicago," and that the name has spread throughout the country and seems to be fixed as a cognomen. Just what condition or circumstance prompted this nick-name, the article did not state. We have mentioned this condition, because our own city, Friona, has a reputation by which it is known, at least here at home. It is the city where one drives as he pleases, parcs as he pleases and does not have much regard for his neighbor's car.

We have often heard these things mentioned by Friona's own citizens. Only this week, we heard a man complaining of this close parking. He had parked his car and another car was parked so close to it that there was not room for the door of the second car to open without the latch striking the side of his car, and the driver had not been concerned about this and had swung the door open with force enough to make quite a gash in the paint on this man's car. While the occupants of the car No. 2 were still in it a neighbor came by and a visit ensued, and the latch was still in contact with the other car and the motions of the parties, unconscious though they were, caused the latch to jig up and down and the scratch was made longer and wider. Just careless thoughtlessness.

And there is so much double parking, wrong-way parking, long time middle of the street parking, mostly for visiting purposes, that traffic is sometimes almost, if not quite, blocked until the visit is finished. This is so much the case, that one man was heard to express it something like this: "Drive as you please and park as you please, and they should be damned well pleased judging by the way some drive and park." But such things seem to be taken for granted at Friona.

It was reported, and on good authority, that a Friona man was driving in Amarillo, and driving just as he was accustomed to drive while in Friona, and he was hailed by a policeman's whistle. He pulled to the curb on the wrong side, and the cop inquired where he lived, and he replied that he lived at Friona. The cop then said, "Alright, that is sufficient. You are a privileged character, so drive where you please and how you please, as you are not supposed to know any better."

It is frequently the case that little things like those we have mentioned above, create the reputation for a city, more than the great and noble things, either for weal or woe, and it need be only a very few of the inhabitants of the city, that may start the spread of such a reputation.

There are still an abundance of thrifty weeds growing in many parts of the city, and especially along Main Street, where, of all places in the city, there should be none. More people travel Main Street than on any other street. A. O. Drake and George McLean are killing weeds on a commercial basis. Art drives the sprayer and George hauls the water for mixing the spray. Anyone having weeds that should be killed might secure their services. It is an easy way for the lot owner to get the job done, and with little exertion on his part.

Another lovely home will soon grace the galaxy of pretty and modern homes, which already adorns Friona. It is the home of Dr. and Mrs. H. H. Cooke, which is now in process of construction. It is located on Block 10, at the junction of 10th Street and Summit Avenue.

And it is reported that another business building will go under construction in the near future. It will be located, according to report, at the corner of Main and 7th streets. But so far as our information is concerned, it is only rumor, but we have not heard it disputed.

Webworms Invade Farwell

Although there has been no report of webworms in the Friona territory, they are very bad in Farwell. These worms appear in poplar and elm trees.

There are several ways of combating these worms, which will destroy all the foliage on the trees if they are not killed immediately. The tree may be sprayed with arsenate of lead or a five percent solution of DDT or dusting with ten percent powder of DDT. The infested limb may be cut from the tree and burned in order to eradicate the worms.

WEEKLY CROSSWORD PUZZLE

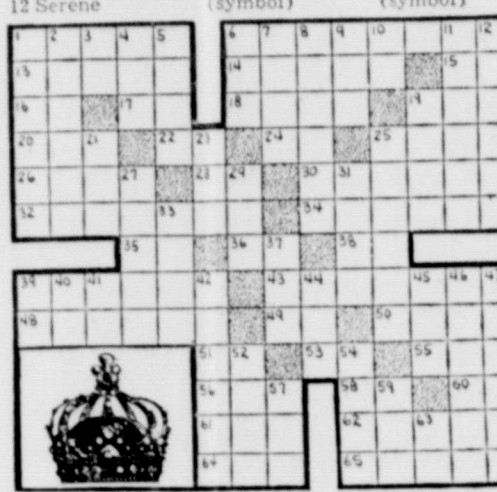

Appliance Prices Pace Reduced Living Cost



CHICAGO—Electric appliance prices advanced less than one-half the amount of the average of all commodities since 1939, and they led all durable consumer products in "rapid and thorough price reduction to pre-war levels," James J. Nance, right above, president of one of the nation's largest appliance manufacturing companies, explains recent message "The Truth About Appliance Prices" to Leslie Hicks, president of Hawaiian Electric Company.

Here to study price stabilization moves, Hicks was told of recent activity by which 10,000 Hotpoint dealers received letters explaining prices, meanwhile, local and national advertising is being scheduled to inform the public that some appliance prices have returned to 1939 levels. Nance said that business was in a leveling off period following the recent post war readjustment from economy of scarcity to one of ample supply. This change brought the sharp price reductions which have brought back pre-war appliance prices so that "today dealers can go forward with their sales and advertising programs, and consumers can buy needed appliances with full confidence that they are getting their money's worth," he added.

Panhandle Farm Plant Expanding



The new management and financial team directing Dandee Manufacturing Co., Guymon, Okla., conferred here in late June on plans for greatly-expanded production to meet wheat country and export demands for its specialized farm equipment. L. D. A. J. Rome, sales manager, formerly of Larned, Kan., and Chicago; R. E. Dumas Milner of Jackson, Miss., president of Milner Enterprises who is underwriting Dandee's expansion; Dannie D. Birt, president and developer of the firm's specialized tools; and Donald C. Thrasher, formerly of Wichita, now vice president in charge of sales.

Guymon, Okla.—Provision of capital for greatly-expanded production of specialized farm equipment and the appointment of two officers were announced here by Dannie D. Birt, president of Dandee Manufacturing Co., Inc.

The announcement revealed that R. E. Dumas Milner of Jackson, Miss., has assumed an active financial and supervisory interest. He is president of Milner Enterprises of Jackson, Chicago and New York and is active in foreign trade.

Mr. Milner appointed A. J. Rome, of Larned, Kan., and Chicago, to represent him in Guymon. Mr. Rome has been made sales and advertising manager.

Donald C. Thrasher, former executive with major firms in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Texas, has been promoted from sales manager to vice president in charge of sales.

Dandee will remain almost entirely home-owned. Ninety-nine per cent of all stock is owned in Guymon. Eighty-five per cent of the stockholders are wheat farmers, 15 per cent business and professional men.

Growth of the firm since Mr. Birt, a farmer turned welder, started it in 1943 has been unusual. Sales during fiscal 1948 totaled \$380,000. Sales for 1949 are expected to exceed one million dollars.

The firm's growth came through development of four specialized pieces of farm equipment. First developed was a grain loader particularly adapted to wheat country needs. A one-way plow, featuring a swinging, flexible hitch, and a hay rake using side skid bars instead of wheels were soon developed. A sealed bearing, which has never had a reported field failure, has built a considerable demand for replacements on other plows.

Being close to wheat farmers, Dandee realized the huge future demand for deep seeder attachments in the semi-arid wheat belts. In mid-spring it acquired production rights to such an attachment, developed new features and redesigned it for economical mass production. It is on this seeder that Dandee bases its expectations of growth.

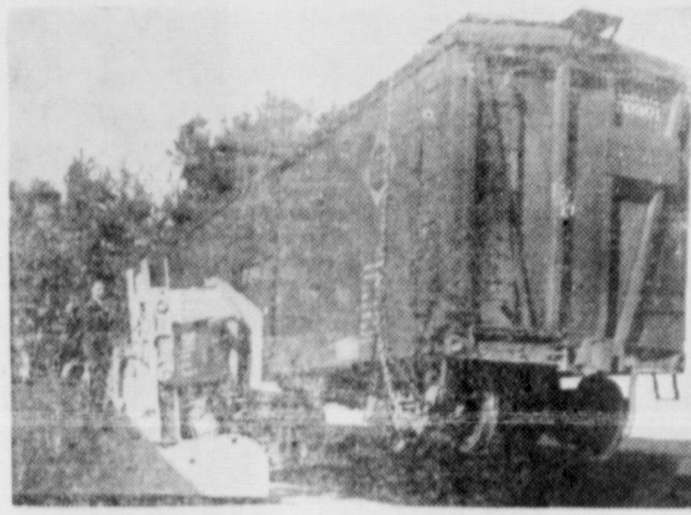

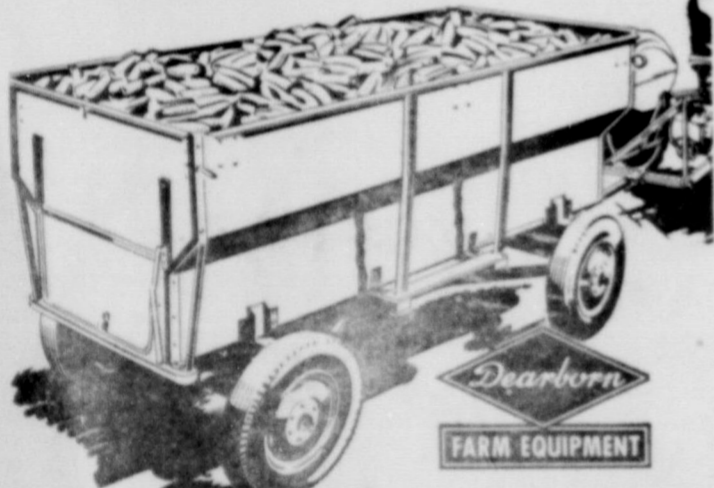

good, so that the heart of men, should be always glad, and that includes both body and soul, or both spiritual and physical. Be it understood, that some of these terms I am unable to fully comprehend, but, from the freedom and alacrité with which they are used, I presume that most other people do understand them.)

Be that as it may, it appears that the sense implied by that all people throughout the entire world, shall be freed from all unpleasant conditions, such as pain, hunger, cold or bodily affliction of any kind, or from whatsoever cause, shall be removed, and that all conditions of whatsoever kind that bring comfort to the body and solace to the mind, shall be freely supplied.

This is a grand and noble thought, and Mr. Truman is deserving of much praise for its conception and expression, and unlimited glory should be his when he has brought all these conditions to pass. But, will he not find a "fly in the ointment," a "snag in the current," when he undertakes the accomplishment. Will such a condition be any thing less than Utopia, or any less to be desired than the place that is referred to as heaven? And under such living conditions here, just who would want to die and go to heaven? Would not the preachers, pastors, ministers, chaplains and priests all lose their jobs? That might be considered as "A Fly in the Ointment." For there would be something odious in depriving the clergy of its usefulness.

On the other hand, when any man or group of men shall undertake to impose religion, education, labor-saving and comfort giving inventions and discoveries upon many and in fact, most of the other nations of the world, they are likely to run against quite a "snag in the current."

Most of these nations or peoples, have built up a form of civilization, during the centuries now past, with which they are fully content. It is good enough for them. It has been good enough for their ancestors, it will be good enough for their descendants, so why change simply because some men, whom he knows not, tell them that they are back numbers, and losing most of the joys of life by their nonprogressive attitude toward life.

Growing children need vitamin-packed food for between-meal snacks. Old-fashioned Oatmeal Cookies contain molasses rich in iron and the oatmeal is loaded with Vitamin B. Cream 1/2 cup shortening and 1/2 cup sugar together. Add 2 tsp. vanilla and 2 eggs, one at a time beating well after each addition. Add 1 tbsp. molasses and 2 tsp. soda which has been dissolved in 1 tbsp. water. Sift 1 cup flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 tsp. salt and add to mixture. Stir in 2 cups oatmeal, 1 cup raisins, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts. Drop from a teaspoon on ungreased aluminum cookie sheet. Bake in preheated gas oven at 375° F. Yields 4 doz. cookies.

There's much more fatigue in drying than washing clothes because of the 45 lbs. of wet wash to be carried out to the line, hung to dry, later taken in and sprinkled for ironing. A gas dryer automatically eliminates all this back-breaking drudgery.

Children's treat. Skewer bananas on wooden sticks, dip in melted semi-sweet or milk chocolate. Freeze in cube compartment of your gas refrigerator.

There are 5,000,000 working wives who have families to cook for. Many of them prepare oven meals ahead of time, set the clock control on their gas ranges so they'll be free to do other household tasks while the meal cooks without watching.

A pastry brush is a handy kitchen accessory. For example, when making a gelatin dish, brush the mold with salad oil so that when set, the gelatin slips out easily.

D. 1949, which reads, as follows:

"AN ORDER
"CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$800,000.00 OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

"WHEREAS, there has been presented for the consideration of the Court a petition signed by G. F. Trimble and more than fifty other persons praying that an election be held in Parmer County on the proposition of the issuance of Road Bonds of said County in the amount of \$800,000.00 and the levy of an ad valorem tax in payment thereof, and

"WHEREAS, the Court has found that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident, qualified property tax-paying electors of Parmer County owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

"WHEREAS, the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Parmer County;

"IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS

"1. That an election be held in said County on the 13th day of August, 1949, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Parmer County shall be issued in an amount of \$800,000.00 bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 1/2 percent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Parmer County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

"2. That the proceeds of such bonds, if authorized, shall be expended in the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Parmer County, Texas.

"3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 26th Legislature.

"4. All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County, and who are resident, qualified property tax-paying electors of this County, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

"5. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"Each voter shall draw a line through one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

"6. The said election shall be held at the several polling places in Parmer County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election at the several voting precincts as follows:

One of the continuing tasks of The American Legion has been to combat the spread of alien ideologies that were brought to this land in the wake of World War I and may again follow in the wake of World War II. It stands for individual rights, fair play, tolerance, justice, recognition of individual ability, and reasonableness in all phases of American living. We cannot condone Americanism sponsored by intolerant secret societies. Neither can we accept as the American way selfish, unjust practices of powerful groups in our industrial life.

We must guard with all our energy the human rights guaranteed by the Constitution. Destructive theories fostered by foreign money and influence aimed at the possible weakening or overthrow of our form of government must be combated with all legitimate means. Liberty under the law must not be extended to protect license, anarchy, or treason under the law. In our efforts to combat un-American influence, we must not, however, become such self-righteous super-patriots that we interpret those who argue for orderly change as un-American and thereby injure loyal fellow citizen.
