Trial of the Lawrence Latta murder case, which was scheduled to start in Bandera on Monday of this week, was shifted to Mason county after Judge Lee Wallace of the 38th district court granted a change of venue.

Latta, who formerly ranched in this county, is accused of murdering his wife, Mrs. Estelle Calk Latta, in an apartment house on March 8, 1932.

The case was first taken to Uvalde on a change of venue from Del Rio. On February 20, 1933, a jury in Uvalde found Latta guilty of murder without malice and fixed the penalty at two years imprisonment. The case was appealed and remanded to Uvalde for re-trial. 




