PMA NEWS

Returns In On Two Communities In County Committee Election

Grain Sorghum loan are currently holding the spot light in work at the PMA office with 804 warehouse storage loans being completed and 98 farm storage loan applications being taken with two of them completed to date.

In securing a loan on grain stored on the farm it takes about 40 days from date grain is stored until the loans is completed.

The Cottonseed Purchase program has brought some relief to cotton farmers in the County. The loan rate on cottonseed at the gin is \$46.50 per ton with all three gins in the county signed up to cooperate in the program. We have purchased 199 tons of seed through the County Office but have several hundred tons outstanding at the gins.

There are several farmers in the County taking advantage of the Grain Loan Program with some 40 loans in the process of completion.

"What Do You Want" Pamphlet Available

Judge Russell recently announced his retirement effective January first. Gov. Allan Shivers recently appointed Judge E. A. Bills to fill the remainder of Judge Russell's term after endorsement of the Bar Association. Judge Russell and the individual bar associations of the six counties of the district.

Geo. Jennings of Tulia, President of the Bar, presided over the session. New officials of the organization were elected as the first event of the session. Arthur Duggan, Littlefield, was elected President; Pat Bobo of Muleshoe, vice president; and Jim Norman, Plainview, re-elected as secretary-treasurer.

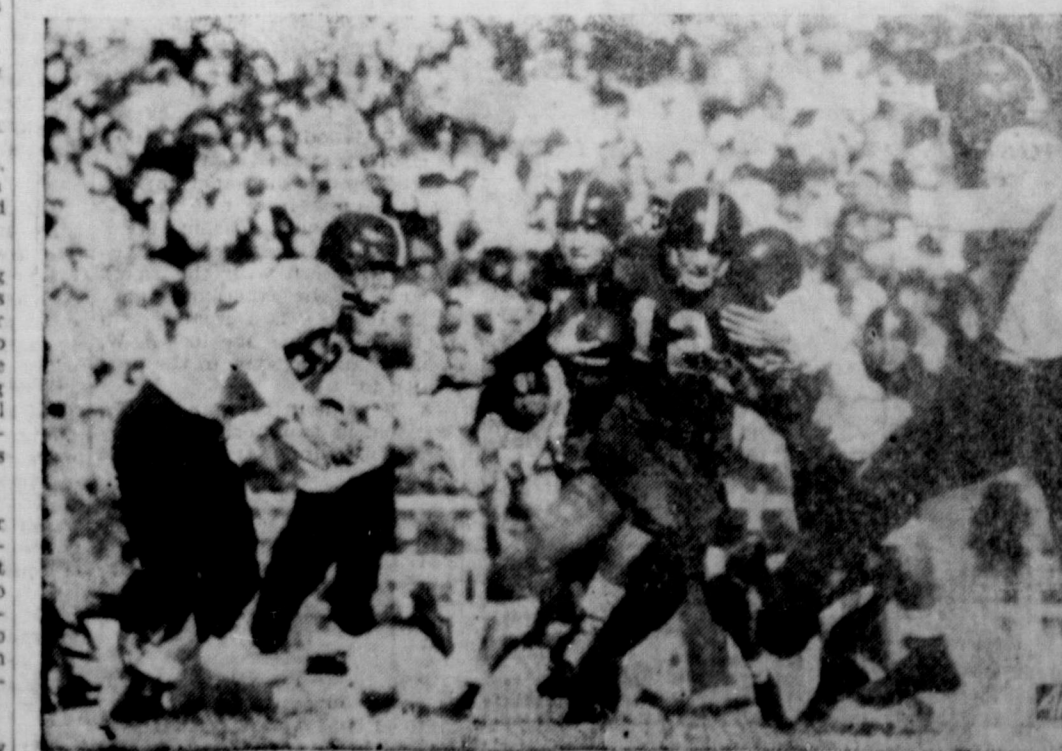
CHRISTENING SERVICES HELD SUNDAY

Wife Finishes College At Baylor; Husband Is Missionary In China

WACO, Tex. — Several thousand miles, an ocean, and the Iron Curtain separate Mrs. Darlyne Sears, Baylor University student, from her husband.

Mrs. Sears and her husband, Rev. S. B. Sears, were Southern Baptist Missionaries to Northern China when the Communist forces invaded. They were warned repeatedly by the American consul of the approach of Communist forces, and finally on insistence of the consul, Mrs. Sears

returned to America last January 10. Mr. Sears chose to remain at the mission base at Tsingtao. While waiting to be reunited with him, Mrs. Sears came to Baylor this year to finish her college work. The few letters she has gotten from him have revealed some interesting things about Communist China.

been no interference with worship in Tsingtao. However, the missionaries have been able to start no new work. Each mission station is allowed to use one automobile.

The biggest change under the new regime has been a great increase in taxes. The tax on the Sears' home at the mission went up from \$50 to \$500 annually. U. S. currency value. Gasoline now costs \$3 per gallon.

Travelers are not allowed to leave town or do any traveling except to return to their home countries. And once out, it is impossible for them to return to Communist China. Foreign business is at a standstill.

The Iron Curtain has cut off all organized mail service from the outside world. Missionary Sears didn't know his wife was in Baylor until several weeks ago. Letters from Tsingtao must be given to Chinese friends who carry them to Hong Kong where they are mailed.

The Communists have not yet solved the Chinese inflation problem. Mrs. Sears has paid as much as \$5,000,000 (Chinese currency) for one meal's groceries. A few weeks ago her husband paid \$2,000 (Chinese) for a haircut.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Sears is hoping that the Communists will relax their laws enough to allow her to rejoin her husband within the next year or so. After all, 7,000 miles is a long distance apart.

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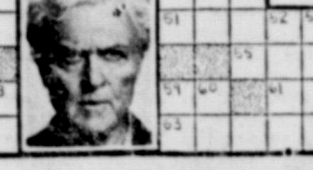
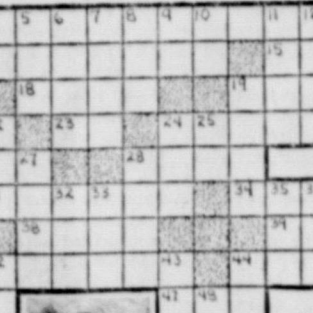
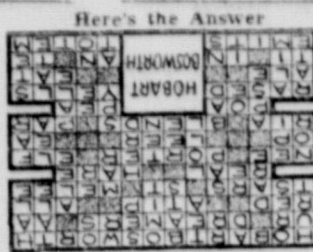

Prophets of Old
Had Same Duties
As Modern Leaders

THERE is a story of a prominent
church member, in a front pew,
who interrupted his minister as he
preached, to protest, "It's not food
you're giving us." The minister
turned on him, as he replied, "No,
it's not food, brother, but it's
medicine; and you need it."
Now, of course, only a compe-
tent physician has a right to de-
cide when a patient needs medi-
cine instead of food; and professed
physicians of the soul may be as
incompetent and subject to error
as physicians of the body. Never-
theless there is point to that story.
The prophets of ancient Israel
led to bitter truth that was not
only unpalatable to those who
heard them, but who so angrily
resented the prophets' words that
they inflicted the most horrible
forms of persecution upon them,
as in the case of Jeremiah.
There is, of course, the type of
false prophet who seems to take a
delight in uttering perverse things.
I knew one such who never seemed
to be happy unless he was insult-
ing somebody. The true prophet
in contrast, has a deep sense of re-
straint and responsibility. The
man who would speak for God
must consider his words. Love
for those to whom he speaks is as
essential as his disregard of their
judgments when he speaks with
conviction.
Deep in the Hebrew prophet,
besides his faithfulness to God,
was his intense love of his people
and nation.
There are many today having
the same spirit as did Jeremiah
when he wrote (Jeremiah 8:11),
"Peace, peace, when there is no
peace."
The true prophet, religious, po-
litical, and social, is concerned
with realities, not appearances,
and with healing the nation's ills,
not slightly, but effectually.
