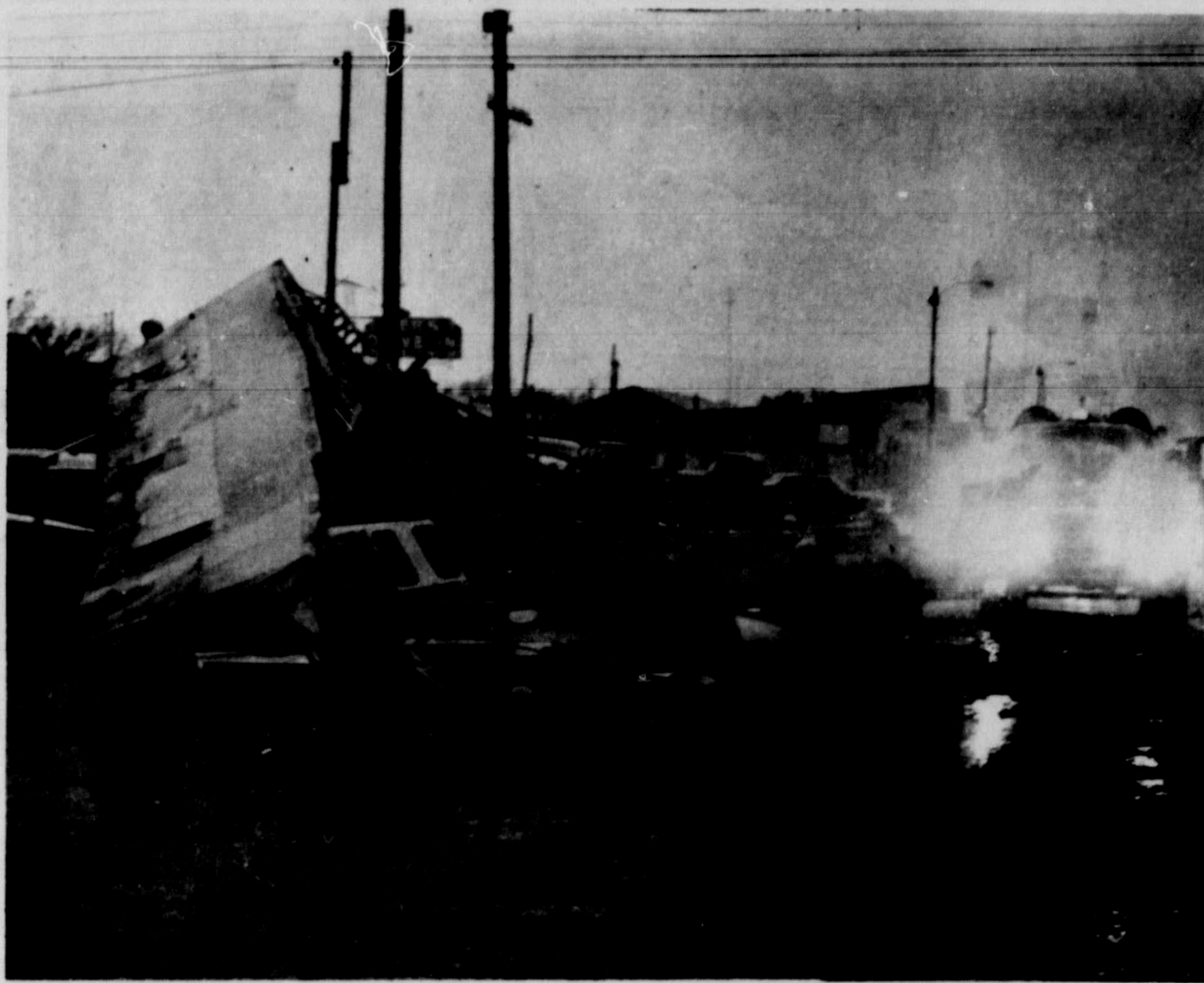

# Funnel Slashes Across Friona

## Marie Carroll Seriously Injured in Storm



**SITE OF TRAGEDY TUESDAY AFTERNOON**--This was the sight that greeted onlookers Tuesday afternoon when following a visit of a funnel-shaped twister along Highway 60 in Friona. This house trailer was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Carroll and Jack Davidson when strong winds from

the twister rolled the house from its moorings and sent it crashing across a vacant lot. It came to rest astride one lane of the highway. Mrs. Carroll was trapped inside the wreckage at the lower left of the picture. Her husband and Davidson escaped serious injury in the mishap.

This has been a pretty full week, and thanks to the twisters things kept right on moving up until time for the presses to roll.

I'm sure that all of you have heard about the high winds and the small tornado that struck Friona Tuesday afternoon, destroying the home of the Carrolls. We are happy that none of them were killed in the disaster.

But--close down the road it was another story--at a small farming community south of Dimmitt a group of people were gathered together in the local church when a twister devastated that locality.

Many Frionans made the trip to Sunny Side after hearing the call for help.

We are proud that we live in a community with a conscience.

I don't guess that there is any place around that folks wouldn't go, or do anything reasonable when asked when something of this kind comes along.

The heavy rain was still falling Tuesday following the loss of the Carroll's trailer house when I heard folks talking about "where will they stay--I have an extra room--I have some blankets--I have this, or that or the other."

I tell you--it is a good feeling to know that someone cares about you when something like comes along.

We are proud to live here and be a part of what to us, is the swellest community found anywhere.

Still wet, probably hungry and tired, a group of doctors, nurses and a carload of volunteer firemen left about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday night for Sunny Side to help where they could.

As this is being written the reports are coming in over the radio of the damage and loss of life down there.

As we sat listening to the reports many more people called in, or dropped by to see if their aid was needed.

I tell you folks, Plains folks are the best!

He and his wife will move to Friona from White Deer where he is teaching for the fifth consecutive year.

Bynum was graduated from McMurry College in Abilene

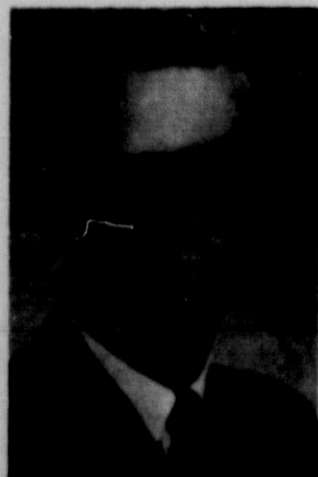
and has been at White Deer since that time.

## One Civil Case In District Court

by Warren Brooks and parked in the rear of the Tasty Cream, was moved sideways about three feet and according to Brooks-- "It would've blown over too if it hadn't been for a utility pole holding it up."

Over at Chieftain Stadium, two sections of the west bleachers were twisted from their moorings and scattered down the track. A plate glass window was blown out at Carl McCaslin Lumber Inc., on Main street and uncounted numbers of TV antennas suffered from the severe winds.

Many residents wanted to know why the fire siren didn't sound off to warn them of the impending danger.

Ruben Taylor, fire chief, told that just as Ralph Shirley grabbed for the siren the power failed and "there we were."

Residents in the east section of Friona stood in their yards and gaped openmouthed at the funnel passing overhead.

"It just never occurred to me to run," one lady told reporters Tuesday.

Ben Moorman, chief of police, had just previously been asked by the weather station in Amarillo to check out a cloud southeast of Friona which was showing up on their radar scopes.

Moorman had just returned from the Parmerton hill area which was lashed twice in about 20 minutes by severe hail. He and a group of men were standing in front of the city hall when the cloud began forming south of town.

"When we saw the funnel I ran for the siren, but it was too late, the power was gone," says Shirley, assistant fire chief.

"We jumped into the emergency wagon and began following the funnel and just as we rounded the corner of Main and the highway we saw this trailer across the road," Taylor told.

Traffic was rerouted around the blocked street for about an hour as firemen and other volunteers worked to clear the area of debris and sifted water looking for personal effects which had tumbled out of the trailer.

Following this cloud the weather cleared for a time, but about 7:30 p. m. pressures began building up again, this time a severe cloud was reported at Black.

Dave McReynolds, editor of The Star, was on the highway at Black at 8:15 p. m. and reported severe hail from about two miles south of Black to the curve about 4 miles north of Friona.

At times the road was covered with hail and severe winds blew the car almost off the road

In Our Own Back Yards

About the time we get settled down to the notion that crime and corruption in political office is a problem reserved for such places as Washington, D. C., New York City, Chicago and perhaps Austin or Dallas, we are shaken from this pleasant dream by unsavory developments which force us to look the facts squarely in the face.

The slime covered garbage cans which the special investigations committee has been emptying in full view of the public in the Amarillo area provide sufficient evidence that all is not lily white in are politics.

It staggers the imagination of upstanding citizens of this area to realize that such goings

on could take place in civilized society to begin with and beyond that that they should be permitted to continue for such a length of time with no restraint from elected or appointed officials or the electorate at large.

We are sure that the residents of Canyon and Randall County are appalled at what has, or apparently has, been taking place. While residents of Parmer County are not directly affected by any malpractices which have been unearthed so far, it is no longer possible for us to think that corruption in public offices always happens hundreds, or perhaps thousands, of miles away.

Citizens of Randall County are having a pretty cold blooded lesson in the facts of life about local government. Such disclosures should rekindle the interest of all of us in local politics and local governmental affairs.

This Bears Watching

For some reason or another, the state has had what Governor Price Daniel calls an "almost sensational" 28% drop in traffic deaths in the first seven weeks of the year.

Since so much criticism of the state's new safe driving auto insurance plan has come from this part of the state, it seems only fair to point out an interesting statistical development which will certainly bear watching.

There were 69 fewer deaths during the first seven weeks of this year than during the same period in 1959. The drop was from 243 deaths in 1959 to 174 this year.

which are higher for careless drivers, have been due at least a portion of the credit for the improved safety record.

The new insurance plan has many glaring deficiencies and some of the most bitter criticism directed against the plan has come from this area. However, we believe that if it does turn out to be a fact, that the change in the state law has reduced traffic deaths, then that factor should be a consideration in our criticism of the plan.

Certainly it is too early to make a decision. Conclusive evidence, both the governor and insurance board chairman have agreed, will have to await more time and statistics. Even so, this does bear watching.

Track Team Wins Fourth

Friona's track team garnered fourth place in District Friday during the 1 AA Track and Field Events meet held in Amarillo as they gathered in a total of 55 points. Gary Bradley, Friona's all around utility man during the entire season of athletic competition, tied for first place in the pole vault event and Coach Smith correctly called a flip of the coin to send Bradley to the Regional meet in Lubbock, April 22 and 23.

Tommy Barker, placing second in the High Hurdles with a time of 16.3 seconds, has also qualified for the Regional playoffs and will travel to Lubbock with Coach Smith and Bradley.

The total list of events and the number of points collected by the Chiefs were seven events and the 55 points that placed them in the fourth position. Dalhart won the meet, upsetting favored Tulsa.

In the Pole Vault event, Bradley tied for first with a height of 10 feet six inches. Two flips of the coin were necessary in the pole vault event and Coach Smith called them both correctly, giving first place medal and the trip to Lubbock to Bradley. The tie for first place in this event gave Friona eight points.

In the discus event Kenneth

Harrington won third for six points and Tommy Massey won fifth for two points, making a total of 16 points for the team.

The high jump event also garnered Friona some points as Gary Bradley won third place for another six points which raised the total for the Chiefs to 22 points.

Fifth place was won by Connie Ray in the broad jump event which added another two points to the already 22.

A creditable third place was won by the Chiefs in the 440 yard relay with team members Floyd Reeve, Jackie Hight, Gary Bradley and Connie Ray doing the honors. This position gave the Chiefs another 12 points to add to their total which then raised the number of points for the local team to 36.

Low hurdles event also added points to the total as third place was won by Tommy Barker for six points and fourth place in this same event by Connie Ray who was credited with four points.

Scoring for the Chiefs in the high hurdles was Barker's second place for eight points and Tommy Sanders' sixth place for one point, making the team total of 55 points.

## Jr. High Wins Meet

Friona's seventh and eighth grade tracksters took complete charge of a track and field events meet against Bovina and Lazbuddie last week. Meet was a warm up for district competition to be Thursday (today) in Dimmitt.

The 100-yard dash event was captured by Friona as Everett Gee took first place with 11.5 seconds. Jerry Houston, also of Friona, was second with 11.6. In the 220-yard dash, Gee again took top honors for the local school. Winning time was 26.5 with Brown of Lazbuddie coming in second with 27.3.

Lazbuddie captured first place honors in the 75-yard dash with Bean clocking 9.0 followed by Bob Welch of Friona with 9.2. Bovina captured the 50-yard dash first place with Stowers' 5.9. Friona's Tommy Baxter took second with 6.1.

In the 440-yard relay Friona's team, consisting of Baxter, Gee, Welch and Houston, took first place in 50 even with Bovina coming in second with 50.8. The mile relay was captured by Bovina in 4.07 while Friona took second place honors with 4.13.

Lazbuddie won another first in the high jump as Watson snared that event, with Friona's Houston taking second.

Friona captured another of their many firsts in the broad jump as Gee jumped 17 feet, one inch to snare first. Houston and Stowers of Bovina tied for second and third places respectively with a jump of 16 feet, nine inches.

Shot put event was won by Stowers of Bovina with a distance of 37 feet, 10 inches with second place taken by Kelso of Bovina with a toss of 37 feet. Friona won four first place

events as compared to three for Bovina and two for Lazbuddie. Seventh and eighth graders travel to Dimmitt today to compete in the annual district track meet there.

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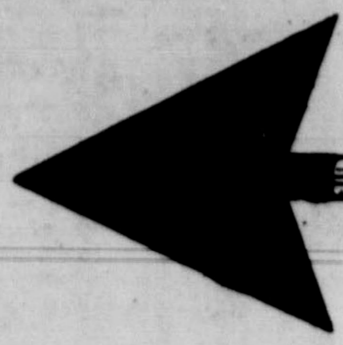

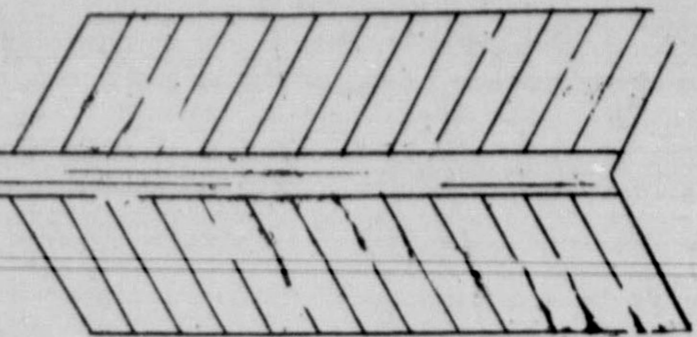

There is tenderness too in this story of a boy who finds himself pitted against a man whose sensitivity is hidden beneath his uncouth strength.

Tax Assessor Ethridge gave his monthly report at the board meeting and reported a total of \$1,965.02 taxes collected during March. This only leaves a total of \$8291.91 delinquent taxes on the roll for the school year. Superintendent Alton Farr reported on the various phases of the school's activities including the cafeteria, transportation, activity and budget reports.

Following discussion of the school's transportation problems the board voted to authorize the purchase of a new 60 passenger bus for use beginning in September. Pre-school visitation day was set for Friday, April 29. This is the day when all of next year's first graders will attend classes for one day to acquaint them with the role of students in the system.

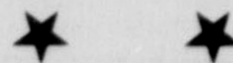

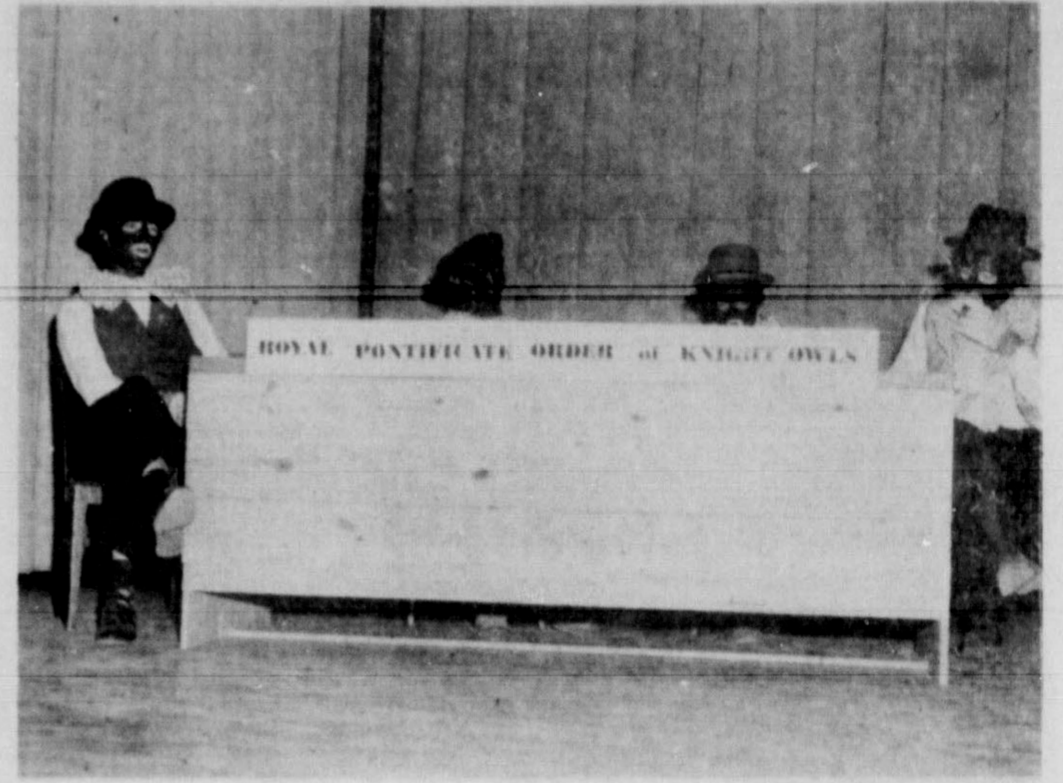

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# THE HIGH PLAINS FARM AND HOME

## Sprayplane Business Oldest, Largest

The largest sprayplane business in the Farmer County area has been operating for 13 years.

Owner operator of Bengier Air Park airport and spraying business is Elvie Jennings, who came to Farmer County with his parents while only a boy and grew up near Lazbuddie.

Jennings says his business is named for the first Farmer County boy killed during World War II while serving as a pilot for the army.

Among the equipment Jennings uses in his spraying business are nine specially equipped planes which include two Stearman dusters, three P-18 sprayers, one combination that

can spray or dust, two Stearman sprayers and one new PA-24 agricultural airplane.

"I have tried to make it a policy to put one new sprayer on a year or to replace one piece of equipment," the flier-business man says.

Mixing equipment Jennings uses to prepare spraying chemicals include two 1000-gallon tanks with pumps and seven 500-gallon tanks with pumps.

Jennings has two 1 1/2 ton trucks with tanks and four pickups. Included in the physical layout of his airport are 214 acres, the shop and office, two large hangers and 16 T-hangers.

"During the spraying season, I generally have 3 pilots working beside myself and 3 flagmen," Jennings has a mechanic who works full time throughout the year.

During the summer months he usually employs a field man who checks fields, makes contacts and collects.

Jennings explains that a flagman serves as a guide to the pilot of a sprayplane to show him what strip of the field to spray next.

"The spraying season usually starts about the first of May and runs until the first frost or about Oct. 15." While the season is on, Jennings says he and his other pilots usually average a total of 3000 to 3500

acres a month or about 100 to 150 acres a day of spraying.

On an average working day, the pilots try to start as soon as it is light enough to see. They dust early in the morning before the wind gets up and spray during the day, Jennings says.

"The chemicals have to be mixed at a certain rate to be applied. Too much will burn the plants; not enough will not kill the bugs," he says.

He has around \$50,000 tied up in equipment. To keep planes and equipment up it takes an average of \$16,000 a year.

"On an average, spraying costs the farmer from \$2 to \$2.50 an acre," Jennings largest expense is keeping up with improvements on spray equipment.

Along with his spray business, Jennings runs a regular airport, gives student instruction, and offers plane rental and charter

the last year or so.

Hog prices have taken a definite upturn since the first of the year and the experts figure they will continue to gain in strength until July and August this summer. We have often heard it said a man shouldn't pay too much attention to market fluctuations in the hog business or for that matter in the cow or sheep business. The argument is that the "in and outers" are never smart enough to be able always to buy low and sell high and that the only sensible plan is to make up your mind about what you are going to produce and get in and produce it the best way you know how year after year.

Just the same there are a lot of people exploring the possibilities of getting into the hog business, particularly in this part of the country. I'm sure they'll agree when we say it's a lot easier to convince yourself of the advisability of getting into a business when the immediate prospects are looking good than to sell yourself on the idea of getting into the

work.

Jennings first got into the airport business in 1946 when he and Carl C. Maurer began the Bengier Air Park.

"I leased the land from him and built the main hanger. He and I operated a flying school in partnership until 1948.

"My brother bought his interest and he and I ran a partnership until 1954 and I bought my brother's interest and I have been running it by myself since that time."

Jennings was an Army primary instructor for 21 1/2 years during World War II.

"I first became interested in flying when I was just a small

boy before there were too many planes. At that time they were just a novelty, but I didn't get to start until 1940.

"In 1947, I bought the first duster and I was the only operator in this area. I did all the work at Muleshoe, Hereford and Friona. I added a sprayer in 1948."

The Friona businessman sprayed about 3000 acres that first year, and he says the number has just kept growing since then.

"It will run somewhere around 80,000 to 100,000 acres for an average year," Jennings says the most acres he has sprayed in one month was 34,000 in August on one year.

"We are always running into insects that one chemical would control one year and not the next. We have to keep changing the chemical to get results. We are continually running into problems," Jennings says.

"The amount and type of chemical used is regulated by the Pure Food Drug Agency," Jennings says pilots must have

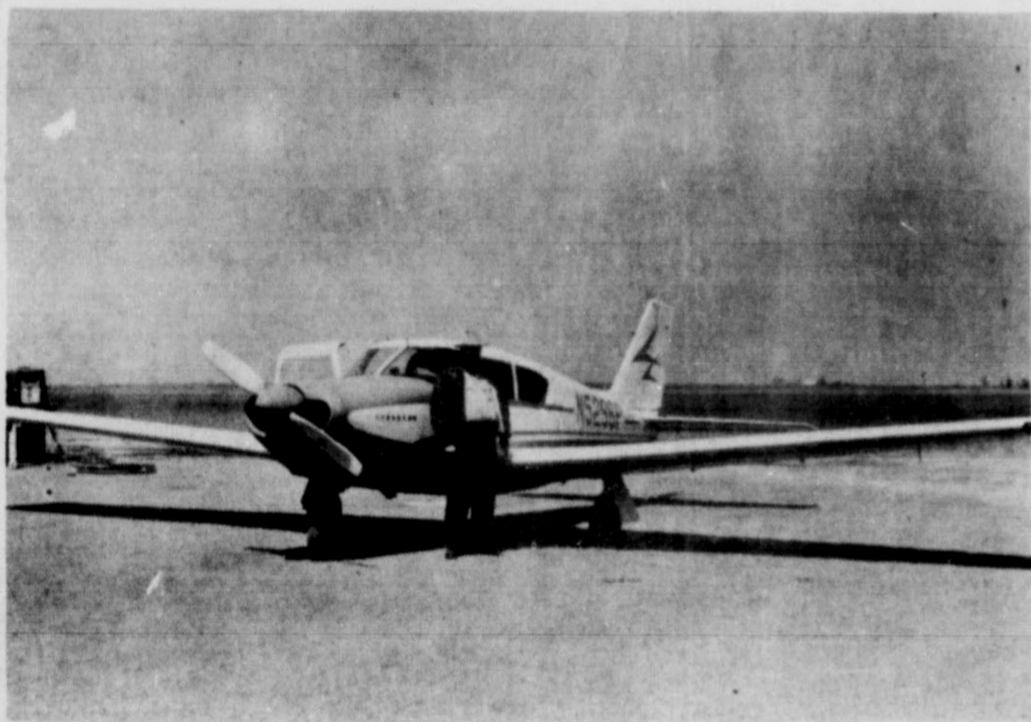
a special permit issued by the CAA to do spraying.

Only qualified pilots are allowed to fly.

"Once a year, College Station holds a short course and hands all developments on to operators. The program started about 1950 to try to improve services and get operators to

do the best job possible for the farmers."

Jennings is planning to add 10 new T-hangers to his airport. There are nine individually owned craft based at the Bengier Air Park. He does most of his spraying in Deaf Smith, Farmer, Castro, Bailey and Curry county, N. M.

# Efficiency Important In Irrigating Cotton

"Irrigation efficiency is one of the answers to profitable cotton production," James Valiant, Assistant Water Engineer at the High Plains Research Foundation, stated in the 1959 research reports just released to supporters of the Foundation.

Irrigation applied preplant and at peak bloom produced the best grade and highest income in 1959. Production from this irrigation method ranged from 85.3 to 94.3 pounds of lint per acre inch of supplemental water applied.

The return from the preplant,

that it should be shared with our readers. It would be well for each homemaker to read it, then clip it and re-read it aloud to her husband before vacation time arrives.

"One of the chief problems is sleepiness—especially on the long, straight controlled-access highways now being built.

Fifty per cent of fatalities on the busier turnpikes occur in rear-end collisions—mostly in broad daylight and seldom with any skid marks on the highway to indicate that the drivers had applied their brakes.

Everyday drivers who are accustomed to the bustle and constant stop-go shuffle of commuter traffic day after day, find themselves in a new world when taking to the modern high-speed highways. Thinking in terms of 30 to 40 miles per hour, drivers are apt to forget that they are hurtling down a

peak bloom method of irrigation ranged from \$161.00 to \$181.00 per acre. Pumping costs were figured at \$6.00 per acre foot at Halfway. Some authorities, however, report this cost as high as \$9.00 per acre foot.

These results indicate that the time of application, not the total amount of irrigation water applied, controls dollar returns from irrigated cotton.

Cotton irrigated at a total of 17.2 and 21.5 inches returned less income in 1959 than the 8.6 inches applied in the preplant, peak bloom method.

From these results it is evident that a more profitable cotton crop can be grown with less water, less labor, and less pumping costs in a year like 1959. Time of irrigation and fertility level are two of the major controlling factors in irrigated cotton profits.

"This experiment will be conducted over a period of several years before definite conclusions can be made regarding the recommended irrigation methods and fertility levels needed for most efficient cotton production," Mr. Valiant said.

turnpike at 60 or more. It takes longer to stop! Everything happens quicker! Skids come easier! And other cars are rocketing at high speeds also!

In addition, city drivers fall prey to the rhythmic hum of powerful engines mile after mile. The soft rumble of tires can produce a decided hypnotic effect. Driving seems to take less effort resulting in a lessening of attention.

The responsibility of staying alert and awake is up to each individual driver. It is a full-time job—one at which you have to work all the while you are on the road.

A series of hints on super-highway driving in common use by truck drivers, salesmen and seasoned travelers well acquainted with turnpike driving, can prove useful to average drivers who take to the highways only occasionally.

Keep a look-out for police. Never let a car pass in either direction without noting if it is a police car. This is the best method of keeping aware of everything that's going on around you.

Chewing gum is a good habit while driving. Chewing a full pack at a time requires conscious effort, which is exactly the idea.

Singing aloud is an old standby of the long-haul truckers or listening to the radio slightly louder than comfortable. But don't listen to soft soothing melodies.

Try driving a while in your stocking feet. The strange feel of the gas pedal on a bare foot is stimulating.

Wet your eyelids. Lick your finger, then moisten your eyelids.

Even when driving alone,

"talk out" the situation ahead. Whenever the traffic pattern changes down the road, report it to yourself out loud.

Sitting on something hard occasionally is a big help. Try a couple of thick magazines or a square of plywood, for a refreshing change.

Smelling salts are a quick awakener. It may be surprising to find this favorite of Victorian maidens in many a truck cab today. Other truckers carry a half lemon, one suck of which achieves the same end.

But both are strictly emergency measures to keep you going until you reach an area where you can take a cat nap. The only real antidote to sleepiness is sleep!

Try "co-pilot" checks. Make it a rule that, every 15 minutes, the passenger in the right front seat calls out "Speedometer," whereupon the driver glances at it and replies, "Speed, 62," or whatever. This prevents the common error of letting speed creep up unnoticed.

Keep the eyes moving. The quickest way to hypnotize yourself is to stare straight ahead. Professional drivers keep their eyes moving constantly.

Use the mirrors. Good drivers glance in their rearview mirrors about every five seconds.

Eyes should be protected from glare. On bright days, good sunglasses should be worn.

Don't overeat. Many vacationing drivers encourage drowsiness by eating too much on a trip.

A good practice, especially in winter or air-conditioned cars is to check the car's exhaust system. Carbon monoxide causes sleepiness. Be sure the exhaust system is tight and free from corrosion.

Make periodic stops. Take a five-or-ten minute break every hour after the third hour of driv-

Texas ranked third among all states in acreage and production of fresh market vegetables in 1959, according to Clyde Singletary, extension horticulturist. Onions was the top income producer for Texas with 40,800 acres harvested and worth \$14,192,000. Texas had 14.3 per cent of the nation's commercial vegetable acreage and 8.2 per cent of the production.

Electric data processing machines are now being used to process DHIA records. A.M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman, says use of the machines will relieve DHIA supervisors of much tedious and time-consuming book work and at the same time provide dairymen greater accuracy and more complete and up-to-date production and feed information. It represents a major change in DHIA record keeping, he said.

Diseases took an estimated \$147 million bite out of the 1959 Texas cotton crop, according to 15 cotton specialists located throughout the state. This loss occurred, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, even though 1959 growing conditions were generally good and near record yields were harvested in many areas. Major diseases were bacterial blight, root rot, verticillium wilt and seedling disease.

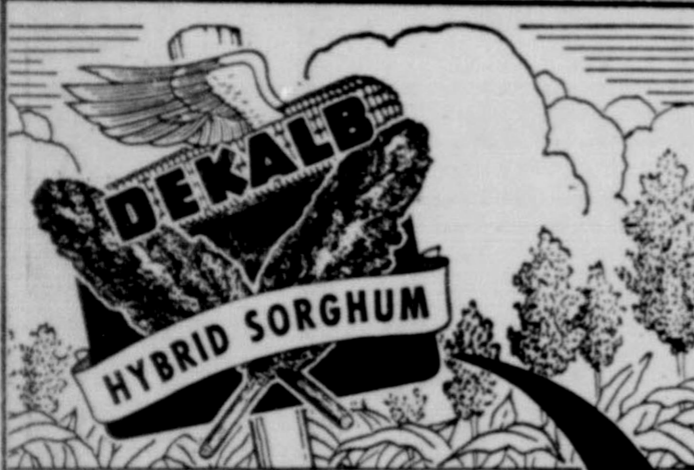

## High Moisture Grain Produces Better Gains

Steers gained more when fed sorghum grain containing a high moisture level than steers fed dry grain of the same quality in a test conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Steers fed the wet ground grain at 23 per cent moisture, made gains of 2.42 pounds per day compared with gains of only 2.29 pounds for those fed dry grain.

It was also found that unground grain sorghum containing 23 per cent moisture would not produce as high gains as either ground grain at 23 per cent moisture or ground dry grain.

The sorghum grain, RS 610, was harvested successfully at an average moisture level of 25 to 30 per cent with a standard self-propelled combine. This was accomplished by slowing the ground speed and maintaining the cylinder speed at that used for threshing small grains.

The moist grain was then stored successfully without spoilage or loss in an air-tight, glass-lined silo.

Steers fed the moist grain

required 18 per cent less dry matter from the grain and 12 per cent less total dry matter per 100 pounds of gain than the steers fed ground dry grain. Additional work is now being conducted at A&M to determine if cattle consistently will perform more efficiently on high moisture sorghum grain.

Both types of ground grain were palatable and intake was essentially the same. No difficulty was encountered in grinding the grain or keeping the steers on feed. Selling price was the same for both groups of steers fed ground grain and dressing percentages and carcass grades did not differ significantly.

However, when cost tabulations were made after the steers were sold, the ones fed moist grain were found to have made a profit of \$18.86 per head compared with a profit of only \$8.78 per head for the ones fed dry grain.

This test does not warrant definite conclusions, says J. K. Riggs, professor, Department of Animal Husbandry, Texas A&M, but some calculations re-

garding the application of moist grain storage and feeding should be worthwhile, since Texas generally has a bumper crop of grain sorghum.

Progress Report 2103, a release of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, carries complete results of the tests, and is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

Much of the newer furniture is cushioned with foam rubber and upholstered with fabric. Women are asking if the fabric can be cleaned at home without damage to the foam rubber.

Extension home management specialists of the A&M College System say, Yes! Just be sure to use a SAFE cleaning agent.

Select your cleaning agent by considering first, the nature of the stain, next the type of fabric, and lastly the effect of the cleaning agent on foam rubber.

Soaps, detergents, glycerine, denatured alcohol, benzene, carbon tetrachloride, sodium hydrosulfite, sodium thiosulfate and a weak solution of ammonia are acceptable cleaning agents as far as the foam rubber is concerned.

Specialists warn that carbon tetrachloride should be used very sparingly. It is a rubber solvent.

Normal rubbing of the outside covering on right or fixed seats will not harm the foam rubber cushion. Foam rubber is tender when wet but its normal strength returns when dry.

Cleaning agents that DO have

a harmful effect on foam rubber are of the bleaching and oxidizing types. The following ARE NOT recommended: vinegar, turpentine, acetone, chlorine, hydrogen peroxide, oxalic acid and sodium perborate.

If the nature of the stain or the type of the fabric calls for the use of one of the above cleaning agents, specialists suggest that the fabric be removed from the foam rubber and cleaned separately.

TIPS ON COOKING FOR "WEIGHT WATCHERS"

Any weight watchers in your family? - If so, you, the cook, can be a big help by planning and preparing foods to cut calories.

Here are some suggestions offered by extension foods and nutrition specialists of the A&M College System.

Use non-fat, dry milk solids for cooking. Reconstituted dry milk solids heated and combined with vegetable liquids are good in soups.

Keep desserts simple... Serve fresh fruits or canned and frozen fruits packed in water or juice -- not syrup.

Roast or oven or pan-broil meats, poultry and fish instead of frying in fat. Avoid "breading" and use of egg batters on foods. Trim extra fat from the meat.

Serve salad materials plain -- or use low-calorie seasonings or salad dressings. These can be made with tomato juice, herbs and lemon juice or vinegar.

Prepare food without added fat, sugar or flour whenever possible.

Tempt appetites with herbs and spices instead of rich seasonings, sauces and gravies.

Serve low-calorie items for nibbling or appetizers. Try celery, cabbage wedges, carrot sticks, or other low-calorie vegetables or fruits.

Avoid high fat foods such as cream, butter, gravies, sauces, nuts, potato chips, oil, pastries, rich salad dressing; sweet foods, such as cakes and cookies; rich puddings, candies, fountain drinks and sundaes, carbonated drinks and alcoholic beverages; and starchy foods, such as macaroni, dry peas and beans.

GET THE MOST FROM YOUR AUTOMATIC WASHER

Re-check the instruction book when your washer falls, suggests Wanda Barkley, extension home management specialist of the A&M College System. Often the source of washer trouble is not mechanical, but human.

Carelessness, usually about little things, and failure to stick to the rules given in your instruction book are often responsible. Here are suggestions from the specialist.

WEIGH THE LOAD CAREFULLY. Smaller loads are easier on your washer, and garments come out cleaner.

CHECK ALL POCKETS AND CUFFS before loading the washer. Sharp-pointed things--like needles, pins, nails and hairpins--can tear up an expensive pump.

PUT SMALL THINGS IN A NYLON-MESH BAG or a pillow slip before placing them in the washer. These small articles sometimes are whirled over the spin tub and get so tangled in the pump that the pump may be damaged. Loading the washer with the small articles at the

Where natural protection is lacking, tree windbreaks give welcome shelter in addition to beauty and a homelike setting.

Now is the time to order your trees for windbreaks. We have had some inquiries on trees and on planting arrangements and hope to have more.

The Soil Conservation District is making potted Arizona Cypress seedlings available to you again this year. Cost per seedling is 30 cents. Applications must be received by April 22 for delivery on or about May 2. Information concerning the trees may be obtained at the SCS office, Steve Messenger's office in Friona or at the county agent's office in Farwell.

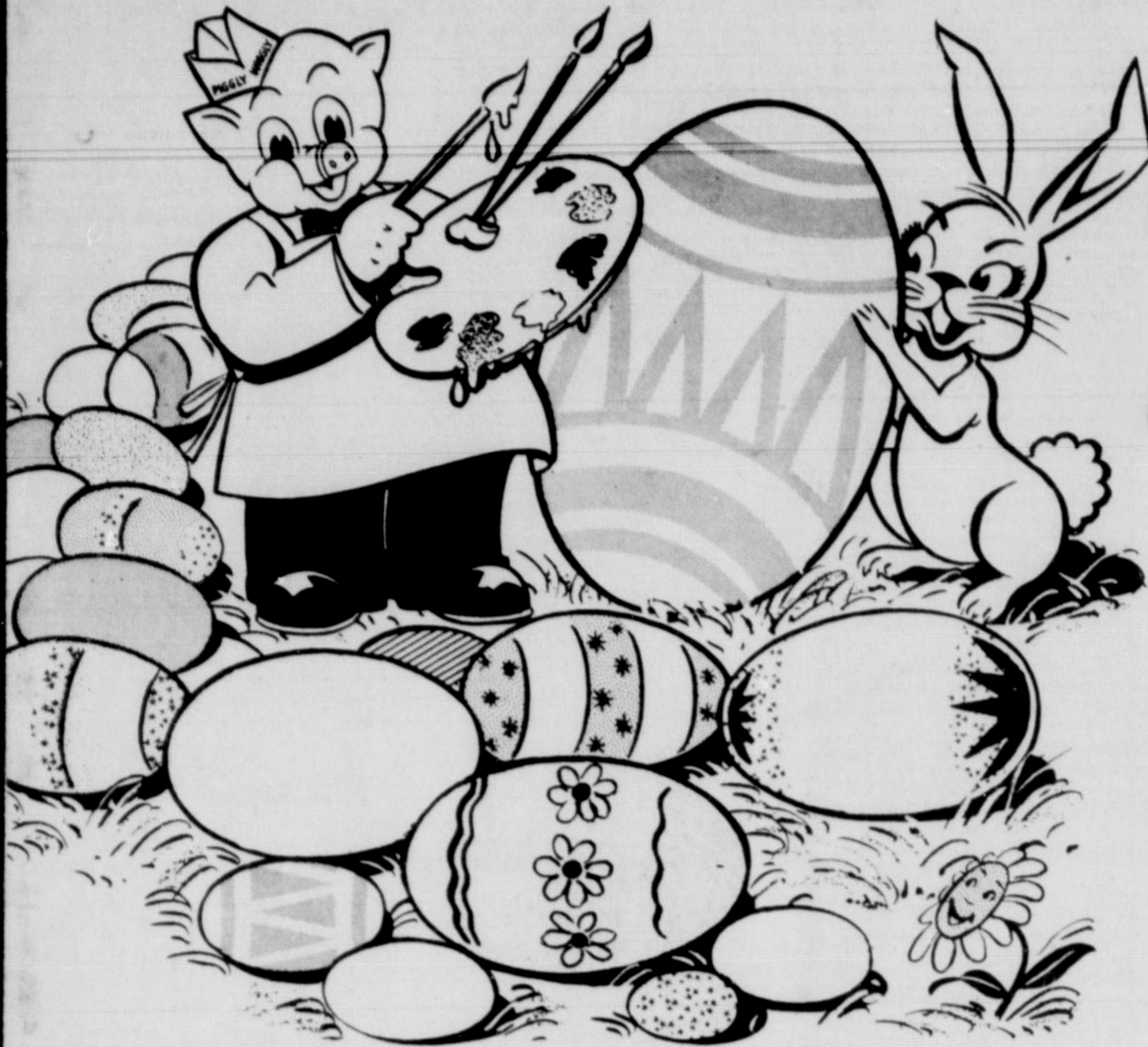
