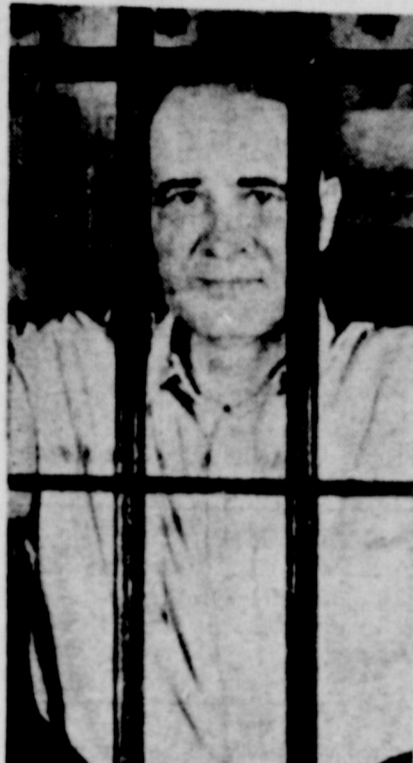

## Bids for Bridge Construction to Be Opened Dec. 1

## Engineers Running Survey to New Road East of Dryden

The State Highway Department last week published contractors notices to the effect that bids would be received until December 1 on the building of four bridges on highway 90 from east of Sanderson west to the county line.

One bridge will be placed across Sanderson Canyon just east of the town and two will be placed over the same canyon west of town. The fourth bridge is to be placed over Three Mile Draw. Bridge work and approaches will amount to 3,967 miles of construction, and according to E. L. Pearce, Resident engineer, work will probably get under way by the first of January. No definite time will be set of course until the contract is let. The work will represent an expenditure of approximately \$193,000.00.

Local engineers are also running a survey east of Sanderson thirty miles to the new road surface. The Commissioner's Court agreed to purchase right of way for the new road which will straighten the present route considerably. The majority of the dangerous curves and turns lay at the west end of the survey.

A survey has also been completed from Sanderson to the county line on the Fort Stockton Sanderson highway and it will also be necessary to obtain right of way for this new road.
